

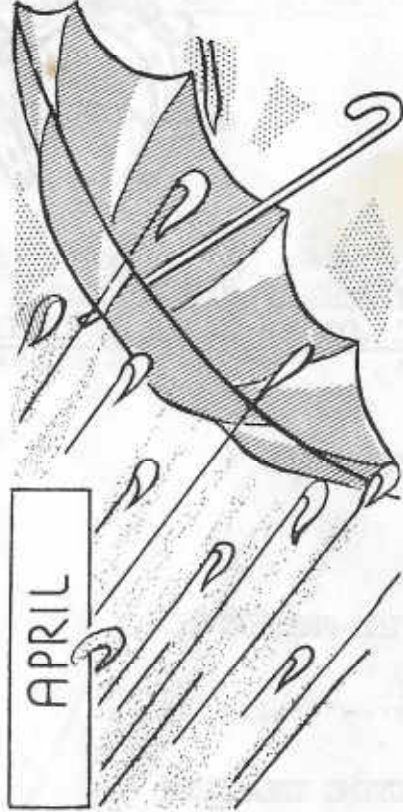

MINUTES OF THE MARCH MEETING

The March meeting of H.O.A.C.G.A. was held in the home of Cooley & Marge Miller. A great meal was served to the club members and then the meeting was called to order at 2:30 P.M.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by Linda McGrew and were approved as read.

The Treasurer's report was given by Elizabeth Bolles with a recorded balance on hand as of March 15 of \$10,754.12. It was noted that of this amount the glass for the Souvenir, a major cost, is still outstanding. The report was approved and placed on file for audit.

Bob Grissom gave an update on the souvenir. The pouring of the glass will be on March 23. M/M Cooley Miller and M/M Bob Grissom for the initial pouring. The banquet mug will also be poured at this time in Vaseline Opal. Mr. Frank Fenton has stated that he will arrive for the convention on Thursday April 23.

Florence Millins made a motion to allow each membership to purchase two pairs of Candle Lamps instead of two single lamps. The preference being for pairs this year. However, for those desiring only one lamp it is not necessary to buy as a pair.

The 1980 Ice Green Hatpin Holder souvenir will be available for members at the convention. There is a small quantity left over and will be sold by Roland Kuhn.

Sadie Treff gave a report on the Convention planning. The menu will be Prime Rib at a cost of \$12.60 per plate for the banquet. This cost also includes the Vaseline Opal mug.

The Saturday evening "Chuckwagon" meal will be free for members who supported the club by purchasing the 1981 souvenir or \$3.00 per plate if no souvenir is desired.

A motion was made by Sara Love to issue a check to Sadie Treff in the amount of \$1600 to cover expenses of the convention. The motion carried

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

GREEK KEY-A FINE NORTHWOOD TUMBLER



GREEK KEY IN GREEN, MARIGOLD AND PURPLE

In Carnival glass "Greek Key" is one of those pretty tumblers that you very seldom have a chance to purchase. Mrs. Marion Hartung, in her Carnival glass price guide, lists the water set in this pattern as rare. Richard Owens, in his Carnival glass tumbler book, states the "Greek Key" tumblers are considered rare and desirable. I would agree with him in that they are very desirable. I also consider them rather rare, but not in the same class of rareness as Multi-Fruits and Flowers, Cone & Tie, Checkerboard, Northwood's Cherry (Cherry & Cable), Fentonia Fruit, Gay Nineties, Inverted Feather, just to name a few which are much more rare. Only occasionally does a "Greek Key" water set ever show up that is for sale. This pattern is definitely Northwood and the tumblers are nearly always marked with the "N" in a circle. The tankard type pitcher however, like most Northwood tankards, are not marked.

"Greek Key" tumblers in Carnival glass have been reported only in the marigold, green and purple colors. In my opinion, the purple one is a little harder to find. I believe I have seen more green tumblers in the "Greek Key" pattern than I have seen either in marigold or purple. But as I have previously stated, they are not easy to find in any color. I have seen a number of these tumblers with the year 1914 etched on the side near the top of the tumbler. I assume that they were made at about that time.

It is interesting to note that the Northwood Glass Company's water set patterns usually featured artistic floral or fruit patterns. In this sense, the "Greek Key" tumbler could be called rather unique. Northwood's Singing Birds pattern does feature birds, but in most cases his water sets uses pretty floral or fruit patterns as their main motif.

Another interesting point that you might or might not have noticed is that the "Greek Key" tumblers are made with exactly the same panelling and shape as Northwood's Dandelion, Oriental Poppy, Singing Birds, Springtime and Wishbone tumblers. In other words all six of the above mentioned tumblers are made exactly alike with only the pattern itself being different.

In addition to the water set, "Greek Key" was also made in bowls and plates. "Greek Key" plates are considered quite rare and one in the cobalt blue color should be rated as very rare. I have seen two of these plates in cobalt blue. I have never heard of a "Greek Key" tumbler in cobalt blue nor in any of the pastel colors.

I consider the "Greek Key" tumbler as one of the very fine tumblers in Carnival glass. It is most desirable and would be rated high on most tumbler collectors list of top Carnival glass tumblers.

In this series on Carnival glass tumblers, this being #39, we have tried to cover some of the very rare, rare and some that are in the more common class. Next month we will discuss the "Fashion" tumbler, which is one of those patterns that fall in the more common group, especially in the marigold color.

RARE CHECKERBOARD PIECES

The "Checkerboard" was made by the Westmoreland Glass Company and was originally called their "Old Quilt" pattern. Westmorland actually made very little old Carnival glass. Probably the most well known Westmoreland patterns in Carnival glass are the Strutting Peacock sugar and creamer and the same pieces in the Shell and Jewel pattern. The above photograph shows this rarely seen "Checkerboard" pattern in the only known marigold tumbler. Actually very few amethyst "Checkerboard" tumblers exist and they are considered rare, but a marigold tumbler in that pattern would be classed as very rare. In Carnival glass, I know of only two "Checkerboard" water pitchers, both being in the amethyst color. They are also very rare. In the center of the picture is the amethyst "Checkerboard" goblet. These are also listed as rare and only seldom does one ever come up for sale. A Carnival glass wine has also been reported in this pattern. A wine would be a real find in Carnival glass. On the right we show a marigold "Checkerboard" punch cup, which is one of the two known examples of this piece. If a punch bowl does exist somewhere, I am not aware of it. "Checkerboard" pieces are seen more often in clear crystal and were made in a good many pieces in this type of glass.



ORANGE PEEL FRUIT OR BERRY SET

In a recent issue of the H.O.A.C.G.A. bulletin, we discussed this pattern showing one of these little stemmed fruit cups. They are also called sherberts. Ruth Schinestuhl sent us this picture of the complete set in aqua. The "Orange Peel" pattern was also made in punch cups and custards, which were pictured in a recent bulletin. We thought you might be interested in seeing this complete set and we thank Ruth for sending in this picture.

THE SHAPES OF ADVERTISING PIECES - We see a number of these Sterling Furniture pieces here on the West Coast, as this was a San Francisco store. The bowl on the right is the first I have seen in the round shape. This and other advertising pieces are usually ruffled bowls, flat plates, hand grip, (as shown on the left), or double hand grip plates. Souvenir pieces such as the Millersburg Courthouse, Age Herald, and some of the Elk pieces are found in the round (ice cream bowl) shape. Such doesn't seem to be the case, however, with advertising pieces.

The color of these standard 6" pieces has been another point of interest. In spite of the popularity of marigold, I have never seen or heard of any color other than purple or amethyst. Think of the interest it would create should one turn up in a color such as ice blue or ice green.

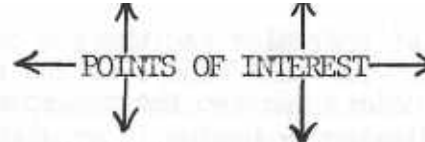
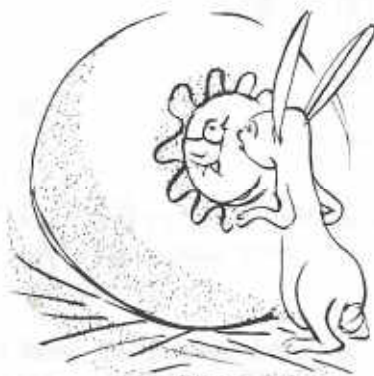

I know there has been a lot of controversy over the Whirling Star punch bowl shown in the H.O.A.C.G.A. Carnival glass notebook, so I thought I'd pass this information along.

I teach a course in Carnival glass at nightschool, and as a part of that class I identify glass for my students. Recently, one of the class brought in a Whirling Star punch bowl, base and 12 cups; all marked I.G. The owner said they had had the piece for several years and were not aware it was a reproduction. I cannot for certain state that this pattern was never made in old carnival, but I do have serious reservations. Does anyone know if the bowl shown in the notebook is marked or not? Just some food for thought.

Sunday, May 18, 1980. A particularly important date? Perhaps not to many but to we 7 collectors of Carnival glass from Clarkfield, Mn. it was to be OUR Sunday. 175 representative pieces of Carnival glass from their collections were on display from the afternoon at the Yellow Medicine County Historical Museum. This was the spring opening of the Museum and the first Sunday Special for the season. The museum is 12 miles from Clarkfield. Special display are scheduled each Sunday afternoon from the May opening through mid-October.

The setting was the main aisle of the museum filled with 5 banquet sized tables fronted with glass showcased upon which were displayed Carnival glass pattern books, auction brochures and Carnival glass association newsletters for the viewers to browse through while the collectors talked Carnival glass with more than 250 visitors for this special showing.

Highlights of Dick & Elaine Peterson's collection were the eye catching peach opal Ski Star and Caroline handled baskets and the Ski Star bowl in peach opal in a silver brides basket. The iron based lamp table lamp with its 3 peach opal shades prompted many comments and questions.

Earl and Beulah Lindquist's display had the eye catching Grape & Cable purple master punch set. Two dark wine sets and their six daisy and Drape vases in as many colors sparked their display. His several pieces of aqua opal and dark Northwood Grape rounded out his display.

Jack and Lois Lynner's displayed 11 Beaded Cable rose bowls including custard, blue, green and vaseline opal. A tall dark funeral vase, pastel Peacock at the Urn ice cream bowls and a marigold whiskey decantur sparked their display.

How does one get into such a delightful situation? By having 4 active collections in our Western Minnesota community of 1100 people. As spring draws near last years preparations for OUR SPECIAL CARNIVAL GLASS SUNDAY come to mind again. The combined planning so as to be able to show Carnival glass at its best, the apprehension in packing and traveling to and from the museum but with the final realization that we are having the opportunity to share our love-Carnivla glass.

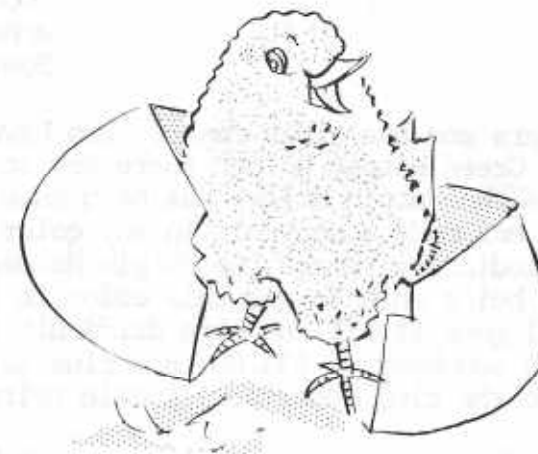

1981 SOUVENIR-CANDLE LAMP

Have you ordered your 1981 souvenir candle lamp? The lamp is a reproduction of the old Northwood Grape & Cable candle lamp except it will have the "Good Luck" horseshoe molded into the shade and will have the letters H.O.A.C.G.A molded into the candle stick.

It is being made in RUBY RED base color by the Fenton Art Glass Co. Bryon & Grace Rhinehart took their lamp to the mold maker, Island Mold Co., to be used as the pattern. So I guess we could say that our souvenir is a reproduction of the Rhinehart's candle lamp. The mold has been completed and is now at Fenton's and they are ready to start making the lamp pieces.

The shade holders are now made and are being plated. The shade holders were made by the Kling Metal Stamping Co. and the plating is being done by the Sicania Electroplating Co. both of New York City. Those of us who have been working on this souvenir for the past year believe that you will be very pleased to own one of these Candle Lamps. As you know, the Old Candle Lamps are much sought after by all collectors.

Again, you are encouraged to place your order for the lamp as soon as possible. We will only make 600 of these. We have received several inquiries as to whether the purchase of two lamps constitutes one purchase and if another purchase is allowed. Since quite a few of the orders that have been received have been for pairs it was voted on at the March meeting to allow a purchase of two pairs of lamps, or a total of four lamps per membership and the motion passed by a high majority.
