1993 H.O.A.C.G.A. CONVENTION SUMMARY

Greeted by a large 20th Anniversary H.O.A.C.G.A. Banner at the registration desk, Wednesday, April 21, 1993, saw members arriving in force for the 20th Annual Convention of the Heart of America Carnival Glass Association. By Thursday's Registration, most of the pre-ordered packets for early Registration were gone. Final count for Friday and Saturday was nearly 120 rooms at the Holiday Inn in Lenexa, Kansas.

Thursday's first Program was presented in the afternoon by Bob Stremming on the Two Flowers pattern. A capacity crowd of 150 heard Bob tell us that marigold and blue are common, but white and red are very difficult to find. Also sapphire blue and green are tough to find. A display of over 50 pieces in various colors, sizes and shapes were impressive.

Thursday evening saw another standing room only crowd in the Presidents Room for Smokey Cloud's presentation on Small Plates. One hundred small plates were displayed and discussed with Smokey noting that the H.O.A.C.G.A. Notebook is probably the best reference on small plates. Thursday evening on the Party Deck, pie and coffee was served and everyone enjoyed the hospitality. A lot of visiting took place in the rooms as well.

On Friday at 10:00 A.M., the Presidens Room was the scene of another standing room only Program. This time on the many types of blue Carnival, as Richard Cinclair tried to train us to differentiate renninger, ice blue, teal, blue opalescent, celeste, persian, smokey, powder, cobalt, electric and aqua opal. A beautiful 50 piece display of glass helped to illustrate.

Friday afternoon in the Ballroom, nearly 190 people convened to honor Frank Fenton and John & Lucile Britt. The Hotel outdid themselves on the Luncheon which was topped off by fresh fruit and a 20th Anniversary Cake (which unfortunately most of us didn't get to see before it was "dissected".) Bob Grissom hosted the Luncheon and he and Helen James Ward began by commenting on the outstanding help (and unending patience) Frank Fenton has offered over the years. Frank was then presented with a beautiful cranberry vase hand painted with "Frank Fenton, Friend of Carnival Glass Collectors, Presented by H.O.A.-C.G.A. April, 1993." It was also signed on the bottom by two generations of Fentons (second & third). The Program continued with testimonials to John & Lucile Britt by Diane Fry, Chuck Kremer, Marie McGee and Richard Cinclair, who presented Lucile with a dozen long stemmed red roses and a "white, lightly iridized vase" (florists) to put them in. The tribute was most touching and and as the saying goes, there wasn't a dry eye in the house. A Fenton signed cranberry vase was presented to the Britts with the hand painted inscription "John & Lucile Britt Award for Excellence in Carnival Glass". H.O.A.C.G.A. plans to present one of these awards for each of the next 11 years to a member who has demonstrated a special excellence in and/or service to Carnival Glass

Collectors. Both Frank Fenton and the Britts received standing ovations.

After the Luncheon, the Annual Business Meeting took place. Upcoming Conventions were announced. Election of officers took place with Bob Grissom reelected President and Ed Kramer elected Secretary.

Friday evening saw a lot of glass change hands and many visitors to see the room displays and auction glass preview. With all the room displays and lighting, the hotel looked like a shopping center at Christmas. Thanks to the Kansas City Star and some extra publicity, we had a lot of "locals" pass through which we hope will lead to increased membership and participation in the Club. Another "party" on the Party Deck was sponsored by the Club with Nadine Paulsen producing cheese and cracker trays, coffee and tea and a 20th Anniversary Cake. Everyone stopped by and seemed to enjoy the conversation and treats.

Saturday morning saw a lively auction of 300 pieces of glass by Tom Burns, Bill Richards and Bill Richards III. For some of us who had not been to a Burns auction before, it was a special treat. The auction went into midafternoon after which the Banquet set-up began.

The Banquet was attended by over 200 guests. Acknowledgements of all the workers was made by President Bob Grissom. The tables and dais were decorated with beautiful roses in vases which were later awarded to lucky winners at each table. Favors were plum colored small mugs and Room Display participants received a hobnail cuspidor in the same color. Room Display awards were presented and the raffle was then held. Lucile Britt was asked to draw the winning tickets and the results were as follows:



EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES By John & Lucile Britt



THE PANELED TWIGS TUMBLER

Panaled Twigs is a little smaller than the average size table tumblers. It measures 3 3/8 inches tall with a top opening of 2 5/8 inches. There is a plain band around the top of the tumbler and below this area are four smooth panels alternating with four otherpanels that contain the twigs design. The color is a beautiful dark marigold with very nice iridescence.

The featured Panaled Twigs tumbler was made in Czechoslovakia. We found this pattern in a section of Czechoslovakian glass from Joseph Inwald A.G., Prague, Czechoslovakia in William Heacock's Collecting Glass, volume #2. This exact pattern is listed in that section along with many other glass patterns. Decoratum, Intaglio Stars and Fleur De Lis are three other patterns made in Carnival Glass that are also shown in this material. We have covered these three patterns in previous articles.

The example shown above is a part of the Whitley collection and was earlier purchased from the Lytle collection of California when the Lytles had decided to sell their collection. This Panaled Twigs tumbler is the only one that we have ever seen. The Whitley's also report of seeing a dresser set in this pattern. We believe that this pattern was made in many different pieces in Carnival Glass. We consider the Panaled Twigs tumbler as very desirable and

would add beauty and charm to any Carnival Glass collection.

The Panaled Twigs tumbler marks the 184th entry into our Educational Tumbler Series. Next month we will cover a Westmorland Carnival Glass tumbler that is known as English Hobnail.



THE MILLERSBURG CHERRY SMALL PLATE


Millersburg Cherry, often referred to as Hanging Cherries, is one of the most popular Millersburg patterns and was made in a wide variety of pieces including water sets, table sets, berry sets, bowls of various sizes, compotes, rare milk pitcher, sauces, rare powder jar, rare chop plate and our featured small plate. A rare nine inch plate has also been reported, but we have never seen that one. The Millersburg Cherry pattern can also be found in a variant which contains the Hobnail pattern on the back instead of the normal wide panelled pattern. This variant, with the hobnails on the outside, can be found in large bowls and small sauces. All pieces of this type are considered hard to find.

A few of the regular Millersburg Cherry pieces are rather common, especially in some of the different sizes of bowls. We consider this little plate as very rare. The featured example is $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide and is only a trace over 1 inch high from the table top. Three clusters of hanging cherries circle the interior of the plate. The exterior contains the popular Wide Panels pattern. There is a 28 point star used on the underside of the collar base. The color is of a good dark marigold with radiant iridescence.

In photo #2 we show this small plate alongside a super blue three-in-one edge sauce in the same pattern. We think that these two pieces compliment one another and both are certainly beautiful and desirable pieces of Millersburg Carnival Glass.

A LOOK AT TABLE SETS By Chuck & Marge Kremer



THE DAHLIA TABLE SET

A Dugan pattern that is available in white, amethyst and marigold. White and amethyst are considered quite scarce. Occasionally the flowers on the white sets are painted red, blue or gold. The pattern is highly raised and distinct. All four pieces rest on four feet.

When the iridescence was good we always considered this a striking set. An amethyst piece with shiny iridescence and purplish highlights is a real beauty. The white set is also quite attractive when it is a frosty white or decorated.

We have probably seen more individual amethyst pieces and complete white sets for sale than the rest. For years our goal was a good amethyst set, but the few sets or pieces we found usually left something to be desired. We had purchased a couple of nice pieces at very reasonable prices earlier, and in 1991 our time had arrived. A three piece set that was to our liking sold in an auction—it was a four piece set until unpacked at the auction. It was therefore sold by the piece; and this was a case where the pieces probably sold for more than the "whole", but we had our set completed and it was well matched. In our opinion, prices usually do not reflect the scarcity of this pattern.

The Dahlia water set has been reproduced, but as this, the eleventh in our series on table sets, is written, we know of no reproductions in the table sets.

ON THE AUCTION TRAIL WITH CHUCK & MARGE

APRIL 3, 1993: Richard Hagood Auction, Lexington, Kentucky. Richard Hagood proved an individual could organize and advertise the sale of their own glass, draw a good crowd from all over the nation and have a very successful sale. Of course it helped that Richard had assembled a very good selection of glass—glass that literally sold itself.

Although Jim Seeck cried the sale, it was not a Seeck Auction Company sale. Jim and Jan's involvement was limited to the sale day control and verbalizing. They did their usual good job. What does an auctioneer do on his day off? Why he goes to an auction! We recognized five other auctioneers in the crowd and there was some buying by them too.

In every auction there is a piece or two that is controversial and this auction was no exception. One such piece was a white Grape & Cable Sweetmeat. It had a somewhat stretchy look and feel, had a faint N trademark and was a dead ringer for any other Grape & Cable Sweetmeat. This piece apparently surfaced a year ago and was first shown at the 1992 A.C.G.A. Convention. It brought \$900.00.

Prices will be reported in most newsletters so we will not go into detail here except to say we thought prices were generally very good and a lot of different people took glass home.

APRIL 10, 1993: Kremer Auction, Warsaw, Indiana. The time came when we felt we should dispose of some of the collectibles and primitives that we had accumulated over the years. Weeks prior we had made arrangements to consign about 400 items to the auction. We had a choice of several dates. Should it be an all day Saturday or a Monday afternoon-evening sale? We settled on Saturday, April 10, 1993. Then the hard part began. We sorted, washed, cleaned, boxed the smalls and stacked it all in our garage. Of course, the car sat outside. This part proved to be quite a job and was spread over several days.

We rented a truck and the fun began. The 25 boxes went in fairly easily—the heavy ones on the bottom and light ones (like the one with 2 stuffed ducks) on top. There was an old "Hoosier kitchen cabinet, a victorian love seat, spinet desk and Cindy's old baby bed to load and protect. Odd shaped items like the school desks, bean sorter, two spring wagon seats, large copper kettle, coaster wagon and the wheelbarrow were a challenge to stack and make sure they didn't shift and damage other things. In between them we packed the wooden forks, rakes, corn planters and a lot of other individual items. We had planned on putting the odd tables, 8 X 10 area rug and light bulky items on top of it all, but there was just too much in the odds and ends catagory. The truck was full and it had taken four hours of "shoe horning" to get it all loaded.

Friday morning we were up early to drive the 45 miles to Warsaw and be there by 8:00 A.M. We hadn't planned on taking the car but had to put the overflow like the paintings and a few smalls in the trunk and carefully put the old wooden baby high chair in the back seat. It only took us an hour to unload the truck and car at the auction site.

We went back Saturday to the sale. Had a good crowd and everything went very well. Our "Carnival" friend Lee Markley had recommended this auction team and he surely was correct. They did a super job and prices were generally quite a bit higher than we expected. Oh yes—the high chair we put in the back seat sold for \$400.00—it paid to give it a soft ride up there.

What a relief it is over! We now have room we didn't know we had. Are we ready to start a second collection of collectibles—no way!

APRIL 16-17, 1993: Cooper and Albrecht Annual Spring Auction, Flint, Michigan. The Friday afternoon "Hors D'Oeuvres" preview is always welcomed and we wonder what different goodies will be there—a very nice way to start off the two day sale. The preview spread isn't the only thing that sets this auction team apart from the rest. Friday night the team arrived decked out in matching shirts, ties, trousers and coats, and Saturday they were again in matching attire except this time the colors had changed. Their ties looked like some—thing Rush Limbaugh wears on his TV show. Very refreshing!

The 125 pieces offered Friday night were mostly in the low priced catagory and generally nice and there were many bargains. Saturday the "work-a-day" crowd arrived and the pace picked up. We were disappointed to find several of the better items had some minor damage--damage that Gary to his credit identified before the sale. While not the highest priced pieces, an ice green Peacock & Urn 10" ice cream bowl sold for \$1,000.00, a white one at \$425.00, and blue at \$600.00, a red Persian Medallion bon bon sold for \$1,000.00, and an amethyst hobnail cuspidor brought \$1,050.00.

Most of the plates sold were in the middle to lower price range and we heard one plate collector comment that he thought the plate prices were soft considering the quality. We went home with a super Heavy Grape chop plate and we were very happy with the price.

The next auction planned for Flint is tentatively scheduled for August. The good crowd at this auction included Bob & Betty Stremming, Smokey Cloud and Tom and Sharon Mordini—three of the four scheduled H.O.A.C.G.A. Convention Speakers.

ON THE AUCTION TRAIL continued...

APRIL 24, 1993: H.O.A.C.G.A. Convention Auction. Burns Auction Service conducted the auction in conjunction with the Convention. H.O.A.C.G.A. is growing each year and as usual had a fun and very educational Convention—one of our favorites. Someone will probably describe the details of the very successful Convention, but we want to add our thoughts on the sale.

We have attended dozens of Burns Auctions and must say this one was conducted as well as, or better than any of Tom's sales that we can remember. Tom and his staff had a time constraint and really "had it in gear" to comply. We liked the way they moved it along. Keep it up, Tom!

There was not a lot of high priced top end glass, but there was something for everyone—all the way from the Aqua Opalescent Good Luck bowl to the Beaded Purses with many miniatures in between. The miniatures alone made the sale different from most of our glass auctions. The little Elephant paper weight was cute. Now if someone can find a little Donkey, the new owner could have a political pair.

Most of the glass had good color and iridescence and the halogen lights showed it off well. Won't mention all the super pieces but our eye kept coming back to the amethyst Blackberry Block tumblers—we thought they were something else. The sale might have had a few too many pieces for most Convention auctions, but there was enough variety to carry the day. The sale grossed a little over \$100,000.00. Prices were generally good but like most auctions there were some bargains.


