

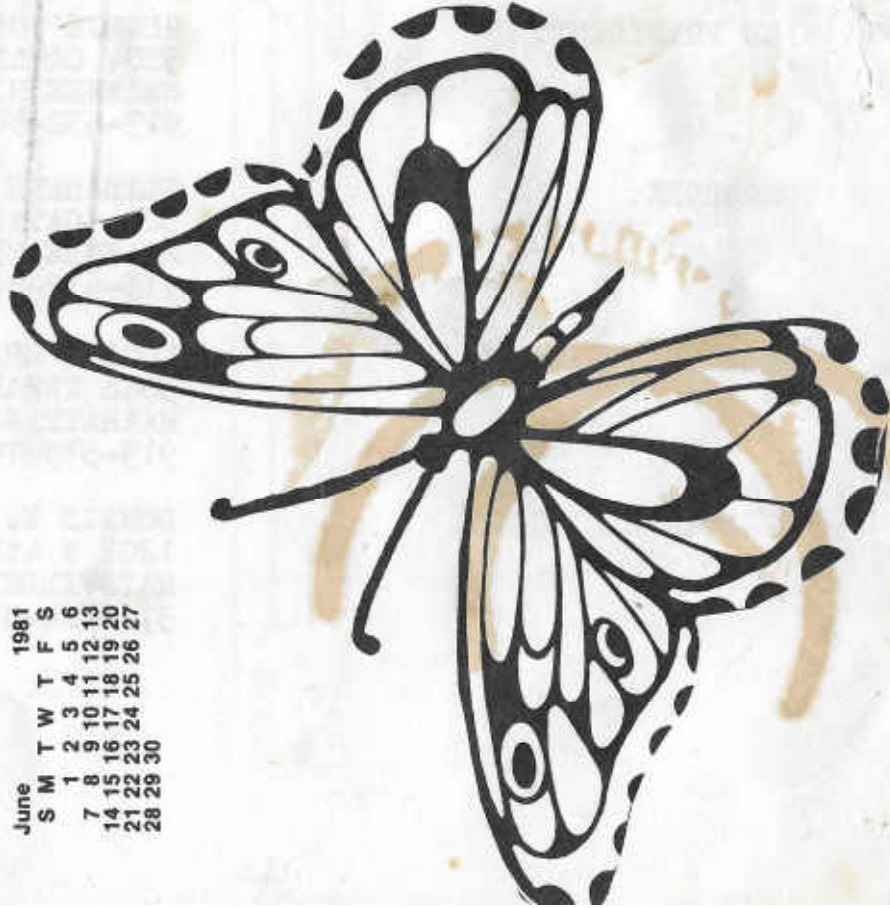

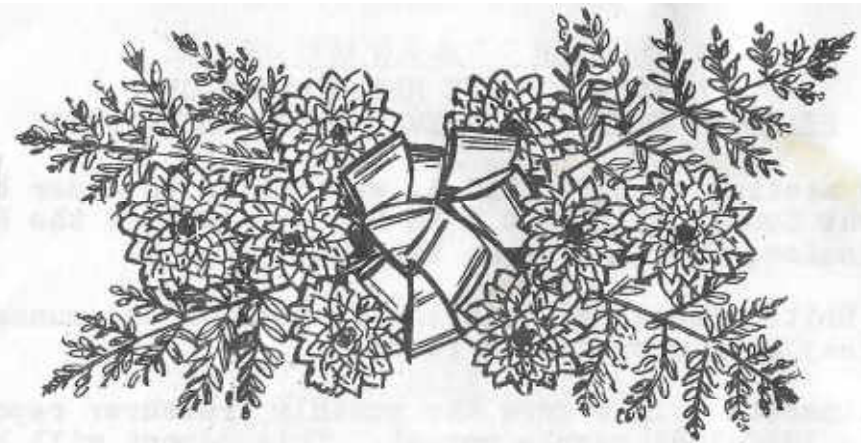

MINUTES OF THE MAY MEETING OF
HEART OF AMERICA CARNIVAL GLASS ASSOCIATION

The May meeting of H.O.A.C.G.A. was called to order by the President Cooley Miller at 2 PM May 24, 1981 at the Holiday Inn, Mission, Overland Park, Kansas.

Lucile Britt, Secretary read the minutes of the annual meeting. They were approved as read.

Mrs. Elizabeth Bolles gave the monthly Treasurer report and also the 1980-1981 yearly report. This report will be in the June bulletin. Both reports were placed on file.

President Miller thanked the officers and all the members for their cooperation and participation during his tenure as President.

Under old business--Robert Grissom reported that Mosser will run us some more mugs this month for the ones we were short at the banquet this year.

Mr. Miller asked Bob Grissom if he had the color separation for the note book. He didn't have so he asked him to pick them up and keep them on file.

Roland Kuhn made a motion that we have members send their name in if they wanted one of the extra mugs and they would be put in a hat and draw for the parties who could purchase the mugs. Lucile Britt amended the motion to sell the mugs for ten dollars postpaid. Winners to be announced in the bulletin. The motion failed.

As we have had many inquiries on putting the lamp together Mr. Grissom wrote instructions on how they go together and it will be in the June issue .

Bob Grissom has 50 Ice Green Hat Pin Holders that are all not good enough to sell and that they be destroyed and disposed of. Davis Shikles made a motion the Grissom's destroy the above 50. It was seconded and carried. Bob Grissom also reported we have about 60 or 70 of the Ice Green Hat Pin Holders left that are good for sale.

Bob Grissom presented the club with a refund check from the Fenton Art Glass Co. for an adjustment on the souvenirs. The check was for \$1,340.00.

George McGrew read letters from Mrs. Woodward, Mrs. Rinehart and Lucile Britt read letters from Phillip Graham's and A. A. Fogleman.

President Miller installed the new officers for 1981-1982 George McGrew-Prisident, Elizabeth Bolles-Treasurer and Donald Kime-Bulletin Secretary. George Bolles-Vice President and Lucile Britt-Secretary retained their positions.

Retiring President Miller then recessed the meeting for ten minutes.

Our new President George McGrew called the meeting back to order and called for new business: Robert Grissom reported that we received 620 lamps and he has found 20 rejects so far and they also sent 29 extra shades.

President McGrew reported that a member Leonard Krimmel, who was at the convention has had heart by pass surgery and he is recovering nicely. We also offer our condolences to Babe Scott on the death of her husband Lloyd April 8.

President McGrew appointed Vi Shikles to send cards to the above and also any members that are sick or loss of a loved one.

President McGrew discussed the next years convention site. Lucile Britt reported that the new Holidome in Manhattan was already booked for 1982. Mr. Miller suggested we put a hold on Holiday Inn in Overland Park, Ks. for next year and check around for another motel with better banquet facilities.

Bob Grissom has reserved the Raytown Shelter House for our summer picnic.

We discussed the Antique Trader ad and it was decided to run the ad for six times this year.

Lucile Britt reported we had 1388 paid members for the 1980-1981 year. She also reported totals on the convention-we

registered 380 guests and members, gained 22 new members who joined at the convention, we had 28 states and Canada represented, 33 room displays. We had 325 at the banquet, 255 at the Chuckwagon and 192 stayed for the breakfast.

We also discussed and the board agreed to place \$10,000.00 in a money market certificate.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Sebaugh of St. Louis, Mo. were house guests of Cooley & Marge Miller for the week end and also attended our meeting. We were very glad to have them.

Rosa Grissom made a motion we adjourn. It was seconded and passed.

The meeting will be June 28, 1981 at the Mission Holiday Inn at 2 P.M. in Overland Park, Kansas.

The Picnic will be July 26, with map and details next month.

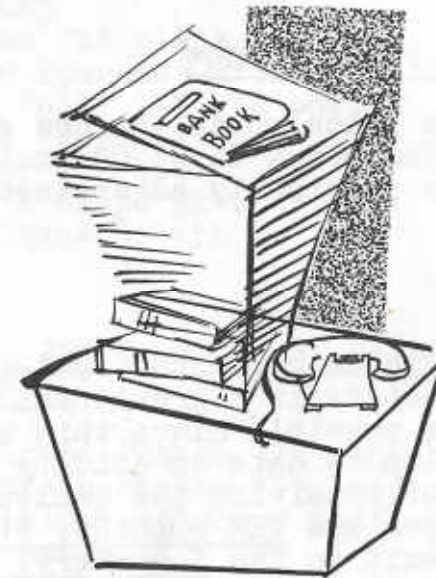

SOUVENIR REPORT

The RED GRAPE & CABLE LAMP souvenir is selling very well. A lot of members only ordered one initially but, after they received theirs they are ordering another one.

Several members do not understand how the shade holder will stay on the candlestick. A candle is needed to attach the holder to the candlestick. You will need to get a 6" tapered candle and cut it off so it will fit into the candlestick then shave it down until the shade holder will fit over the candle. Remember, this is a candle lamp and this is a reproduction of the OLD "Grape & Cable" candle

lamp. It was held together the same way.

Most of the shades will have some small nicks or chips and will probably show some evidence of being ground at the inside of the top. When the shade is made the opening at the top was filled with glass. After the shade is made and has been completely cooled, this glass in the top is then broken' out. When this is broken out it does not always make a clean break so it is then polished to remove any sharp edges. If you have an old candle lamp, check its top but be careful and not cut yourself from the roughness.

The tops were left in all the whimsys.

Again, our thanks to Byron and Grace Rinehart for their time spent in taking their old candle lamp to the mould maker and the two different trips they made to Fenton's with the lamp also.

Our thanks also go to the Christ Harnish's for allowing me to send their old metal candle holder to the Kling Co. for use in making the candle holder.

WREATHED CHERRY, A VERY FINE TUMBLER

These pretty "Wreathed Cherry" tumblers can be found in marigold, amethyst, deep purple and frosty white. The marigold tumbler is the easiest one to find in this pattern. White and purple tumbler examples are actually rather hard to locate. I have seen very few white and purple complete water sets in the "Wreathed Cherry" pattern. To put a set together, piece by piece in these two colors, would be very hard indeed. The white tumbler is decorated with painted red fruit and gilded gold leaves. White pieces of this pattern, such as the berry set, sometimes will be seen where the cherries and leaves have all been painted the gold color. The "Wreathed Cherry" tumblers usually have excellent iridescence and color. Some of the dark tumblers are so deep purple that you actually can't see through them with an ordinary light. To identify that they are purple -- one needs to hold them to the sun or a very strong light. You probably have noticed this deep color on the large oblong master berry bowl. This very deep purple color can also be found on Fanciful bowls and Fisherman mugs -- both considered to be Dugan-Diamond patterns. I have noticed that Dugan-Diamond made very deep purple on many of their dark pieces. The berry bowl mentioned above is sometimes incorrectly called a banana bowl

due to its oblong shape. It is actually a part of a berry set, however, and occasionally you will see a complete set containing six small oblong berries. They can be found in purple, cobalt blue, marigold, white and peach opalescent colors. It is possible however, that the designer of this set, had in mind that the large piece could serve a dual purpose and be used as a banana boat when it was not in use in the berry set. In line with this thinking, some punch sets, such as Millersburg's Multi-Fruit & Flowers, have the base iridised on both sides so they could be used as a compote when it was not in use as a punch bowl base. This type of procedure, where the housewife could use the piece in several different ways, no doubt made a good sales pitch for their product. In my opinion the peach opalescent berry set mentioned above in this pattern is one of the prettiest colors in which it was produced. One would hope to find a tumbler or pitcher in this color, but as yet none has been reported. It might also be pointed out here, that the big majority of the peach opalescent color carnival glass is considered to have been made by Dugan-Diamond.

The featured "Wreathed Cherry" tumbler has a cluster of three cherries inside a wreath of leaves. There are three of these clusters spaced evenly around the tumbler. Between each wreath is a long tear-drop like fan shape design. These fan shapes are very similiar to those used on the Inverted Fan & Feather (Feather Scroll) tumblers. This wreath and fan shape design should help beginning collectors to determine the difference between the "Wreathed Cherry" tumbler and other carnival glass cherry pattern tumblers such as Millersburg Cherries and Cherry and Cable (Northwood's Cherries.) The bottom of the base is smooth on the "Wreathed Cherry" tumbler, while a star like figure is pressed into the bottom of the base of the other two tumblers mentioned. The "Wreathed Cherry" tumbler contains a collar base.

This article on a Dugan-Diamond pattern is No. 41 in this series. It is our first article on a tumbler from the Indiana, Pennsylvania factory. We will cover other tumblers from this factory in the near future. Next month we will bring you another first--a beautiful carnival glass tumbler that was produced by Fostoria Glass Comapny. It is an unlisted pattern in carnival glass. A complete story and picture next month

RARE INVERTED STRAWBERRY BREAKFAST SUGAR & CREAMER

The above set is in purple carnival glass and is one of two sets in which I have had the privilege of seeing. This unusual set was made by the old Cambridge Glass Company of Cambridge, Ohio. The "Inverted Strawberry" is pictured in Mary, Lyle and Lynn Welker's book #2 on Cambridge glass. The book is made up of reprints from old Cambridge Glass Company catalogs. The pattern was called their No. 2780 "Strawberry" rock crystal design. The old catalog sheet listed it as being produced in many different pieces. Cambridge also made the regular four piece table set in carnival glass. The breakfast set shown above is somewhat smaller than the regular table set. Like other breakfast sets the sugar bowl does not contain a lid as it does on the regular table set. A very nice picture of the "Inverted Strawberry" table set can be seen in this years section of the H.O.A.C.G.A. binder notebook on table sets. Note that our featured breakfast set shown above is made differently from the table set in that they are on pedestal feet. This little set is considered highly collectable and is very rare. It is a part of the collection of Mr. & Mrs. Carl

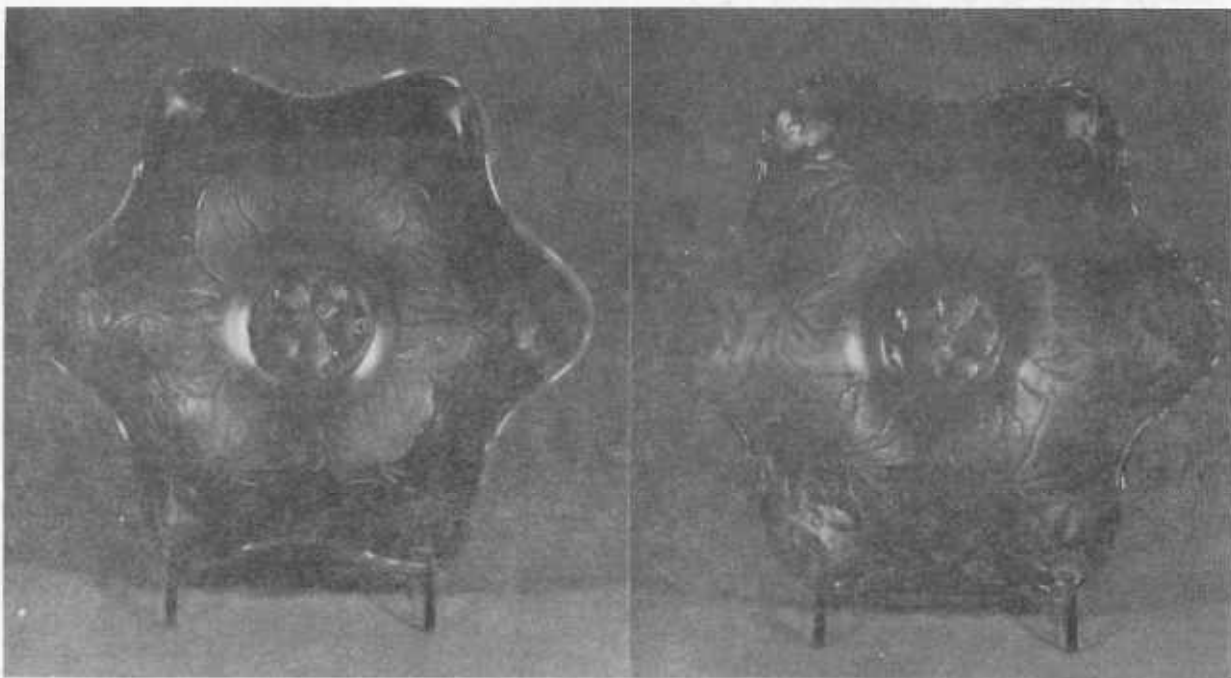

Carnival Cameos by Don Moore



BLUE OPAL CAROLINA DOGWOOD - I have seen this pattern only on an 8½" bowl, as shown, and a flattened version which is sometimes called a plate. This bowl can be found in aqua opal, blue opal, (as shown), marigold (or peach) opal, and also comes on milk glass. Blue opal is seen so seldom that I have wondered if it was intended or simply resulted from an aqua opal mixture that became overbalanced on the blue side. While this pattern has been attributed to Fenton, I would rather go with Northwood or Dugan, as most of the other blue opal pieces I have seen were Northwood.

Note the difference in the two bowls shown. While they are both ruffled, the edge of the one on the left is smooth, but the one on the right is fluted. This might indicate that two companies produced this pattern.

ACORN COMPOTE

For the first in this series of Millersburg pattern notes, I will choose the very rare Acorn Compote pattern.

Found in green, amethyst and an ultra rare vaseline base glass, this average size compote (6" tall) has the Millersburg Flute as an exterior pattern. The base is the same clover leaf design as the Wild Flower and Peacock and Urn compotes. Also from Millersburg.

The Interior design is one of four bold acorn leaves that are veined and heavily stippled and four pairs of stemmed acorns bearing smaller leaves. A close comparison reveals these are the same acorns and leaves found on the famous Millersburg Pipe Humidor I featured on the cover of my Millersburg book.

While most compotes from this company are in the rare category, I would consider the Acorn Compote the fifth rarest (right behind the miniature Holstar and Feather, Tulip, Flowering Vine and large Rosilind compotes).

The mold work of this Millersburg pattern is equal to their best and the glass is clear and top quality. While none have been reported in true marigold or blue, I feel these colors may exist. But regardless of color, this is a pattern much sought, so if you are lucky enough to find one, grab it and hold on for dear life! You have found a real treasure.

THE LAUNCHING OF THE DAISY BLOCK ROW BOAT

This story has its beginnings almost a century and a half ago, in 1838, when Grace Darling, 23 year old daughter of the keeper of the Longstone Lighthouse off the North-East coast of England, rowed with her father through towering seas to rescue survivors of the steamer "Forfarshire" wrecked on the rocks off Farne Island.

Grace having spotted eight men and a woman clinging to the gale-swept rocks, made one trip in the tiny rowing boat to bring the woman and four men to safety. Mr. Darling, with two of the survivors then returned to rescue the others. It was a courageous act of Grace Darling's which was recognized first in artists impressions of the heroic deed, like the one shown here, and later in portraits of Grace herself and replicas of her little boat.

Long after her death from consumption only four years after that dramatic event, these mementos continued to be produced, one of which was the Carnival piece we know today as the Daisy Block Row Boat.

To my mind this Carnival rarity from the Sowerby Ellison glassworks at Gateshead, is one of the best English-made items, one that I have long wanted to find. In fact it was while I was at a fair looking for it-(and other pieces too, of course)-that I heard this fascinating story of how it came to be made-or should I say launched.

Messrs. Sowerby, it seems did not get round to registering their design of the Grace Darling Row Boat until 1888, though one presumes they had been making and selling it long before that date. They pressed them first in clear glass and on some of these was an inscription commemorating Grace and her bravery. Later they were pressed in coloured glass, and in the 1930's the carnivalised boat was introduced.

The boat on its own is incomplete as there is a glass stand on which the keel rests. But as I say in my recent book, I am wondering and undecided if it was meant to be a pen-tray with stand or a flower trough. I have seen it described as both and can imagine it in use as either. Pens would rest nicely in the lower part while the boat held the ink, or as a flower trough, little flowers of all varieties would sit nicely in this decorative piece to provide a pleasing display on any table.

I first heard this story from a London Glass dealer whom I met at an antiques fair in Eastbourne on the Sussex coast, early in March. A little later it was confirmed

by an authority on English 19th century pressed glass, who told me that he had actually seen a pressed glass Row Boat with the Grace Darling inscription.

Wouldn't it be a nice gesture if the heroism of this daughter of an English lighthouse keeper was recognized by Carnival collectors the world over, by renaming the piece the Grace Darling Life Boat.

Some of those pieces that have been shown in the Pictorial Parade, which people suspect may be of English origin, like two tiny shot glasses shown in the January issue, for example, well I will try my very best to find out about all these pieces and to get them verified for you American folks, as I think it would be nice to know. To me they certainly look English, the shot glasses, and I will do my best to contact some of my authorities on English Carnival, and see what I can come up with.

She brought it back to her friends booth and placed it in a buffet that was for sale. The dealer had her records and papers in the buffet too.

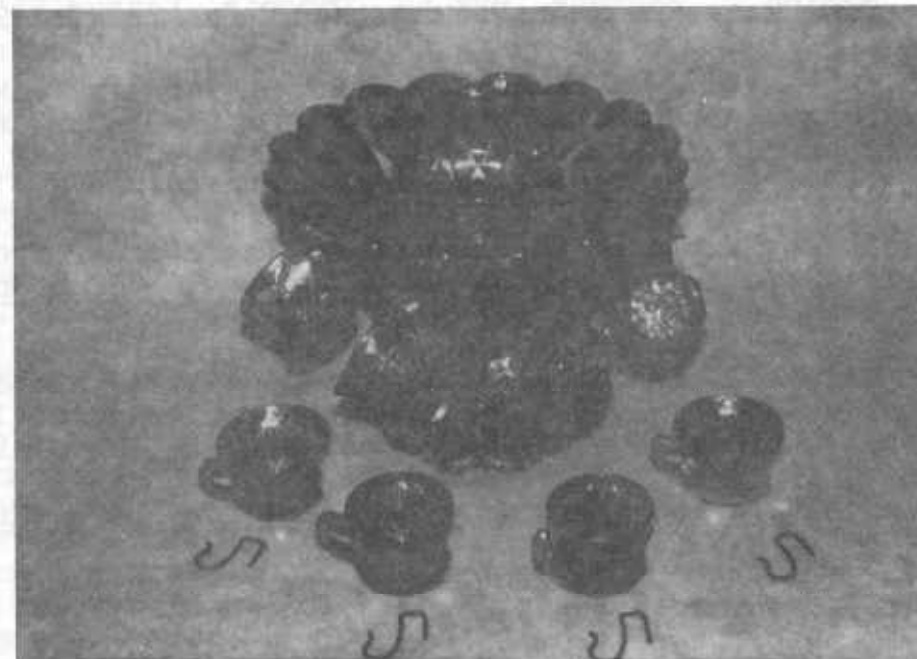

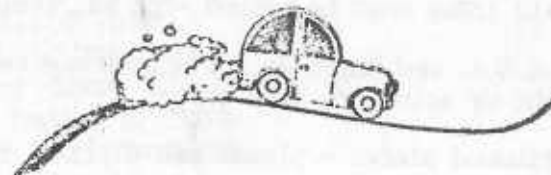
