2001 HOACGA Souvenir

In 1977 the HOACGA Souvenir was the "Good Luck" hatpin holder, in "Flame Red", made by the Smith Glass Co. In 1980, it was the made in "Ice Green" made by the Fenton Glass Co. This year we have asked The Fenton Glass Co. to make the hatpin holder in Vaseline Opalescent. The date will be changed to indicate the year 2001. Not many pieces of Carnival Glass were made in Vaseline and even fewer were made in Vaseline Opalescent. I was at the Fenton factory on February 27th to see the hatpin holder made. I got to see some samples of the color. It is a beautiful piece of Carnival Glass. It has a very nice pastel iridescence and the opalescence is very good. I believe any member will be glad to have one or more of this souvenir. Only 200 to 225 pieces will be made.

The Room Display award, the "Hobnail" spittoon, and the Banquet Table Favor, "Orange Tree" Wine will be in the same color.

When you purchase a Souvenir you get a nice piece of Carnival Glass plus you are helping to financially support the organization. A member can order as many of the hatpin holders as you want.

2001 HOACGA Notebook Insert Vases — 6th Section

The HOACGA Notebook Section for 2001 will again identify vases. This is the 6th and final section on Vases. Another 85 to 90 patterns are reported. This section contains additional Non-U.S. vase patterns, and identifies many of the Brocaded pieces, along with patterns that were not previously reported. With this section, a total of about 425 different vases have been reported. Probably all of these vases are reported in other publications, but no other single publication contains as much information as these six sections. Each different pattern is identified with a colored picture. Even after reporting on 425 different vases, there are still, patterns that are not shown.

This information is only possible with the help of many members that have supplied photographs and other information. This is a good example of what collectors are doing to help promote their hobby of Carnival Glass collecting.

If you do not have all of the previous five Notebook sections on Vases, then you are missing a lot of valuable Carnival Glass information.

Little Bo Peep

We don't know a lot about the Little Bo Peep pattern. In early Carnival Glass books, such as Sherman Hand's 1978 book "The Collectors Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass", it was referred to as a possible Northwood pattern. But today we are inclined to credit Westmoreland as being the maker. This pattern can be found in a marigold iridescence mug and an extremely rare child's plate. The plate is sometimes referred to as a cereal bowl. The mugs are also supposedly found in clear glass as well as mugs

with flashed on colors. Some years back we recall two colored Bo Peep mugs that were sold in a John and Lucille Britt auction here in St. Louis.

Marigold mugs are not difficult to find but the problem is finding one with a nice strong marigold color. Many mugs leave a lot to be desired on the quality of the iridescence. The plates or bowls are so seldom seen that you had better buy it if you find it, regardless of the color or lack of it.

Westmoreland Glass started out as the Specialty Glass Co. and apparently was failing before it got started. The West brothers, Charles and George, bought into the company in 1889 and the company name changed to Westmoreland Specialty. The early production of glass centered around what was referred to as "packers goods", such as candy containers and mustard jars. We have early Westmoreland mugs (not carnival glass) with paper labels still intact that read "Prepared Mustard, mixture not injurious to health. Westmoreland Specialty Co. Grapeville, PA." Could the Little Bo Peep mug have started out life as a mustard container?

The child's plate shows up in the 1924 Butler Brothers wholesale catalogs in crystal glass called the "ABC baby plate". The mugs, however, were advertised in 1927 and 1929 as the "Little Bo Peep" mug in iridescent glass. Apparently the plates and mugs were not paired together as a child's set.


Don't confuse the "Little Bo Peep" plate with the "Stork ABC" plate. They are both very similar in shape and both have the ABC's from A to Z and the basic numerals. They seem to show up occasionally at the antique malls. The marigold "Little Bo Peep" plate is another story.

Bon-Bons With Obscure Reputations

Panelled Holly

Seems that this "bon-bon" is shaped from the sugar in a breakfast set, with Alaskan iridescence on the inside only. Holly design on the exterior detracts from its overall desirability, perhaps, but the pedestal foot is certainly a redeeming feature, along with the clarity of the uniridized glass. These offer the Northwood trademark on most examples found, but the popularity ranking is low/moderate. A 1909 wholesale catalog featured this



bon-bon. It is known in marigold, amethyst and green.

Prisms

We could call this "an orphan" in the crowd!....For a time many years ago, writers attributed this bon-bon to Millersburg. Another of the early writers claimed it for Northwood. However, in a recent conversation with one of our more up-to-date authors, as emphatic disclaimer took place. It is now our understanding that such as this came from Westmoreland!

At one time, we owned a perfectly gorgeous marigold example with undisputed radium finish-clear handles. Amethyst has been found, and possibly green exists. It is not a piece given notice in price guides to any large

degree, so it is very difficult to say how many turn up for auction on regular basis. Prisms is 7 1/4" across the handles and only 2 1/2" tall. An intaglio design on the underside of the bowl shows nicely through to the interior. An ornate star appears under the base.



The circular handles are surely different from other bon-bons, and they have a nicely "prism'd" effect on the edges.

Obscurity is by no means a hindrance to unusual and relevant beauty in either of these cases!

A marigold one sold at a Mickey Reichel auction for \$3200.00 in 1997 and another marigold one is rumored but not confirmed. Nothing ventured,

nothing gained, I emailed Ron to inquire if it was for sale and proceeded to make a rather low offer. Basically, I offered all the money left in my carnival piggy bank. I even told him that I might be his long lost brother. He responded that yes it was for sale but that I was short 4 piggy banks.

Thrilled that it was indeed for sale, though in desperation, I offered him some trade options: my left arm, the Christmas presents under this year's tree, a variety of Carnival pieces, including the Homestead plate and the Poinsettia bowl. Turns out I had unknowingly outbid Mr. Archer himself for that Poinsettia bowl in Hagerstown: he was the mail bidder. A bowl like this one was something he had been trying to acquire for many years. Amazingly, the Homestead was something else he had a serious craving for, unbeknownst to me. These two pieces I offered among others in a trade.

Ron has two great arms, would not dream of depriving my kids of their Santa gifts, he saw his chance. He took it and the trade was on. Fearing to trust the post system with such a rare piece, and being an airline employee, one week later I took my daughter for a 1 hour visit to Los Angeles. We met Ron 50 feet away from our arrival gate at LAX. A lot of smiles were traded in the bar that day and Ron says my eyes did a "Roger Rabbit" when he unwrapped the vase. Two days and six planes later I was back in my bed with a tired grin on my face. Gotta agree with Ron on this too: Dang! I sure do love this hobby too, Mr. Archer. And, a special thanks to the Northwood employee, who almost 100 years ago, left the factory with "A little something in his lunchbox".

Membership Dues

The cost of the monthly bulletin is exceeding the \$25.00 annual membership dues by about \$5.00 per member. This is brought about by increases in postal rates, preparation and printing costs, and the cost for preparing and printing of the quarterly colored insert, which was added in December 1999. After considerable discussion, the Board of Directors meeting on February 22, 2001 voted to increase the annual membership dues to \$35.00 per individual or family, effective June 1, 2001.

We discussed reducing the number of bulletins to only 6 per year and/or discontinuing the color pages. The bulletin is the major source of communicating information to the members. For many it is the only Carnival Glass news they receive for months at a time. Therefore, we do not believe these were the options that should be pursued. We regret having to make this increase but we feel that it is something that is necessary to maintain the information source that we all want.

We know this is not the type of information that members want to receive. It is only through viable Carnival Glass organizations that we will be able to maintain and promote this hobby that we all enjoy and have considerable investments in.

If you will need a table(s), (6 ft) for your display or for selling glass, please request it when making your reservations. 

Another "Bear" Tumbler

The September 2000 Bulletin reported the availability and location of the six previously known "FROLICKING BEAR" Tumblers. Recently, Bob Smith reported the seventh known tumbler. This is a report of the location of the previous six plus the seventh known tumbler. Crystal Tumblers and a Pitcher have been reported. Does anyone know where they are? Please let me know so they can be reported.

- 1 Tumbler Owned by Cecil Whitley. This is probably the first tumbler found and was the one owned by The Reverend Leslie Wolfe. It was originally sold to Mary Elizabeth Collier of Tennessee. Sam Roebuck bought it at the Collier auction. Sam sold the tumbler to Cecil Whitley. All Floyd & Cecil wanted to buy from Roebuck was the tumbler. In order to get the tumbler they had to also purchase the Green "Peoples" vase (only one known) and Peach Opal "Farmyard" bowl (only one known).
- 1- Tumbler Owned by Randy & Jackie Poucher. They bought it from an ad in the Antique Trader. Mrs Rawls of Orange, Texas was the owner.
- 1 Tumbler Bob Smith purchased it at the auction of the Bob Gallo estate, Burns auction, in 1999.
- 1 Tumbler Jim & Yolinda Lewis purchased it at the Joe Corruthers auction, by Mickey Reichel.
- 1 Tumbler Sold at a Woody auction in 1999 to a Missouri collector. This tumbler is damaged. (This was not one of the two original tumblers Woody purchased)
- 1 Tumbler Bob & Geneva Leonard purchased their tumbler from Bob Gallo. This was the first tumbler that Bob Gallo owned. He purchased it from an Antique dealer in Indiana.
- 1 Tumbler In the collection of Don & Becky Hamlet, North Carolina. The tumbler is not iridized, it has Silver Overlay. It has the same base color (Green) to the glass as the Carnival ones. Don said that he was able to polish the silver. The Hamlets purchased the tumbler from an area antique dealer who had gotten it at an Antique Show in York, PA.

February 28 to March 3, 2001: It was San Diego-Southern California carnival glass convention time in Pamona, California. This convention has a set format that was interrupted by an ice storm in Kansas — Brian Pitman couldn't make it out of Kansas so his seminar was cancelled. This cancellation seemed to slow things down a bit, making what I thought was a "dead" day on Thursday. This was unfortunate as the Wednesday evening ice cream social and bingo was good as was the Marie Capps seminar on Friday.

The room was not available for setting up the auction glass on Friday, but Jim and crew were up at 4 am to set it up on Saturday morning and the auction went on as scheduled. In my opinion the top-end pieces in the auction sold well, but there were many very nice pieces just a cut below that could have done better. Overall the glass was good and desirable.

Karen Engle went out of her way to provide us with a nice display of her glass and the many stories that made her banquet presentation great. In a trial run at home the glass looked so good under the carnival glass chandelier that they took the chandelier down, brought it along and had it lighted and hanging over the display at the banquet. That is what I call beyond the call of duty. A super job, Karen.

There were several nice displays, but there was one that I thought was different. Jeanette Harris called hers "Shades of Siamese." She had three or four each of ice blue, sapphire, and what she called violet blue pieces of carnival glass and in front of each group she had a picture of one of her Siamese cats. Poly's eyes matched the ice blue, Baby's eyes matched the sapphire and Coco's eyes matched the violet blue glass. Real neat, Jeanette.

One thing that is always great at this convention is Shirley Patterson's hospitality room.
