We had a short recess for coffee and donuts then John & Lucile Britt had a program on all the known Millersburg and Cambridge tumblers. They had a tumbler of each pattern on display as well as told about each one.

Sadie Treff moved that we adjourn the meeting and it was seconded by John Britt. The October meeting will be October 26, 1980 at the Mission Holiday Inn, 7240 W. 63. George and Linda McGrew will present the program.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES
PATTERNS THAT OFTEN CAUSE CONFUSION

We are convinced that the following patterns cause more confusion as to the correct name among dealers and collectors than any of the other patterns on the long list of Carnival glass tumblers. We often hear of the "Crackle" tumbler called "Soda Gold" or maybe even labled by another pattern name known as "Tree of Life". At another place you might see "Tree of Life" named "Crackle" or perhaps called "Soda Gold". We will endeavor to point out here some distinct differences among these tumblers which might enable the collector to remember them by the correct name.



SODA GOLD IN MARIGOLD, SMOKE AND PASTEL MARIGOLD

Let us first discuss the very pretty pattern called "Soda Gold". This tumbler was made by the Imperial Glass Company of Bellaire, Ohio. The Imperial company was one of the three largest producers of old carnival glass. The "Soda Gold" tumbler has the true collar base, which is a characteristic of many other Imperial tumblers such as Waffle Block, Field Glower, Windmill, Lustre Rose, Fashion and Imperial Grape just to name a few. Keep in mind that the "Soda Gold" is the only one of this group of tumblers we feature this month that has the collar base. This tumbler has a very pronounced stippled like background that actually consists of thousands of tiny raised dots. This in my opinion, adds a great deal of class and beauty to this tumbler.

The so called spider web type of veins are much more pronounced on this tumbler than they are on those of the "Tree of Life" or "Crackle" tumblers. These veins also extend out further from the tumbler itself. This design is also carried out on the bottom of the tumblers base. In my opinion the "Soda Gold" is a very fine tumbler in every respect. It has excellent color and super iridescence. Without a doubt, it is the best of this group of so called confusing tumblers that we are featuring this month. Besides coming in a deep rich marigold, it can also be found in a beautiful pastel marigold that exhibits a lot of pink, green, blue and lavender hues in the iridescence. It also can be found in a very pretty smoke color that also shows many different hues in its iridescence. It also has been reported in the clambroth color.



SODA GOLD AND TREE OF LIFE

Picture #2 shows the "Soda Gold" along side the smaller "Tree of Life" tumbler. The "Tree of Life" tumbler has a distinct shape in that it bulges out somewhat in the middle. It does not carry any stippling effect whatsoever on its background. This is in contrast to that of the "Soda Gold" and "Crackle" tumblers. The "Tree of Life" is made of much thinner glass than are the other tumblers of this group. The same pattern is also carried out on the base of this tumbler.

Besides the regular sized tumbler shown above, "Tree of Life" tumblers are also found in the tall lemonade tumbler and the very small juice size tumbler. "Tree of Life" tumblers in most areas are not too easy to find. An interesting bit about this tumbler is that the majority of them in which I have seen have come from the State of Texas. I have also found this to be the case with the beautiful "White Oak" tumbler.



CRACKLE IN MARIGOLD AND GREEN

Note the distinct pedestal type base of the "Crackle" tumbler shown above. This is probably the easiest way for you to remember and recognize the name of this tumbler. This distinctly different shape should help you from confusing this tumbler from any of the other tumblers that we are discussing at this time. It has a very fine stippled background and a network of fine crack-like lines. These lines are much finer and more irregular than those on the "Soda Gold" tumbler. It is a two mold tumbler with no pattern on the base. Besides the marigold, it can be found in a light greenish color. The "crackle" pattern tumblers were undoubtedly produced at a much later date than were those of the "Soda Gold" pattern.

TREE BARK TUMBLERS

The small tumbler on the right is the true "Tree Bark" pattern in Carnival glass. It is sometimes referred to as "Fisherman's Net", but it is generally known as "Tree Bark" by the majority of Carnival glass tumbler collectors. The design somewhat favors a large fish net. The late Mrs. Presznick called this pattern "Fisherman's Net" while Mrs. Hartung named it "Tree Bark". The entirely different pattern on the large tumbler shown above on the left is often referred to as "Tree Bark Variant" by many dealers and collectors. It has also been reported to me that the large tumbler on the left, which was made in at least three sizes, has recently been produced. They are certainly not in the same class as the "Soda Gold" tumbler in either age, beauty or desirability. You can usually purchase these variant type "Tree Bark" tumblers at a very low price at flea markets.

TREE OF LIFE & CRAUELLE

"Craquelle" the taller of the two tumblers shown above, is pictured here with the "Tree of Life" tumbler. We are showing them here side by side in order for you to note the differences in the two tumblers. The "Craquelle" tumbler is similar in shape to the "Tree of Life", but is covered with uneven craquelling figurations that are very distinct indeed. The inside of the "Craquelle" tumblers contain twelve panels, while the "Tree of Life" carries no type of panelling whatsoever. The network of vein like figurations on the "Tree of Life" tumbler are worked into the actual surface of the tumbler. This is a very fine and unusual tumbler. It came from the Ripley tumbler collection.

In summing up this group of tumblers with confusing names, we might say that the "Tree Bark" and "Crackle" tumblers are considered toward the bottom of the list by most tumbler collectors and have a rather low value. I have included them here to show them in comparison to such fine tumblers as "Soda Gold" and "Tree of Life". In fact, most tumbler collections that I have seen do include these very easy to find "Crackle" and "Tree Bark" patterns. The "Craquelle" tumbler is unique, hard to find and is a fine addition to any Carnival glass collection. This is # 33 of this series on Carnival glass tumblers. Next month we will go the top of the list and discuss the "Frolicking Bears" tumbler.

TINY OCTAGON CORDIAL DOES EXIST

The tiny "Octagon" cordial shown above along side the regular wine glass, to my knowledge, has never been reported or even mentioned in any of the Carnival glass books. This past summer at one of the conventions I saw this little gem illustrated in an old Imperial catalog that is owned by Ruth Schinestuhl. I certainly appreciate her generosity in sharing this book with me in order that I might read it. This was the first time that I had ever read or seen any information on this particular piece. This old Imperial Glass Company catalog was called their catalog # 200. It did not contain any printed date to let us know when it was actually published, but it did contain a world of information and pictures. While at the convention, I spent several nights reading from this catalog, which included many other interesting illustrations and material. I was very delighted to see this little cordial pictured here, because I had been searching for material and information on this piece for several years. I actually missed out on buying one of these cordials once at an auction. It was not listed as a cordial in their brochure, and from where I sat at the auction it looked like a regular wine when it was auctioned off. At that time, I actually had no idea that a cordial even existed in the "Octagon" pattern. I can

assure you that my lack of knowledge on this particular item was not because I had not read all the available books. At the time of that auction I had never even heard of one of these "Octagon" cordials. I am quite sure that many of you too have not seen this tiny piece of Carnival glass. The cute little cordial that we show above was found last summer by the Andreatta's. They graciously consented to sell it to us to add to our goblet wine and cordial collection. Since the time we missed that one at the auction and learned that one really did exist, we had been looking hard to find one. Thus, a two year search and an empty place on our shelf has now been filled.



OCTAGON WINE, GOBLET AND CORDIAL

The above picture shows this little cordial with the "Octagon" goblet and wine. I am amazed at the fact that this "Octagon" cordial is so very hard to find, while the large goblet seems to be quite plentiful. The cordial measures $3\frac{1}{2}$ " high, $1\frac{5}{8}$ " across the top and $1\frac{5}{8}$ " across the base. The regular wine glass is 4" high and 2" across the top and $1\frac{7}{8}$ " at the base. The goblet is $6\frac{1}{2}$ " tall, $3\frac{1}{4}$ " across the top with a base measurement of $3\frac{1}{8}$ ".

OCTAGON WINES IN AQUA, WHITE, PURPLE, MARIGOLD

We have included the above picture in order to show you the extremely rare wines in the true Aqua and Frosty White colors. These are the only two wines we have ever seen in the aqua and white colors. It might be well to point out that Imperial actually made only a very small amount of white in old Carnival glass. The "Octagon" wine sets, which includes the decanter, are highly sought after by collectors today. The purple set is quite hard to find and is very beautiful with super iridescence. The Robert Grissom's of Raytown, Missouri own one of these sets in purple of which they are very proud. While the wines are known to exist in the various colors mentioned above, to my knowledge the goblet has been reported only in marigold. I might also point out that the "Octagon" pattern is sometimes referred to as "Princess Lace".

MIRRORED LOTUS - This little piece is unusual in several respects. In the first place it is a seldom seen pattern in any color. The fact it is white makes it quite scarce. Still more unusual is the rose bowl shape. Combining these features makes this a rare piece of Carnival.

It stands $2\frac{1}{2}$ " high and is $5\frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter. It has been shaped from the $7\frac{1}{2}$ " bowl which is the piece usually seen in this pattern. It is also found in a bonbon. Listings show this as also being made in a plate, but I have not seen one.

This is a Denton product and carries the Berry and Leaf Circles as an exterior pattern. It is usually seen in blue or marigold, but the two or three rose bowls I have heard about have been white.
