BLACK GLASS

Last year in the April issue of the HOACGA bulletin there were seven interesting articles, all excellently done as usual, directed to providing information of benefit to collectors of Carnival Glass. One of them was submitted by Alan R. Pickup on the subject of black Carnival Glass.

It reminded me of data that I had gathered together some time ago when researching the black glass used in making Carnival Glass buttons but which had not yet been prepared for publication.

The beginnings of the glass-making industry are lost in antiquity, but we do know that the ancient Egyptians used it decoratively during their period of high culture. The art progressed to Tyre and Sidon, and later the Romans produced glass articles possibly earlier than the third century B.C.

At first, ancient glass was somewhat translucent, retaining the color of whatever the tint of the sand that was available. During that period, sometimes an article was decorated with enamel made of powdered glass with color from certain minerals added. and then refired. With that, the decoration was permanently fused with the glass and the effect was certainly artistic and beautiful.

In time, an entire batch could be enhanced with color, but when a method was discovered which produced a colorless clarity, that crystal clear glass became highly favored and even more of a luxury than the earlier types. Glass had always been affordable only to persons of power and wealth.

Not until much later, sometime in the 1870's was black glass made, a discovery credited to Andrea Vidaori, a member of the exclusive and secretive Italian glass-making clique. They guarded their manufacturing techniques rigidly to the extent that the threat of death was held over the traitor who shared any of his knowledge outside the group.

Nevertheless, the formula inevitably slipped out of their control, and by 1815 was being used by Germany and France to make objects in imitation of the very scarce jet. The dense black color was achieved with a mixture of oxides of iron, cobalt, copper and nickel in combinations of two or more added to the glass batch.

When in 1827 the glass press was invented, the success of the resulting reasonably priced glass objects was phenomenal. Carnival collectors are part of the rest of the story.

Mr. Pickup pointed out that most black glass will show a little spot of color, usually amethyst or red when held before a bright light. True totally black Carnival shows no color, and he states that it must be very rare indeed, and all will agree.

We collected all types of old Carnival for many years before deciding to concentrate on the fascinating old Carnival Glass buttons. Our only black piece was a flat bowl in Stretch Carnival, pressed of course, and highly iridescent. Our attempt and that of the person who bought it from us failed to detect any color at all when it was held before an intense illumination.

Many thanks to Alan Pickup for his information article which prompted this follow-up!

The article in July HOACGA bulletin prompted David Cotton to drop us a note with this picture included of his and Libby's grouping of pieces in this pattern. We decided to spin an article from it, hoping others might enjoy.

David says the 9" plate is Clambroth is marked "Made in USA". The 6½" square bowl is white, and also marked "Made in USA". (The bowl and plate appear to have been made from the same mold. The 7½" plate is good marigold and not marked. The milk pitcher shades from marigold to clambroth toward bottom - not marked. The compote - sherbet is 4½" tall, 5" across, light clambroth color, not marked. David goes on to say he has seen a clambroth pickle/relish dish, which he didn't buy because it wasn't on the BUY list at the time. "We all have mental blocks don't we?"

The two sizes in rose bowl shape, are found in marigold and clambroth - white, as well. Some are "Marked", some are not. There is an "Old Eddards Saying" that the "Marked" pieces are more difficult to find and may cost a tad more. We shall leave that up to you.

We saw a perfectly gorgeous deep Smoke color 7½" plate in the Imperial display during ICGA Convention is Dallas this past summer. Many folks commented they had not seen another. We should like to be the ones to find the first Smoke 9" plate! Wouldn't we all?

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

THE MASSACHUSETTS TUMBLER

Massachusetts is a U.S. Glass pattern and is part of that company's series of state patterns. It was made in a wide variety of pieces in crystal, but very few pieces have ever been found in carnival glass. The pattern is shown in Kamm book 2, page 136 and in "U.S. Glass from A to Z" on page 144. It can also be found in Mellie McCain's pattern glass book in plates #111 and #233.

The first piece of carnival glass that we ever saw in this pattern was a marigold vase. This example is shown in color in Bill Edwards Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass, 4th Edition, on page 131. We have also seen a beautiful marigold mug in this pattern. More about it in a future article. Jane Dinkins of Houston, Texas located a Massachusetts tumbler in marigold carnival glass some years ago. It was the first one that we have ever seen. She was nice enough to send it to us in order that we might photograph it. She assured us that it was definitely not for sale, however, it being the only one reported at that time.



After many years of looking for one of these tumblers, we were lucky to come across one this past summer. It is illustrated above in photo #1. Dave Doty photographed it for us at the A.C.G.A. convention. The Dinkins tumbler is show in photo #2, sitting in a slightly different position. Both of these tumblers are the same size. They are the only two carnival glass tumblers in the Massachusetts pattern that we know about at the present time.


The featured marigold Massachusetts tumbler is 31/2" tall with a flare out top measuring 2 3/4" across. The base is 2" in diameter and contains a 20 point star type figure on the bottom. It has good marigold color and very nice iridescence. In our opinion, this is a very rare tumbler, desirable and certainly one that you might want to look for.

This article, on the rare Massachusetts tumbler, is #214 in our Educational Tumbler Series. Next month we will feature a Heisey tumbler that is known as the Wigwam pattern. We have it in both ruby stain and marigold carnival glass.

ROYAL SWANS

The sketch shows a very interesting piece of carnival glass which is stamped with the Sowerby trade mark.

This small boat shaped vase with a swan positioned at each end is illustrated in Simon

Cottles' book "Sowerby Gateshead Glass".

The information in this book indicates the design is no. 1326 from Sowerby pattern book (IX) page 6 1882. The size is 5" long, 3" high, 2 3/8" wide. We are unable to find any reference which shows this item was produced in carnival glass. This very small & attractive piece of carnival is a nice amethyst colour with excellent iridescence & was found at a collectibles fair which is held twice a year in Sydney, Australia.


An article written by Ron Notley appeared in the HOACGA bulletin of July 1984 & the know colour was marigold & as quoted by Mr. Notley "at the time of writing this is a true rarity in Carnival Glass with a most interesting & distinguished pedigree."

We have never encountered another piece of carnival as unusual or with similar size design or pattern during our 20 years of collecting. We would be pleased to hear from anyone who has another of these little gems or additional information would be appreciated.

WISHBONE CHOP PLATE IN GREEN

The Wishbone chop plate that is shown above is in the extremely rare green color. These chop plates are very desirable and considered rare in both marigold and amethyst, but the green example is the most rare. This piece has very fine color and iridescence. The popular Northwood basketweave pattern is used on the back side. The plate measures 10 inches wide and 1 3/4 inches high from the table top.

We purchased this pretty green Wishbone chop plate from Osteen and Mary Lou Smith of Cornith, Mississippi. They were long time friends of ours and attended many of the I.C.G.A. and A.C.G.A. conventions. They really enjoyed selling carnival glass from their motel room. They told us about this plate, that was located in their area, but the owners were not ready to sell it for awhile. After several years (it seemed much longer than that) the owners notified the Smith's that they were ready to sell. We lost no time in purchasing it from the Smith's. After enjoying this piece for some time, we decided to sell it to Ron Kuhn

and Don Kime because they were top Wishbone collectors and good friends of ours. We had sold them quite a number of Wishbone pieces including Wishbone bowls in ice blue, aqua opal, white and two in blue, so we thought that they should have this plate in their collection. Yes, we did miss it, but it is only about 125 miles from us, so we get to see it quite often. We sold it to them for \$600.00

The only other Wishbone chop plate that we have seen in green was a part of Rovene Heaton's collection of Muncie, Indiana. It sold in her auction at the 1994 A.C.G.A. convention for \$3,500.00. It is possible that there are others out there somewhere is green, but we have not seen or heard of them. You might want to look for one of these beauties, but don't pass up a marigold or amethyst example if they are pretty.

Last month, due to the mess my wife laughingly calls my "piling system", I inadvertently left out the following inquiry from Rudy Kovacs of Pembroke Pines, Florida.

Q: I own the blue large Stag & Holly bowl shown in the enclosed photo. It is 8" long on each flat side and 9" across the corners. Have you ever seen another one shaped like this?




A: I suppose I've owned a hundred blue Stag & Holly bowls, but I can't recall ever seeing one shaped like yours. I think I would have to call this square, even though the corners are notched in, as opposed to being pulled out like the square Butterfly & Tulip bowls. I'm not certain how much value would be added for this very unusual shape, but my gut feeling is that only a dyed in the wool Stag & Holly collector would get real excited about it.

Received a nice letter, some kind words, and some "sport for my inquisitiveness" from Andres Neveu of Rutherford, Australia. I've met lots of nice people from "Down Under", and am happy to have one of them take part in our little monthly get-together.

Q: The pictured vase is 9" high, 5 1/2" maximum diameter, 3 1/2" across the top, with a 2 3/4" base. Iridescence is a light marigold. I have included a detailed drawing of the exterior pattern. Do you have any information on this piece?






A: Andres, I have no idea what you do for a living, but if it isn't something to do with art, you missed your calling. That's the best darned drawing I've ever seen (this, of course, from someone who can't draw a straight line without a ruler)! However, I digress. As I had never seen this particular vase, I sent your photos to several people, including "Mr. Vases", George Thomas of Belmont, California. All to no avail. No one has any substantive information. However, I believe a few pertinent observations can be made. Your vase is what is commonly referred to as the "pickle jar" type vase, and belongs to a loosely knit family that includes; Inca, Seagulls, and Pebble and Fan. The linking factor among these patterns is that they are all rather large bulbous type vases, that have a top rim that incorporates a squared off lip. The story goes that these vases were originally filled with pickles, and the top was closed with a wax seal affixed over the squared off lip. I have no idea if these suppositions have ever been substantiated by hard facts, but the

premise, in my opinion, is sound. I had no better luck in identifying the flower on your vase, than I did in the vase itself. My hope was that the type of flower might give me clue as to the origin of this piece, but no one seems to know what it is. Perhaps it is a compilation, and falls under the all encompassing "Artistic License". The coloring on the vase is typical of U.S. Glass, or possibly Jeanette Glass, but I personally lean towards this item being from Europe, most probably, Czechoslovakia. If my supposition is correct, then this item would fall into the late Carnival era of the 1930's. Vases of this type have traditionally sold in the \$250 - \$400 range.

Q: This 6" Pillar & Flute bowl has the Imperial Iron Cross mark and is on amberina base glass. I have seen this bowl in marigold, clambroth, and smoke, but never in this color. The iridescence is very good. What can you tell me about it?



A: Through means which are not totally clear to me, this pattern has come to be known as Lustre & Clear. I have seen quite a number of these bowls on amberina base glass, but none of them have been iridised. These items from the Depression era are usually on very shiny high luster glass, and I believe you are confusing that shine with iridescence, as I can detect no evidence or iridescence in the photo you sent. If, in fact, this piece is truly iridised, it would be the first one, to my knowledge, and would be of substantial value.

P.S. to Andres: I could definitely use some Sport; but my inquisitiveness was not what I had in mind.

Mike Smith of Syracuse, NY wants to know the guide lines used to determine what is a true plate. My first reaction was to wonder if anyone reads my answers, as I covered this question in the June Bulletin. However, after a moments reflection, I realized it is entirely possible that Mike was not a Member in June. Therefore, here's a reprise of that June response, for Mike, and any other newcomers.

What is your theory in reference to plates? I've been quoted three different heights that are considered standard in plates.

- A: Two of the heights you were quoted are wrong. In an ideal world, there are three absolute rules that define what is a plate, and what is not:
 - 1) When measured with the piece sitting on a flat surface, the outer rim must not be more than two inches above that surface.
 - 2) An imaginary line drawn from the outer edge of the collar base (on the inside of the piece) to the rim, must be flat and continuous, ie a straight line. (this eliminates low ice cream shapes from plate consideration)
 - 3) When the piece is turned upside down and placed on a flat surface, the outer rim must continually touch the surface. (this eliminates low ruffled bowls from plate consideration)

These "rules" are all well and good, but Carnival Glass is not an ideal world, and so we sometimes are forced to use common sense to make a determination. For instance; Northwood made no "ice cream shape" bowls other than the standard ice cream bowls. So if you have a slightly "cupped" up, 2 1/4" high Rose Show piece, it is by process of elimination, a plate. Similarly, there is the phenomena known as a "ruffled plate"; generally used to describe a very low ruffled bowl. Do I use this term? Yes. Do I really think these so described pieces are truly plates? No. Reason? When I say ruffled plate, 98% of the Carnival world knows exactly the piece I'm trying to describe.

Received the following from "brand new" member Mary Lynn of Nashville, Tn. (Welcome aboard Mary!) P.S. I know you've heard this a hundred times, but you really should think about getting a last name.

- Q: Recently I read that iridized glass should not be placed where the sun will shine directly on it as it will (may?) fade the color. Is this true?
- A: I've been told that story in antique stores all across this country, but no matter how many times it gets retold, it doesn't come any closer to being true. Iridescence is much tougher

than most people give it credit for. Unless you go to extremes, (sandblasting, for example) it won't wash off, wear off, fade, streak, mottle or stain your Momma's best tablecloth. While direct sunlight will have no effect on the iridescence, prolonged exposure may cause the base glass to "sun color". This is a phenomena caused by the reaction of ultraviolet light with any lead content in the glass, and results in clear glass achieving a lavender coloration. However, this "sun coloring" is generally thought to be a positive, as it adds to both the beauty and the value of the glass.

Since I'm a little short on questions this month, I thought I'd institute a new feature that we'll call "John's Corner". This will be a potpourri of editorial comments, answers to questions not asked, or anything else that strikes my fancy (and if you've ever had your fancy struck, you know how painful it can be).

From the September Lincoln Land Bulletin I culled a question that I feel begs an answer. I would give credit to the asker, but the column was unaccredited (it was a column dealing with Fenton oddities).

Q: Why is there only one known Portland Elks Bell?

A: I had the good fortune to be able to inspect the Portland Bell (1912) at great length when it was first discovered, and was able to compare it to the Atlantic City (1911) and Parkersburg Bells (1914). The first thing you notice in comparison, is that the Portland Bell has both a wider and deeper band where the writing is inscribed, and that the writing itself is larger. This information coupled with the fact that the 1912 bell has the same general shape and coloring as the 1911 bell, lead me to the not so amazing conclusion that the 1912 bell had been made from a retooled 1911 mold. Since the molds were the most expensive part of glass manufacture, it follows that the reuse of these molds, whenever feasible, would make perfect sense. I further conjecture that the one known 1912 bell was run as a sample for an order that, for whatever reason, was never made. In other words (or these words, for that matter), I wouldn't recommend holding your breath until another Portland Bell shows up!

I have had several inquiries from last months column wanting to know exactly what a "loveworm" is. I won't even try to follow where that question obviously leads, but suffice it to say the word should have read "loveworn". Whether this slip was simply typographical, or Freudian, I'll have to defer to our estimable printer. Brian, you do a great job, but your rare boo boos can be much funnier than what I wrote!

PERSNICKETY - FINICKY - PICKY

Should any of these descriptions be applied to carnival glass collectors in general? I am sure some sellers and auctioneers feel that way about us. But do we really deserve these labels or are we being painted with too broad a brush? Let's look at some of the reasons we collect and some of the conditions we have to endure.

Collecting carnival glass is an addictive hobby and new collectors should be so advised. Competition among collectors is intense but we enjoy the camaraderie of "carnival glass" as much if not more than the glass itself. Most of us start out collecting in all directions and eventually learn that you can't possibly collect it all. Some collectors are more investment oriented than others. We are all concerned with condition and price.

In order to add glass to our never ending appetite of glass collecting we fly, drive and tromp all over the map and feel the trip was worth it if something is found and brought home. It doesn't seem to matter that the trip occasionally may cost many times more than the glass you found. Cracked windshields, ruined tires are just the price you have to pay. But wait a minute, doesn't that tend to make us PICKY? We don't think so if the price of the glass found is right. Now this is where I will get into trouble but I feel it needs to be said and some of you are sure to agree, I hope.

Like most glass collectors we don't limit our collecting exclusively to carnival glass. We recently attended two auctions. The first auction was an auction of Greentown glass and related items in Indiana and the second auction was a carnival glass auction in Missouri. The Indiana auction house described damage in minute detail and still had a five minute return policy should you find any reason other than described to not want the item. All the buyers "were on the same playing field". These were happy buyers and very few items were returned. Those items that were returned usually brought about the same price the second time around. Not a picky crowd you say? I don't think so. They just knew what they were buying and all could then decide the fair value and bid intelligently.

The carnival auction was another story. When we arrived about an hour before the sale, the buyers were being berated for damaging the glass in the pre-auction viewing. During the sale a vase with a crack was returned. Not a crack cried the auctioneer, just a little heat check. When a second item was returned, it was angrily announced that sufficient time had

been allowed prior to the sale for viewing, "no other items could be returned". Well that pretty well stops the buying of any items you didn't really inspect closely prior to the sale. The owner of the glass was the biggest loser. And the auction house loses more than just his commission, he loses his credibility also.

So why should an auction like this reflect against carnival glass collectors? We are the victims. Calling us persnickety, finicky and picky we feel is way off base. We just would like to bid against each other "all on the same playing field". Consider that this glass was inexpensive to begin with. Quality was not the primary concern during its manufacture. And now some 80 years later we cannot expect it all to be in perfect condition. But when buying or selling glass, price and condition cannot be separated. We do own and enjoy glass in other than mint condition. I just have a hard time buying a piece of glass when I can see it is damaged and know I am bidding against several people who think what they are buying is perfect. This "let the buyer beware" policy doesn't do justice to the buyer or seller.

Finally, let's look at the price guides. One well known author recently expressed how impossible it is to please everyone. The buyers always feel that the price is too high and the seller doesn't ever think the price is high enough. Price guides should attempt to average prices or a price range would be nice. We realize that's asking a lot. Prices too often reflect two unwavering buyers vying for a piece of glass that they are both determined to buy. These prices are then unrealistically quoted as the new value of the glass.

How many of us have been told by an antique mall operator that carnival glass doesn't sell. What is really being said is that the picky collector is not willing to pay his or her price. Can you blame the antique mall dealer? They are just using a price guide. Desirable glass reasonably priced sells quickly. And it doesn't have to be in perfect condition as long as it's priced accordingly. So are we collectors really persnickety, finicky and overly picky? We don't think so. We just want a level playing field. After all, it is our money (our kids' inheritance) we are spending. Sellers crying about their expenses should consider the buyers have expenses also and without us collectors, there isn't any game.

This little piggy went to market. Yes, a pig with a message. A marigold carnival glass advertising piggy bank? No, we haven't hit bottom yet. There is an unending inventory of carnival glass that we could expound on. But this little pig needs his day in the sun. He has been ignored too long. His measurements are 3" tall by 4¼" long and 2½" wide. It's understandable that this little piggy didn't make it in John Resnik's book on Carnival Glass Lettered Pieces. But we can't seem t find it in Edwards, Hartung, Hand or even in Dorothy Taylor's books on new carnival glass either.

Marian Klamkin's book does show the larger version (4" wide, 6" long and 4 3/4" tall) and states that it was made in the 1950's. Possibly the little piggy bank was made by the same company. We recently saw a large piggy bank that had been painted with something and an Anchor Hockings Glass Co. sticker and a \$2.49 price tag was still readable through the paint. Anchor and Hockings Glass companies joined forces in 1937.

This little Ohio Co. pig represents our Midwestern region in two ways. We probably enjoy the cheapest gasoline prices in the whole country and large pig farms are abundant in the area. This marigold iridescent piggy bank has the message "Save with Marathon" on one side and "Ohio Oil Co." on the other. These are readily found in most Midwestern antique malls at a price range of \$15 to \$25. The same piggy bank without the advertising message can be found in the \$6 to \$12 price range.

When visiting the Midwest, you had better grab a carnival glass piggy bank while they are still available. In this "Plastic Age" we live in, they will soon be history like glass milk bottles and peanut butter jars. Remember them?

FROM MY CORNER

BUYING, SELLING OR TRADING CARNIVAL GLASS

We, the HOACGA Officers, continue to receive some complaints from members, who are buying and selling glass through the monthly bulletin. These complaints do not have any one thing in common, except they are usually about something that could have been avoided with a better understanding between the parties at the time of the original contact.

The "FOR SALE" and "WANTS" section of the bulletin are for the mutual benefit of both the buyer and seller. The ability to conveniently buy and sell glass is a vital part of the hobby. Neither the Officers or HOACGA assumes any responsibility for any of the items advertised in the bulletin. We do try to assure that the information in the bulletin is correct, as it was submitted by the member, to the bulletin secretary. Only members may use the bulletin to advertise their glass for sale.

When you call about an item that is advertised in the bulletin, always ask about all of the qualities that you desire in the piece that you are considering. Some of the questions that you might want to ask are:

- 1. What kind and how good is the iridescence?
- 2. Is the iridescence uniform, or does it vary over the face of the piece? Does it have iridescence on the backside?
- 3. Does it have any damage? If so, where is the damage?
- 4. If it is a ruffled piece, how many ruffles does it have?
- 5. Do not assume that the piece that you are buying is a certain size. Ask about its size (diameter, depth, shape, etc.)
- 6. Make sure you understand how the glass is to be packaged and shipped to you.
- 7. Make sure you understand the return privileges.

When you are selling an item from your ad in the bulletin, you should not only describe the item when you send in the ad, but you should also describe it in detail to the person that calls to purchase it.

One thing that we should remember is that all members do not have the same amount of collecting experience, and we do not all describe iridescence the same. It is very hard to describe iridescence over the telephone, especially if you are not familiar with a person's collecting experience.

JUST REMEMBER THE GOLDEN RULE SHOULD ALSO APPLY TO CARNIVAL GLASS ----- BUYING AND SELLING.
