THE 1991 H.O.A.C.G.A. CONVENTION IS NOW HISTORY

Even though the Convention activities did not start until Thursday, some members arrived as early as Monday, so they could get their Room Displays and glass for sale all set up for those who would arrive later. By Thursday, the Motel was beginning to fill up and looked as if a Carnival Glass Convention was taking place. When all the Room Displays and glass for sale is set out with the drapes pulled back in the picture windows, the whole Motel becomes a Carnival Glass display.

Thanks to all of those who brought their glass to share with all of us, it does make an impressive display. If you are a new collector and have not attended a Convention, you have missed a great educational opportunity.

On Thursday afternoon, we had the opportunity to see some of Jerry and Carol Curtis' Carnival collection. Jerry and Caro displayed about 60 different pieces from their collection and explained how they obtained the various pieces. As Jerry explained, their collection has some unusual pieces either because of color, shape or pattern. The pieces may not be some of the better known or popular patterns, but it is what they find interesting or unusual. It was a very nice Heinz variety collection. Jerry was concerned that he would not be able to talk about his collection for as much as 30 minutes. It took him 75 minutes to give us the complete inside story of their collection.

Thanks Clint & Gene for assembling the Hatpins and presenting the Program. This is one of those pieces of Carnival that has not received a lot of publicity and is only collected by a few collectors.

Friday evening the auction glass was presented for viewing, after which members had an opportunity to socialize with pie and coffee. 45 pies were served that evening. It seems as if the gooseberry and rhubarb pies are becoming the favorite flavors.

John & Laveta Woody presented a very nice Carnival Glass auction. Members were able to add some nice pieces to their collections. Approximately 300 people were in attendance at the auction.

Saturday evening, after a delicious steak dinner, we were privileged to hear from Kendall, Wisconsin's #1 Citizens; Carl & Fern Schroeder. The Schroeders entertained and educated us about a few of the items from their collection. It is always interesting to hear collectors tell about some of their very special pieces of Carnival Glass. Carl & Fern have been collecting for several years and are always willing to share their glass and knowledge of Carnival with fellow collectors.

A big thanks to all of those for sharing with other members. The willingness to present a Convention Program is very much appreciated and always makes us all enjoy ourselves more.

A PEEK INTO THE PAST - - IN CARNIVAL GLASS

We are going to take another peek into the past that will emphasize this beautiful glass that we call Carnival. Carnival Glass is playing an important part in a great many of our lives today by bringing a lot of joy, happiness, interesting history and friendship to people all over this country and abroad. We must also remember that it played an important part to America in the early part of this century by providing jobs and livelihood to many families and also supplying a part in better family life to thousands of others. Long live Carnival Glass!

The following will give you some idea of the value of Carnival Glass in the past. The list gives the name of the owners and their offering price. These samples were taken from ads placed in 1976 Antique Traders. You will notice that the values at that time, in most cases, were much different than they are today.

(Writers Note: Notice that the above pieces from the Kojis ad are all aqua opal. Is there anyone out there that would like to order the complete list? Oh yes, maybe a thousand of us or even more would like that. Wouldn't it have been great if you had? We are sure that many of you newer collectors will find that these prices are very hard to believe, but we can assure you that this is what they were selling for in 1976.

In this same line of thinking, we can well remember that a super ice green Poppy Show plate sold in our St. Louis auction in 1975 for \$275.00. We thought that was great, because we had bought it in a Florida antique show for \$125.00. (One of these sold in an auction in 1987 for \$2,700.00. Another example sold in 1988 for \$3,500.00) At the same 1975 auction our ice blue ribbed Tornado vase sold for \$200.00. Today one would sell for at least 10 times that figure. In fact, we only know of 3 of these. Out beautiful aqua opal Peacock at the Fountain fruit bowl sold for a shopping price of \$2,700.00. This was 1975. That sure put us on cloud nine, as we had paid the big price (we thought so at the time we had purchased it in 1971) of \$385.00. After seeing one of these sell last summer at the I.C.G.A. Ludemann auction (7-12-90) for \$9,250.00, you might say that we both fell off our perch on cloud nine. Ha!)

THE MILLERSBURG ELK BOWL

This beautiful Millersburg Elk bowl is certainly a classic example of Millersburg's radium finish Carnival Glass. Its' design, detail, color and iridescence are all outstanding. John Fenton and the Millersburg workers and designers certainly should have been very proud of this super piece of Carnival Glass. Likewise, collectors today take great pride in owning one of these very fine pieces.

The above six-ruffled bowl is a full 7½ inches wide. The interior of the bowl contains the clock, elk and the wording DETROIT 1910. The letters B.P.O.E. are placed just under the elk. A vine with ivy-type leaves extends around the outer edge of the interior. The reverse pattern is of the wide panel design and a 28 point star is pressed into the bottom of the base. The typical Millersburg amethyst is the only color that has been reported in the Millersburg Elk bowls.

The Millersburg version of this pattern is often referred to as the Two-Eyed Elk bowl. This, no doubt, is because you can see both eyes of the elk on this piece. In addition to the ruffled bowl, this piece can be found in the ice cream shape. The ice cream shape is considered more difficult to find, but you can be sure that these pieces are very rare in any shape.

THE FENTON ELK BOWL

The above photo shows the Fenton version of the elk piece. This particular one is the Atlantic City bowl, but these Fenton Elk pieces were also made featuring the cities of Detroit and Parkersburg. We are showing the Fenton Elk bowl here to illustrate the difference between the two examples. Note that the Fenton Elk bowl has a band of stars around the outer edge, while our featured Millersburg Elk shows the vine and ivy-type leaves design. Also notice that the Millersburg Elk faces to the left, while on the Fenton piece, the elk faces to the right. There are other differences, but these are the most prominent.

This is our 149th entry into our Pictorial Pattern Parade. Next month we will cover the famous Millersburg Courthouse bowls.

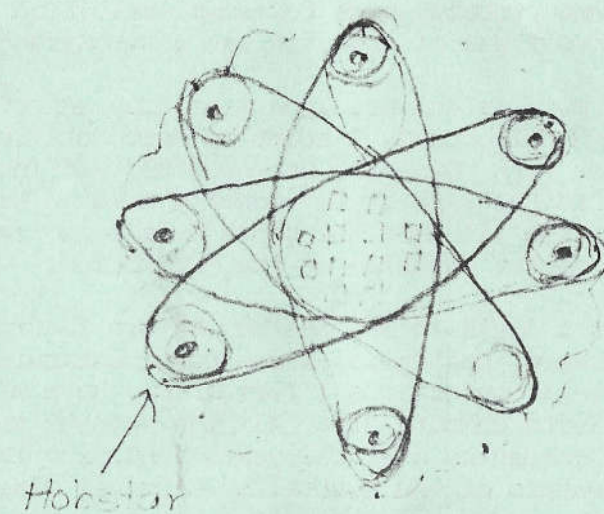
THE HOBSTAR DIAMONDS TUMBLER

The Hobstar Diamonds tumbler was purchased from Walter Brannon of California at the same time we bought his very popular Butterfly tumbler. He said that he had found this tumbler at a small auction in California.

It is definitely a rare tumbler and it is not listed in any of the books, to the best of our knowledge. Only two examples have ever been reported in Carnival Glass. We are quite sure that there are a few others out there somewhere, but we have not seen them. The tumbler is 3 7/8" tall, 3" across the top and has a base diameter of 2 3/8". The bottom of the tumbler contains an unusual figure, similar to the spokes of a wheel. We are showing a rough sketch which will give you some idea of what the bottom of the tumbler looks like. There are eight hobstars around the outside top of the tumbler and 8 smaller ones around the bottom. These hobstars are diamond shaped, hence the name of the tumbler - - Hobstar Diamonds. A band of large diamond shaped figures are placed between the two rows of hobstars, forming a very attractive design.

We have not been able to find much information about this tumbler or as to its maker. There is a picture of the tumbler along with two others shown in the Butler Brothers 1910 catalog. If you have a copy of that catalog, it appears on catalog page no. 403. This is a direct reprint showing only the

glass section from the 1910 general catalog. It is shown along side a Colonial type tumbler that looks like it could be the Flute #1 tumbler. This old 1910 catalog tells us that it was made in the early Carnival Glass era. The color and iridescence of the tumbler, and the pattern used on the bottom of the base, certainly do not look like Imperial. So until we can find out more on this pattern, we can only say - - maker unknown. We might add that it does favor the Hobstar Band tumblers in many respects. It is quite possible that these two tumblers were made by the same company. We believe that this is a very nice and unusual tumbler and would make an important addition to any tumbler collection.

## AUSTRALIAN CARNIVAL GLASS KIWI MYSTERY SOLVED

In October, 1990, I wrote an article which was published in this Newsletter on Kiwi bowls and I mentioned the theory that was often put forward by many collectors that they were probably made for some exhibition in New Zealand and as no forthcoming proof was offered, it was disregarded.

GREAT NEWS! Whilst in New Zealand enjoying a holiday and of course visiting many antique dealers and collectors, I stumbled onto details of the South Seas Exhibition held at Logan Park, Dunedin, between 1925 and into 1926. This exhibition was similar to the Expo style recently held in Brisbane, Australia and large corporations from all over the south seas region was invited to participate for the 12 months duration of the exhibition.

I researched as much as I could in New Zealand before leaving and within 24 hours of arriving back here, Australia; I was busy continuing this line of inquiry with the excellent connections I fortunately have with Crown Corning Ltd., the present surviving company after all the various take-overs and amalgamations of glass companies over the years including the Crystal Glass Company, who were the makers of the Australian Carnival Glass back in the mid 1920's.

Apart from executives and old employees of the Company, I also delved into archive material from one of our largest libraries and also a large museum.

From all the information gathered and the details sorted out both from documentation and memories of past employees, the result of the jig-saw would offer that the Company had accepted the invitation to attend the Dunedin South Seas Exhibition and accordingly tooled up to have suitable stock to create interest in the many glass products the Company wished to offer and in particular the Lustre ware items (as it was known then) which at that time was enjoying a huge popularity.

Obviously the best way to create immediate attention and interest in your product was to design something typifying the host country which in this case was several different sized bowls depicting the New Zealand National Bird, the Kiwi. Stock of these and other Australian Carnival Glass would have been accumulated in readiness for the big promotion, but unfortunately the Company did not proceed with its plans to participate. Not always can you get undeniable proof as to why something may have happened, but an educated guess suggests that at that time, they were undergoing internal Company changes and an amalgamation with the Australian Glass Manufacturing Company and this was put forward as a most logical reason.

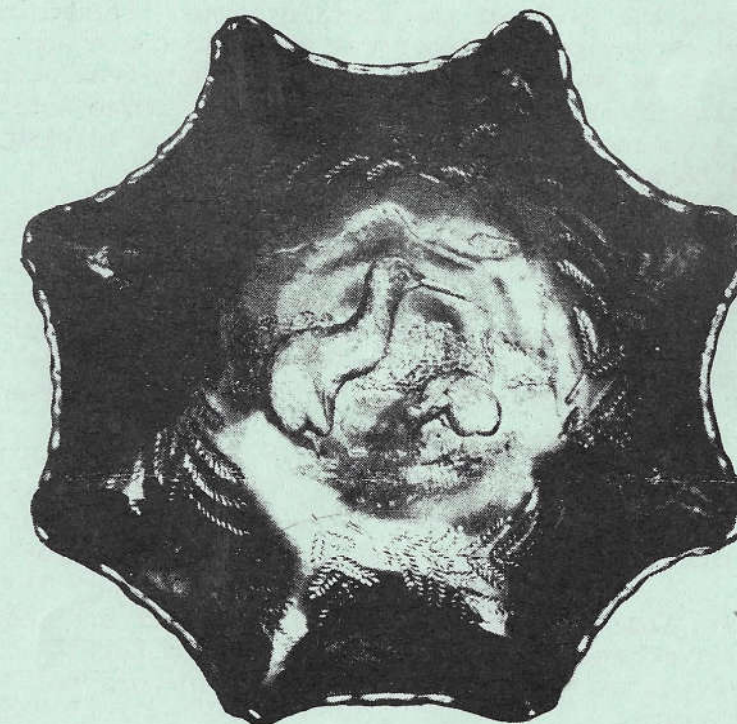
It is of particular note that no Kiwi bowls have ever been found in New Zealand and the only Australian pieces found have been the very few taken over by individuals. This again supports the fact of non-participation

to the exhibition and also indicates the Company had never exported Carnival Glass into New Zealand.

All research items are only as good as the documentation to support the theories and whilst I have been both satisfied in my endeavors and excited to put to rest one of the last great mysteries pertaining to Australian Carnival Glass, I would still wish that collectors keep their eyes open for any further reference to this study and advise me accordingly.

May 5, 1991 - The ad read "over 1,000 pieces of Carnival and Cut Glass from an estate". Some good patterns and shapes were listed with a few pictures. A sale of this size was bound to have something attractive. So we were off to Indianapolis early Sunday morning. The sale started at 11:00 A.M. and there was a lot of glass plus furniture, oriental rugs, jewelry, bicycles, primitives, etc. to sell. We were greeted by hundreds of pieces of new Carnival, some cut glass and probably 300 pieces of old Carnival and the usual gang of "Carnival Nuts" and bargain hunters from Tennessee, West Virginia, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, a few Hoosiers and some we didn't know.

It didn't take long to discover how spiled we and other so-called main line Carnival sale goers are. No sale list - no numbers on the glass so no sale sequence. No bid numbers in advance - we got our bid number when we bought our first piece. The first hour was devoted to selling miscellaneous items including much new Carnival that was wheeled up front on small hospital bed food tray carts and sold choice of the eight or ten items. From then on a mixture of everything was the sale sequence.

Most of the old Carnival Glass was displayed in random order on glass enclosed shelves lining the walls of the auction house. Periodically a portable table full of glass was brought up front where we could and did reinspect it before it sold. Sets were broken up and sold piece meal. For example, a four piece Hanging Cherries table set was sold in three lots. We left after five hours and a collector from Ohio was still there waiting for the third part of the set to sell.

The auction house was comfortable, plenty of boxes and packing material and the auctioneers were professional and very accomodating. Our friends got some nice pieces - the top one being an amethyst Lotus & Grape plate at \$1,150.00. One Indiana Carnival collector bought an almost new refrigerator. All in all we visited with collector friends, bought some glass and were treated to a fast paced sale - even if we did think it was different from our typical Carnival Glass auction.

May 17-19, 1991 - Five auctions of some 1,600 pieces of glass. Three of the auctions with over 1,100 pieces were to be held in a 48 hour period in Missouri alone. Almost more than the mind and body can tolerate!

We made it to St. Louis for Jim Seeck's Friday night and Saturday auction. We thought the crowd reflected the fact there were few "killer" pieces in the auction. As in most auctions the good glass sold well and there were some bargains in between.

We moved a few miles down the road to Tom Burn's Saturday night-Sunday morning auction. The some 45 Dragon & Lotus and about 50 Peacock & Grape pieces

in a wide variety of colors and shapes were a sight rarely seen. While we were there (Saturday night only) the top pieces sold well, but in our opinion the large number of pieces in the same pattern made for some good buys.

Sunday morning it was off to Booneville, Missouri for the Mickey Reichel auction. The sale was made up largely of nice marigold glass. We bought a couple of items that we wanted and left early for home so we do not have a feel for how the total sale went.

A "three sale weekend" was interesting and enjoyable for us and we bought something in each auction but have decided we couldn't take this as a steady diet. Tomorrow we are off to the Keystone Convention in Brookville, Pa.

NEWS FROM OUR MEMBERS.....

I have some interesting information that the other Club members might be interested in. My wife Linda and I just started collecting Carnival Glass a little over a year ago and there are a lot of questions that we have asked and some of the answers we got, I wasn't sure I believed or not. The answer I'm writing about is that vaseline glass has uranium in it. I found this hard to believe although I had heard it from several people. Does vaseline glass really have uranium in it? I had to know.

Well, now I have my answer, but first let me give you some information on how I found out. I work in nuclear plants and have since the late 1970's. I figured it should be easy enough to find out if this glass is truly radioactive since I'm around it every day. So, I took a piece of my vaseline to work to try to solve this mystery.

There are radioactive detectors everywhere, so all I had to do was put the glass next to it and check it. Guess what! It set off the detector. Now I knew it was radioactive, but what was in it? Was it uranium?

I took it to Health Physics and they agreed to do a Gamma-Scan on it. The Gamma-Scan measures the energy levels of the gamma rays emitted by radioactive elements. As a radioactive element decays or tries to become stable, it gives off gamma rays and different elements give off gamma rays of different levels. Some energy levels are close to the same so it will tell what it most likely is if it can't tell for sure. This would tell what was in the glass.

The list it gave of the maybes was impressive: uranium, radium, barium, thorium, iodine, xenon, niobium, protactinium. Of course, most of these have a relatively short half life and will decay down to a different element and become non-radioactive in a few days. The ones to worry about are uranium and radium. Uranium has a half life of 700 million years and radium is 1,600 years.

Some of the energy level peaks couldn't be identified by the computer, but the ones that were identified and given over a 90% probability were radium, thorium, xenon and niobium. It's not uranium, it's radium! So in only a few thousand years it will become non-radioactive.

That explains why it glows under ultraviolet light. Do you remember the radium watch dials that would glow in the dark and were outlawed several years ago?

Are these precious pieces of Carnival Glass dangerous? The piece I had tested had ten times the activity of anything that we are allowed to bring out of the radiological controlled area at nuclear plants. With no quality

control when the glass was made, I'm sure that the level of activity will differ from piece to piece. There are probably some pieces out there that are very radioactive.

Does anyone have any vaseline glass they want to get rid of cheap?

The following letter from Mr. Frank Fenton, of the Fenton Art Glass Company, was received by us, and should be of interest to all Carnival Glass collectors:

Dear Eleanor:

Sorry to be so late in responding to your letter of May 8, 1991. I set it aside until I had time to think about the proper response to Mr. Cain's letter. Now it's already June, so I'd better get at it.

You should inform Carnival Glass collectors that, to the best of my knowledge, uranium is the material which is used to make the Vaseline Glass. I imagine that, in other glass companies, there are various salts of uranium that have been used to get the coloring. In our factory at the present time, we use uranium oxide depleted. That means that the major radioactive isotopes (the ones that are used to make atomic bombs and so forth) have been taken out. Uranium oxide depleted is still radioactive, but not to the extent that it would be without the necessary processing.

We are licensed by the Atomic Energy Commission to buy this uranium oxide. We have to be very careful that no one working around the material or mixing it in the batch has any possibility of ingesting the uranium into his system. We give them regular tests and urinalyses in order to make sure that nothing is ingested.

On the other hand, there seems to be no objection to using the uranium in the small quantities that we use for coloring the glass. A number of years ago, we received letters from individuals indicating that our Custard and Burmese glass (both of which have about the same amount of uranium in them as does Vaseline) were hot and were radioactive. Since our decorators worked on the Custard and Burmese pieces regularly, we felt we had to check this out.

We employed a licensed health physicist from Ohio State University who came down and checked our operations. It is true that, if you put a piece of glass right next to the Geiger counter, you will get an indication that it is radioactive, and the Geiger counter will do its clicking. On the other hand, if you put the piece of glass 12" away from the Geiger counter, you can't get a response.

The physicist explained it to us: If the decorators were to hold the glass close to them 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, for a number of years, there might be some hazard involved. However, with the occasional handling just on the tips of their fingers, he saw no hazard. He said there was much greater hazard in going outside and standing in the sun light. We would get more radiation from sunshine than we would from handling Burmese and Custard glass pieces.

We are satisfied that there is no risk to the normal user of Vaseline Carnival Glass. I suppose if you ground it up and ate it, and it stayed in your system, there would then be a hazard.

I hope this answers your question. If there are other questions, please be sure to get in touch with us.

THE MUSEUM OF AMERICAN GLASS OPENS THE MAJOR EXHIBIT FOR 1991

MILLVILLE, NEW JERSEY - A brilliant arrangement of rare colored cut glass will blossom on Saturday, April 6 in the Museum of American Glass at Wheaton Village with the opening of the "Colorful Cutting" exhibition.

The exhibit features an array of American-made colored cut glass produced between 1876 and 1930 by such well-known companies as Tiffany, Dorflinger, Libbey and Hawkes and will be open to the public through Sunday, October 27.

Among the examples which will be included in the Museum exhibit is an elegant emerald green punch bowl set, cut in an intricate geometric pattern by C. Dorflinger and Sons. Another dramatic piece is an iridescent pitcher cut in a delicate floral and bordered design by the Tiffany Glass Company.

"In addition to the historic significance of these pieces, I would have to say that this is simply one of the most beautiful exhibits we've ever mounted," said Gay LeCleire Taylor, curator of the Museum of American Glass.

These unusual pieces in vivid shades of red, green, gold and blue were not believed to be part of a company's cut glass production line. They were usually created in response to requests from customers to mark special occasions.

Less than 1% of all the cut glass produced in America during the late 19th century and early 20th centuries was colored cut glass. The exhibit brings together 75 examples of this glassware, which will be housed in the Museum's Special Exhibition Gallery.

Pieces for the exhibit were loaned by private collectors and institutions, including members of the Empire Chapter of the American Cut Glass Association and the Jones Museum of Glass and Ceramics.

The Museum of American Glass and Wheaton Village will be open seven days a week from 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. beginning April 1. Narrated glassmaking demonstrations take place daily in the T. C. Wheaton Glass Factory at 11:00 AM, 1:30 P.M. and 3:30 P.M. Current operating hours are Wednesday through Sunday 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

TO CONCERNED GLASS LOVERS:

This is an update on our campaign to keep American glass on display at the Smithsonian. On August 13, we received a letter from Mr. Roger G. Kennedy, Director of the Smithsonian. He welcomed contributions of glass. He stated that they are a Museum of History and not an Art Museum, but were interested in an adequate representation of glass in the treatment of American History.

On September 7, Mr. Kennedy wrote to say that there would not be an independent glass exhibit depicting 170 years of glass in America. And I quote "so with regret I must say to you that we are going to have to dissappoint you".

On November 14, we received a letter from Mr. Kennedy saying that the Ceremonial Court would have three double cases containing approximately 100 pieces. Not much for almost 200 years of glass making in America.

On further investigation we found that large collections of Tiffany, Libbey Cut Glass, Burmese and thousands of other examples of early American glass are in storage. With no access to the public. We discovered that approximately 99% of the Smithsonian budget is funded with our tax dollars.

If we want to keep the glass where future generations can have access to it, now is the time to let your senators and congressmen know that we want some changes made in the policy at the Smithsonian. Even if it means replacing the present management. It wouldn't hurt to let them know that we will remember at the polls how they solved this problem.

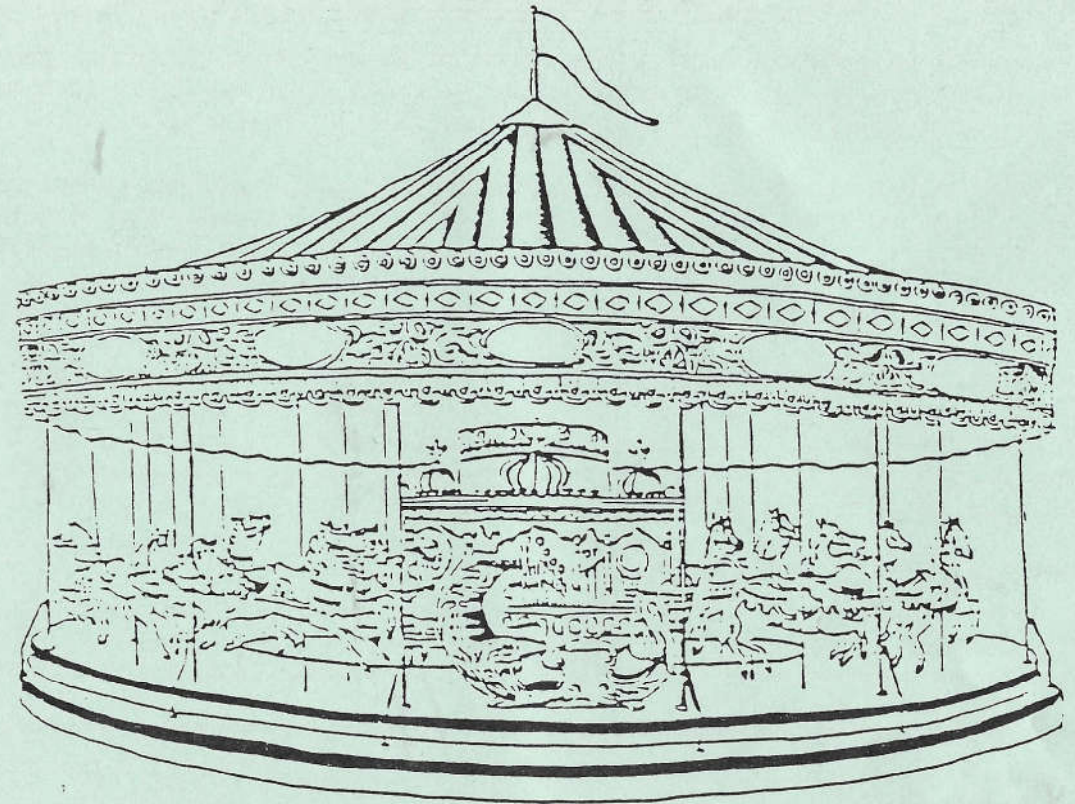
