QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

All questions received by the 20th of the month will appear in the following months' newsletter. Late arrivals will be delayed one month. The only tabu subject is my hairline; I'm very sensitive about that; everything else is fair game. If I don't know the answer to your question, I'll do my best to uncover it, if no one knows the answer, I' probably make something up and dare the world to prove me wrong. Now on to business.

Steve Santos of Marysville, WA sent in the following list of questions.

Q: What is opalescence?

A: Opalescence is a milky, semi-opaque edge that is an extra step process in the manufacture of Carnival, as well as other types of glass. This edge is obtained by the application of potash, or other suitable minerals, to the edge of the piece prior to applying the iridescence and then refiring the piece. This refiring causes the potash to turn the edge milky. The color of opalescence is normally some shade of white, but the color of the base glass, as well as the color and quantity of iridescence can lend various hues to the edge. (Ask me the time, and I tell you how to build a watch!)

Q: What is the difference between "radium" & "satin" finish glass?

A: "Radium" finish is a very high gloss, shiny look. Much like a freshly waxed car, or most new Carnival glass. (All the Millersburg collectors out there will love that one!) Speaking of Millersburg, "radium" was a copyrighted trademark of that company, and technically, the name should only apply to glassware of that company. However, through common usage the name has come to be used to describe any glass that has that "look". Satin finish is a matte look similar to the effect brought about by the utilization of acid etching. To further complicate matters, it is not at all uncommon for a piece to exhibit both these traits simultaneously; ie, radium in the center, satin at the edge.

Q: What is considered a pinhead? How much value is lost when a piece contains one?

A: "Pinhead" describes the size of the damage that a given piece has incurred; ie, a chip, cinder, pit, or open bubble the size of the head of a pin. The second half of this question has as many answers as there are people who collect Carnival Glass. However, since this is my column, I'll give you my answer: This glass is nearly 90 years old, and I feel that very minor things such as pinheads, small amounts of wear or minor scratching should be considered normal effects of ageing and should not effect the value one red cent. People who describe a two inch chunk out of the rim, as a pinhead, are a whole different problem!

Q: Describe the difference between "Pie Crust Edge" and "Candy Ribbon Edge".

A: This is one of those places where a picture is worth a thousand words. Still, this is not a picture column, and I can't draw a lick, so here come the thousand words.

Pie Crust Edge (PCE) is uniform in both horizontal plane deviation and vertical spacing. That is to say, every little ruffle is the same width and goes up and down the same amount. Further, these little ruffles are continuous around the perimeter of the bowl, with no deviant spacing or anomalous deviation from the norm. In other words, if your mother had 3000 degree fingers, she could take thumb and index finger and do to a bowl much the same thing she does to her pie crust, with the very same result. (We don't just make up these names, you know) Candy Ribbon Edge (CRE) should really be more appropriately called Ribbon Candy Edge (RCE), because this edge simulates the shape of that hard Christmas candy that all of us in my age group (older than dirt) used to receive when we were children. Don Moore was the only one I can think of that insisted on the RCE as opposed to CRE. Anyway, the shape consists of a series of large (about 1/4" both vertical and horizontal), squared off ruffles, with each of the horizontal portions containing three small ruffles. To my mind, only Dugan made a true CRE, but the name has evolved to describe any edge that consists of a series of unevenly spaced, size varying, undulating ruffles. If that isn't confusing enough, I could throw in Ice Cream Shape, Deep Ice Cream Shape, Tight Crimped Edge, Three in One, Ruffled, Deep Ruffled, Goblet Shaped, Tri-cornered, Square, and Ruffled Plate.

Q: What is the difference between a "Compote" and a "Sweetmeat Compote"?

A: About two hundred dollars. Seriously though, a compote is comprised of a bowl of varying size and shape, which rests atop a stem of varying length and design, which in turn rests on a foot which generally looks like a small (2 to 3 inches) plate. A Sweetmeat Compote is simply a specific type of compote, in this particular instance, the bowl is round and comes with a separate (removable) lid or cover, the stem is reticulated and ornate, and the foot is (if I remember correctly) hexagonal (6 sided). To my knowledge, only two patterns comprise the Sweetmeat Compote family: Grape & Cable (purple & a rare marigold) and Wheat (a very rare marigold and a one of a kind green).

Q: Do you have any advice on things to watch out for while collecting glass?

A: I always have advice to give. Beware of Greeks bearing gifts, don't eat yellow snow, and always buy the best quality glass that your budget will allow.

I would know like to answer a question that was never asked by Richard K. Peterson (state unknown, or I would have written) excerpt from the February bulletin.

A: Richard, your ruby Mary Ann vase is most likely new, courtesy of the L.G. Wright Co., circa the 1980's and the reason you can't find a base for your blue opal Fishnet epergne lily is that this lily was one of two different types that originally came in a strawberry base. I'm reasonably certain that I have a spare one among the several hundred boxes we (we means my wife) have packed for our impending move. Give me a month or so to get organized (that means time for my wife to unpack the boxes) and then get in touch.

I hope the foregoing has been enjoyable for Yall (I'm practicing for my North Carolina accent) and I look forward to answering all your questions both great and small.

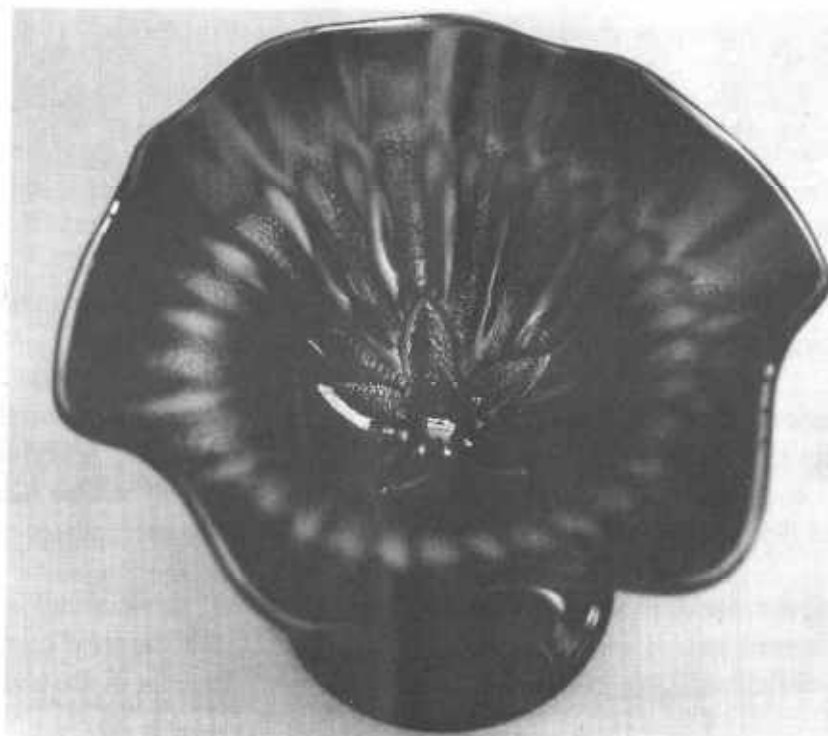

BOUTONNIERE

Compotes are few from the Millersburg Company and without exception, each stands on its own merit.

While this is one of the more simply designed, with use of the stippled rays, which many of the makers of Carnival Glass capitalized upon, we must in turn accept the fact that those rays were "sellers", otherwise, we would not see so many today.

The Boutonniere Compote is complete with a beautiful redeeming feature of the raised, stippled flower set into the rayed design. These compotes are often found with radium finish, however, we feel that the satin finish, as the one pictured portrays, is quite lovely also. Any of the Millersburg patterns found in satin, tells us it was being produced prior to the development and use of the radium ware.

Only five examples in amethyst and four in green are mentioned in the Mordini Auction Guides for 1992 & 1993. Marigold, as is the case with many Millersburg patterns is presumed to be the most difficult to obtain. -- And -- wouldn't a BLUE one be nice?

A TIP FOR BEGINNERS

When new collectors enter the world of Carnival Glass collecting, they are usually overwhelmed by the mass amount of information that is to be learned. There are patterns, shapes, colors, manufacturers and last but not least, prices.

The value of Carnival glass is a very complex and difficult topic to comprehend, but one of the first things that new collectors want to learn.

If you ask experienced collectors for advice on pricing, they will generally give the same information. Study the price guides, refer to Mordini's Auction Prices, attend auctions and read the auction results in the Carnival glass publications. It will still be impossible to keep up with the flexibility of the market, but you should be in the general area of value.

The one thing that we seldom tell the beginner is something that I think is very important and almost never mentioned. I feel that every person entering the Carnival glass hobby should be warned of the inaccuracies of prices in Edwards Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass.

This should not be taken as a statement against his book. He does a great job and it should be one of the first purchases a collector makes. He lists a total of over 7,000 prices in his price guide and overall manages to do quite well. However, the fact remains that many of his prices are far above the value of the glass and many are far lower.

Many beginners use Edwards guide as their only source of glass prices and accept his information as exact values. It is well worth the time to compare his prices with other sources before buying or selling an item. I have witnessed several beginners in the past few months make some terrible decisions on glass purchases based on Edwards prices.

Buy his book, its great, but be cautious when consulting his price guide.

The object lesson of this tale is for each of us to look at our sets to ensure that all pieces are the same, and if not, why not. Maybe there are more unreported items in collections just waiting to be "found".

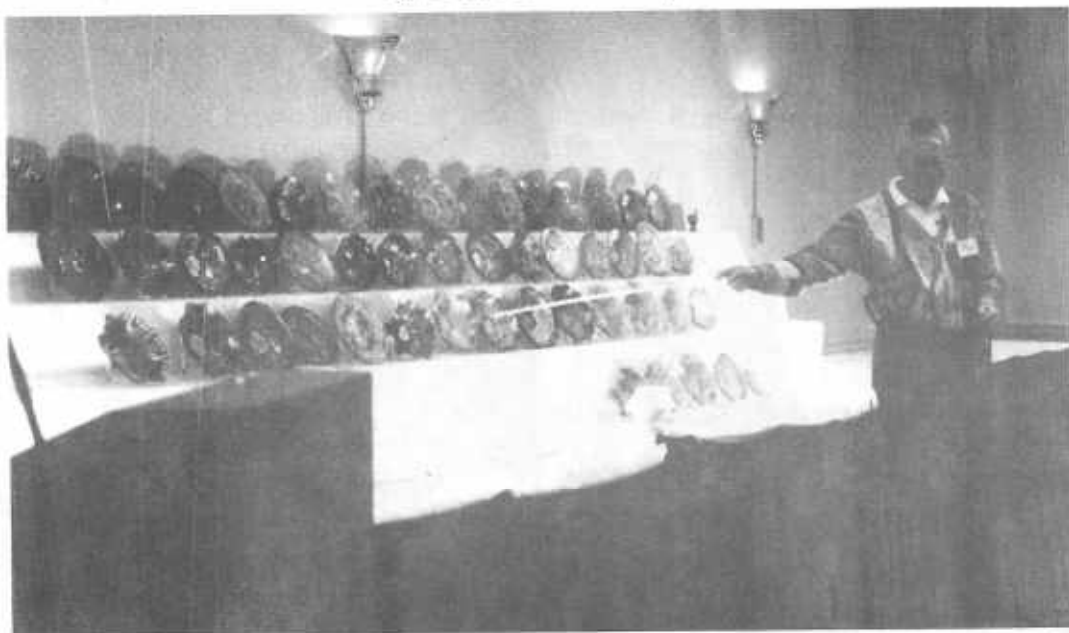
Our Dugan Blue Floral and Grape water set has six tumblers that at first glance appear to be alike. However, on close examination, we found that three different molds were used to make the six tumblers. Now, if we were purists, we would have to find enough tumblers to ensure all were the exact same pattern, to include mold line location.

If any of you know of any Amethyst / Purple Stippled pieces to the Grape and Cable table set, please let us know.

The 3 in 1 candy ribbon edge Farmyard bowl brought \$4,000, the Hobstar and Feather giant rose bowl at \$2,250, the amethyst opal Dragon and Lotus ruffled bowl at \$1,100, purple Formal hatpin holder at \$1,025 and the marigold with opal edge 9" Strawberry plate at \$1,500 are some price examples. There was a beautiful Lustre Rose water pitcher with small chip on a rose at \$600 and a dark peach opal Fishermans mug at \$755 in the seldom seen category. Someone took home one of the prettiest purple Springtime butter dishes ever sold for \$300. In all, there were 10 items selling for \$1,000 or more and a great many just below this level.

March 17-18, 1995: Burns Auction Service was back at Richfield, Ohio, for another auction. Three weeks earlier the auction was smooth and easy, but this time the auction team earned their pay. The lamps that sold at 1 PM were nice and sold well. There was a large crowd for the carnival and many more came in at one o'clock just for the lamps. There were carnival glass bidders from all sections of the country.

In our opinion, prices were generally acceptable. Some of the glass went to dealers and the mail bidders got more than usual. A few representative prices were the blue Dugan Many Fruits 7 piece punch set that looked like a bargain to us at \$950, amethyst Hobnail Swirl spittoon at \$800, dark marigold Acorn Burr 8 piece punch set at \$2,600, electric green Poppy Show plate at \$5,750, a super 6½" blue Sailboats plate at \$1,400, blue Orange

Tree with tree trunk plate at \$400, amethyst Holly plate at \$800 and the square green Trout and Fly bowl at \$1,250. There was glass in all price ranges and a wide variety of patterns and colors.

We enjoyed seeing Grace Rinehart at the auction and visiting with her. It was good to see John and Jeanette Rogers on the road again after Jeanette's recent surgery.

March 25, 1995: The Woody Auction Company sold the Iva Rambo collection at St. Louis. When the doors opened a large crowd from the midwest and a few collectors from the outlying areas found some good glass.

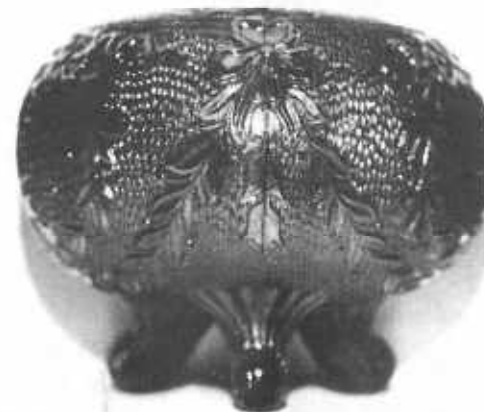
Once again the lure of some very scarce and many much sought after pieces proved the crowd will be there if there is promise of good carnival. Of course the colorful brochure didn't hurt a bit. The top end pieces sold at very good prices while those below them were bringing normal prices in our opinion. The crowd was not tolerating much damage on the medium to lower end pieces, but they seemed not to be too critical of the top end pieces. Some damaged pieces at all price levels were returned and resold. We couldn't help wondering why the faults were not discovered prior to sale.

Complete sale results will probably appear in club bulletins, but we just have to mention the \$14,000 moonstone Rose Show bowl, the \$3,000 marigold Christmas compote and the \$5,600 green Rose Show bowl.

Friday, we had time to visit and have dinner with friends, view the glass and more visiting - a relaxed time. We hadn't been to a Woody auction for some time, so we were looking forward to Saturday. What did we see? A vintage Woody Auction, Jason Woody had grown a couple more inches and computerized checkout. Move over John - the next generation has arrived.

GARLAND ROSE BOWL IN RARE GREEN

Garland is a popular and well known Fenton pattern. It is a design that was made especially for the rose bowl shape. We suspect that most all collectors would recognize this pattern. We can't remember of anyone ever asking me the name of this pattern.

The Garland rose bowls in blue and marigold are not hard to find, but they are certainly desirable and collectible in those colors. Remember, a piece of carnival glass doesn't need to be rare to be beautiful. To find one in green is quite difficult however, and we consider them as rare in that color. We have seen only three examples in some 25 years. We can remember seeing one sold at the 1989 A.C.G.A. convention auction held by Tom Burns. He pointed out how rare it really was. It sold for \$350.00 back then. We can assure you that we had to pay a lot more than that for the one that we purchased privately in 1994. The second one that we had the privilege of seeing was in the very fine rose bowl collection of Sharon and Marvin Gill. The third one that we have seen came from England and is the example illustrated above. While in Florida in February of 1995, I approached Tom Burns as to how many green examples that he had knowledge of, and his answer was three. If he has seen only three with all the carnival he gets to see every year, there can't be many green examples around.

We should also point out that the Garland rose bowl is also very hard to find in amethyst. One in that color is reported being sold at a 1993 Burns auction in Lansing, Michigan for \$375.00. We can find where only 2 amethyst and 2 green Garland rose bowls were reported sold in the Mordini auction reports through the 1983 to 1994 years. This includes the 1983 and 1984 years conducted by Al Rettke.

If any of you carnival glass collectors happen to own a green or amethyst Garland rose bowl, we would be most happy to hear from you.

This article on the rare green Garland rose bowl is our 197th entry into the Pictorial Pattern Parade. Next month we will feature a little marigold 6 inch plate in the Puritan pattern. It is a McKee pattern and signed PRES CUT.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

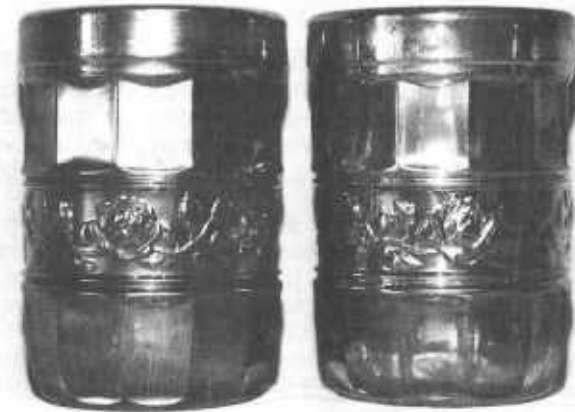


ROSE BAND TUMBLER AND SHOT GLASSES

We wrote about the Rose Band table size tumbler in March of 1979. At that time we knew of only two of them. Since that time no others have ever been reported by collectors, writers or auctioneers. This would indicate to us that they still should be considered rare and very hard to find. Unfortunately, no precise information has yet been found as to the maker of this pattern, but we suspect that it was produced in one of the European countries.

In the summer of 1994, the little Rose Band shot glass, shown above on the right, was found in the Pennsylvania area. We were quite thrilled to learn that one of these exists. This means that there is a good chance that others are out there somewhere. Our purpose for this article on the Rose Band tumblers is to let collectors know that another size is now known to exist. You might like to look for one of these in your carnival glass hunting trips.

The featured Rose Band shot glass is 2 3/8" high. It is 1 5/8" across the top with a base diameter of 1 3/8". There are 8 panels below the narrow rose band. This is the same amount of panels that is contained on the standard sized tumbler. The two examples are made the same with the size being the only difference. This is a cute little piece of carnival glass and certainly fits in especially well in tumbler and miniature collections. We suspect that this pattern was produced in a number of other pieces such as wines, cordials, pitchers, more sizes of tumblers etc.,



We are including a photo of the Band of Roses tumblers which might help the beginning collectors to see the difference between the Rose Band and Band of Roses patterns. The Band of Roses is thought to have been made in Argentina. It was made in a wide assortment of pieces. We have seen tumble up sets, water sets etc. in this pattern. We have a tiny cordial in the Band of Roses pattern. We suspect that it was also produced in the larger size wine, but we have not seen one in that size.

Photos and descriptions of both the Rose Band and Band of Roses tumblers are shown and described in the HOACGA Educational Series Book #2 which contains some 180 pages devoted to carnival glass tumblers. The Rose Band tumbler in the first photo is from the Whitley collection. The tiny shot glass is a part of the writes collection. The photo is courtesy of Dave and Joan Doty.

This article, featuring the Rose Band shot glass and an update on the Rose Band tumblers is #207 in our Educational Tumbler Series. Next month we will cover the rare Hobstar and Arches tumbler.

BLUE FOUR PILLARS VASE - FOLLOW-UP

Dear HOACGA,

As a follow-up on the blue four pillars vase story, here's another one to think about.

While cruising US 40 a few weeks ago (three to be exact), I saw, touched, and examined at length a green 4 pillars vase (not iridized). It had interior ribs, the N in a circle on the inside of the base, no advertising. I didn't buy it because it was bruised, chipped and overpriced. The color was typical Northwood and definitely not the green color on the "4 pillars" vase I have which has no interior ribs, no N mark and the Millersburg star bottom which is the same as the Hobnail pieces and other Millersburg items.

I am now even more convinced that the "4 pillars" bases with the Millersburg type star on the bottom were, in fact, made by Millersburg. The star on the bases (I have marigold, amethyst & green, all have the radium finish) is 32 points. The star in the base of the Hobnail & Hobnail Swirl rose bowls, spittoons, and swung vases is also 32 points. Additionally, this same type star is on the bottom of the Trout & Fly bowl (36 points); 9" Mystery Peacock bowl (36 points); 9" Rosalind bowl (for some strange reason, 37 points); 9" Blackberry Wreath bowl (36 points); Courthouse bowl, 7" Blackberry Wreath bowl, & 7" Hanging Cherries bowl (28 points).

Do you know of any Northwood pieces with this type star in the base?

I'll close with those most famous of words... Research continues.

CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Ed,

I have a story that I thought might be interesting to you and other members of HOACGA. When I began to collect carnival, I was careful to read as much as I could about the subject. One thing that was immediately apparent was that any piece that are "signed" better have an "N" or its not very old!

Now you have to understand, I have a rather "cynical" husband and whenever I spot a piece of glass with excellent iridescence, he's afraid its a reproduction.

So when there came an occasion when I brought home a lovely "Butterfly" handled bonbon, my husband immediately denounced it as "made last Wednesday".

To settle any question about the age of the piece, I wrote a letter to Mr. Bill Fenton, the chairman of the Board of Fenton Glass. I asked two questions:

1. Did any of the reproductions NOT have the Fenton logo?
2. Did the reproductions also have "straw" marks?

The following is Mr. Fentons' wonderful reply.

Thank you, Mrs. Silverman,

for your interesting note that was received August 22 from QVC. I'll try to answer your questions. The reproductions of earlier Carnival pieces that were made in 1970 had the Fenton logo on them. We did not want to have any confusion in the antique trade and we did not want to have our pieces misrepresented comparing the old and the new. If you have a Butterfly Handled Bonbon, then it was one that was made in the early years. We marked all of our carnival pieces with our logo starting in 1970 and then during the next three years, we gradually marked all of the other pieces that we made in our line that were not carnival. This has been a very good thing for the collectors and has protected them. The other items that you mention in your letter are old if they do not have the Fenton logo.

You mentioned "straw marks". These actually were little shear marks that were found in earlier pieces. We know that the old production had a lot of these, but in our attempt to make a better piece of glass, we try to keep those to a minimum or eliminate them altogether. Quite often we see pieces being rejected that have these shear marks (straw marks) because they do not meet our current quality requirements. Some very slight ones that do not detract from the beauty may be accepted.

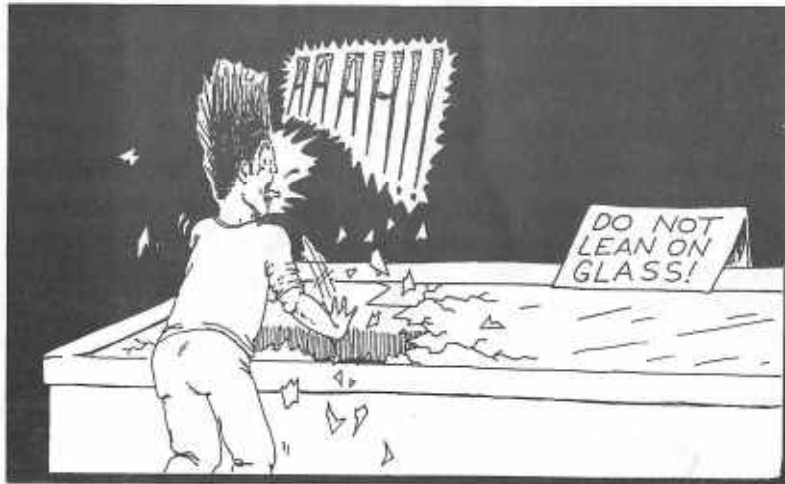
