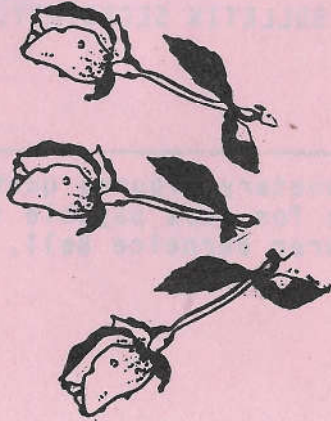

MINUTES OF THE 1988 H.O.A.C.G.A. ANNUAL MEETING

At 2:00 P.M. Friday, April 24, 1988, President Robert Grissom called the H.O.A.C.G.A. Annual Meeting to order. Secretary Glen Fortney read the minutes of the 1987 Annual Meeting and they were approved as read.

Treasurer Berniece Bell read the Treasurers Report for the fiscal period ending 1988. The Report was approved and placed on file for audit. Explanation of the Fiscal Period was given by the Treasurer, also the \$1,000.00 payment to Mrs. Henshaw for the Hartung copyright and book inventory was explained, as was the final payment as of April 15, 1988. The total price was \$7,496.00.

President Grissom made a motion to the floor, by the Board of Directors, that all existing Souvenirs and whimsys, prior to the 1985 Souvenir Bells, that are in the possession of the Club, be auctioned off at Annual Meetings. This is to be done to bring a fair recovery of the Clubs' investment. The motion was made and seconded and after some discussion, the motion carried.

President Grissom named the Officers of the Board whose terms expire at the end of the fiscal year. They were as follows:

After nominations, there was voting by hand, and all three were approved.

President Grissom asked for discussion on the possibility of continuing the Souvenir Bell Series for one more year to honor the founder of the Dugan Glass Co., or to go to some other piece of glass for a Souvenir. After much discussion, a motion was made and seconded to continue the Bell Series. A vote was taken and was tied at 22 yes and 22 no. President Grissom broke the tie with a yes vote.

There was some discussion of possible future Convention sites and there were announcements on the books available by the Club on Carnival Glass.

President Grissom thanked the retiring Officers for their loyal service to the Club, and all members for participating in the Annual Meeting.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

THE "ROSE WINDOWS" TUMBLER

The "Rose Windows" pattern is pictured and described in Kamm book 4 - page 138. While she described the pattern very well, the name of the maker is not mentioned in any of her material. The pattern looks as though it might have been made by the United States Glass Company, but I could not find it in any of my literature from that company, nor could it be found in my McKee or Cambridge books. All three of these companies did make small quantities of iridised glass. I will continue to search for the maker of this pattern, and until I find out for sure, I am going to lean towards the United States Glass Company as being the maker.

Five or six of these "Rose Windows" tumblers were first reported in Texas. They contained a very light "flashed on" type of iridescence. I was able to purchase one of them for research of the pattern. A short time later, the "Rose Windows" tumbler, that is shown above, was found by H.O.A.C.G.A. member Charles Bucy. It was found here in the midwest. He proceeded to bring it to our home for me to identify. Since he does not collect tumblers, I was able to purchase it from him. The tumbler is in a beautiful dark marigold with outstanding iridescence. There is no sign of flashed on iridescence on this one. I don't understand why any company would make these

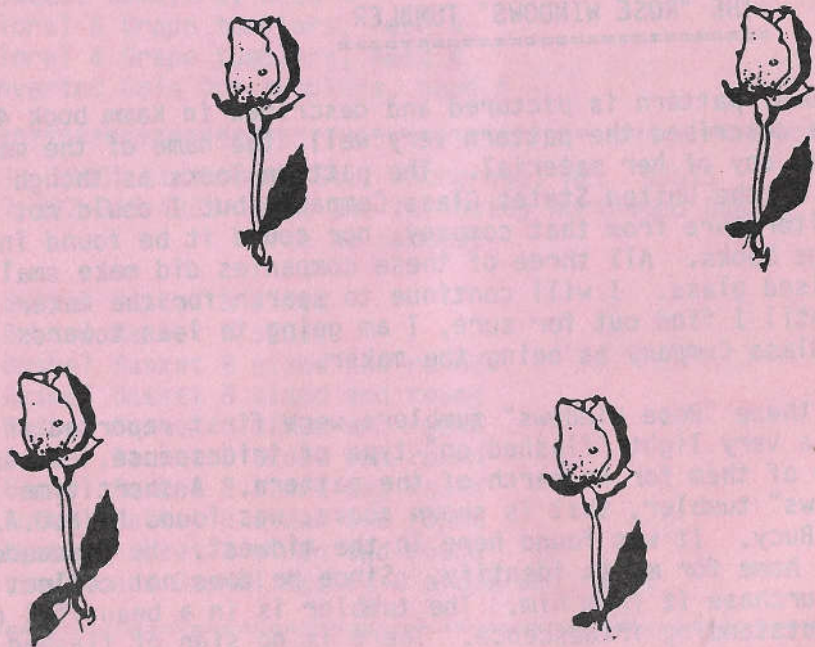

two distinctively different types of iridescence, unless they made the "flashed on" type first and later found out how to make the genuine carnival glass. Anyway, the one shown above is truly a beautiful and outstanding carnival glass tumbler.

The "Rose Windows" tumbler is made of rather heavy glass, similar to the "elephant toes" pressed glass tumblers that were made by U. S. Glass. It stands 4½ inches high. Notice from the picture that it flares out at both the top and bottom. It contains six panels, all exactly alike. These panels resemble large church windows. The base is not ground and it contains an eighteen point star on the bottom.

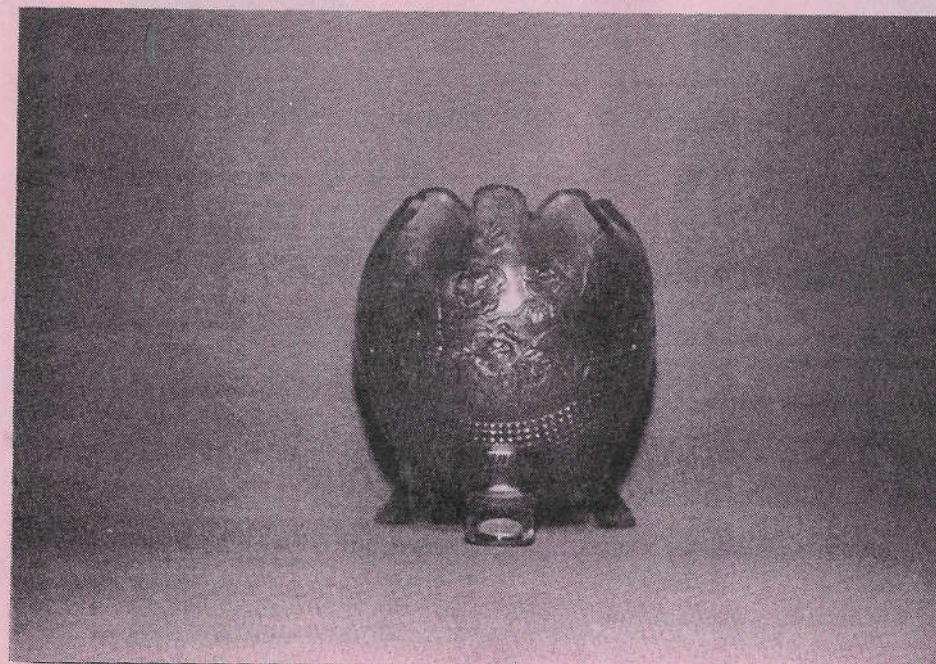
This beautiful and unusual tumbler represents our 124th entry into this carnival glass tumbler series. Next month we will feature the "Band of Roses" tumbler.

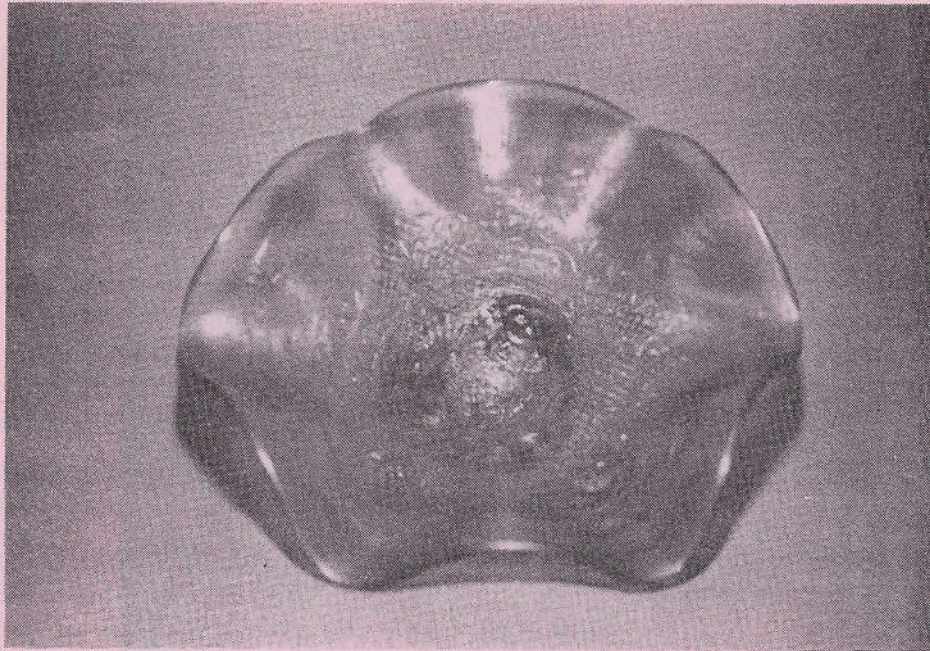
PICTORIAL PATTERN PARADE

FINE CUT & ROSES ROSE BOWL IN ICE GREEN

After many years of searching for a "Fine Cut & Roses" rose bowl in ice green, we finally were fortunate enough to locate one. It was indeed a thrill to see one of these, as we had never seen or heard of one in that color. We had always thought that surely there must have been some of these ice green rose bowls made, as we had seen a few of the candy dishes in that color. The candy dish is actually the same piece of glass as the rose bowl, only it has been flared out into a candy container. Picture #2 (on next page) shows the "Fine Cut & Roses" candy dish in ice green. Notice the "northwoods Fancy" pattern that was used on the interior of this piece. This pattern was also used on the interior of our featured ice green rose bowl. In fact, this interior pattern has been found on all of the pastel color "Fine Cut & Roses" rose bowls that we have seen. The vivid color rose bowls are usually smooth on the interior with the underlined "N" in a circle found on the inside bottom of the base. We have seen a few purple rose bowls with the "Northwood's Fancy" interior, however. We have also observed at least two in the green color with the "N's Fancy" interior pattern.

The "Fine Cut & Roses" rose bowls are very collectable, not only for their beautiful appearance, but also because they can be found in such a wide variety of colors. Purple is the most often seen color. Marigold and green are found less frequently. Ice Blue, even though very beautiful, is rather easily found. Even so, if the feet are not damaged too bad, they always bring a good price at auctions, antique shows, etc. White examples are much harder to find than are those in ice blue and will demand a much higher price. Ice green, as mentioned above, is extremely hard to find. Amber and lavender are two other colors that are only rarely found. We have seen one in celeste blue, it being very beautiful. We have one that is actually a sort of smokey blue. I am sure that there are a number of other odd colors out there in your collections. There even might be a few of you that have one in ice green, but the one pictured above is the first one that we have ever seen.

Picture #3 shows one of these "Fine Cut & Roses" rose bowls that has been made into a very unusual whimsy shape. Notice that it is smooth at the top. Perhaps this might be one that they never used the crimping tool on. It is in a deep lavender color. No interior pattern is used on this one, but it contains the underlined "N" in a circle. This is a very interesting piece and is the only one we have ever seen in this shape. We found this one in Ohio, not too far from Wheeling, West Virginia where a lot of Northwood carnival glass was made.

Those with fruits, or flowers or birds, and normally anything with a peacock will catch my eye! When you are novice collectors like ourselves, it is hard to narrow down just exactly what your preference is. There are so many different patterns, shapes and colors and every piece we have seen is beautiful in its own way.

We thoroughly enjoyed attending our first Carnival Glass Convention. Everyone we had the opportunity to visit with was very cordial and helpful and we are already looking forward to next years Convention. 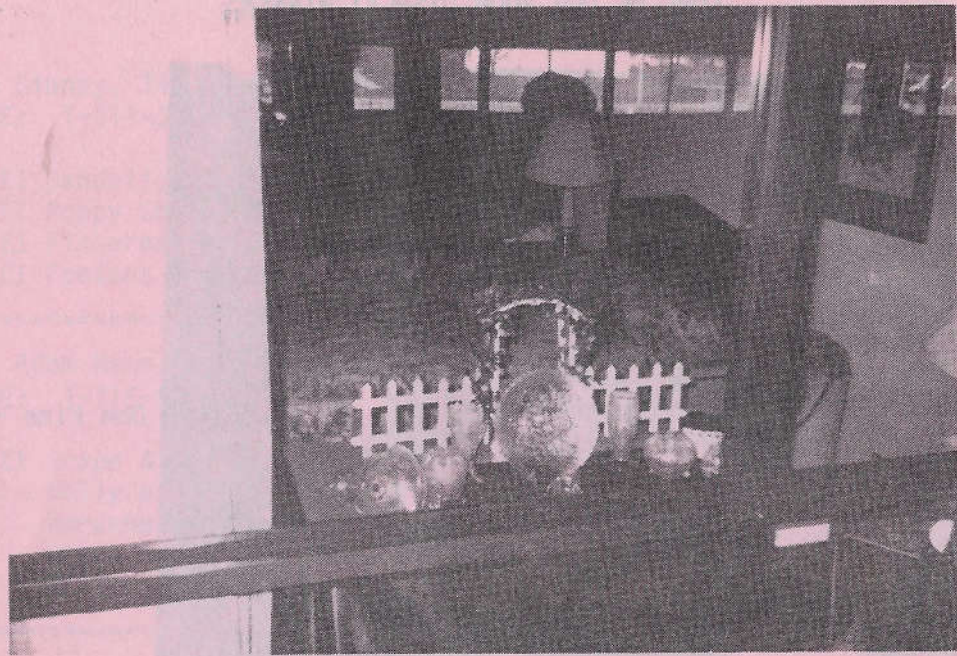

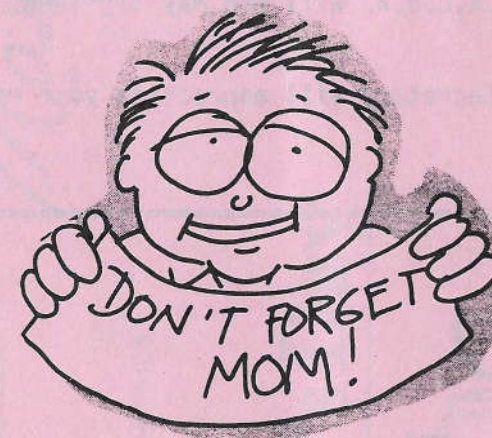
