HOW A NEW BOOK IS BORN

Let me share with you what "drove me to distraction" enough to take on the task of writing a new carnival glass reference book. My husband, Fred, and I are fairly new collectors. I inherited a "Butterfly and Berry" berry bowl from my grandmother, and we began collecting in '93, at which time the word "carnival" wasn't even in my vocabulary. But once carnival fever takes hold, you all know how guickly one becomes addicted to "the hunt." So for the first time in our lives, my husband and I began frequenting antique stores. We laughingly say he's the "investor" and I'm the "collector," which equates to he wants to sell everything and I want to keep everything. So here we'd both go into the antique mall with pencil and sketch pad in hand, see a piece, sketch it, and go back to the car to sit with Edward's in lap to try to find the pattern. Even with two copies of Edward's, plus every other reference book we could lay our hands on, often thirty minutes to an hour might be spent looking before a match could be made. And sitting that long in a car in the Texas heat is not fun. Well, I've been an elementary school librarian for 17 years, and this inability to locate the pattern while I had the piece "in hand" was becoming very frustrating. The final straw was a white creamer that had grapes on it. Shouldn't be too difficult. But two hours later I had gone carefully through Edward's 900+ photos TWICE before I finally located it. Palm Beach... I couldn't believe it. What does "Palm Beach" have to do with grapes??? That's when the idea for Carnival Hunters Companion: a guide to pattern recognition begin to take shape.

My husband has been a software developer for almost thirty years, and he developed the computer programs to generate the book. I spent two summers analyzing each of Edward's photographs in detail. I broke each pattern down into words which described its basic features (descriptors). The result is over 1,200 words describing aspects of each pattern (i.e., each specific kind of fruit, animal, geometric shape, type of leaf, etc.). So the user looks at the piece and decides what its features are. Then those features are looked for in the "descriptors" section of CHC. Once found, the user will see a list of all the pattern names that have that specific feature - for instance, all the patterns that have grapes. At this point, you turn to the second section of the book, locate the pattern name, and find 1) a complete list of all the words used to describe that pattern, 2) the maker, 3) the page numbers in Edwards and Hartung where a picture or sketch of the pattern can be found, and 4) whether there are any known reproductions. In the future, I will include other standard reference resources that many of us "lug" around with us in our carnival hunt. This has been a labor of love that I hope will help the novice as well as the more experienced collector.

PICTORIAL PATTERN PARADE

VERY RARE RED HORSE MEDALLION ROSE BOWL

Horse Medallion, sometimes referred to as Horses Heads, is a very popular and desirable Fenton pattern. It was made in quite a number of different shapes and colors. All of the shapes were not made in all of the colors. Plates, rose bowls and nut bowls seem to be the most sought after pieces in this pattern. In this article we will limit our coverage only to the rose bowls. We will cover the Horse Medallion plates at a later time.

The featured Horse Medallion rose bowl, show above in red, is the first one ever reported in that color. It is one of only two that is known in red. It sold for \$8,000.00 on September 9, 1995 at an auction in Boonville, Missouri. It was the first one that we had ever seen. The second one came up for sale on December 1, 1995 at an auction at Hagerstown, Maryland

and sold for \$9,000.00. These two rose bowls would have to be considered as very rare.

The marigold examples of the Horse Medallion rose bowls are the most often seem. In using the auction report books from 1983 through 1995 there were 44 marigold rose bowls sold. This does not include those that were sold privately. Even though they are not too hard to find in marigold they are certainly desirable and highly collectable. We are proud of ours.


In contrast to the marigold examples there were 16 blue and 16 vaseline rose bowls sold at auction during that same period. Only 3 were reported in smokey blue. Our vaseline rose bowl sold for \$750.00 at auction in 1991 and the smokey blue one sold for \$400.00. While there were other Horse Medallion pieces sold in aqua, green and amethyst, no rose bowls were sold at auction in those colors. While I didn't see it, I noticed that a footed ruffled bowl with a crack was sold in celest blue in 1994 for \$1,075.00. Wouldn't it be great to find a Horse Medallion plate or rose bowl in that color?

The Snell's of Colorado, who have a very fine collection of pieces in this pattern, own an aqua rose bowl. It was valued at \$4,000.00 at the time. I might add that a green or amethyst Horse Medallion rose bowl would be a great find. If anyone out there has one of these we would be glad to hear from you.

This article on the very rare red Horse Medallion rose bowl is #207 in our Pictorial Pattern Parade. Prices and numbers used were taken from the Mordini auction reports. The photo was supplied by David Doty.

"PLAIN" CAR VASE

"Plain" Car Vase?
What a way to start an article, but what can we say.
The vase doesn't seem to have a proper name or for that matter a known mould

number. But will attempt to write about it regardless. We find that if you want to learn something about a subject you know little about, the first thing you must do is get the subject on the table, so to speak. Someone will help you with the details later. So here goes nothing.

This car vase or we should say a couple

of variations of it, appear on pages 110 and 111 of the Dugan/Diamond book. The Story of Indiana, Pennsylvania, Glass by William Heacock, James

Measell, and Berry Wiggins. If you haven't bought a copy of this fine book, you are way behind times. The book is one of the many excellent books published by Antique Publications of Marietta, Ohio.

The book points our that these car vases are usually marked Benzer on the bottom of the knob on the vase. More on this later.

The Diamond Glass Company ledgers indicated that the Benzer Company was one of the many Diamond Glass Company's customer. It goes on to say "the Diamond firm may have made these vases exclusively for the Benzer Company, or they may have added the Benzer name to an existing mould."

So this car vase, that was previously referred to as "maker unknown", can now be called a Diamond Glass-Ware product. The book shows pictures of the car vase in two colors, pastel blue and pastel green. Made around 1921 to 1923. The iridescence on both vases appears to have been totally sprayed from top to bottom. Our reason for pointing this out is the vase pictured in this article is a beautiful marigold color. What makes it beautiful? The marigold color was only applied to the inside of the vase. This produces a deep stunning effect with the clear glass depth enforcing the luster.

The marigold vase shown in this article has a different bottom knob and is cupped in at the top, rather than being flared out. As you can see, the bottom is acorn shaped rather than rounded. And the small acorn shaped bottom is not signed. The holder is our own creation so please disregard it. The vase has a small depression or hole on the back side that must have mated with something in the original holder to secure it in place. We recently saw another marigold vase similar to ours with the rounded bottom and it did have the raised letter Benzer name on. It was priced too high and had chips in the area of the small hole. But was the same quality and obviously made by the same company.

Where does that leave us? We now know who made it, approximately when, and that it was made in at least three colors and two shapes. Now all we need is a nice name because "Plain" just doesn't do it justice.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

BIRD AND STRAWBERRY TUMBLER

We feature here a very pretty tumbler that is known as Bird and Strawberry. We found this tumbler several years ago and have delayed writing about it until we could get more information on it as to the maker etc.. The pattern is listed in Metz book #1 on page 105. It is also found in Mollie McCain's pattern glass book on page 26 - plate #8. Kamm book 2 on page 85 has a very good description of this pattern. She calls the pattern Bluebird. Bird and Strawberry, however, is the name most often used for this pattern today by collectors, authors and dealers.

The Bird and Strawberry tumbler is of standard table size measuring 3 7/8 inches high. It is 2 3/4 inches across the top. The base is 2½ inches in diameter and contains a large

complex star on the bottom centered with a tiny raised daisy. On the body of the tumbler and just below the rim is a 5/8 inch wide band made up of hexagons filled with cross-hatching and separated from each other by various fine-cut designs. The same type band is also used around the bottom of the tumbler. In this case the band is only ½ inch wide. Between these two bands are twelve shallow vertical panels arched above and below and slightly indented. The panels are practically covered with figures in good relief consisting of a group on each side of two birds with wings and tail outspread, flying toward a cluster of strawberries and leaves. We think that this pattern is unique and very pretty. The tumbler would add class and beauty to any carnival glass collection. Being a little light in color, it makes up for this with super iridescence.

The best and most informative material that we have found on this pattern is in the book called "The Beauty of Albany Glass" by Marcele Bond. The book also contain's a rather large section on old Indiana Glass Company patterns. The featured Bird and Strawberry pattern was made by the old Indiana Glass Company between 1910 and 1920. These were years in which much of the old carnival glass was manufactured.

We really were not too surprised to learn that this pattern was made by the Indiana Glass Company. After all, they produced the carnival glass Flower Medallion tumblers. We know now that the Lucile pattern tumblers were also made by that company. The cute little "Oval Star" childs set pieces were also made by Indiana Glass. We noticed other patterns in this book that we have seen examples of in carnival glass. More about them in later issues of the Educational Tumbler Series.

This article on the Bird and Strawberry tumbler is our 217th entry into the Educational Tumbler Series. Next month we will feature an unusual variation of the Lustre Rose tumbler. This Variant was discovered by Dave Cotton of Mansfield, Ohio. The tumbler is in the rare olive green color. More on this tumbler in next month's bulletin.




Additional input on the 30 point Leaf & Beads nut bowls. Kathy Johnson from Elk City, Mn. sent in the photo shown below, and very politely told me I couldn't count (math was my college minor, but counting was not a required course).

Q: (Sort of) Enclosed is a photo of our 30 point nut bowl in green with the sunflower interior, unsigned. If you compare it with the picture in Harry Northwood, The Wheeling Years, page 109, you will see that ours has actual points, whereas the one in the book has a beaded effect and 60 points. Carl Burns, I assume, was talking about one like that in HN, TWY, page 109.



A: I've already proven that my counting prowess ends somewhere this side of 30, so I won't even attempt to estimate the number of Leaf & Beads pieces that have passed through my hands; and I haven't ever noticed all these subtle differences. Makes me wonder what else I might have missed, or are these examples so rare that I've never seen one? Sharon Gill, where are you when I need you?!! Okay, so there are at least three distinct top treatments on Leaf & Beads pieces: the normal 15 points, 30 points, and the 60 point, beaded effect. And speaking of points, at this one I haven't a clue as to what this all means, how rare these things are, or how much added value can be attributed because of these differences. Still, the saga continues, and I await further input which I trust is forthcoming.

More update stuff came in from Mike Carwile of Lynchburg, Virginia. Mike sent in the picture show below, in response to the article on Kathy Pyles bowl in the December bulletin, with the caveat that there really is a "Stippled Mums" pattern; and apparently this is it. I keep hearing about this pattern, but no one will tell me from whence the information came. Mike says this bowl will be shown in Bill Edwards forthcoming book (oh joy, more confusion!), but I don't know if this pattern was newly named for this book, or if it was located in a previous text. In either case, this bowl is obviously not the same as the one sent in by Kathy. As pointed out by Mike, the stippled area is somewhat larger (a measurement wasn't given, but a ruler and some basic algebra yielded a diameter of 3.14 inches vs 2.5 inches for the first example), there is a smooth rays pattern extending outward from the stippled portion, the N is not reversed, and there is no exterior pattern. Other than that, they are exactly the same. Mike also commented on the fact that though he feels this is a scarce pattern, he understands that it probably is not of great value. And there, dear friends, is the crux of the matter: In Carnival Glass collecting, if a pattern fails to tickle the fancy of the multitudes, then regardless of rarity, value and collectability will go begging. P.S. to Mike: If you ever locate an Acorn plate, get me one too. I know Bill Edwards says they exist, but I've never heard of one. Autumn Acorn yes, Acorn, I don't think so.



Also received some input from Marla Smithe of Sea Tac, Wa, regarding an earlier column that dealt with some obscure foreign glass. Marla took the time to peruse her Hartung pattern books and sent in the references that she came up with. Thanks for the effort, but the facts are that much of the data contained in early reference books is now known to be in error. Mrs Hartung, Mrs Preznick, and Mr Hand were all laboring under the misassumption that nearly all Carnival Glass was made by the big four American Companies; Fenton, Imperial, Millersburg, and Northwood. Though we all owe these early Carnival pioneers a debt of gratitude, later research and a much larger data base has proven that many early attributions were incorrect.

Sandy Braden from K.C. in the big Mo. sent in a nice letter and a couple of questions. As for sharing my knowledge, such as it is, you are welcome. As anyone who knows me will tell you, there is little that I like better than showing off!

- Q: Please explain the difference between a nappy, a small bowl, and a bon bon. This has me totally confused, as there seems to be nappies and bon bons with and without handles.
- A: As with language in general, Carnival Glass terminology does not always adhere to the strictest interpretation of a given word or phrase. The word nappy is used by glassmakers to describe any shallow open dish, handled or not; but is generally reserved by Carnival collectors to describe a one handled item such as a Leaf Ray nappy. Similarly, a bon bon is a piece of candy, and any dish that would hold them could be one (bon bon, that is), but for our purposes, they must have two handles. They can be collar based or sit on a stem, and the bowl can be any of the known shapes. A small bowl is, well, a small bowl. It may be ruffled, ice cream, tight crimped, 3 in 1, candy ribboned, but not handled. Of course, if it's ice cream shape, it may be called a sauce. If you have something that's to deep to be a nappy, but it has one handle, it might be a sauce boat or gravy boat, a creamer, or even a water or tankard pitcher. If is has two handles but is the wrong shape to be a bon bon, it's probably a loving cup or a Mary Ann vase, or perhaps a celery vase or spooner. When it comes to bowls, I'm not sure where small ends and big begins, but I believe it has something to do with bread boxes.
 - I do hope you've taken adequate notes, cause this will be on the mid-term exams.
- Q: We own the small 6" bowl shown in the enclosed picture. Edwards calls it Fenton's Vintage Leaf with Wide Panel exterior. The unusual thing about this little bowl is that the grape clusters and leaf in the bottom are clear green, while the rest of the bowl is covered with a heavy silver iridescence. When we visited the Fenton Glass Factory, at Williamstown, we were drawn to a case captioned "Rarities in Carnival Glass" which

held a bowl exactly like ours. My questions are: Is it really a rare piece? What would be it's approximate value? What process was used to get this unusual effect? Did they spray it and them wipe the iridescence off the high areas? If so, how was this accomplished without effecting the near molten glass in the surrounding pattern?

A: The picture was to small and dark to reproduce, so everyone form a mental picture of a small Vintage ICS berry bowl. Got it? Okay, we can continue. Edwards is fine as a picture book, but under no circumstances should you read any of the words. Besides, the latest issue is virtually verbatim to the ones he published in 1978. Your bowl is Vintage, period. The same pattern on different shapes often had subtle differences, because of the need to accommodate those different shapes. To give each different shape a different pattern name would be asinine. The "leaf" portion of your bowl is nothing more than a space filler, and does not warrant an entirely new pattern name. I feel much better now. You didn't mention if Fenton offered any explanation as to what made the Vintage bowl displayed, rare, but I'm fairly confident that it was not because of the irregular iridescence. I've seen several bowls with the phenomena you describe, so it's not terribly unusual. The cause could be laid at several doorsteps, including poor spraying technique, or foreign substances (oil, water, etc.) in the spray. In my opinion, the most likely reason is that the areas where your bowl lacks iridescence are the thickest, so after the spray was applied and the piece was returned manually to the glory hole, insufficient time was allowed to reheat those thick portions, so the iridescence in those areas did not adhere. Value on these items are generally in the under \$50 range.

Phil Prince of Hixson, Tn. made the following inquiry.

- Q: What makes a piece the color called black amethyst? I have a Peacock & Grape collar base bowl, with super iridescence, and even when held to my dining room chandelier, no light filters through. Could you advise me on the rarity and value of such a piece?
- A: You've pretty much defined the color in your description of your Peacock & Grape bowl. The color name was borrowed from the uniridised glassware know as black, or sometimes ebony glass. Although examples of black glass are known to date back to the time of the Pharaohs, the vase majority of it was produced in the post Carnival Glass era. What appears at first as being totally lightfast, can generally be made semi-opaque by proximising the outer edge to an extremely bright light source (300 watts, or brighter). Under this scrutiny, nearly all items will exhibit a deep purple glow. I would rate your bowl as being very scarce and, given your description of its' beauty, would evaluate it in

the \$300 - \$400 range. Of course, a dyed-in-the-wool Peacock & Grape collector, sans this color, might make you a more generous offer.

Had a late arrival from Greg & Helen Ferguson of New Bedford, Mass. They had a question on an item I had answered last June, but since the Fergusons just joined HOACGA this past October, they were not privy to my previous wit & wisdom. Here's a reprise of that response:

- Q: This item is in a reference book on Carnival Glass and is therein denoted as scarce. If it's scarce, how did we end up with it? Just how scarce is it? What is it's value?
- A: First, the piece you have is a marigold Orange Tree sherbet (yes, I know Heacock calls it a jelly compote, but don't believe everything you read; this column excepted, of course.) The part of your question I find so interesting, is that you apparently don't think that beginners ever find any rarities. Not so mon frere. In my experience, beginners find most of the rarities, because that are not yet jaded, and are out there beating the bushes at every opportunity. But to answer the first part of your question; just lucky, I guess. How scarce is a very subjective question, but best guess would be some where between one & two hundred. Not many when you consider all the Carnival that was made. Now the bad news. Scarcity or even rarity have surprisingly little to do with value. As with most commodities, demand is the big determiner of value, and people are not demanding to have one of your cute little sherbets: Marigold ones sell in the \$25 \$30 range; blue, \$45 \$50; and a rare white one sold recently at auction for a paltry \$150. I think an amethyst one would be quite rare, and I've never head of a green one.

I might add that the Ferguson's sherbet is ruffled, where as most of these pieces are ice cream shape. I doubt that this distinction, of itself, would much alter the value. Also, I should have noted in the above answer that Glassmakers tended to call all stemmed items that possessed a flat bottom; jelly compotes, ergo Mr. Heacocks nomenclature.

The Fergusons also noted the great mold similarity between this item and the Maple Leaf small berry bowls (something that had escaped me until now), and remarked at how unusual it was for two different manufactures to have such similar molds. Well, it's not really all that amazing. The major Carnival Glass makers were all related, either by blood or brotherhood, and glassworkers tended to be nomadic, so it is not only possible, but quite probable that the mold of one was copied by another. Further, due to the transitory lifestyle of glassworkers, and the fierce competition for skilled moldmakers, it is entirely probable that the same person made both molds.

Okay Carol, if your patience has gotten you this far, I can tell you that your peach opalescent bowl is Dugan's Cherries. Though usually an interior (primary) pattern, your bowl has utilized it as an exterior (secondary) pattern. However, since your bowl has no interior pattern, I suppose your secondary becomes primary. Seriously, I cannot find a single picture of this pattern used on the outside of any item, with or without an interior pattern. This could be because the pattern would photograph better when on the interior, or it could mean that your bowl is really unusual. In either case, I don't believe this primary/secondary controversy would greatly enhance the normal value of in the \$75 - \$100 range. Several excellent pictures of this pattern appear in the Dugan/Diamond book by Heacock/Measell/Wiggins.

Someone sent me a copy of an article in the Texas Carnival Glass Club Newsletter, wherein their Research Editor, Jane Dinkins, took me to task for "my" 3 rules for an item to be considered Carnival. As much as I would like to take credit for originating guidelines that are so concise and insightful in their delineation of what Carnival Glass is; I must defer to Hartung, Preznick, Hand and Olsen, who, each in their stead, made these determinations long before I knew what Carnival was. Ms Dinkins main complaint seems to revolve around her belief that these "rules" eliminate enamel decorated items from the annuals of Carnival. I see no reason why the requisite pattern cannot be painted on. Besides, what fun would life be, if we couldn't bend the rules from time to time.

Ms Dinkins didn't send in any questions, but had she consulted me about it, I would have told her the Memphis piece she wrote about is the master berry bowl which has no bottom indentation, not the top to the fruit bowl, which does have an indentation on the bottom to receive the base.

Big doin's at the Resnik household, of late, has been our attempt to get our spaces at Statesvilles' new 60,000 sq. ft. Riverfront Antique Mall set up. It's opening January 17th, and will have hours of 10 AM to 8 PM, 7 days a week (6 PM closing on Sundays). So if your traveling through on Interstate 40 or 77, stop and see us. Please bring cash, and keep North Carolina green.

We will be one the road for the next couple of months to attend the Florida, Texas, and Bakersfield, Cal. conventions; so this will be my last column until May. I expect to return to a mountain of mail and resultant questions. Don't let me down.



FROM MY CORNER

Recently I attended an auction which was held here in Missouri. The auction consisted of 600 pieces of carnival glass. Some of the pieces in the auction were; Amethyst Christmas compote, Master Amethyst Grape & Cable Punch Bowl with 12 cups, approximately 25 water sets (five Grape & Cable), several plates, many bowls, five hatpin holders, and other miscellaneous pieces. Most of the glass had average or below iridescence, with many pieces having damage.

Because of the quality of the glass, the thought occurred to me that the owner had probably never attended a convention or even a local carnival glass meeting. Obviously, not very much time had been spent learning anything about the glass. I doubt that this person had ever been a member of any of the carnival organization, even though they had been invited to join several times. Probably the Edwards Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass and price guide provided all of their carnival glass information. A lot of the reference books show the patterns, and give information about colors and maker, but they do not talk about glass quality. This information can only be gained by seeing and comparing the glass. Local meetings, conventions, auctions and viewing other collections, provide opportunities to gain this invaluable information.

This person is like many others buying carnival glass. They are reluctant to become a member of any club. Obviously they do not realize that the organizations are the primary instrument in creating and maintaining the carnival glass market place. These types of collectors (to use the term very loosely) are always willing to benefit from the work done by the organizations, but never willing to put anything back. It is probably inevitable that this type of collector will always be with us.

It is always discouraging to see collections such as this one when it could have been improved with just a little effort on their part. They did not take advantage of the knowledge that is available. They put much time and money into the collection but very little time for education.

Perhaps this year is the time to share your interest with a new collector, invite them to a club meeting, a convention, to see your collection or to an auction.
