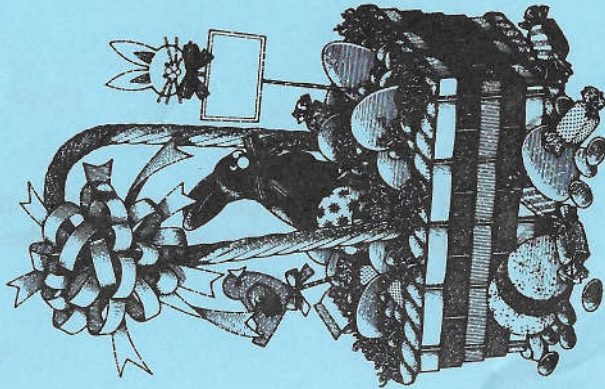
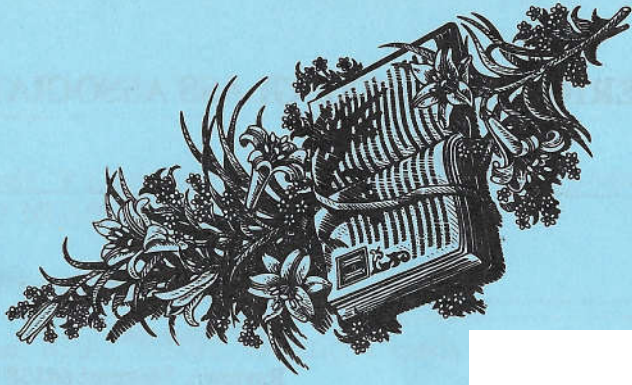

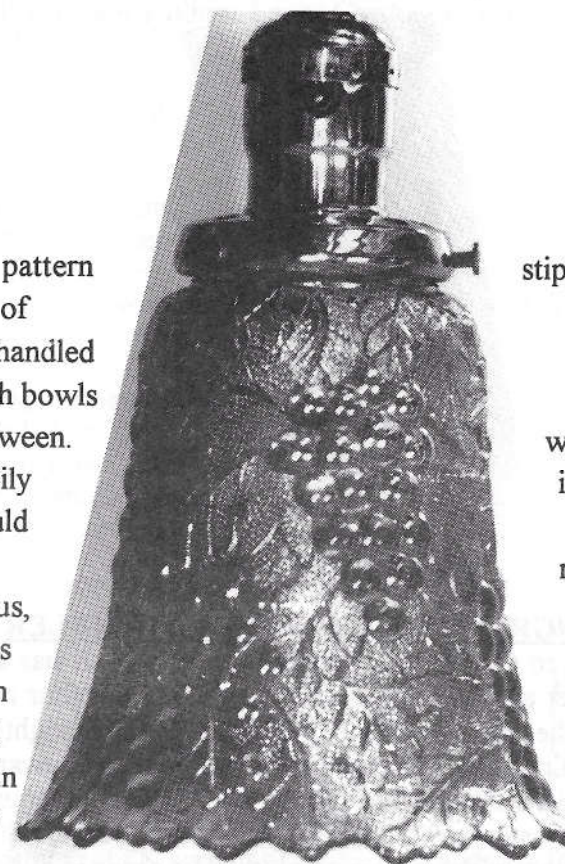

IMPERIAL'S GRAPE SHADE

Imperial's Grape pattern was a very large line of various shapes from handled serving trays to punch bowls and everything in between. Most shapes are readily available and we would imagine that most collectors, including us, have several examples of Imperial's Grape in their collection. And like all patterns certain shapes and colors are also more elusive.

We feel that the electric lamp shades fall into this somewhat elusive category. We were fortunate to be the winning bidder of two of these shades in a handsome lamp from the Charlie and Anna Belle Vaughn auction in 1990. These shades are hardly ever seen and make a nice addition to any lamp shade collection.

The design detail on this shade is outstanding. Six clusters of well rounded smooth grapes on a background of richly

stippled leaves. The leaf tips form a nice naturalistic edge termination. Found only in a rich marigold with very pretty multicolor iridescence. Iridized both inside and out, its dimensions are 5½" tall and with a 5" flare and a 2½" fitter. Signed with the Imperial trademark NUART on the fitter collar in block letters. The inside fitter edge is ground smooth.

This extra finishing touch was also an Imperial glass signature. The old Imperial ads stated that "On all our NUART pressed shades the inside fitter edge is reamed and smoothed." Check the shades in your collection and you will find this true. Happy hunting, we will keep the light on for you.

EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

ENGRAVED CORNFLOWER TUMBLER

The marigold Engraved Cornflower tumbler is 5¼" tall. It has a top opening of 2½". The base is 2" in diameter and has a plain bottom. There are four raised rings around the bottom of the tumbler. The bottom ring includes the base and is slightly wider than the other three. From this group of rings the tumbler curves outward and upward and makes a distinct bulge about 3/4's of the way to the top of the tumbler. A band of engraved cornflowers and leaves circles the tumbler just below the widest point of the bulge. This engraved band adds to the attractiveness of the tumbler in our opinion. The shape is quite unique for a carnival glass tumbler. We believe that this tumbler is quite scarce as we have not seen many of them around.

We purchased this tumbler from Sharon Mizell of Silver Spring, Maryland a few years ago. She called it Engraved Cornflower which we think fits the pattern very well. We have had it on our shelf of tumblers to write about for some time with hopes of finding more information on it.

In November of 1995, we received a letter from Pat Holmquist of Cedar Rapids, Iowa with a photograph of a very pretty marigold tankard type pitcher wanting to know if we had any information on it. I have certainly never seen this pitcher in any of our travels, but I noticed it was in the same shape and design as our featured Engraved Cornflower tumbler. The pitcher contains a cobalt blue handle which adds a lot to it's beauty. It also contains the same floral engraving as does the tumbler. We are showing this beautiful tankard type pitcher in the photo on the opposite page.



I wrote back to the owner of the pitcher stating that I thought it was made by Fenton and sent her a photo of my tumbler which was of the same pattern. I suggested that she send the photos of her pitcher and my tumbler to Frank Fenton for his views on this pattern in which she did.

Mr. Fenton wrote back stating that both pieces were definitely made by Fenton. He had never seen this pitcher in the marigold carnival treatment with engravings. He stated that they do have an example of this pitcher at the Fenton Museum in topaz (vaseline) opalescent with a blue handle and without the engravings.

Since Frank Fenton has never seen this pretty marigold tankard with engraving and we don't know of another one, it would seem to be quite scarce to us. If any of you carnival glass collectors or dealers have ever seen one of these pitchers, or even the tumblers, please let us know or contact Pat Holmquist, 1200 Ellis Blvd NW, Cedar Rapids, Iowa 52405. We would both like to know if there are any other examples out there. We would appreciate hearing from you and we will report any information on this pattern that we receive in a future HOACGA bulletin. We wish to thank Frank Fenton for his help with information on this pattern. It was greatly appreciated.

ANTIQUÉ OR ART - WHAT CARNIVAL GLASS TRULY IS

My purpose in writing this article is to share some personal thoughts concerning the Carnival Glass market and future trends I see emerging. I am also revisiting and moving forward with a theme in the "Antiques, Carnival and Pastels" article I wrote in the October 1995 issue of HOACGA.

As the title of this article suggests, I feel Carnival Glass, depending on the individual piece in question, should be classified as either an antique or object of art. Now, before you laugh or get angry, allow me to explain why. Ten years ago, when I lived in Northern Virginia, a close friend of mine was an avid collector and dealer in antique oak furniture. He had no interest in antique glassware nor Carnival for that matter, but I had an interest in antique oak china cabinets which I occasionally purchased for displaying Carnival. Over a period of three years, we made several trips to Adamstown, PA. to visit "Antique Row" where numerous full time and part time antique dealers sold merchandise. I was in search of Carnival and my friend was in search of oak furniture. In our pursuit of antiques, I noticed that many antique furniture buyers would often purchase furniture with imperfections, old worn varnish or minor damage. Of course most of this furniture could be refinished or repaired. The buyers were primarily concerned with finding a piece of furniture to decorate their homes for that "country look" or obtaining that special furniture conversation piece. There wasn't much price variance in antique furniture of similar size, shape and composition. When I shopped for Carnival Glass on the other hand, I felt 90 percent of the Carnival fell into one of two general categories - quality Carnival glass selling at premium market prices and lesser quality Carnival selling at the low end of the market. I eventually realized that aside from rarity consideration and glassware condition, there were artistic factors which influenced Carnival Glass values. This implied that the Carnival Glass market behaved differently from the general antique market.

The Carnival Glass market is different because we as collectors concern ourselves with antiques and art simultaneously. I see Carnival glass belonging to one of two distinct groups. The first group consists of premium quality carnival; the rarities, the strong patterns (glassware having high collector demand) and the scarce pastels. The second group consists of carnival selling below the \$500.00 price range, which is for the most part carnival that is readily available. I did not pick the \$500.00 figure out of thin air. It is a realistic figure in which to

segregate more common glassware from premium glassware with strong price support. I could have selected a \$1,000.00 figure, but there is not presently sufficient glassware priced at or above the \$1,000.00 price level in which to conduct and sustain a series of annual carnival glass auctions.

The premium quality carnival I feel is quickly evolving into a separate market. I consider this glass "art" versus "antique". Art is unique in that it takes shape in many forms. Art can be impressive oil paintings or sculptures, but it can also be hand sewn patchwork quilts, carved wooden objects or hand painted blanket chests. I am not saying that carnival glass should be compared to classical works of art. I am saying that there is a human presence in designing molds and creating patterns, experimenting with base glass colors and in some instances shaping the hot glass with hand tools. Even the human effort in applying the iridescence requires some level of care and diligence. This factor alone can make a big difference in the valuation of glass. The creativity and talent of individuals is present in many old Carnival and Victorian glass pieces, regardless of whether you credit the glass manufacturer or glass company employee. Consider Rene Lalique, a French maker of fine glassware. In his lifetime, he was a jeweler, silversmith, glass maker and artist. He is well known for the quality design work he did in wallpaper, fabrics and jewelry, though he is best remembered for his artistic glassware. Also take a few moments and read "Harry Northwood, The Early Years 1881-1900" and you will see that aside from being a successful businessman, both Harry Northwood and his father earned international acclaim for creating outstanding art glass. Several pieces are on display in prominent art museums today.

I will cite one example of carnival possessing unique artistic qualities. During the 1994 ACGA convention held in Columbus, Ohio, a Dugan Heavy Iris whimsey hat made from a tumbler was sold through the Burns Auction Service. The whimsey hat was not pictured in the auction brochure, the brochure description was in medium sized bold print. If you asked knowledgeable collectors what the piece might sell for prior to the auction, you probably would have received an estimate close to published prices in either the price guides or auction reports. I inspected the Heavy Iris whimsey prior to the bidding started, several bids were cast and once the bidding surpassed current market or book values, only three bidders remained. I sat a few seats away from the lady who cast the final winning bid. She openly admitted that she was reluctantly paying more for the item than what she felt it was worth. The purchase was based on emotional desire and her attraction to this colorful carnival whimsey. The Heavy Iris hat had a beautiful dark marigold color and brilliant iridescence,

the ruffled jack in the pulpit shaped top caught and reflected light superbly. In all regards, it was an exceptional piece of glass and worth every penny paid for it. I'm sure if others had a second chance, the bidding would have continued on with more intensity. This is but one example of a rare carnival piece having unique artistic qualities.

While lower priced carnival glassware certainly has significant value and a strong following of collectors, one has to consider the prudence of buying heavily in the more common patterns in abundant supply. This is the glassware I content should be considered as an antique or highly valued collectable. The premium quality or artistic glassware will continue to hold value and I suspect maintain upward price momentum. In this regard, I feel carnival glass auctioneers will eventually hold auctions specializing in the artistic glassware where the bidding process starts at \$500.00 or more per item as a tentative baseline. I do not mean to confuse this with the concept of a reserve bid, but I am expressing the viewpoint that we have a new and separate market emerging within the carnival glass hobby. Historical prices support segregating carnival in order to provide a more efficient market benefiting both buyers and sellers. I expect the "high end" segment of the carnival glass market to attract many new collectors. More people will consider investing 4 or 5 digit sums of money on a particular carnival item knowing a specialized market exists for liquidating their glass holdings with other carnival glass of the same quality and price range. Presently, the concept of selling a \$2,000.00 punch set followed by a \$35.00 berry dish at auction does not flow well. The lesser priced item might detract from the value of the higher priced glassware piece. Envision if you will someone ready to expend a few thousand dollars on a rarity with bidding expected to take place in \$100.00 increments waiting patiently while a five minute bidding war goes on over a \$75.00 vase where bids increase in \$2.50 increments. Obviously, some frustration and impatience must exist. The glass should be segregated so auctioneers and sellers can attract the "right crowd of buyers". The following fictitious scenario will illustrate my point further. A conversation between Mr. Carnival Megabucks, a collector of Rose Show plates and Mr. and Mrs. Frugal, owners of a consignment shop specializing in used women's clothing, metal school lunch boxes, Barbie dolls and a small selection of depression era Carnival. The individuals mentioned are attending an all day Saturday Carnival auction and are conversing during the scheduled lunch break. They are seated adjacent to one another in the hotel conference room eating sandwiches while keeping an eye on their recent carnival purchases now in cardboard boxes underneath metal folding chairs.

Mr. Megabucks addressing Mr. and Mrs. Frugal: "Good auction, wouldn't you say?"

Mrs. Frugal: "Why yes, we just bought two marigold tree back tumblers to finish off our water set. I hope it helps us sell that water set we have in our shop. It's been up for sale for a long time now."

Mr. Megabucks (politely): "Well yes, those two tumblers you bought do have nice color. I'm quite happy too. I picked up a marigold Rose Show plate with opalescent tips."

Mr. Frugal (prospecting for a customer, responds to Mr. Megabucks): "You should stop by our consignment shop. We have a marigold Lustre Rose plate that would go nicely with that Rose Show plate of yours. Sell it to you for a good price too. I think it might even have a few more roses on it than the Rose Show plate you just purchased."

Mr. Megabucks: "I'll certainly keep that in mind. This sandwich I'm eating is a little bland. Say, would you happen to have any Grey Poupon?"

Conversely, a few years down the road, Mr. and Mrs. Frugal decide to upgrade their carnival collection and are in search of two purple raspberry tumblers. They already own the pitcher and four tumblers. Once again they attend an all day auction near home. In this auction, they plan to bid on lot number 373 (I'm tired already just looking at this number) which consists of five purple raspberry tumblers, two damaged, others with excellent color, SELLING CHOICE each. They must bid on these items in person they feel, no absentee bid will work or suffice. Since they don't know exactly when their prized tumblers will come up for bidding, they arrive at 11:00 A.M. and wait almost four hours for the magic moment. Mrs. Frugal is amazed at the prices some of the glass brings during the first two hours of the auction. Some of the carnival pieces sell for thousands of dollars which is the equivalent of their annual house mortgage plus utilities. Mr. Frugal waits patiently to cast the winning bid and hopes to get home before 5:00 P.M. so he can take his heart and high blood pressure pills prior to supper. As you can see from the situations described above, both buyers and sellers would be better served by restructuring the way Carnival is sold.

In closing, I will comment that only by doing your own homework will you eventually discover what separates high priced carnival from lower priced carnival. In a nutshell though, it is the artistic qualities and availability of an individual glassware item that makes the difference. Whether you are into art or antiques, the Carnival Glass market is changing.

ON THE AUCTION TRAIL WITH CHUCK

February 23-24, 1996: Burns Auction Service sold the Spangler collection to the tune of some \$450,000. February weather in Cleveland can be terrible, but this weekend was a beauty and a lot of very nice glass sold. If there were any disappointments, they were probably limited to the top end Millersburg pieces. The Gay 90's green pitcher and the amethyst Morning Glory tankard at \$10,000 each were soft in my opinion. A super array of plates changed hands at good prices. The green Peter Rabbit plate at \$6,500, the lime ice green Hearts and Flowers plate at \$5,750, and the \$4,500 nine inch Vintage Grape flat plate are examples.

The auction may have been a study in contrasts: A very large crowd of regulars and many new (to me) faces. It didn't seem like the dealers were loading up -- probably because the collectors were there and really bidding. The area west of the Mississippi River was not well represented. One collector that I had not seen too often lately took at least 6 punch bowls from the auction. Another bought many vases including the auction high blue Rose Columns at \$12,000 and the green Mitered Ovals at \$7,500.

And then there was the motel. It had a shuttle from the airport -- the good part stopped there. Apparently after the auction was booked, the motel was sold and was undergoing a complete remodeling. Trash everywhere, several restrooms closed, whole floors closed, etc. The auction room was almost too small for such a good and well-publicized auction.

The doors were not open for preview until 2 hours before the start -- far too short a time for the size of the crowd and the limited area. The auction was not fast-paced and the Friday night session was uneventful. On Saturday, the motel sound system failed about 10 minutes after the sale started. To their credit, the auction team had a backup in place and switched to it. Also the fire alarm sounded several times. Pressure from the auction team and complaints from the rest of us must have been heard, as the motel lowered the room rate \$10 and we had cookies and coffee Friday night and donuts and coffee Saturday -- compliments of the motel.

Oh yes, we had a little competition from a dance something or other in the room next door on Saturday.

I left in the middle of Saturday afternoon as there is only so much the human body can take. I didn't buy a piece, but it was a treat to see such good glass offered. This quality is not often sold in one auction. I had mixed emotions about going to this auction, but looked forward to seeing and visiting with friends. The condition of the motel and the length of the auction did limit my visiting -- but there will be another time.

March 23, 1996: A Mickey Reichel auction at Boonville, Missouri. When the sale brochure arrived I quickly laid it aside thinking there was nothing that I wanted that would warrant the long drive to Missouri. That changed when a friend saw the glass a week before the auction and called to tell me I had to see the Hattie chop plate. I decided to go and also attend the monthly HOACGA meeting on Sunday, March 24.

There was a wide variety of glass that for the most part sold at very reasonable prices. The amber Hattie chop plate was a beauty and brought \$5,400. Other desirable pieces included the marigold Ohio Star vase (\$2,400), sapphire blue collar-based stippled Three Fruits ruffled bowl (\$1,850), ice green Embroidered Mums plate (\$900), white Leaf and Beads rose bowl (\$475) and amethyst ruffled 1910 Detroit Elks bowl at \$625.

I enjoyed the sale and the hospitality of several carnival glass friends, saw their collections and heard some enviable acquisition stories. Kansas City had a severe weather warning and just as the HOACGA meeting ended the rain started. I drove in a downpour -- what didn't fall straight down the 18 wheelers sent horizontally. I gave up and stopped short of my destination. By morning the 60 degree temperature had fallen to less than 15 with snow flurries and 30 to 40 mile winds. In spite of the terrible drive home it was an enjoyable weekend. One consolation -- the next auction will be closer to home.

PICTORIAL PATTERN PARADE

HOLLY AND POINSETTIA COMPOTE

We are featuring here a very unusual and pretty marigold dome footed compote. It is the only example of this piece that we have ever seen. We suspect that there are a few others out there somewhere, but we have never seen or heard of another one. The photo shown in the HOACGA notebook on compotes, photo #83, is from this same compote. We are showing two photos of this piece that are taken in different positions in order to give you a better view of the pattern. The pattern is on the interior, but it shows up very well through the plain exterior.

We are calling this pattern "Holly and Poinsettia". We think the name fits it very well as it does feature both of these motifs. Due to the typical Dugan dome footed shape used on this piece, we are quite sure that it was made by that company. This shape was a favorite of Dugan and was used in a number of their patterns. Five Hearts, Double Stem Rose and Flowers and Frames are a few other examples of Dugan patterns that are found in this dome



footed shape. Most of these pieces, however, are found in the much lower bowls. The very desirable Christmas compote was also made in this shape. In fact, this piece reminds one of the somewhat larger Christmas compote.

We first saw this piece at the 1993 ICGA convention held at Indianapolis, Indiana. It was found by Titus Hartley not very far from the convention site. He had it on display in his room. I was so surprised to see this very unusual example of carnival glass that I certainly wanted to get a photo of it. We were lucky that David and Joan Doty, who do excellent photography work, were also attending the convention. We thank them very much for their help in bringing this article to you. We also thank Titus Hartley for allowing us to get photos made of this rare piece.

This article, on the Holly and Poinsettia pattern, is #209 in our Pictorial Pattern Parade. We hope that you have found it interesting and educational.

I'LL TAKE 'EM BOTH!

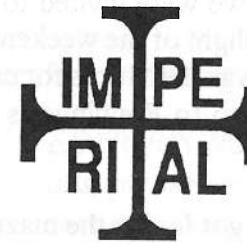

Obviously, this dealer knew that Rose Show and Funeral items were valuable, but didn't know the difference in rarity that color can make. And, in answer to my question, "where did you find these", the answer was "in an estate we bought. I have another box full of real good Carnival including some RED. I'll bring them next week and you can have first choice." Well, you can just about imagine the fantasies this sent running through my head, but I do know from past experience that lightning does not strike in the same place twice. But, of course, I keep smiling - saying hello to her every Sunday and asking.
