NEW CARNIVAL ATTRACTS COLLECTORS By Jol Olston

Thousands of Old Carnival Fans Join in Purchasing New Iridescent Glass Now in 11th Year of Production at Several Major Glass Companies.

The second carnival glass era is in full swing. New iridescent pressed glass has emerged as a whole new world in glass collectibles.

The era started formally when Imperial Glass Co., made 70 different items in blue and marigold in 1965. Other glass companies then joined in the revival and now production is midway in the 11th year of manufacture.

Literally millions of pieces have been made in thousands of patterns and colors and sold at reasonable prices. Of these, hundreds of pieces are obsolete and out of production. Many are diligently sought by collectors willing to pay many times the original price.

Coming Giant in Collectibles

New carnival has been tabbed a coming giant among collectibles. Some believe it may become the leading glass collectible

by the end of this decade -- or sooner!

New carnival received a big boost early in 1975. Original moulds were discovered for two famous patterns, God & Home and Stork & Rushes. Water sets were made and sold in these patterns in amethyst glass. The sets were pressed and iridized by the Westmoreland Glass Co., for L. G. Wright Company, glass jobbers. Many old carnival collectors bought their first new sets at that time.

Westmoreland, established in 1889 at Grapeville, Pa., in June announced a new line of 15 items in pastel blue carnival. Westmoreland became the eighth glass firm to take an important part in the new carnival glass revival.

Another factor has contributed much to the growth and expansion of new iridescent glass. Ready-mixed carnival finishes were perfected and marketed starting in 1972. One is a clear finish for white and pastel carnival. The second produces a golden-aurene rainbow finish on dark base carnival.

The old company secrecy surrounding its iridescent finishes is a thing of the past. The new finishes take as much work as the old to apply, but are more convenient and economical. They are expertly blended and rarely leave any unburned residue like some of the old finishes. The new finishes are sold by the gallon by a New Jersey conglomerate.

A summary follows on the amazing first decade of the new carnival era. Participating companies are introduced in a somewhat chronological order by entry date into the iridescent field.

IMPERIAL -- Some collectors date start of the second carnival era to 1961. This was when Imperial Glass Co., of Bellaire, O., began testing the market with a heavy grape goblet in marigold and blue carnival. Formal opening of "reissue" carnival by Imperial came in January 1965.

Starting in January, 1967, Imperial introduced a new color in carnival nearly every year until it had produced iridescent glass on eight base glass colors.

Green (Helios) came in 1967, red (Sunset Ruby) in 1968, ice blue (Azure Blue) in 1969, cobalt (Aurora Jewels) in 1970, followed by white and amber in 1972 and 1973.

Imperial lines were large and varied. Water sets and punchbowl sets were made at a pace unmatched by any company. In all, Imperial pressed 3-pint water pitchers in seven water set patterns in the decade.

Imperial made four patterns in marigold (Rubigold) and blue (Peacock). These were: Windmill, Lustre Rose, Four-70-Four and Heavy Grape. In addition, the Watermill water set appeared in a unique part-satin finish called marigold-suede. Heavy Grape was also made in green and amber.

The Robin Embossed set appeared in cobalt and white.

Tiger Lily came out in ice blue and Fieldflower was made in red.

Imperial followed a practice of removing each carnival line after 18 months to two years of production. In June, 1975, only the white line remained plus the mari-suede Windmill water set. The white carnival line also had been simplified considerably.

During the 1965-75 decade, Imperial also pioneered with souvenir, special edition and Christmas plates. Its Christmas plate series was based on the "12 Days of Christmas" theme. Imperial in 1972 became a subsidiary of Lennox Glass Co.

FENTONS -- The Fenton Art Glass Co., of Williamstown, W.Va., pressed 2,000 souvenir G/C humidors in amethyst carnival for Rose Presznick in 1969. Later that year, the company tested the market with a few Glass Finisher plates in black-amethyst carnival.

Fentons began carnival production in January, 1970, with a line of attractive pieces in amethyst and, later, in marigold. Three series of special plates were started and continued on an annual basis: Mother's Day, Christmas and a collectors' series. The general line was added to and revised year by year.

Production included some of the most interesting pieces known in new carnival including the Mermaid, Atlantis and Peacock vases, a Strawberry candy box, Heart candy box, tall covered compotes, Dolphin and Butterfly art pieces.

The famous Fenton Butterfly & Berry tumbler was made in amethyst but the matching water pitcher had not been manufactured up to July 1, 1975.

Fentons made several blown animal pieces in carnival including a 10" tall Alley Cat doorstop, a Rabbit and an Owl. A Giant Hen covered dish also was unique in carnival.

In January, 1974, Fentons pressed six items in amethyst Maple Leaf carnival for the Wright Glass Co. The pieces were the 4-pc. table setting and a water set. Tumblers were made readily but the pitcher was interrupted by production problems and discontinued. Only about 50 pitchers were made. In 1975, Fentons declined to make additional reproduction carnival from original moulds on the grounds the moulds had been designed for use before modern high production schedules were considered.

Fentons 1975 carnival line was simplified in part to make way for production of bicentennial glassware and a new line of art glass vases.

SMITH GLASS -- The L. E. Smith Glass Co., of Mount Pleasant, Pa., was induced to enter the new carnival field in 1971 to supply a Chicago dealer's order for 5,000 amethyst Kennedy and Lincoln plates.

Production went smoothly and Smith brought out a line of white carnival later that year. This was followed by amethyst carnival including Hobstar & Feather and Heavy Grape punchbowl sets.

Smith featured a water set in Hobstar pattern in four colors: amethyst, white, amber and green. The firm also made special plates, a Turkey covered dish, 3-pc table setting in Hobstar and a 9" tall Ohio Star vase. Collector plates included: Robert Lee, Jefferson Davis and the Morgan Dollar plate, all with lattice edge.

JEANNETTE -- The Jeanette (Pa.) Glass Co., entered carnival in 1969 with two amber marigold water sets in Arctic Ice and Swirl patterns. Arctic Ice featured five sizes of tumblers from the 6-ounce juice to the 25-ounce giant ice tea.

In 1971, Jeannette made a large line of marigold carnival including the Honeycomb water set in amber. The Jeannette firm, like the Indiana Glass Co., of Dunkirk, Ind., attain high production by means of automatic pressing equipment.

INDIANA -- The Indiana Glass Co., of Dunkirk, Ind., which made the HOACGA souvenir Goodluck red carnival water sets, entered carnival with a blue Embossed Grape line in 1971. Amber and pastel colors were added in 1972.

Indiana Glass also made a Sunset amberina line of 23 items in an Octagon varient pattern. Its Heirloom line in 1974 featured an amethyst water set with goblets instead of tumblers.

TIARA -- Tiara, an independent sales and merchandising company with offices at Dunkirk, Ind., in 1973 featured a line of light green carnival that included a water set in a geometric pattern made by Indiana Glass. Through its 1,200 agents, Tiara soon distributed all of the carnival. The 5-pc sets, with goblets in place of tumblers, jelly compote and a swan vase are in demand.

GUERNSEY -- The Guernsey Glass Co., operated in Cambridge, O., by Harold Bennett, manufactured a few water pitchers in the

Inverted Strawberry pattern in clear and sapphire blue and some amethyst tumblers in the same pattern in 1972. The plant iridized a few pitchers in a silvery finish. The tumbler iridizing was done by Robert Hansen, Bridgeport, Mich., and Terry Crider, then of Lima, O., two specialists in custom iridizing.

ST. CLAIR -- The St. Clair Glass Co., of Elwood, Ind., in three periods, 1963-64, 1968-70 and 1973-74, made carnival tumblers in marigold, white, cobalt, ruby and a few in amethyst. The patterns were: Inverted Fan & Feather, Holly, Cactus, Fleur de Lys and Grape/Cable.

Toothpick holders in nine or ten patterns and many colors also were made. The St. Clair firm never made a carnival water pitcher. Its largest piece of carnival to date has been the covered sugar bowl in the Inv. Fan & Feather pattern.

WESTMORELAND -- The Westmoreland (pa.) Glass Company made its first new carnival for the L. G. Wright Co., early in 1975. Water sets in amethyst were made from original moulds of the God & Home pattern, as stated. Water sets and berry sets in amethyst and marigold also were made from old moulds of the Stork & Rushes pattern.

Since the God & Home water set in blue was among the top 20 most popular sets in old carnival, the reproduction sets were very popular especially when priced at \$125 retail compared to the \$2,500 price tag on the old. All reproduction pieces were marked with a W-Circle in the base.

Westmoreland in March made water sets and 4-pc table sets in the firm's old High Hob pattern moulds in amethyst and green opalescent glass. Market test turns also were made in amethyst carnival of the Checkerboard pattern boxes, hen and duck covered dishes and a 3-pc child's table setting.

In early May, Westmoreland made a few amethyst water sets in the Checkerboard pattern which is known in three colors of old carnival tumblers. A child's play punchbowl set also appeared.

At the mid-June gift and glass exhibit in New York City, Westmoreland unveiled an attractive line of 15 items in pastel blue carnival. Included were the Checkerboard water set, bowls, covered boxes and the child's punchbowl set.

In addition to the iridizing of production carnival at the glass works mentioned in this article, Bob Hansen and Terry Crider have custom iridized many different toothpicks, tumblers, goblets, spooners and other items of comparable size.

During the festival days both factories make special pieces that are most interesting. One lady told me that last year at the festival she obtained a vase made from a glass in marigold carnival cactus pattern. Also a sample of the train before it was fired and finished. One of Roberts most interesting pieces this year was a Cobalt Blue blown fish, very large and beautiful in carnival and he only made 25 and each one was different.

In 1973 Bob St.Clair made the Sheaf of Wheat toothpick holders for the HCGA that were given to members attending the American Convention. Paul St.Clair, who returns from Florida each spring, made a beautiful train engine during his break. The detail is very fine. Ed St.Clair last summer made disc with Home Sweet Home, Mother, and Mason emblem. Paul also made a limited number of small birds in Cobalt. They were very tiny and some were signed in script. Joe's latest piece is a Cobalt Blue plate. Very outstanding cupid's design.

Anyone who is in the area it would be worth stopping over to see. One never knows what they may find. Just think about the whimseys you might find. See you all in Elwood if we can possibly make it.

NEWS FROM "YOU ALL"

Dear Carnival Glass Lovers: This new publication dealing with only new carnival glass is a much needed paper. In it, the lovers of this glassware may indulge their enthusiasm and exchange news and ideas they might be hesitant to put forth in the publications dedicated to the "old" carnival glass.

I know some collectors who like both old and new pieces in carnival - I happen to be one myself. So, let's face the facts. Many people could not afford a "God & Home" water set in the old. This re-issue of the Wright Glass Co. from the old molds allows those less endowed with worldly goods than more fortunate collectors, to own a set such as this. It does not decrease the value of the old production for no attempt was $\overline{\rm made}$ to copy the same color the old set enjoys.

Look at many pieces of the St. Clair Glass Company - How beautiful their carnival glass pieces are in patterns that were never made in the old carnival glass - such as their "Rose in Snow" goblets; the "Panelled Grape" wines and many others. It's true that some of their new carnival glass is patterned after the old, but no attempt made to deceive collectors.

The Hanson carnival glass are coveted items. Much of Smith, Indiana Glass Company, Colony, etc., are superior items. I can

see no reason why those collectors who like a thing of beauty whether it is new or old should be censored for their tastes. Neither do I think it should be a matter of controversy - unless our minds are elastic and open to all loveliness we could wind up as a miser cherishing only his gold and silver and shunning the worth of other things. Let us not shut our minds as such and give due consideration and courtesy to other collectors be they collectors of new, or old, carnival!

Remember how once only the wealthy could afford cut glass? Then when the Sandwich Glass company invented a method of pressing glass into lovely lacy patterns, many which resembled the old cut glass ones, our wealthy dowagers decided it was no longer a mark of distinction to own cut glass when every servant girl might own a piece of pressed glass so like the cut quality that at times it was hard to distinguish the difference.

Carnival glass again is within the reach of all - not just a cherished few - those who are able to buy the old and rare pieces in this are fortunate, but a need is being fulfilled for others in the "new" carnival and the re-issues. These collectors have looked in vain for information on their new pieces so this publication will fill that need as well as an opportunity to "share" with like minds and enthusiasm. All collectors of new carnival should give this publication its heartiest support. They will find much information and enjoyment in so doing.

From what I can determine by comparison I feel the carnival they started making about 1967 is the closest to the old that I have seen. However it seems I'm always bring up the tail end when it comes to getting in on a good deal. I have several of their tooth picks, goblets and sugar bowl. I wasn't lucky enough to start soon enough to get any of their ice blue products except one goblet. I have tried hard to buy their ice blue items but there are none available.

It truly seems that here in Central Florida there is NO interest in carnival of any age - around Jacksonville, St. Petersburg, and Miami there is some interest but all these places are 125 to 250 miles from me and it's extremely difficult to commute this distance.

I am definitely interested in your idea of a publication on new carnival glass. They have had nearly everything else available for sometime and I for one admit to being completely ignorant about new glass. One friend of mine who has visited with Mrs. Presznick said 3 years ago that she was selling the new, but my friends came home booing it. Now they are sorry -I have never had an opportunity to travel in Mrs. Presznick's area as my friends, but I know had I been with them when they visited Rose's museum, I personally would have bought some of the new she had at that time. I don't recall having seen any of the IB sets for sale that were put out by Imperial, but I did buy some of their dark repros - dark water set, table sets, etc. Also have a set of the Fentons B&B tumblers and was sick they didn't do the pitcher to go with them - Indiana glass put out some red pitchers (similar to Diamond Lace) and red goblets which I invested in and think they are beautiful. Your red souvenir water set is the thing that drew me into HOACGA. I had to have that and to my knowledge no other club has offered any souvenir to equal this red water set.

If I can and when I can I buy any of the St. Clair carnival that was made by the older St. Clairs. I'd like to get any of their toothpicks, sugars, tumblers, goblets or wines that they made around 67 to 70. It's just never advertised.

COURAGE, CONVENIENCE AND COLOR

Seldom do we find this triple value in a book. Collectors, dealers, students and curators should welcome the latest work on Carnival Glass by Rose M. Presznick, ENCYCLOPEDIA OF NEW CARNIVAL AND IRIDESCENT GLASS. The courage can be found in the concept of the work. It is excellently done with complete information about glass companies, patterns and prices at time of issue, dates of issue, dates of discontinued production and up-to-date values of the pieces. Each page is encased in an acetate protector and bound in a three-ring binder which will allow for insertion of new pages to keep the volume updated or for the owner to insert pages with personal information ... that's convenience. For color the author has included actual catalog sheets from the manufacturers. If anyone buys a new piece now at an old piece price it will just have to be because they are not interested in the complete story and are ripe for taking. The hard work and research will be appreciated by those who are knowledgeable.
