The color suggested for that Bell is teal.

The Hartung Carnival Glass Pattern Books are continuing to sell well. So far we have sold nearly \$1,900.00 worth of books. The initial investment for the Club was around \$7,000.00. The price for the set of books, 1-10: is \$32.50 for the complete set.

The Board of Directors is continuing discussion on how to get more local members to the monthly meetings. Any suggestions anyone has to offer will be most appreciated. Remember folks, without your attendance and participation in the Club's activities, our Club can not grow.

After a short break, President Robert Grissom gave the Program on cobalt blue Carnival Glass. 
Sunday morning, a free breakfast buffet was served prior to getting on the road for home.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES By John & Lucile Britt



MARTEC TUMBLER - - MCKEE

"Martec" is one of the Tec patterns that were produced by the McKee Glass Company of Jeanette, Pennsylvania. (It is interesting to note that the city of Jeanette, Pennsylvania was named after Mrs. Jeanette McKee. The town was founded by H. Seller McKee, owner of the very large McKee glass plant.) A few of the many "so called" Tec patterns that were produced by McKee are Aztec, Toltec, Nortec, Wartec, Fentec, Doltec, Plutec, Plytec, Quintec, Sextec, Totec, Startec, and of course our featured "Martec" pattern. These patterns were made in large quantities in clear pressed glass and in many different pieces. By 1907, these Tec table lines were commanding a substantial share of the market. McKee was also noted for their production of ruby stained glass. We have a good many tumblers in ruby stain glass that were produced by McKee and some of them are in these Tec patterns. We have also seen a few pieces of carnival glass in the Aztec pattern and they are considered very rare. Iridised pieces can also be found in Mc-Kee's "Heart Band" pattern. Tumblers, mugs, sugars, and creamers are some of the carnival glass pieces that can be found in that pattern.

Our featured "Martec" carnival glass tumbler is very similar in color and iridescence to the rare Aztec carnival glass tumbler. "Martec" is not listed in any of the carnival glass books, to the best of my knowledge.

The tumbler that we describe here is the only piece os carnival glass that we have seen in that pattern. The pattern is of the intaglio or near cut type. It stands four inches high and has a sunburst type design pressed into the underside of the base.



_MARTEC_TUMBLER - - OPPOSITE SIDES_


Two sides of the tumbler contains a large diamond shaped hobstar which is shown in Photo #1. Photo #2 shows the design that is used on the opposite sides of the tumbler. This "Martec" tumbler is signed with McKee's "PRESCUT" trademark. This mark is on the inside botton of the tumbler. "PRESCUT" was a registered trademark of the McKee Glass Company. We consider the "Martec" tumbler as being very rare. We find that McKee made only a very small amount of carnival glass.

A very find book on McKee glass was written by Sandra McPhee Stout. It covers the history of the McKee company and the patterns that were produced by them. A number of other patterns found in this book were made in carnival glass. We recommend the book highly to any one who is interested in glass. It can be purchased in shops or antique shows where antique books are sold.

This unusual "Martec" tumbler represents our 126th entry into this series on carnival glass tumblers. Next month we will cover a Dugan pattern tumbler that is known as "Stork & Rushes".

We actually purchased the rose bowl that is shown above to do some research on this pattern. It is an interesting piece of carnival glass in good dark marigold and with very nice iridescence. We have had this piece now for about three years. It is one of those pieces that the longer you keep it, the better you like it. We have never been able to find another piece of carnival glass in this pattern, but we are sure there must be others out there some where.

This pattern is not listed in any of the Hartung books, but it can be found in Presznick book 2 - page 36. It is shown in plate #136. Presznick reported the maker as unknown at that time, but we have found that it was made by the U.S. Glass Company. A small milk pitcher of this pattern is illustrated in Kamm book 1 - page 20. The pattern was originally made by Bryce Brothers and called "Maltese" by them. Material on this pattern was found appearing in an old trade catalog in 1885 and described it as being made in many different pieces. In 1891, some fifteen different glass companies, including Bryce Brothers, were merged together to form what would be known as the U.S. Glass Company. Bryce Brothers would be known as the U.S. Glass Company's Factory B. Since this iridised glass, now known as carnival glass, was not produced at that time, we know that this type of glass was later produced by the U.S. Glass Company.

The "Jacobs Ladder" rose bowl is 3 inches high with a top opening of 5 3/8 inches. the collar base is 3 3/8 inches in diameter with a 24 point star pressed into the underside of the base. We consider it a very unusual and pretty piece of carnival glass and certainly a desirable rariety. It was once a part of the Presznick museum collection and still bears the Presznick museum sticker.

This is the original "Pictorial Pattern Parade" column and marks our 114th entry into that series.

It all began a few months ago when I was called on the phone by a gentleman on the east coast. He asked me how much a tri-cornered green Wishbone footed plate was worth. I said I had no idea, as I had never seen one sell, in fact; I did not know there was one that even existed. He went on to tell me he was an antique dealer, but did not collect Wishbone carnival. He also said this piece was to be in an auction and he wanted to send in a bid on it. He had read my article on the Wishbone pattern and I had not mentioned a green tri-cornered plate, so he thought it probably was rather hard to find. As we talked, he asked me how much I would give for one. After much hesitation and still not believing one existed, I told him how much I would give him for it. This auction was to be on the following Saturday. I believe he called me on a Monday or Tuesday of that week. We ended our conversation and the more I thought about it, the more anxious I became.

Well, several weeks went by and I had no word about the plate. I finally could stand it no longer, so I wrote the man who called and asked him what he had found out. I just knew it probably turned out to be something else and chalked it up to another of those wild goose chases we all go on from time to time. Several more weeks went by and still no word. I finally dismissed the thought from my mind. One evening, after a hard day at the office, I came home and just sat down at the table to read all of the junk mail that fills my mail box every day, when the phone rang. It was my unknown friend from the east telling me he was sorry he had not answered my letter, but he had nothing to tell me until that day so he gave me a ring instead. He said the man who owned the plate would not sell it. He had got wind of my article from someone and decided it was worth something more than he had anticipated, but that my man from the east had talked him into putting the piece in one of his auctions on the 28th of May. I said, "Is it what you thought it was?" He said, "Yes indeed, and I have it right here in my hand as I am talking to you. It is beautiful and it is a green, footed Wishbone tri-cornered plate." Again, I was stunned and told him not to worry, we would be sending him a bid for sure. Roland was at work every time the fellow called and when he came home, he could not believe it was truly a Wishbone tri-cornered plate. The more we talked, the more I said one of us has to go to the auction. Roland was not able to get off, but I was, so we made reservations to go to the auction. There is still some doubts in our minds that this piece really exists, but we will soon know, as the plane ticket is bought and come the 28th of May I will be on my way to seeing for myself.

The day finally came to leave for Ashville, North Carolina for the auction. Roland took me to the airport for a 7:40 A.M. flight. I had two changes

of planes going down, one in St. Louis and Charlotte, North Carolina. I went from TWA to Piedmont. Of course, every time you change planes, you have to go through one of those security checks. In Wichita and St. Louis I went through without a hitch. In Charlotte, I walked through and the lights and buzzer went off like a Las Vegas neon sign. I took everything out of my pockets and it still went off. Finally we decided it was my western belt with the metal name plate on the back. Sure enough, that was the culpret. I proceeded on to the gate for departure to Ashville, holding my pants up with one hand and carrying two carry-on pieces of luggage with the other one. I never saw so many different types of aircraft. From big ones to the type that look like you might have to wind up with a rubber band. Well, they herded us to our plane and I never saw a plane that looked like this one did. Imagine a cracker box with a wing stretching across the top and 2 propeller driven engines hanging from the wings. We all got aboard and there are 2 seats wide along one side and 1 seat wide on the other. I squeezed myself and two carry-on cases into a seat and off we went. We were only number 7 to take off. It finally was our turn to take off and we bounced down the runway and leaped off the runway on one of the bounces and into the air we went. The old crate flew pretty good once we were airborn and 45 minutes later we were in Ashville. I was met there by Pat Vass, a sister of the fellow who was having the auction. I thought this was awfully nice of her and a friend to come meet me.

As I checked in and headed for my room, guess who the first person I ran into? Bob Vinning and Chuck Kremer. What a small world this carnival glass can be. I hurried from the room to wait in the lobby for the viewing. I still could not believe the green, footed, Wishbone tri-cornered plate existed. We met Mr. Haygood in the lobby and he said go right on in and look. Sure enough, there it sat on the table with some other rare pieces that would be in the auction.

Saturday morning I met Chuck and Marjorie for breakfast and we rushed back to look at the glass before the auction. The auctioneer was very good and moved the glass quite rapidly. He finished by 3:00 P.M. This being my first time in this area, I was able to meet a lot of new people. I was able to match the faces with the names and really enjoyed being there. There was a good crowd. We were fortunate to get the Wishbone piece along with some other fine pieces and the Wishbone now joins its plate with the marigold and purple one. As far as we know, this is the only one that has surfaced at this writing.

Sunday morning I met the Kremers again for breakfast and they took me back to the airport. I very much appreciated this and hope to repay the favor

sometime.

I plan to research how and when this green Wishbone piece surfaced, but that will be another story for later.

This was a first for the area in the Carolina's and from comments perhaps we will be seeing more auctions in this area soon. What little I saw of the Smokey Mountains was beautiful. Ashville is nestled beneath the mountains, which are completely covered with trees. I expected to see bare mountains, but they are covered with so many trees you can hardly walk between them. It is like a picture post card and looks like a well kept park for miles. I was pleased to be able to meet Shirley and Bobby Hill from Reidsville, North Carolina.

I have enclosed the price list of the auction so, if you care to print any or all, please feel free to do so. I think the prices are very interesting and think you will agree they are quite good.

I must add, the morning of the auction, who should I run into also, but Merle Richardson, Singleton Bailey and Mr. X. This fellow never misses an auction. What amazes me is how can he be at 2 or 3 auctions the same day many miles apart. That is a story for later, also.


Dear Members:
