DIAMOND AND DAISY CUT

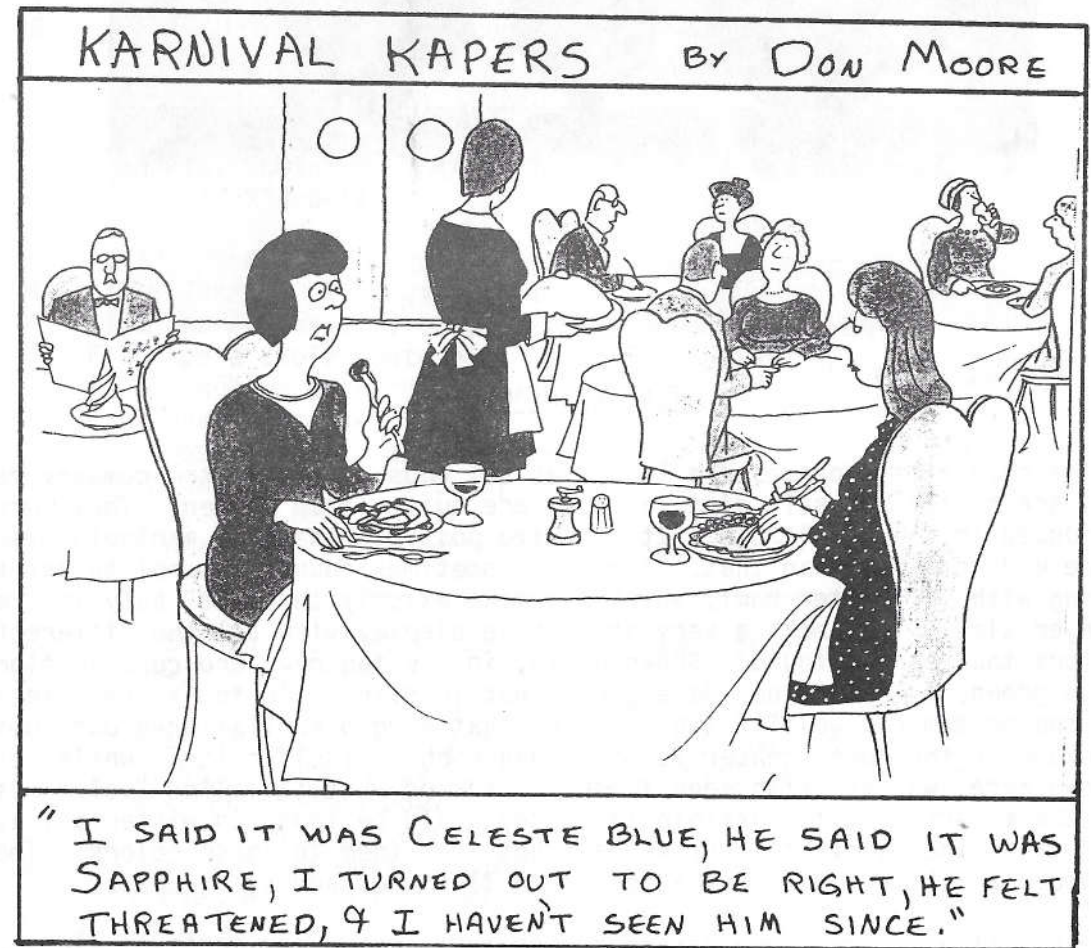
The "Diamond and Daisy Cut" tumbler is also known as "Mayflower". To make matters even more controversial, it is called "Floral and Diamond Band" by the depression glass collectors. It is listed by that name in the depression glass books. While this pattern was thought by some to have been made by Jenkins, most of the authors and collectors now consider it to be a U. S. Glass pattern. We have been told by William Heacock that Fred Bickenheuser, author and owner of many old U. S. Glass periodicals, had found this pattern in an old U. S. Glass catalog. Gene Florence, author of the "The Collectors Encyclopedia of Depression Glass", now lists this pattern as being made by the U. S. Glass Company. We have noticed that the carnival glass water sets in this pattern, show up more often in the Indiana area. The U. S. Glass Company operated factories at Gas City, Indiana and Tiffin, Ohio, which possibly could account for that.

Pieces of this pattern are found more often in non-iridised pink and light green depression glass colors. The tumblers are made of rather heavy glass. They are of the regular table size, standing four inches in height. A sixteen point star type figure is impressed into the bottom of the base. The carnival glass tumblers have been reported only in marigold and were made from a two part mold. Time of production was in the late 1920's, which was much later than most of our carnival glass tumblers.

Diamond and Daisy Cut tumblers continued...

This is the 121st entry into this tumbler series. Next month we will feature the "Enameled Apple Blossom" tumbler.

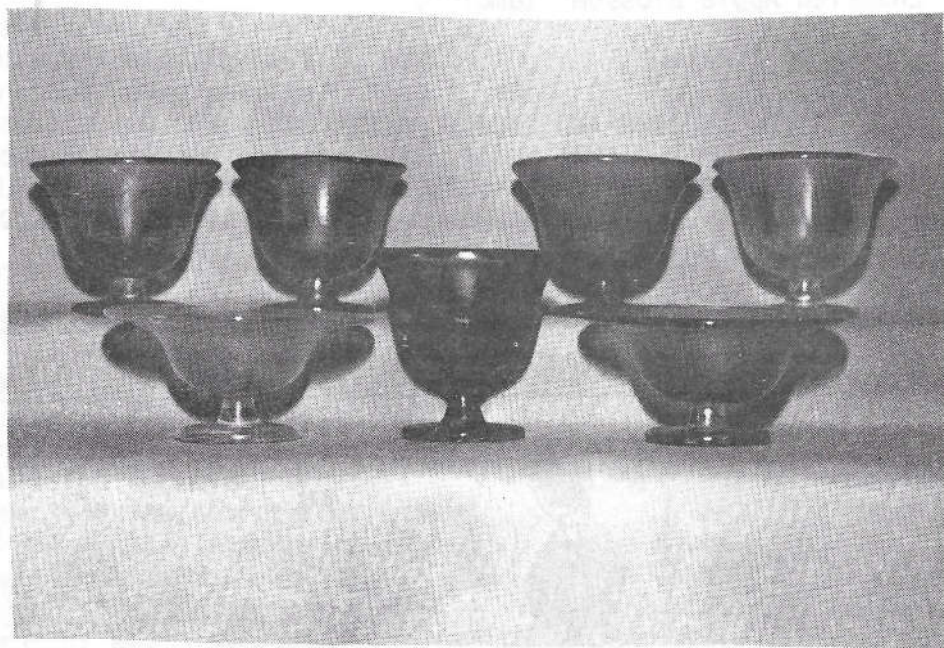

PICTORIAL PATTERN PARADE

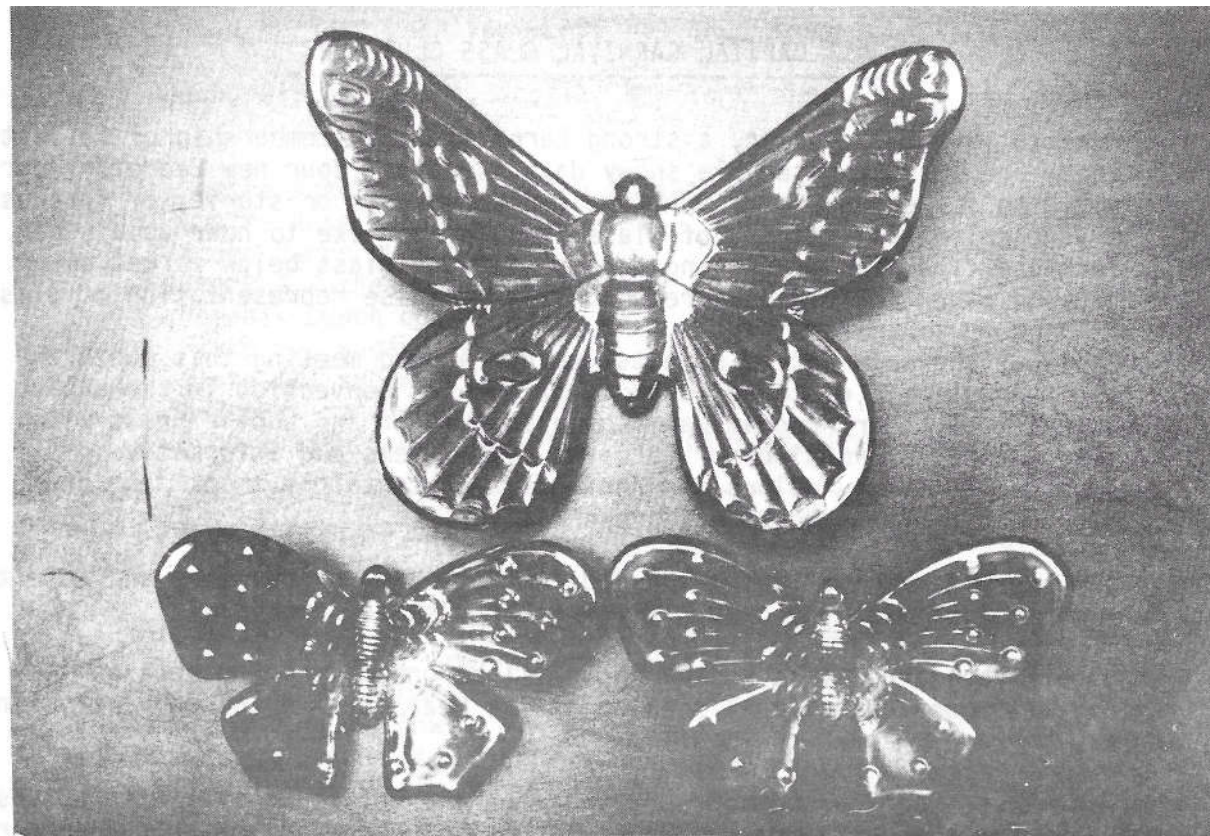

FENTON NUT CUPS

These cute little pieces are listed as nut cups in old Fenton company records and are really not salt dips, as they are quite often called. They were produced in the mid 1920's. It is quite possible that the marigold examples were made earlier than that. They are sometimes found in complete nut sets along with the master bowl, which was made exactly the same, only in a much larger size. They make a very attractive display with all the different colors that can be found. Shown above, in the top row, are cups in florentine green, celeste blue, jade green (not iridised) and topaz (vaseline). In the bottom row we find two examples that have been flattened out somewhat. The one in the lower center is of a good rich marigold color. While not shown here, we have also seen these in pink or what is called "velva rose" by the makers. It is possible that they could be found in wisteria (lavender and tangerine (apricot), but we have not seen them in those colors. They measure a little over 2 inches high and 1½ inches across the base.

These little nut cups would make a fine addition to any carnival glass collection and they should be especially attractive to the miniature collector.



"NORTHWOOD'S BUTTERFLY ORNAMENT?"

Butterfly ornaments are a very rare & desirable miniature, and are seldom seen, sold or exchanged. The Butterfly shown here along with two Fenton ornaments is apparently unknown to most collectors.

This Butterfly is pictured identically in Mrs. Presznick's Book IV, plate 143, identified only as "Northwood's Butterfly ornament." She therein states: "This Butterfly had very good iridescence, but probably was re-fired after flashing. It is one of the larger sizes, and when found, was glued to a wooden base that evidently had been whittled and sort of carved around the edge, or made especially for the Butterfly."

The underside of this Butterfly is ground flat, as opposed to the round underside of the Fenton counterparts. The base glass is pastel blue with light silvery-amethyst iridescence.

Here we come to a screeching halt, as I can find no further information regarding its age, history, or if indeed Northwood was its actual maker. Can anyone contribute any further information.

AIR CAPITAL CARNIVAL GLASS CLUB

Have recently returned from a month in Bombay, India. I was inspired by Gary Workman of South Australia, telling me his Big Fish came from Bomday. Cawford Market and Choor Bazaar are the places to look, especially Mutton Street, so with a car and a driver and a friend I headed for Mutton Street. The crowds are daunting as well as the innumerable beggars and wandering livestock and don't think it was "fun" hunting for glass. The shops are only narrow fronted, but quite long and nothing is displayed, one has to hunt through the trash and dirt, some shops are of a better standard than others with a few display shelves. There is a lot of Victorian glass which has to be examined thoroughly for cracks, repairs, etc. Most of it covered in grime. A lot of Victorian lamps. In one shop in Mutton Street I saw some very nice tumblers in marigold, that I've never seen before. They are fine cut glass, not moulded, very good iridescence and with intricate Symetrical design. I will be writing to John and Lucile Britt to identify them. I bought 3 of them and they were not cheap. Choor Bazaar is renowned for high prices. I returned home hot, dirty and exhausted.

My son had to visit Gujarat on Consulate Affairs and I went with him. It is a northern province. We went by car, air conditioner and driver. The country, in severe drought, no rain for 3 years in Ahmedabad, where we were heading for. First of all we called at Surat, as Gavan wanted to contact an antique dealer, whom we were told had good stuff. Chinese ceramics and martabans, pots for storing food and water! Gavan collects these large pots, also Chinese ceramics. We spent quite a time with Mr. Zaveri in Surat after Gavan had attended to his official calls. Mr. Zaveri's place was like an Aladdin's Cave. He had everything including one of the biggest crystal chandeliers I've ever seen, nothing displayed, but everything stacked in floor-to-ceiling cabinets; old lamps, bottles, shades, china, etc. I stopped some Carnival, only glasses again and four tumblers, all in excellent condition. My best buy were two beautiful shades, Art Noveau design of tulips coloured on a white frosted base and at least one and a half inches of marigold iridescence around a frilly edge. Gavan went bananas when he saw the pots, a large room full of them. He bought 3, including a Japanese one. We left our purchases and headed for Ahmehabad as we'd only gone half way, we finally arrived late at night after doing about 900 miles. We had a police escort as we'd never have found our way around both Surat and Ahmedabad. We booked into the Cama Hotel which was very comfortable by Indian standards, air conditioning, good coffee shop and swimming pool, which we made for first thing in the morning.

Next day Gavan had to make Consular calls, and afterwards we went sight seeing. We visited several beautiful mosques. Both Surat and Ahmedabad were walled cities and the old walls still remain, but in a crumbling state.

India trip continued...

The Indians seem incapable of preserving their ancient past. I visited the local cottage industries shop and bought some very well made dolls, sandalwood, beads and elephants at very reasonable prices, good examples of the traditional handicrafts of that region, mirror work, etc. I also bought some very good quality silk. There is a large manufacturing silk trade. After 2 nights in Ahmedabad, we headed back via Lothal as Gavan was very keen to see the archaeological dig there, 12,000 B.C. We saw the museum and the mock-up of the early city, similar to early Roman cities, it was at least 112 degrees but Gavan poked around in the dirt for over an hour with the museum director and found some very interesting pieces. We arrived back at Surat and booked in at the "Oasis Hotel". Some hotel, but the best offering. Empty swimming pool, etc. no liquor (dry state) and only vegetarian food. To get 2 bottles of beer it took 3/4 hour and 8 pieces of paper to sign and passports to be seen etc., however, we were taken to a good restaurant for a decent seafood meal. Surat noted for the prawns. There are about 6 million people in these two cities and Europeans are a rare sight. Surat is where the diamond cutting industries are and the Argyle Diamond Co. of W.A. are interested in their methods of cutting. We visited the old British fort in the usual state of disrepair and after one night at the "Oasis" we called on Mr. Zaveri to collect our purchases. He has contact with Australian dealers he tells me and has an album of photos from Australia showing bottles, lamps, china, glass, etc. that the dealers want. We left Surat and headed for home. The journey back was interesting, I saw working elephants and camel carts. The Coastal Highway is a drivers' nightmare, as all the heavy traffic belts along it at an uncontrollable speed. Every few miles you see the rusting remnants of over-turned transport on the side of the road. Kamakazi tactics prevail, however we got back to Bombay safely thanks to Satich our very competent driver. I told him he deserved a medal. I'm sure he knows a bit about chinese pots and carnival glass by now. Gavan has always got him on the look out for pots - Bombay is very good for leather goods, shoes, handbags, belts of excellent quality, also jackets, reasonably priced. There are 3 good hotels; The Tajmahal, Oberoi and President. The Taj has lots of atmosphere and one can spend an hour or two just sitting and watching. The Oberoi also very interesting and up market 3 floors of shops. Bombay is worth a weeks stop-over either going or coming from U.K. B.A. fly in and out of Bombay every Friday and direct to Perth.

While sight seeing in Bombay I saw where the Dhobi men do the washing, and there are numerous little shops where the ironing is done and I was amazed to see the men using the old fashioned coal iron. I did see them for sale in the Cawford Market area, but thought they were for decorative purposes only. They are very big, the coal burns brightly in the dingy little ironing booths as they push these heavy irons across the garments. I didn't

find any Big Fish or anything very exciting in the Carnival Glass area, but did bring back two interesting vases and four tumblers, Crackle design, good iridescence and 8 glasses carried as hand luggage! Next time perhaps more success.
