The HOACGA bulletins are delivered to the Post Office in Buckner, Mo no later than the 15th of the month unless the 15th is a non-business day. If the 15th of the month is a non-business day then the bulletins are delivered the first business day prior to the 15th. Bulletins are mailed for first class delivery.

Prior to delivery to the post office, the bulletins are manually labeled by 4-6 HOACGA members. Once labeled, the bulletins are bundled together into postal flats which hold approximately 125 bulletins. It takes at least 8 postal flats for the HOACGA bulletins. Foreign bulletins are placed in envelopes and labeled.

All bulletins are delivered in the postal flats to the post office in Buckner, Mo. No bulletins are pulled and sent special delivery! (Admittedly, one of the perks of helping with the labeling is that the laborers have an opportunity to pull their own bulletin if they so desire.) That means mine (I leave mine in to monitor the delivery), Bob Grissom and yours are at the mercy of the post office and their distribution process. Once received, the Buckner, Mo post office will then send the postal flats to the Kansas City distribution center for routing to their destination.

The bulletins are mailed with a postal permit for first class delivery. The postal permit allows the club a discount on domestic mailing but also contains certain restrictions. These restrictions include that at least 90% of the addresses must be barcoded, the label must be at a certain level on the bulletin and the bulletins must be bundled together in the postal flats ... and OH YES additional forms. We have been very fortunate in that the Buckner, Mo post office personnel is a great team of individuals to work with!

Normally it takes 2 business days for me to receive my bulletin in Blue Springs, Mo. Since the bulletins are sent first class, everyone should receive their bulletin within 2-3 business days of the 15th of the month. If you do not receive your bulletin within 5 business days of the 15th or if it arrives mangled, give me a call at (816) 373-3162 and I will send you another one.

If your bulletin is consistently late, you may want to be proactive and check with your local post office on how they distribute mail such as the HOACGA Bulletin. As aforementioned, all bulletins are delivered to the post office in Buckner, Mo at the same time.

DIAMOND AND SUNBURST VS. OCTAGON WINE SETS

Imperial's Diamond and Sunburst wine sets are found in both purple and marigold. Because we feel that many collectors today are familiar with the marigold Octagon wine sets, we picture the purple Diamond and Sunburst with a marigold Octagon wine decanter for a size and shape comparison. They both exhibit a pleasing geometric pattern and the family resemblance is quite apparent.

Diamond and Sunburst wine sets are certainly not plentiful but can be found occasionally in both marigold and purple at auctions. The purple sets generally have exceptional color and are many times described as having electric iridescence, and are priced accordingly. The marigold decanters and wines, while probably equally scarce, bring a more lackluster price. These decanters were first marketed in clear glass and we have seen several in the antique malls at very reasonable prices.



The Octagon wine sets, still very good-looking, are very common in marigold and don't command too high a price—a good reason why everyone should enjoy owning one. The wine set is said to come in purple and green. Those colors must be rare indeed. We must confess that in the last sixteen years, we can't recall ever seeing either color for sale, decanters or wine glasses. Maybe just knowing that the price would be beyond our reach, we have not paid that close attention to them. With today's auction prices we have a tendency to pass over items that we know are beyond our reach and concentrate on glass we think we have a chance of buying.

The stoppers on both sets are hollow mould blown stoppers and are usually crudely broken off from the over-blow glass and then ground to a somewhat tolerable finish. It is apparent that the glass makers of old didn't envisage just how picky carnival glass collectors would become down the road.

OAK LEAF LUSTER

Pictured are two unreported tableware companions from a partial table set in marigold whose manufacturer is unknown ... at least unknown to me. The pictures are of a cheese dish and a butter dish. The pattern is quite distinct and resembles oak leaves. What then would be a more appropriate than a name with a little flair and a ring such as "Oak Leaf Luster".

The cheese dish has a base of $8 \frac{5}{16}$ inches wide and a height of $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches. The outer rim flange of the base measures $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in height. The cheese dish cover rests deep inside base on the bottom of the base.

The lid and base each have 12 individual flutes. As can be seen from the picture, on the very top of the cheese dish cover these panels remain simple and plain whereas the side of the cover has the oak leaf design within each vertical



flute. The underside of the cheese dish base also has the oak leaf design within each flute. In addition, and what cannot be seen from the pictures, the cheese dish base's center has a sixteen pointed star with the points alternating in two lengths inside a ground raised circle.

Details of the butter dish are minimal as the butter dish was returned due to having more damage and poorer color than I desired in relation to the price. It appears the butter dish also has 12 flutes on the lid and the base. Each flute does carry the oak leaf design even though with varying designs. The base has an upright flange on which the butter dish cover may rest on helping to keep the butter from touching the cover. Also, and I am almost certain, the bottom of the base has the sixteen pointed star with alternating points of varying length inside a ground raised circle even though I no longer can verify it.

If anyone has information on these pieces of carnival glass, I would be interested in hearing from you as the pattern is quite attractive and desirable, a welcomed addition to the carnival glass arena. Ralph Handwerk, 2717 Nonth Ln, Orefield, PA 18069-2828.

RARITIES IN PLATES WANTED

I am doing a survey. This was a request by Bob Grissom. He asked if I would be interested in putting together a list of Plate Rarities? I said I would try, of course I need a **lot of help**. If you are interested in helping us make this list accurate we would greatly appreciate your time.

If you have Internet excess and wish to help by asking Internet users if they have any unusual or rare carnival plates that would be "GREAT". If you place a copy of the following list on the Internet, you may get an accurate count of how many of each plate is out there and how many are good or damaged. Maybe other colors that are available or different types of back variations (such as basket weave or ribbed back). There are many possibilities on completing the "**New Plate Rarity List**". If you do get information from the Internet please include as much detail as possible so if others give me information from the Internet we don't mistakenly think 4 people have the same item when really it is only one person that responded to all four of your requests.

I am a new collector and I have attended 21 auctions and 4 conventions, so I have seen a lot of glass in my two years but I don't have the background or knowledge to put together a list of rarities. I am hoping you will share with me and other HOACGA club members your knowledge.

Two plates I have seen that are not mentioned on the following list are one smoke and one marigold Greek Key and Roses plate. "*I loved them both*".

We are interested in finding the **top rarities in 9" - 10" and 11" plates**. (Not the small plates at this time.) We would like to create a list of the top 50 or so rarities in these plates. **Including maker if known, size, variation and color**. Some plates have plain back, basketweave back, ribbed back, beaded berry, wide panel etc.

By looking in the back of the HOACGA Educational Series Book III there are some rarities already listed. "Rare" meaning 5 or less known. I don't know if the information is still accurate or how complete the listing is. But it is a good place to start. **If you can help update this list, please do so.**

I am not sure if rare is still considered 5 or less? I do not know who decided this? Do you know? The more information we can gather the more complete and accurate our new list will be. **If you have any of the following plates, please note next to it and fill in any missing details.**

You can cut out the list from your HOACGA bulletin or write on a blank paper any comments you may have. As I receive results I can start updating the new Plate Rarity List. **My hopes are to complete the list within 6 months.** The results of the list will be printed in an upcoming bulletin with an appreciation note for each person's name that helped with this research. I hope to add your name to the list. If you would review the list that follows and add comments, **I would enjoy hearing from you.**

Plate Survey Update

Well the plate survey is coming right along with all the help of everyone.

I have heard of some real new rarities. I actually saw one at ICGA convention. It was the Amethyst Birds and Cherries chop plate made by Fenton. One word says it all "BEAUTIFUL". The iridescence was stunning. The pattern was so clear and really shows off nicely on a chop plate. We have it in a blue CRE bowl and you miss seeing the pattern like a plate will show. I still like our bowl - we purchased it from the Gallo auction in Ohio last year. Anyway the Amethyst Birds and Cherries chop plate is the first one ever reported in that color, and what color, WOW.

Another rarity reported to me was a RED Peacock at the Urn plate. This is the first one I have heard of. The owner said the iridescence was gold and silverish and also had a small chip on one point so not that attractive as red can sometimes be. We know red can be really pretty and sometimes not so pretty. Sounds like this was not one of the prettier pieces Fenton made, but rare - it is definitely rare. As for price I couldn't even guess what it might sell at auction. The man that owned the plate said he'd heard of another to exist. But I haven't heard any replies yet.

I'd love to have a picture of the Red Peacock and Urn plate. I took one of the Amethyst Birds and Cherries when I was at ICGA this year. So if the owner reads this please send me a picture if you can. I am a picture nut. I am not Dave Doty but what I wouldn't do to be him - taking pictures of so much pretty glass. I have two albums full of carnival pictures already and will fill many more throughout my years I am sure.

Another rare plate that was confirmed was the only know Ice Green Leaf Chain. I'd love to have a picture of that one too. Mickey Reichel sent me some pictures of rare plates and so did Lynda Grizzle. Thank you both.

I've also heard of the first Marigold Plaid Plate. Any one else seen or heard of one?

CARNIVAL GLASS CANDLESTICKS

A well-known dealer and carnival glass collector once told me in my early days of collecting that there were no candlesticks in 'classic' carnival glass. But, by the count on my shelves, I say there are! While some of them fall into the 'late' carnival era (such as the double candled Iris & Herringbone) and some fall into the stretch category (such as Florentine), how do we explain the Grape & Cable Candlestick and Candle Lamp by Northwood? All publications that I have point to these being considered carnival glass. Even if candlesticks aren't officially considered 'classic' carnival glass, the shapes, colors and iridescence place them somewhere in the history of carnival glass.

Most of the glass companies made candlesticks - Northwood, Fenton, Dugan, Imperial, Fostoria, Westmoreland, Heisey, Cambridge and others. Brocade; Candelabra; Colonial; Crackle; Crucifix, Double Dolphins, Double Scroll; Firefly; Florentine; Flute & Cane; Grape & Cable; Heisey, Imperial Jewels; Inverted Strawberry; Iris & Herringbone; Lustre & Clear; Premium; Six-Sided; Soda Gold; Spiral; Tree Bark; Twelve Rings; Wide Panel and many shapes available in Stretch are patterns that come to mind. There are also some out there that remain virtually unknown. One pattern is Origami or Paper Chain, a unique and beautiful pair. My thanks to Glen Thistlewood for helping me put a name to that pair. I took a picture of another unique pair to the www.cga Las Vegas convention in January. No one knew the pattern name but many shared my opinion that they were made by Imperial.

We have been lucky enough to 'marry' many sets, including marigold and green Grape & Cable Candle Lamps. I have on display my 'orphan' collection - currently, a grouping of 6 single, unmatched candlesticks and an upturned punch bowl base that holds a pillar candle very nicely. Set them aglow and it's a nice warm setting. I'm always searching out Ebay and shows for a mate or another orphan to adopt! At present in our collection, we have about two dozen matched pairs of candlesticks. They don't take up much room on the shelves and fill in the spaces nicely on each side of a 'show pieces' bowl.

So, the next time you happen upon a candlestick, adopt it and add a little carnival glass light to your home! Or better yet, leave it there for me to adopt!

WHAT'S ALL THE FUSS ABOUT COLOR!

Taking Second Look at Marigold Carnival

They say a diamond is a girl's best friend and if a lady owns a red diamond she should by all accounts, consider herself most fortunate. Anyway, that's part of the story told in the "Aurora borealis in a rock" article, Forbes Magazine 5 April 1999 issue. The rarest of all diamonds is indeed a "blood red diamond" and the going rate is \$1 million per carat according to Christie's jewelry department for those with an inclination to buy a red rock. I really have no interest in diamonds, but what caught my attention was the strategic acquisition of colored diamonds called the Aurora Collection, not necessarily big in size but it does consist of "260 diamond gems in an astounding palette of colors like apricot, china red, honey, rose, ink blue, kelly green and jonquil." The total carat weight of the collection is 231.78 carats. This diamond collection is not about size of gem stones or quantity, it is about color. After reading the article, especially the part about colors just mentioned above, I just couldn't resist making a correlation to the expressions of color we use in describing the "Colors of Carnival" such as Renninger Blue, Pumpkin, Emerald Green, Cherry Red, Aqua Opalescent, Fiery Amethyst, Electric Blue, etc. A little diamond "color" trivia before moving on to my primary topic, that being Marigold Carnival Glass.

Probably the best way to summarize the attributes of Marigold carnival from a collector's standpoint is to say that it is rather plentiful, people like it and it reflects or captures light well. If we look back in time, we can see how this iridized, brightly colored glass could help "illuminate" a dark Victorian home, probably more so than dark colored glass such as purple or green. Now I'm confident everyone appreciates this short historical insight into marigold carnival, but where does that leave us today? I'm speaking of the carnival collector as we close out this century and enter the next. My first word of advice is don't be afraid to buy marigold carnival, simply because it is plentiful. The expression location, location, location is the foundation of solid real estate investing, but in the world of carnival glass the expression now and in the future will be color, color and color. Where can the carnival collector find vivid colors in Marigold? There are quite a few choices out there, but I've listed my top five picks below with a short narrative explaining why I chose them.

Imperial Grape Plates. These small six inch diameter plates possess a well balanced and executed pattern. Clusters of grapes centered in the middle, surrounded by scallops and stippling throughout. Select only those examples dark in color with a vivid radium or electric finish. Easily procured in the \$35 to \$60 price range. Folks, this one is a no brainer! These little gems have appeal to collectors of plates, miniatures, and a growing number of collectors specializing in Imperial Glass. I anticipate these plates doubling in value over the next three to five years.

Northwood Acorn Burrs- Buy it in "pumpkin" colored Marigold when opportunities exist. The punch set and table set are my first picks. The water set is a close second and the berry set is a respectable third. The naturalistic pattern of Northwoods Acorn Burr, dark marigold color and sharp robust iridescence make this an unbeatable combination. Seldom are collectors or investors disappointed owning Acorn Burrs.

Dugan Heavy Iris Pitcher- This one is a sleeper! Selling for about one fourth of what Heavy Iris pitchers in Amethyst and White Carnival sell for. The Heavy Iris raised relief pattern is a pleasure to look at. About three or four are sold at auction each year. They are not all that common and I consider them to be under-priced. This is a very artistic piece of glassware, so check it out!

Morning Glory vases (large)- In this pattern I am referring to the flared out top Jack-in-the-Pulpit shaped vases. The large surface area of the open end of the vases really captures and reflects light superbly. Try to buy those vases where the tops measure 7 inches or greater in diameter. Restrict your buying to only those "pristine" examples. Current market value is \$95 and up.

Field Thistle- Manufactured in a light marigold by the U.S. Glass Company. The iridescence is brilliant and the pattern well executed for detail and coverage. I listed this particular pattern because of rarity considerations and the **visual appeal** of the glass. Highly under-rated. I consider it to be scarce and overlooked by collectors because it is light in color. The color is light, the finish superb and the glass quality first class. Some collectors might part company with me on this recommendation. Buy the glass if it appeals to you, otherwise pass.

I'm sure several other patterns come to mind as being splendid examples of Marigold carnival. A few pieces deserving honorable mention include: Fenton's Spector Department Store plates, Imperial Loganberry vases, Millersburg Hanging Cherries and Northwood Good Luck bowls. I also like Northwood Grape & Cable in water sets and the punch bowl series. Regardless of pattern there will be a significant emphasis on "color" as we enter our next century of carnival collecting. Pinks, Blues and Reds make all the difference in iridescence quality.

For those ladies out there who still would prefer a red gem stone, may I suggest a piece of Fenton Cherry Red Carnival as an appropriate substitute. It costs less than the diamond, possesses more color, and certainly is easier to care for than those tiny little diamond stones which can easily get lost or stolen. As a side note, please remember to remove your diamond jewelry when cleaning the carnival glass, we certainly don't want to scratch the iridescence. Have a bright, colorful summer and good hunting.

2000 CONVENTION

It was decided that Plates will be the display pieces and Bob will contact various individuals for possible chairpersons for this project.

5th VASES SECTION

Tom was instructed to include a condensed version of the board minutes in the HOACGA Newsletter.

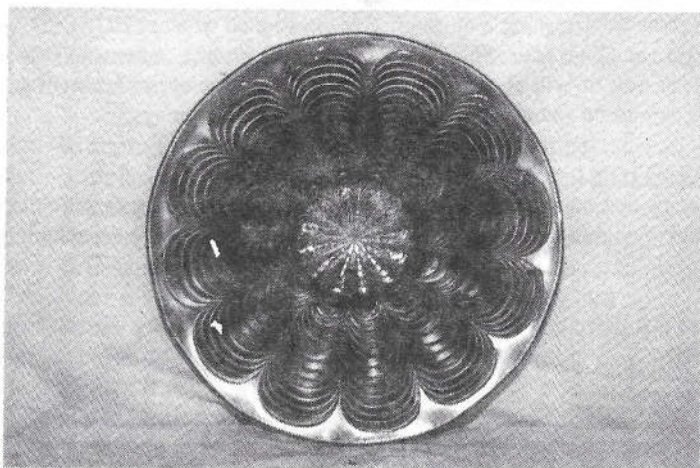

ANOTHER UNKNOWN CHOP PLATE

Mickey Reichel will be selling a Marigold Peacock Tail chop plate at his upcoming auction on January 8, 2000. The Peacock Tail plate is rare in the 9" size. This is the first one in a chop plate that has been reported.

If it is rarity that you are looking for, then the year 2000 will offer you at least two opportunities to purchase a top piece of carnival glass.

NEW CARNIVAL GLASS FINDS

Bruce Hill displayed his recent find at the recent ICGA convention. It was the Amethyst Birds & Cherries chop plate. Those that saw the plate said that it has outstanding iridescence. Until now the only know Birds & Cherries chop plates were the Marigold & Blue. Bruce was able to purchase the plate from a well known antique & carnival glass dealer. The dealer had known about the plate for several years, but was not able to purchase it until recently. When the plate became available the dealer called Bruce to see if he was interested, which he was.

THE UGLIEST PLATE

Item 293 of the August 28, 1999 Seeck Auction was "Dragon & Lotus 9" plate - blue - extremely rare, has silver iridescence, has a minor nick on back of one point." Mickey Reichel was the successful bidder for this item. He said that he always wanted to own the ugliest carnival glass plate known. I think he was successful.

HELLO FROM IOWA

Well we just returned from our trip to Lansing Michigan. This was the first time we had ever been there. The hotel was very luxurious, the restaurant had some difficulties keeping up with the group during breakfast. We didn't have any problems, but many others did. They were short on help and it made it difficult to serve so many people. Too bad they didn't have a breakfast buffet set up like many conventions do. This was the Great Lakes Carnival Glass Club Convention.

We went to attend the auction. We are not members of this club but they didn't seem to mind that many of us were there for the auction. They were more than kind like most carnival collectors letting the outsiders in. This was a real nice group of people. We did not join the club, I have joined so many recently I can hardly keep up with them all. The auction was very good for us, since we got to purchase some very nice pieces to add to our collection.

We had a very nice conversation with Tom and Sharon Mordini and they were kind enough to catch me up on a lot of back issues of the auction price guides. This is very helpful to me since I am conducting the rare plate survey. I am getting closer. Lots of knowledgeable people have been so helpful and many have called and written to me to tell me of the rarities they have or know of. Plus the price guides also have items I didn't know existed. And I am reading old club newsletters and bulletins and finding more rarities mentioned.

So I am learning a lot about plates. I am not a plate collector, probably will never have any of the real rare ones. We purchase items we like and can afford and unfortunately rarities are not found in our collection. But on the other hand a lot of pretty carnival is enjoyed by us on a daily basis. We have a collection we enjoy.

Narrowing the listing down to the top 50 rarities will be very difficult especially the 9" plates there are so many. The chop plates are fewer and I think I can do a fair job in getting that list down to 50. I know not every collector will agree with the final results I send to HOACGA. I will use all the information I can to determine rarity, to narrow the listing down I will have to let desirability come in play since I can't list the top 200 plates I will have to eliminate some of the lower value plates to get the list down. Some plates I know are rare but won't be able to make the top 50 list. There are just too many colors and patterns so some of the rare plates will not make the list. I am taking into account somewhat as to the amount of times the plate made it to auction, over the past 14 years. I am using Mordini's price guides to help me with this.

I have spent a lot of hours to get this far and I don't want to disappoint people. So when I do get the listing done I hope people will understand I have did the best job I can. This will not be a list I typed up in a few hours. So I hope if nothing else you will learn of plates that do exist that you may not of known about.

Some of the auction highlights from the Great Lakes Carnival Glass Club Glass Bash were as follows:

N. Poppy Show Plate in dark marigold had a base crack but it was a beauty and brought \$475.

N. Rose Show ruffled bowl in Aqua Opal sold for \$900. I thought it had a base crack but it was not mentioned at the auction.

N. Rose Show ruffled bowl in dark marigold was beautiful and brought \$650

A rare vase in Aqua Opal #30 in the auction flyer called an Absentee Formal vase sold for \$3500 it had a small bang on the side but was beautiful and where will you find another one?

N. Oriental Poppy Show 7pc tankard water set in ice blue, had a badly cracked handle and a blister about the size of a quarter on one side, tumblers were perfect and brought \$1400 and looks beautiful in our home.

Imperial Octagon stemmed round jelly compote in purple a really neat item sold for \$525 it was number 90 in the auction flyer.

Number 155 was the Ice Green Pony Bowl it was beautiful and sold for \$1000.

Number 165 was the 7½" Dugan Fishscale and Beads Flat plate in purple with electric irid, It brought \$625. It was absolutely beautiful.

Number 169 was also a little plate not often seen it was a 6¾" Dugan Petal and Fan crimped edge plate w/jeweled heart ext. in purple a real cute one. Sold for \$350.

The Christmas compote in purple sold for \$3000 it was a nice one I thought it would bring more.

Number 245 was a very rare Orange Tree plate in amethyst sold for \$2000.

Number 249 was a 6½" Pine Cone Plate in Blue it sold for \$400 to a mailbidder it was a real pretty one. You could tell it was blue.

Number 300 was the Holly plate in red sold for only \$700. Which was a good price. The one in Black Amethyst was really pretty and brought \$1000. The Amethyst sold for \$500 and the Green sold for \$775. The white had a chip on the base and sold for \$95.

If you love the Kittens pattern you'd of liked #310 - Fenton Kittens 2 sided Banana dish in amethyst a really nice one, with great color it went to a mailbidder for \$550.

A really top of the line water set was #325 Fenton Blueberry 7 pc. Bulbous water set in Blue an absolute beauty sold for \$2,050.

Number 335 was the 11" Cherry Chain Chop Plate in dark marigold the picture on the auction flyer didn't do it justice. It was a very pretty marigold a real "19" and sold for \$1700.

The Stag and Holly Chop Plate #337 was also a beauty, it did have just a couple of small white stones in the glass. One stone was right inside the stags tummy and looked liked he just finished dinner. But really it was very small and didn't take away from the beauty of the plate at all. It sold for 950. It was very pretty marigold.

We finally got our White Orange Tree Punch Set - at a very fair price of \$650. It is a 8 pc set and looks great on top of our cabinet. There were many other wonderful items but thought you'd like to hear about a few that caught my eye.

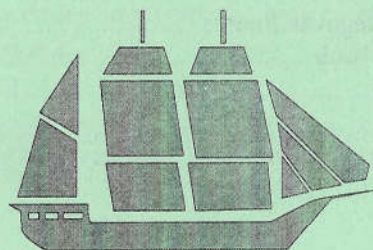

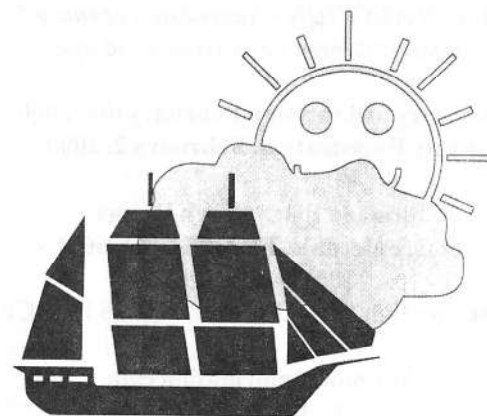
