FENTON DRAGON AND LOTUS

This article will cover red, amberina, reverse amberina and brick red. There are so many colors I thought it would be easier to cover these in one article.

All <u>RED</u> Dragon and Lotus were produced late in the Carnival era around 1920. Fenton produced much of the other red Carnival also. This has been documented in the Butler Brothers Catalog.

The RED Dragon and Lotus is always desirable and always holds its price. Some red bowls have less color and more silver and gold iridescence, but the red with red iridescence is always an excellent seller. In 1993, two red Dragon and Lotus ruffled bowls sold at different auctions for \$3,250.00 each. It seems good glass just keeps going up. The red bowls are found in the collar base ruffled and ice cream shape. I've never seen nor heard of any other shape in red, and never any red in spatula footed. That would be a real find. Does anyone have one?

These RED bowls are usually listed as rare, but there seems to be many more plain red than amberina, reverse amberina and brick red.

The <u>AMBERINA</u> bowls can fool you. Most have dark iridescence and don't look red. When held to the light they show an amberina base and the rest a beautiful cherry red. My most favorite bowl has an amberina base, red body and amberina edges.

Another beautiful color is <u>REVERSE AMBERINA</u>. The base is red with a little amberina. The body is amberina and the edges are red. I know of three of these bowls. Tom and Sharon Mordini had one for sale last year at the 1993 H.O.A.C.G.A. Convention.

AMBERINA and REVERSE AMBERINA are underrated and under priced compared to the red. In AMBERINA you find collar base ruffled and ice cream shape. In REVERSE AMBERINA you find collar base ice cream shape. If anyone has or knows of different shapes in collar base bowls, PLEASE let's hear from you! These haven't shown up in the spatula footed bowls in any shape. In fact, I've never seen nor heard of any shape of red in the spatula footed bowls. Wouldn't it be nice if someone writes to tell me I'm wrong.

BRICK RED IS REALLY AN APPROPRIATE NAME. This is last on my red list because they don't seem to be that desirable nor that plentiful. The bowls are darker than amber with an orange cast. The iridescence is usually light but enhances the base color. These were made in collar base ruffled and ice cream shape. Do they come in anything else? Haven't seen any. All information on any of the above would be gratefully accepted.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES BY JOHN & LUCILE ERITT



BANDED MOON AND STARS TUMBLER

This pretty tumbler got its name from the band of moons and stars that circles around the tumbler near the top. There are three of the half moons and three of the stars that are alternated in the 3/4 inch wide band. Above this band is a 3/4 inch wide smooth area. Below the band are six flowers that are evenly spaced around the tumbler. The bottom of the base is plain. The tumbler measures $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches tall and 3 inches across the top. The color is a very nice marigold.

This tumbler is much like the Muscadine and Mirror & Crossbars tumblers in the way that they were made. We believe that these three different pattern tumblers were all made by the same company. This particular tumbler was found in Australia and most likely came into that country from India. We know for sure that a good many of this type of tumbler was found in India and brought back to Australia. Whether they were made in India or shipped into that country from Czechoslovakia or some other foreign country, we can not say at the present time. The featured Banded Moon and Stars tumbler is very pretty and quite unusual regardless of who made it. It would make a very fine addition to any Carnival Glass tumbler collection.

We are including in this article a nice drawing of this tumbler which we believe will give you a better view of the flowers in this pattern than does the photo. The photo does not show the pattern as clear and distinct as we would like.

This article on the Banded Moon and Stars tumbler marks our 196th entry into our Educational Tumbler Series. We hope that it has been of some interest to you.




HOLLY SPRIG COMPOTE

We are featuring here a fine piece of Millersburg Carnival Glass that is very rare in the compote shape. Holly Sprig pattern pieces can be found quite often, especially in bowls, but to find this pattern in a compote certainly doesn't happen very often. It is quite likely that many collectors have never seen one of these and we suspect that many don't realize how rare they really are. We know of only 6 or 7 of these Holly Sprig compotes and one of them is cracked Jack Wilson, in his 1982 Millersburg research series, did not mention this compote. From that piece of information, we expect that he had not seen one at that time. Even though we have collected Millersburg Carnival Glass for many years, we have never owned one of these rare compotes. They have been reported in amethyst, green and marigold. Our featured example is in amethyst.

Notice that the Holly Sprig compote is made in the same shape as the Millersburg Strawberry compote. The only difference is that one features the Strawberry pattern on the interior and the other contains the Holly Sprig on the inside. The Strawberry examples are found much more often, however. Both of these compotes contain the Wide Panels on the underside. Photo #2 on the next page shows a close up view of the Holly Sprig compote.

The compote shown here is owned by Debbie and Mike Heinl of Cullman, Alabama. Here is their story on how they found it and added it to their collection. They noticed it at a flea market where it was priced at \$25.00. They thought

it looked like Millersburg, but they did not know for sure what it was. They hurried back to their car and scanned through their Carnival Glass book and decided that it might be the Holly Sprig compote that was listed as very rare and worth quite a bit. They ran back as fast as they could and picked up the piece trying not to look excited. Out of habit they asked "what was their best price?" The dealer said that they could take \$23.00 for it. They hurridly paid for it. Debbie said that she felt a little bit quilty about that, but they really were not sure that it was the rare compote.

When they got back home they took a photo of the piece and sent it to us to confirm if it was indeed the Holly Sprig compote. We answered by telling them that it was the Holly Sprig compote and that it was very rare and certainly valuable. We thought that you might like to read about their experience. We suspect that most of you have had occasions such as this. This type of an event is only one of the many reasons that makes Carnival Glass collecting so much fun.

This is article #184 in our Pictorial Pattern Parade series. We hope that you have found it both interesting and educational.

A LOOK AT TABLE SETS BY CHUCK & MARGE KREMER




THE HOBNAIL TABLE SET

This table set is a Millersburg product and was made in amethyst, green, blue, and marigold. All colors are considered rare, with blue probably the rarest. Hobnail table sets are seldom mentioned in Carnival Glass books. We usually find the spittoon and rose bowl described with the comment "rare and desirable." The same comment can be made for this table set.

All pieces rest on a collar base. Many times we see Millersburg glass with a many rayed star on the base, but on the table set pieces the base is smooth on the bottom. Also, on all four pieces the background surface is smooth. The finials are covered with small hobnails to complete a simple but attractive pattern.

This is a four piece set, but both our blue and marigold sets are missing the spooner so we have elected to picture only the three pieces. We keep hoping someone will call with the spooners for our sets. Although we acquired our marigold set a piece at a time, we bought the three blue pieces as a unit in an auction in 1992. We have seen green and amethyst pieces, but have never had a chance to buy either set complete. Our blue butter dish, like all others we have seen or heard about, has an amethyst base. Was there ever a blue butter base?

We have been furtunate in finding pieces to our liking, but as with most scarce pieces, don't look too unkindly at a little problem. Pieces in this pattern are so seldom sold it is hard to speculate on prices—condition and iridescence will usually govern. This is number 23 in our Series on Table Sets.



VICTORIAN


This impressively large bowl has come into its own over the past couple of years. Prior to that, in many cases, it was largely overlooked. The pattern is flowing and encompasses most of the surface. For pattern collectors, the design offers a unique quality, in that it appears on no other shape.

Colors are limited also. A rare peach opalescent example is known. However, in checking auction results we find that only 3 purple sold during 1992 and 2 during 1993. There are no other known colors. Ten years ago, a nice purple Victorian could be purchased for little more than \$100.00. A super-splendiferous example sold in 1992 for \$525.00! That woke the crowd to a new dawning. Since that, the price seems to have settled in at about \$300.00 for one with just excellent iridescence.

Only <u>five</u> VICTORIANS sold at auction over a span of two years? This is a truly scarce pattern compared with others which sell by the dozen every year. Do YOU have one of these Dugan beauties? We surely enjoy ours.

Well, gotta go, gotta go spend about \$20,000.00 to put in thicker windows and doors, that's about \$12,000.00 U.S.



MORE ROSES - BUT NO NAMES!!

Shown here are two different ROSE patterns in blue Carnival Glass which, to the best of my knowledge, are unlisted. These pictures were sent to me by my very good friend from "God's Country", Jerry Reynolds, Jerry (a she, not a he) invited me to be banquet speaker at the Pacific Northwest Carnival Collectors convention in 1979 and we have been friends ever since. This is one of the major rewards of my work. It affords me the opportunity to meet some very special people from all over the country.

The two handled compote is frequently referred to as Northwood's Wreath of Roses, but since there is no official listing as such and there are already two different patterns with this same name (one by Fenton, another by Dugan/Diamond) I feel a new name should be introduced. The piece is not shown in Edward's Northwood Carnival book, nor is it in his new "standard" encyclopedia, so let's all get out our thinking caps.

This compote is clearly marked with an N-in-a-Circle trademark. The reverse pattern is the same Basketweave design found on Northwood's Three Fruits and Strawberry patterns. The bowl in the second photo is pictured upside-down to show the pattern. The inside of the bowl is plain and quite worn from use. Jerry tells me it is supposed to be English and she was told it was used as a church collection plate. No dimensions were sent, but I recall it was a large sized bowl, about 9" diameter. The pattern of "intaglio" roses underneath and panels and ribs at the side is most unusual.

CORN VASE VARIANT OR VERY RARE CORN HUSK VASE?

Keith and I started collecting Carnival Glass in mid-1991 and started buying most if not all, all good reference books that the Club offers, starting May, 1992 after we received our first H.O.A.C.G.A. Bulletin.

Last Sunday, March 13, after we left a flea market and one antique and collectors' peddlers fair empty handed, we proceeded driving around the San Francisco bay area because the weather was so beautiful. On the way back home, we stopped by an antique shop around 4:00 P.M. Inside we were surprised when we saw this rare Corn Vase that we both would have liked to have someday. After

examing the vase, we both realized that this vase looked different than what we previously had seen in our reference books that we always read. Even though the price was out of reach of our monthly budget, because of the excitement that we both felt, we bought it anyway and rushed home and dragged out all the reference books that we have, and this is what we found out:

The photo shows a Variant Corn Vase-Pulled Husk that we bought. The height is 6 3/4 inches and is curving inward at the top with 2 1/2 inches wide across the opening. It has the Northwood mark "underlined N inside a circle" inside the vase bottom of the base and the color is purple with excellent iridescence. In Marion Hartungs Second book, page 22, the height states usually between 94 to 92 inches, and Bill Edwards 4th Edition book, page 48, states the height is usually 7 inches. Note the pulled husk style; compare with the picture shown on Don Moore's Carnival Glass-A Collection of Writings book on page 117 and the book of Harry Northwood-The Wheeling Years, 1901-1925, by W. Heacock, J. Measell and B. Wiggings, page 116, figure 578. In these two books, the husk was just being pulled out of the corn kernels and twisted and still comes straight up and the top opening sides also comes straight up. In the photo shown, the three alternating husks around the base were being pulled down and twisted to form a loop like a cup handle and the top opening is curving inward. This shows that what we found as shown in the photo is different in height, top opening, and specially the style of the pulled husk.

The thrill is one....We would like to know more about this unusual pulled-husk Corn Vase and how many have been found. And we would appreciate it very much if the Bulletin can advertise a survey to all officers and members of H.O.A.C.G.A. or anyone who has seen or has one.

We would be interested in hearing from anyone any information on this Corn Husk Vase. Thank you, more power to the H.O.A.C.G.A. Club and happy Carnival hunting.

AN UPDATE ON THE NORTHWOOD BOOK

By the time you read this, all who ordered the new book, "THE COLLECTOR'S GUIDE TO NORTHWOOD'S CARNIVAL GLASS", should have received their books. My thanks to all who purchased copies. I would also like to apologize for the delay in getting your books to you. There were some last minute delays at the printers that I had no control over. The severe weather this winter caused power outages and power surges that apparently damaged several of the printing presses, knocking them out of operation for several days. Secondly, the recent truckers strike didn't help either. The printer had to find alternate means of transporting needed supplies, causing further delays. And to put the frosting on the cake, the presses again malfunctioned, resulting in color distortion on the covers. All of the book covers had to be re-printed.

All of these problems have now been corrected and I have an ample supply of the books on hand. To date, (as of this writing, 4-20-94), only 66 copies have been sold through the H.O.A.C.G.A. This is a surprisingly low response when you consider that our Club now has somewhere between 1,200 and 1,500 members! This volume is only the first of several that have been planned. Each year that Souvenirs were made, Whimseys were also made and sold at the convention banquet.

Saturday, April 23, 1994, after a brief and final regristration, Jim Seeck auctioned the Ken and Bev Osbon collection. The auction was well attended (144 bidding numbers) and was a success for both the Sellers and Buyers. Some very nice pieces of glass found a new home.


A NOTE FROM THE BULLETIN SECRETARY:

FARMYARD

The Farmyard Spectacular was on display at the 1994 Heart of America Carnival Glass Association convention in Lenexa, Kansas. We were privileged to have 13 bowls and one plate to enjoy. The 14 pieces were brought by Club members from across the country. We want to thank Cecil Whitley and Diane Fry for their excellent presentation of the Farmyards, and to all those who brought these pieces for display. A V H S video tape will be available soon on the Farmyard display and also of the Fry collection.

Among the various Farmyards displayed, there was the only known amethyst plate, which was beautiful with excellent iridescence, a peach opalescent square bowl, and a green square bowl, both superb. There were also two 3 in 1 edge bowls in amethyst that were really gorgeous, and several 6 and 8 ruffled bowls of equal splendor.

The Farmyard pattern, produced by the Dugan Glass Company, is a massive piece of glass. It was made for decorative purposes only. We now know there are more six ruffled than eight ruffled Farmyards. The least seen are the 3 in 1 edges. As far as color, amethyst prevails. As far as iridescence, on a scale from 1 to 10 (10 being the best), most Farmyards will be in the 5 to 6 range. When you see a Farmyard bowl that would rate a 9 or 10 on the scale, you've seen a beautiful piece of glass.

THE H.O.A.C.G.A. PATTERN NOTEBOOK

Please don't overlook a great source of information for both the beginning and experienced Carnival Glass collector.

Over the course of many years, the Heart of America Carnival Glass Association has published sections for this Notebook. At present, they number 15 and we are still publishing them.

The first section, Punch Sets, is presently out of print, but may be revised. All other sections are available and can be purchased one-at-a-time or in a complete notebook, as listed in our centerfold order sheet. Each section has photographs in color of each known pattern, the maker and colors known. In their lectures and programs, both Frank Fenton and Dr. Richard Cinclair have memtioned the H.O.A.C.G.A. 
