



On December 1, 2000, Frank M. Fenton will celebrate his 85th birthday. Frank began working at the Fenton Art Glass Company in the mid-1930s. After the death of their father, Frank L. Fenton, in 1948, Frank became company President and his brother Bill became Vice-President. For several decades, Frank was deeply involved in every area of Fenton glass. He was ultimately responsible for all aspects of glass production from color chemistry and product design to work scheduling and labor negotiations! Frank served as Chairman of the Board from 1978-1986 and then retired to the position of Historian.

For many years, Frank has been a great friend to glass collectors. He has given numerous talks and informative seminars at club conventions, and he has helped many clubs with convention souvenirs made by Fenton Art Glass. Dozens of books on American glass mention Frank in their "acknowledgements" sections, and he has been very generous in sharing his time and expertise with many aspiring authors and glass researchers.

Frank M. Fenton (1915-2005)

Frank M. Fenton, Historian, past President and past Chairman of the Board of the Fenton Art Glass Company, passed away on August 9, 2005, following a series of lingering health issues. Frank, the fifth of eight children born to Lillian and Frank L. Fenton, was born December 1, 1915, and was a lifelong resident of Williamstown, West Virginia.



Frank Fenton graduated from Marietta College in 1936. Frank was hired full-time at Fenton Art Glass in June, 1936. One of his early tasks was to patch the factory roof with tar. Years later, when asked if he started at the bottom of the company and worked his way up, Frank liked to reply, "No, I started at the top and worked my way down," before recalling the holes in the roof.

Along with his brother Bill, Frank assumed leadership positions at Fenton when their father and an uncle died in 1948. Under their stewardship for almost 40 years, the organization grew from a modest business to a company known worldwide for its innovative products. Most recently filling the role of Fenton Art Glass Historian, Frank was last seen publicly at a May appearance with West Virginia Governor Joe Manchin in celebration of the company's 100th anniversary.

Frank often made presentations to Fenton collector clubs, and his love for family and Fenton glass were always evident, as was his sense of humor. A friend to several generations of glass collectors, Frank is recalled fondly by many Fenton glass collectors who remember the pleasant times they spent with him. Glass researcher Bill Heacock liked to say that Frank "casts a long shadow." Heacock's jest is literally and figuratively true, for Frank was both very tall and quite well-known among glass collectors!

Fenton collectors often ask about Frank's favorite pieces of Fenton glass. "Oh, I have about 50 favorites, a different one for each week," he often replied, "But I've been known to change my mind and add some new ones!" Truth be told, Frank enjoyed some of Fenton's earliest (1908-1910) Carnival glass just as much as he liked pieces made in 1999 or 2005!

He was active in various community organizations, including Artsbridge, the First United Methodist Church in Williamstown, Marietta Rotary, and the Williamstown Community Association. Frank Fenton served 36 years on the Marietta College Board of Trustees. Frank, along with Bill Fenton, established the Fenton Foundation to support local community needs. Frank most recently donated \$25,000 to the town of Williamstown, along with five acres of land, to create a park.

Frank was preceded in death by his wife, Elizabeth, in 1980 and his brother Wilmer "Bill" in December 2002. He is survived by his sons Frank, Tom, Mike, and George as well as many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Granddaughter Lynn Fenton Erb comments on Frank's service work: "By his example, 'Papa' taught me the importance of church as a foundation for life and family. He also taught me the importance of giving time, talent and financial support to organizations and to people in need. When he takes hold of a project—whether it's a new ambulance for the community or a church building—he doesn't let go until it's finished!"

Frank M. Fenton left a wonderful legacy to the Fenton family, the Fenton Art Glass Company, the Fenton Museum and glass collectors everywhere. He will be greatly missed.

All Fenton USA products will be reviewed and purchased over the internet and through a local representative. We will not mail printed catalogs for these collections and the selling periods will be short. For our latest Fenton USA collection please visit: www.fentonartglass.com/jan2008.asp. We will be taking orders on the current collection through February 20th so act fast! The purpose for this procedural change is to allow us to know what is on order before production starts so we can more efficiently match the production with the sales to reduce costs and avoid overruns.
- Fenton Art Glass is still a family owned and operated business. We are now in our 103rd year.
 We will be adding the letters "USA" to the Fenton logo in our moulds to confirm the Fenton USA items are made in America.
- Fenton International, our new import division, features handmade products from around the
 world. I have included color sales sheets for your review. Many of these products will begin to
 ship in May. There is something special about each collection and I'm sure you'll agree the
 designs are unique and different from others in the market. Fenton International will carry the
 same strict quality and craftsmanship standards that Fenton is known for.

I encourage you to visit the January Collection website as soon as you can and replenish your Fenton Art Glass inventory. In addition, please enjoy the new products from our Fenton International division and contact your local representative or our Customer Service directly if you have questions or orders.
