GRAPE ARBOR----A NORTHWOOD SUPERSTAR

The "Grape Arbor" tumbler, while not one of the rarest, is most desirable and one of the prettiest of all our Carnival glass tumblers. This pattern was made in a wide variety of colors, with marigold being the most commonly found. Tumblers in this pattern will be encountered somewhat less often in white, purple and pastel blue. The pretty pastel blue tumblers were made in several different shades of that highly sought after color--ranging from a very light hue on through to an even darker shade than what is normally thought of as ice blue. We have four of these pastel blue tumblers in our collection, all in distinctively different hues. The rarest colors in this pattern are pastel green and cobalt blue. "Grape Arbor" water sets in either of these two colors would be classed as rare. I have seen only one cobalt blue water pitcher and only a very few tumblers in that color. To find a pastel green water set in this pattern would be a dream come true. A "Grape Arbor" tumbler, pitcher or water set in any color would make a fine addition to your collection. If you own any of these pieces you should be proud of them. In my opinion however, "Grape Arbor" pieces in pastel blue and pastel green are even more exciting and are outstanding examples of this fine pattern.

These two pastel tumblers are so pretty that it makes one wonder how anybody would ever want to actually use them. But back when these sets were made in about 1914, the set probably retailed for around two dollars or less for the complete set. To illustrate some of the prices received for Carnival glass at about that time, we find in an old 1910 Butler Borthers catalog that a complete tankard G/C water set was offered for 65¢ wholesale. In that display, it states that this is an unusually rich one to retail for one dollar per set. The display ad shows the picture of the tankard G/C water set. In the same catalog you could purchase either a Butterfly and Plume or Panelled Dandelion water set for 62¢ each. The colors offered were sunset, violet and royal blue. The large 21" vase in the Rustic pattern was listed at 60¢ each and the G/C hatpin holders and puff boxes (now called powder jars) were 89¢ and 92¢ per dozen respectively. Yes that is right--this is the price per dozen quoted in this wholesale catalog. G/C ferneries were listed at 69¢ each and the "Iridescent" combination fruits and flower holder (now called wide panel or colonial epergne) was priced at \$1.35. Anybody for making out an order? So I guess at the prices paid for these beautiful pieces of iridized glass at that time, one can well understand why people would put them into use, even though they actually seem to us "just to pretty to use".

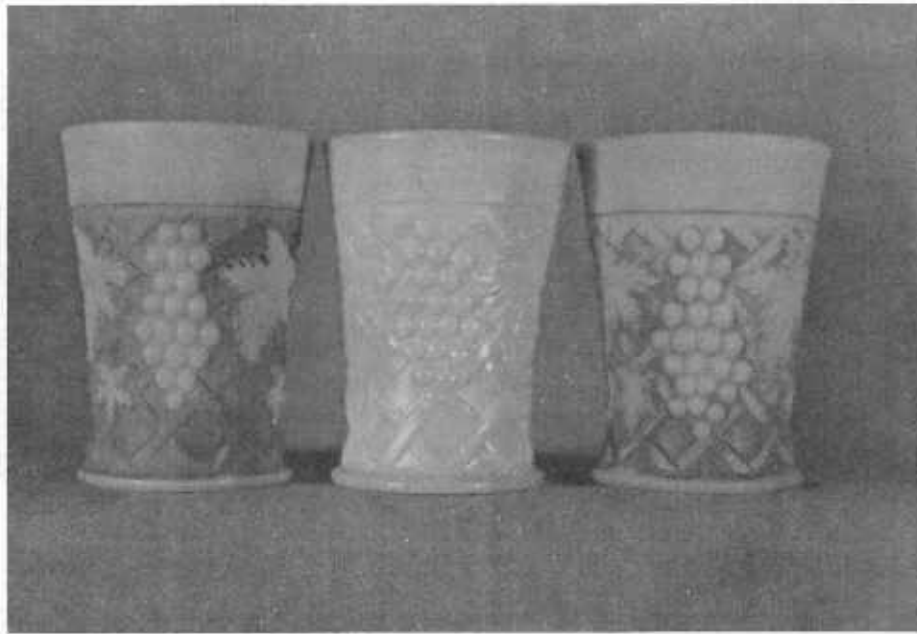
Note the rather unusual shape of the "Grape Arbor" tumblers. They flare out at both the top and at the base. This shape was not used often by the Northwood Company. Wisteria is the only exception in which I am aware. I have included a snapshot of the Wisteria tumblers in order for you to see the near likeness of the two tumblers. The Wisteria examples are shown in pastel green, white and pastel blue. These are the only colors that have been reported in the Wisteria pattern. Both these patterns have the same lattice background. The design and workmanship are outstanding on both of these fine tumblers. There are very few differences in the two tumblers. One features grapes on the lattice while the other exhibits pretty Wisteria flowers vining up the lattice work. Another difference is that the Wisteria, generally speaking, is much harder to find than the "Grape Arbor". As mentioned above the Wisteria pattern pieces are found only in the three pastel colors while the "Grape Arbor" is known to have been made in many colors and shades of colors.

Another feature that probably many collectors do not realize is that "Grape Arbor" tumblers can be found with both the ribbed and smooth interiors. I have noticed quite a number of marigold tumblers in this pattern with the plain interior, though the big majority of "Grape Arbor" tumblers will have the ribbing on the inside. Both tumblers usually contain the famous N in a circle which is located on the inside of the base. The tankard type pitchers of these sets were not marked. This fact is not unusual with Northwood tall tankard pitchers, however.

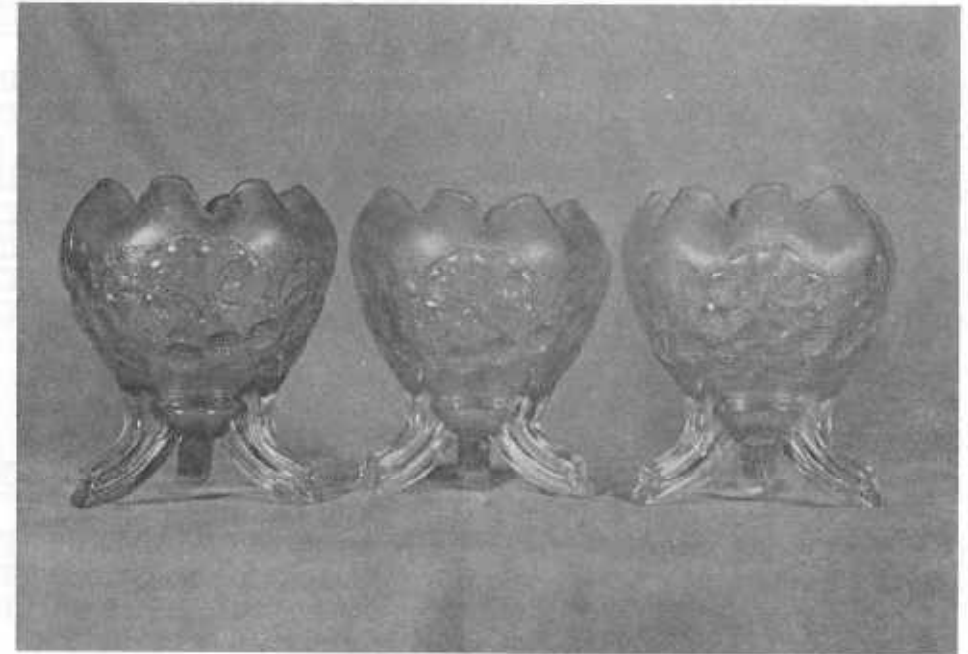


GRAPE ARBOR IN CUSTARD GLASS

It is interesting to note that Northwood also made the "Grape Arbor" pattern in the highly collectable custard glass. I find that these custard glass tumblers are quite hard to locate. They were made with nutmeg staining, pink stain and with a blue decor. The tumbler shown in the center of the custard glass photo has the Carnival iridescence applied. The iridescence on this tumbler is outstanding. This type of iridised glass is sometimes called pearl Carnival. In tumblers this type of glass is usually found in the Grape & Gothic Arches pattern. Mr. Owens has one of these pictured in his Carnival glass tumbler book #208.

This article, featuring the "Grape Arbor" tumbler is # 38 in this series on Carnival glass tumblers. Next month we will discuss another fine Northwood pattern known as "Greek Key".

NORTHWOOD'S "DAISY AND PLUME"

In the above snapshot we show the popular "Daisy and Plume" rosebowls in pastel green, white and pastel blue. "Daisy and Plume" rosebowls in these three pastel colors are considered quite rare. They are usually found in the vivid colors of marigold, purple and green. While I have never seen one of these in aqua opal, I've heard from a reliable source that one is actually known in aqua opal. These pastel three footed rosebowls carry a berry pattern on their interior. You probably can notice these berries through the glass in the above picture. Some of the vivid colored rosebowls in this pattern have the berries on the inside. Others will show a sort of ribbing on their interior. Occasionally one of these can be found with the glass flared out into a three footed candy dish. Sometimes, but not always, these pieces are marked with the "N". The proud owners of these three pretty rosebowls are Ron Kuhn and Don Kime of Wichita, Ks. At one time they were part of the writers collection.



In picture #2 we show this same pattern in a single footed crimped top rosebowl. They usually carry the "N" marking. This piece is sometimes flared out into a compote shape. This shape of rosebowl is usually found in the marigold color, but I have also seen them in purple. Lucile collects goblets and I have looked long and far to find one of these pieces made in a true goblet. At the present time I have never seen or even heard of one. It would seem that there should be a few around, as these pieces evidently came out of the mold with straight up sides and then crimped into the rosebowl or compote shape. I would consider a true goblet in this pattern as a rare piece.

BLACKBERRY WHIMSY VASE - This lacy edge Fenton piece is usually seen in various hat shapes. The whimsy vase shown here is rare. This piece carries the Blackberry pattern on the interior and the usual Fenton Basketweave on the exterior. The standard hat shapes in this lacy edge pattern may or may not carry the Blackberry pattern.

In addition to the hat shape, this pattern comes in larger bowls and is found occasionally flattened into a plate. These Blackberry pieces are found in a very wide range of colors, including red. The hat shape can also be found with advertising. The vase shown here is blue. I don't know if it was made in other colors or whether or not it has been found without the Blackberry pattern on the interior.

GENESIS

At this year's HOACGA Convention in Overland Park, Kansas, April 23, 24, 25 and 26 the guest speaker will be Mr. Frank Fenton. Mr. Fenton's father started the Carnival Glass craze back in the early 1900's. Mr. Fenton can give us a look at those early days and how his factory has survived thru the years. Don't miss this chance to hear firsthand of how Carnival Glass came into being.

The following article appeared in the Feb. 4, 1981 edition of the Antique Trader:

Dear Sirs. We did not renew our subscription to The Antique Trader last August. We were at a friend's home and read the January 14, 1981 issue and want to re-subscribe. We are Carnival Glass collectors and really enjoyed the article by Don Moore. We are good friends and have visited with Connie and Don in their home on several occasions. They are members of the Heart of America Carnival Glass Association, which my husband is and has been President of the past four years. We have the largest membership of all the Carnival Glass Clubs and have had a very good souvenir made each year. Fenton Art Glass Co. has made the majority of our souvenirs and will be making our souvenir again this year. Mr. Frank Fenton will be our guest speaker this year at our convention, April 23, 24, 25, 26, 1981. We fell quite honored to be having him here. We are hoping William Heacock will also be with us to speak on Thursday the 23. Things with Mr. Heacock have not been finalized at this writing.

The H.O.A.C.G.A. started in 1972 with nine couples as charter members. They met in their homes until April of 1973. They signed up more members and it has grown over the years and we now have over 1400 members. Cooley and I joined in the summer of 1973 and the local members decided we should have a convention. Some of us stuck our necks out to come up with a souvenir other than plates of mugs the I.C.G.A. or A.C.G.A. had put out. We belong to these clubs plus four more. I'm a director in I.C.G.A. This year it will be the Candle Lamp made by Fenton with another company making the metal fixture to hold the candle. Our Convention will be April 23, 24, 25, 26, 1981 at the Holiday Inn in Mission, Ks. There will be a large Auction of old Carnival from a very fine collection conducted by Mr. John Woody on Saturday.
