

VINEYARD TUMBLERS

The "Vineyard" pattern is considered to have been made by Dugan. Shards of this pattern were found from diggings at the old Dugan factory site at Indiana, Pennsylvania.

The colors usually found are marigold and purple. One white tumbler is known, it being sold at the Collier auction many years ago. We were fortunate in being able to purchase that particular example. You will find that the purple color is usually a very dark shade and you often need a bright light in order to see the color. Lighter amethyst examples can be found, however. We have seen a few examples of these tumblers in lavender, clambroth and pastel marigold. These are considered quite rare. We might also note that five or six peach opal water pitchers have been found, but we have never seen a tumbler that we would say is true peach opalescent. In due respect to several collectors, who say they have a peach opal tumbler, I could not be convinced that they were really peach opal. Our favorite tumbler in the "Vineyard" pattern is really not carnival glass at all. It is in pink cased glass and is very beautiful. If it only had iridescence, it would be a great one, even though it is gorgeous as it is.

Tumblers of the "Vineyard" pattern often lean to one side or the other. Two bunches of grapes, one on each side, are in high relief along with two nicely done grape leaves, one in each of the other two parts of the mold. The vine and tendrils circle the tumbler just above the bunches of grapes and leaves. The featured clusters of grapes and leaves are on a background of notty bark-like design which resembles the trunk of a tree.

The Presznick name for this pattern is "Peacock Eye and Grape". Most collectors and authors use the name of "Vineyard", however. This article represents our 123rd entry into this carnival glass tumbler series. Next month we will feature a very unusual tumbler that is known as "Rose Windows".

OPTIC & BUTTONS SALT CUP


This tiny salt or nut cup is one of the cutest pieces of carnival glass that we have ever seen. Certainly, it doesn't match up to the great beauty of an aqua opal Poppy Show plate or an electric blue Embroidered Mums bowl, but is is so cute - - so tiny - - and so collectible! It is listed in an old Imperial catalog as a handled table salt. The literature provided in that catalog also stated that these were often used, along with the larger 5 inch piece, as a nut or salted almond set. Both pieces are pictured in the old catalog. The 5 inch piece is made exactly the same as the small one, only in this case, it is of a larger size.

We consider this tiny piece as very rare. It is only the second one that we have seen. The handles would be so easily broken, which is probably the reason not many of them are around today. It sets on an eight sided base that is only 1 3/4 inches wide. It is 2 1/8 inches high and measures 3 3/4 inches across the top to the outer most points of the little handles. Another interesting feature of this piece is that it is signed with the old Imperial German cross mark. IM-PE-RI-AL

Optic & Buttons salt cup continued...

"Optic & Buttons" was one of Imperial's popular patterns back in the carnival glass era, and was made in a large variety of pieces. Their catalog stressed the point of "everything for the table in the same design". It also pointed out that the design and trade mark were patented. You might remember, that sometime back, we featured the rare "Optic & Buttons' cup and saucer. We also wrote about the goblets and wines in this pattern, at a different time. The old catalog also shows the pattern in two styles of handled cruets, or what they call oil bottles. Another one of their featured items is the salt & pepper shakers. Wouldn't they be a great find?

NOTES ON CARNIVAL GLASS BUTTONS

In the early years of Carnival Glass collecting, very few of us had seen or even heard of Carnival Glass buttons. The first reference to them that came to my attention piqued our interest to such an extent that Ken and I immediately began a search in hopes of adding something unusual to our collection. It already ran the gamut from green Peoples' Vase to little Stippled Rays sauce dishes (since then dispersed among other Carnival collectors).

A small number of the then prominent collectors, including Rose Presznick, already had discovered buttons. In 1965, Rose's CARNIVAL AND IRIDESCENT GLASS, BOOK III appeared with her first button section that included twenty-seven different designs which she had named.

After we had accumulated about thirty, we, on a trip through Emporia, Kansas, showed them to Mrs. Hartung. She still wasn't certain that the iridescent luster was actually fired, nor was it known where they were made. Manufacture in the United States was a part of her personal definition of Carnival Glass in her fine series of books (see SIXTH BOOK OF CARNIVAL GLASS, PAGE 7, PARAGRAPH 1).

That moment is when my determination to research them took root, in an effort to find an answer to those doubts.

There is no question now that the iridescence of a real Carnival Glass button is indeed fired and permanent, and the method of application to the surface was roughly the same as to other Carnival. For obvious reasons, the backs of buttons are seldom, if ever, fully iridized.

Records of the U. S. Patent Office picture the distinctive shank affixed to many of our old glass buttons. Such information gives us a step forward in identifying some of those iridescent ones that were made in this country. The very fact that such a patent was applied for suggests that other types of shanks were in use here also, and the inventing company wished to establish a competitive edge.

Of course, without doubt, many other iridescent glass buttons were imported from central Europe, but they and the ones made in the United States all share the beautiful luster typical of Carnival Glass of the early 1900's.


