2001 HOACGA Souvenir

In 1977 the HOACGA Souvenir was the "Good Luck" hatpin holder, in "Flame Red", made by the Smith Glass Co. In 1980, it was the made in "Ice Green" made by the Fenton Glass Co. This year we have asked The Fenton Glass Co. to make the hatpin holder in Vaseline Opalescent. The date has been changed to indicate the year 2001. Not many pieces of Carnival Glass were made in Vaseline and even fewer were made in Vaseline Opalescent. It is a beautiful piece of Carnival Glass. It has a very nice pastel iridescence and the opalescence is very good. I believe any member will be glad to have one or more of this souvenir. Only 225 pieces were made.

The "Hobnail" Spittoon given as the Room Display award and the "Orange Tree" Wine given as the Banquet Table Favor were also made in Vaseline Opalescent.

When you purchase a Souvenir you get a nice piece of Carnival Glass plus you are helping to financially support the organization. A member can order as many of the hatpin holders as you want.

On the Auction Trail with Chuck

April 25-29, 2001: As I expected, the HOACGA Convention was a very good one. I have known Danny McFalls for several years and knew he had some good glass to be sold in the convention auction. I believe he had to be pleased with the results. The auction was good, but a bit too long and slow paced. In my opinion, there were 75 or so too many pieces to be sold.

I am sure there were some record prices set and many happy new owners. Although they were not the highest selling items, I liked the powder blue opal Hearts and Flowers compote (\$3000) and the powder blue opal Peacocks ruffled bowl at \$5500. Also the honey amber Nippon P.C.E. bowl (\$2600), the emerald green Mikado ruffled compote (\$8000), and the dark marigold Elegance plate at \$6500. I do not know who made the Elegance plate or anything else about it, but it sure was a beauty. Any good buys? I thought as a group the Millersburg pieces were very reasonable as well as some of the compotes.

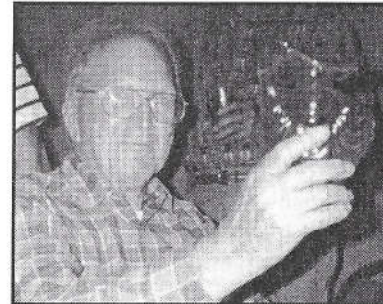
May 12, 2001: Goshen, Indiana. The ad said large collection of approximately 450 pieces of carnival glass. It was tempting and only 150 miles away, so I went to at least look. Look is all I did. The crowd was small with a few collectors and half a dozen dealers. The glass was disappointing — very dirty, many minor chips and bruises and very ordinary iridescence. But there were a few pieces that were clean and in good condition. I suspected there were add-in pieces and not part of the collection being sold. Included was a very nice amethyst Daisy and Drape vase that sold for \$900, but it was mostly downhill from there on.

This auction was different from the usual in that the auction team would put 4 or 5 pieces on the display table and sell choice. Not a real fast way to sell the glass. The winning bidder had to walk to the front of the room to retrieve the piece of his choice. The buyers did all the running. If there had been a full house there would have been chaos. In my opinion, the biggest negative was the announcement at the start of the sale that there would be a 5 percent buyer's premium — no it was not mentioned in the sale advertising.

May 17, 2001: Fort Wayne, Indiana. 200 pieces of quality carnival glass was advertised. I didn't see anything in the ad that I could not live without, but I went anyway. I looked at the glass, surveyed the crowd, and did not even get a bid number. The glass as a whole was better than the Goshen auction the week before, but much of it didn't "talk" to me. I wondered if a good bath would bring it back to life. Minor damage kept many pieces from bringing what I call normal prices. With a few exceptions the better pieces, in my opinion, sold for below average prices. When the price was reasonable, the dealers grabbed it.

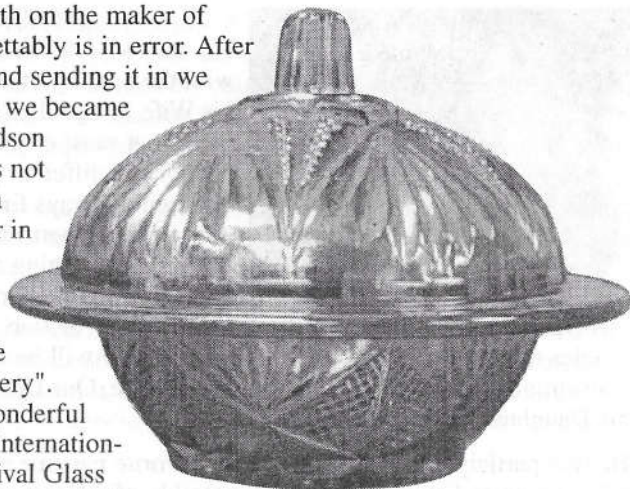

Split Diamond – Oops!

Our article last month on the maker of Split Diamond regrettably is in error. After writing the article and sending it in we were troubled when we became aware that the Davidson Glass Company was not even mentioned as a carnival glass maker in Glen and Stephen Thistlewood's excellent book "Carnival Glass, The Magic and the Mystery". This book does a wonderful job of covering the international spectrum of Carnival Glass producers. So we wondered if we were in trouble with our story crediting Davidson Glass as the maker of the Split Diamond pattern.



One of the many side benefits of the HOACGA convention is visiting and conversing with fellow collectors from all over the country and many times from other countries. So when we found ourselves talking to the Oldfields from England, the first thing to come to mind was, here was our opportunity to ask the question who made the English Split Diamond pattern. The answer was that yes, at one time Davidson was thought to be the maker but recent research determined that Davidson Glass didn't make any carnival glass at all. That answered the question why there was no mention of Davidson Glass in the Thistlewood book.

So who made Split Diamond? Well it seems that at this time no one knows for sure who made it, but there seems to be a general agreement that it was an English pattern.

The Thistlewoods were one of the featured speakers at this convention. So my next task was to ask them to forgive us for not studying their book a little closer before writing the story. They did; they also agreed that the maker was not now known.

So we came away from this convention a little smarter than we arrived. Just kidding, as we always see and learn so much at each convention. And we probably gained a couple of pounds too. As usual we had a very enjoyable convention seeing many old friends and meeting new ones.

Little Bo-Peep

In the April bulletin Alan and Lorraine Pickup wrote a nice article about the Little Bo-Peep mug. We talked with Alan at the HOACGA convention and asked if he was going to do a follow-up article about the bowl/plate. He informed me that he didn't have one, and I asked if I could do a short follow-up showing the bowl/plate picture. He gave me permission to do that.



The pattern on the bowl/plate is almost identical to that on the mug, although the mug shows the pattern twice, once on each side (where the patterns are reversed). The bowl/plate shows the pattern only once. It consists of Little Bo-Peep holding a Shepherd's Crook with ribbon attached, and her hair pulled up in a bun. It also shows a sheep, short plants at the feet, a hillside, and clouds. There is a lot of detail in the pattern.

The bowl/plate is 7 1/2 inches across, 1 3/4 inches deep, and has a one-inch lip. On the lip one will find the alphabet in capital block letters and the numerals 1 through 9.

We're sure that the glass company (reported to be Westmoreland) that made the mug also made the bowl/plate. We consider ourselves fortunate to own both the mug and the bowl/plate.

“When You Wish Upon a Star”

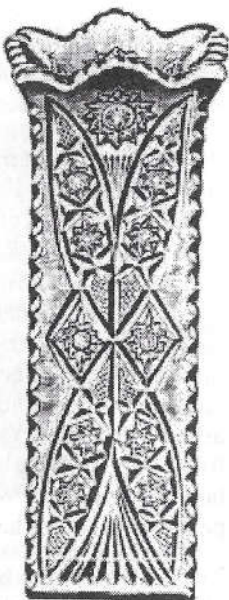
European Carnival Glass caught us in its spell some years ago. There is an air of mystery about many of the patterns - a kind of challenge that says "Find out more." And there's a sense of sailing uncharted waters as one tries to do just that -to find out more. So the journey that Steve and I took whilst writing and researching "A Century of Carnival Glass" was, as you might imagine, not an easy one. The book focuses on the development of Carnival Glass over the years that span the last century-the output of Brockwitz, Sowerby, Eda Glasbruk and many more Carnival manufacturers is fully illustrated to an extent not seen before.

A motif seen on many of the European patterns is the star - not surprising, as intaglio mouldwork was used a lot in Germany, Scandinavia and Bohemia (and of course, stars are a feature of intaglio "cut" patterns). At the recent HOACGA Convention, our seminar presentation focused on the development and popularity of star patterns in Carnival-from the Classic American manufacturers such as Millersburg and Imperial, to the European (and even further afield such as Indian and South American) producers.

Just to cut in with an "aside" here, what a great Convention it was! We had a wonderful time visiting rooms, buying glass and meeting old friends. The room displays were astonishing and we really admire those who participated and gave so much enjoyment to all the onlookers. Another great display was the Dugan/Diamond glass that was brought in by so many people for the Morgans' splendid seminar. And the banquet lecture by Floyd and Cecil Whitley will be remembered by all present for the unique array of one-of-a-kind tumblers that were set out for us to feast our eyes on. Congratulations and sincere thanks to the president and all club officers whose hard work made the whole convention run just as smoothly as clockwork.

But back to my starry story! Many generous people brought some splendid items of glass for the display at our seminar. As we were flying long haul from England, it was only possible to bring just a few special pieces with us (like the exquisite little "Rome" bowl from Brockwitz and the astonishing purple "Curved Star" pin tray). One fabulous table was set full of "Curved Star" items in many different shapes that Ed Kramer had kindly transported from his home to share.

But there was one special European "star" vase that we didn't have for the seminar. Covered with hobstars from top to toe, this vase is an elusive one



that has variously been attributed to Riihimaki (Finland) or Brockwitz (Germany). It is distinctive in the fact that it is square in cross-section where most vases are round. Its name varies, as it can be called either "Column Flower" or "Square Diamond" (my personal preference is for "Column Flower" as it describes the pretty hobstars which look like flowers, as well as the distinctive columnar shape). Alas, though-no one had an example for us to show at our seminar.

Imagine my surprise then, when the very next day, the most fabulous example of a "Column Flower" vase in blue, appeared in front of my eyes. It was superb, the iridescence magnificent, the shape inexplicably alluring, the overall effect utterly mouth-watering. But was it for sale? Yes, no, maybe. And could I buy it? Yes, no, maybe. The indecision involved was down to the fact that my dear friend and much respected vase expert, Joan Doty, had also expressed a desire to buy the vase. What a dilemma. The moment Joan knew that I had also asked to buy it, she said "Oh but YOU must have it"- and of course the very moment that I knew that Joan had also asked to buy it, I said "But no, YOU must have it". Of course, each of us dearly wanted to keep it for ourselves, but at the same time each of us truly wanted the other to have it. It was a situation that called for the judgment of Solomon.

Our solution seemed clear. We decided to share the purchase and the ownership. We would time-share the vase and it will reside in both of our collections, consecutively. A year in one, then a year in the other, and so on. Each of us then has the opportunity to enjoy its beauty. It seemed the right way to solve the predicament-and it is a powerful testament to friendship.

In the words of the late Don Moore: "Never forget that the things of real value in our hobby are our personal relationships. The glass itself is only melted sand."

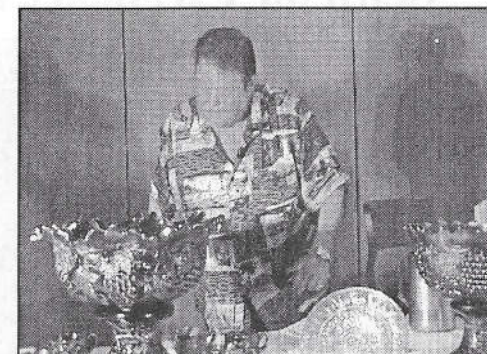

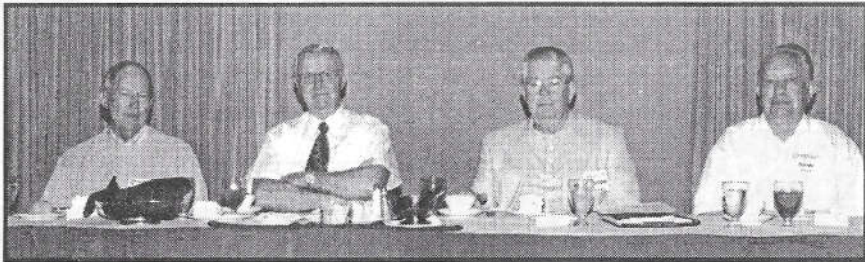

Forever Changed

In 1968, while working as a nurse in a physician's office, I was asked by Ophelia (a patient) if I would like to buy a box of glass she had brought with her to the office. I was gracious and told Ophelia I would take it home and show my husband and then get back with her.

I had heard of Carnival Glass and may have seen some at garage sales, but I wasn't sure if that was what Ophelia had brought to me. It was almost Christmas and I had an aunt die unexpectedly. Busy days turned into weeks and we had not gotten back with Ophelia about the glass.

Saturday morning I had to work, but Saturday afternoon Charles and I started making the rounds of antique shops to find out just what this glass might be and was it worth the four dollars she wanted for it. We soon learned that it was Carnival Glass. We had four place settings of Lattice and Bouquet.

I then called Ophelia and told her we would be happy to pay for the glass. She then invited us to her home to see her other antiques. She also had a white Leaf Ray Nappy that we purchased that day for three dollars.

Charles and I then started going to local auctions trying to find out about Carnival Glass. There was not a lot of information available at that time, but we anxiously pursued any information we could find.

We did learn of Marion Harting that lived in Emporia, Kansas so we went to visit her. We were overwhelmed by what we saw that day and also by the cost of it. I do not remember what we bought from her, but I do remember she had a beautiful blue Northwood, Peacocks Plate on top of her high boy. We asked her the price and she said "one hundred twenty five dollars." We politely declined and left.

As we drove back to Kansas City that day I said, "Can you imagine anyone paying a hundred and twenty five dollars for a plate, I would never do that." Little did I know that we would pay many times over that for some pieces of carnival glass and be thrilled to get it.

Ophelia had no idea how she would forever change two newlyweds lives by bringing the box of glass to the office that day.

Heart of America Carnival Glass Association Board Minutes – May 30, 2001

12:00 Noon - Lawrence, KS, Holiday Inn Holidome. President Grissom called the meeting to order. All board members were present. Treasurer Cliff Ball reported on 2001 convention finances and the general overall budget.

Monthly Newsletter - It was suggested that an article about each of the items on the center pages regarding the club educational materials may be more effective, and a different item could be highlighted each month. Eleanor reported no bulletins were returned this past month by the post office. The survey will be on funeral vases.

President Grissom provided an inventory of all souvenirs and whimsys on hand and noted this needs to be reduced as the investment is over \$8,000. He has sent 12 pansy plates and 12 of the 2001 room display spittoons to Fenton Glass Company to be decorated for the 2002 whimsey auction. This will be the last year Fenton will make wine glasses for the banquet favor and the inventory has blue, white, violet and Vaseline opal in varying quantities. It was decided to offer the members sets of 6 in choice of colors for \$100.00, shipping included, as long as supplies last. Wine glasses sell for \$20 each when sold individually.

Secretary McMorris reported that 39 evaluation forms on the 2001 Convention had been completed and returned. The board reviewed the comments and suggestions. This input is very helpful to the Board in making plans and setting the programs for future conventions.

2001 Convention - the board reviewed the various activities and events of the 2001 convention and the hotel report on expenses.

Membership Contest - A membership contest was approved as follows: "Any current HOACGA member signing up four new members within a certain time period will receive a one year membership free. If the same member signs up 2-4 more additional members their name will be entered in a drawing for \$25 cash; or signs 4 or more additional new members, in a drawing for \$50 cash. Recognition of the winners and the drawings will be held at the 2002 convention. HOACGA officers will not participate."

CONVENTION - 2002

Gale Eichhorst has accepted for the Friday seminar and Will Schutz for the banquet. A third seminar on Grape & Cable is being considered. Bob Grissom has negotiated the hotel contract for 2002. Room rate will be \$98 and meeting room cost will be determined by the number of room nights booked. Other activities discussed were: Britt Award, room displays, special recognition, annual meeting, auction. It was determined that the auction should be scheduled from 9:30 a.m. to no later than 2:30 p.m.

The HOACGA Notebook Section for 2001 will again identify vases. This is the 6th and final section on Vases. Another 85 to 90 patterns are reported. This section contains additional Non-U.S. vase patterns, and identifies many of the Brocaded pieces, along with patterns that were not previously reported. With this section, a total of about 425 different vases have been reported. Each different pattern is identified with a colored picture. Even after reporting on 425 different vases, there are still patterns that are not shown.

This information is only possible with the help of many members that have supplied photographs and other information. This is a good example of what collectors are doing to help promote their hobby of Carnival Glass collecting.

If you do not have the previous five Notebook sections on Vases, then you are missing a lot of valuable Carnival Glass information.

Top ten bonbons

Shape Series

Heart of America Carnival Glass Association

June 2001

A 1925 Butler Bros. catalog showing assortments of Fenton glass refers to this shape as square bonbons and the open end or card tray shape as fancy bonbons. The Two Fruits divided bonbon is called a "double-handled compartment nut or candy dish."

Surely we shall all agree that Fenton dominated the bonbon field with 19 or so contributions, Northwood made 9 — 4 of them significant entries, Millersburg 4, Dugan offered 3, and Fostoria 2.

To qualify and establish appropriate status to this distinct and graceful shape known to collectors as true bonbons is not a simple task. We have some 30 patterns, 14 of which appear only on the two-handled collar-base bonbon. Then we are left with the footed variety, some of which are equally rare and desirable. I don't believe there is a bonbon collector who would refuse either type!

All of the listed top ten have patterns found only on bonbons. In fact, that is a dominant part of the criteria used in establishing the rankings. Rarity, in the true sense, stems from scarcity of pattern or shape, or in some cases, a particular color; by virtue of limited quantity available.

1 Fruit Basket (Millersburg). Since the color range is limited to amethyst, with only four or five examples known, this footed bonbon must take top billing for rarity in this category. The basketweave background for the variety of fruit (pineapple, grapes, pear, apple and cherries) in the center creates an intricate and interesting design.



2 Rose Bouquet (Fenton). This bonbon has been found only in white. Sharon Mordini named this pattern in the late 1980s when she and Tom found the first example. Note the full blown rose in the center with the “bouquet” around the outer edge. This is the shape of the few examples found since that first one. The exterior is smooth and has a collar base. It is believed that there are fewer than six of these known.



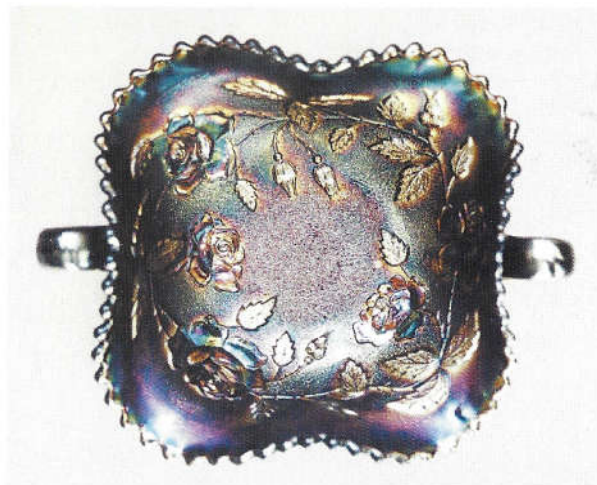
3 Fuchsia (Fenton). The first known cobalt blue example had been on loan to the Fenton Museum and sold at auction in 1993, bringing \$1,500. A second cobalt blue was sold during the 2001 HOACGA convention auction for \$650.00. The only known marigold bonbon in this pattern sold at auction for \$475 in 1993 — with damage. This footed bonbon was named by the late John Britt.



4 Lotus Land (Northwood). The first amethyst example was discovered in Rhode Island and sold to a California collector in 1985. The second one appeared at auction from a collection out of Florida in 1987. A recent tally of these indicates that there are no more than six known in amethyst, all in the four-sided shape. The only known marigold, card-tray shaped, was at one time in the Don Moore collection.



5 Basket of Roses (Northwood). The first of these was found and named by Tom Sprain of California in the mid-1970s. The estimate is that there are about a dozen of the purple/amethyst examples. Marigold is known and a blue one has been reported. These can be either stippled or unstippled. The known examples are of the four-sided variety. The design is very pronounced and the exterior has the basketweave pattern.



6 Tracery (Millersburg). Limited to amethyst and green in oval or square shape, there is not much price differential so long as the iridescence is great and there is no damage. A rule-of-thumb: The green examples seem to have better iridescence. The pattern is quite unusual; a combined floral/stitching, such as a quilting effect. Desirability of these exceeds demand.



7 Daisy (Fenton). These are seldom seen, perhaps one per year surfacing at auction. While not one of the more expensive bonbons, it is nonetheless quite distinctive in design. Almost all known have been blue, although many years ago a marigold was reported. A collar-based bonbon, the exterior is smooth.



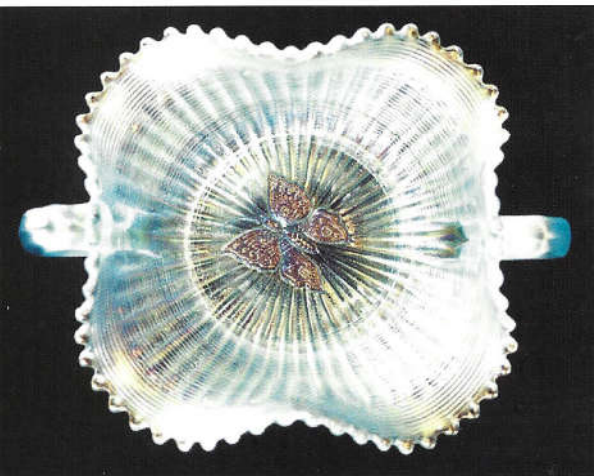
8 Night Stars (Millersburg). There are fewer of these known in marigold than in olive green or amethyst. Much deeper than most bonbons, this is the only pattern found in this shape that displays stars for a central theme.



9 Roses and Fruits (Millersburg). Marigold is found from time to time, along with green and amethyst in this stemmed and footed bonbon. Two blue examples are known. The exterior of the bowl carries the wide panel design while a stippled acanthus leaf seems to attach the base of each handle.



10 Butterfly (Northwood). Available in the standard colors of marigold, blue, green, and purple, with one known in true smoke having a smooth exterior. Interest heightens when the marigold, amethyst, cobalt blue, green, and ice blue examples surface with the threaded exterior! The resultant prices can be spectacular. Shown at the right is one of the few ice blue examples.

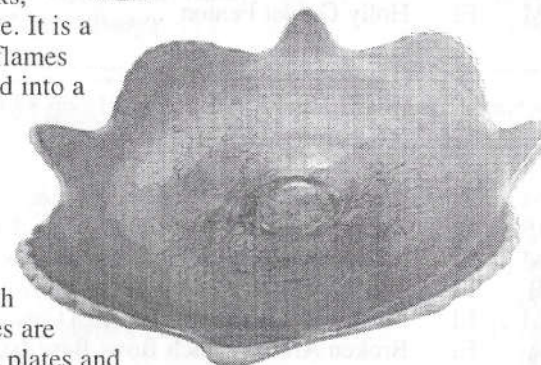
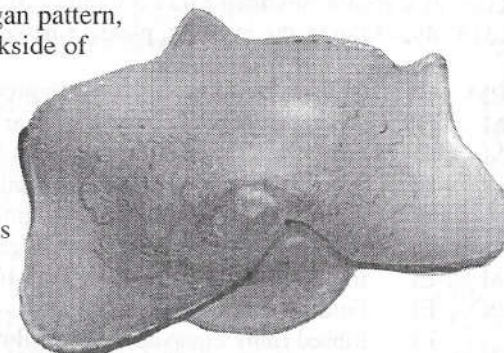

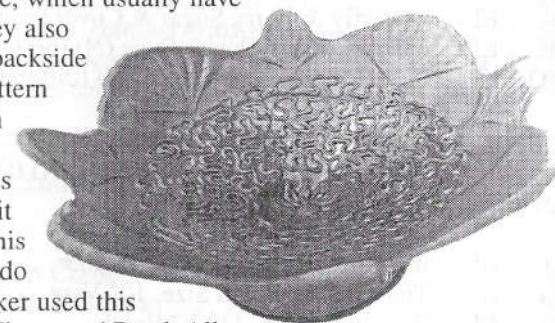
Western Daisy

"Western Daisy" is a Rare Dugan pattern, which only appears on the backside of various pieces. There are only about 12 Carnival glass pieces known, without a pattern on the frontside also. All of the known pieces are in the Peach Opal color except one, which is shown at the top in this article. The bowl has a very different color, it is either Clambroth or White with a lot of the pinks, blues, and green iridescence. It is a Rare shape with all of the flames turned up and it was formed into a square shape. The center picture is of a Peach Opal plate.



The bottom picture is the same bowl, but with the Soutache pattern, it is Peach Opal. Both bowls and plates are found with this edge. Also, plates and bowls with a smooth edge, which usually have the CRE, are known. They also have the Western Daisy backside pattern. The Soutache pattern has only been reported in Peach Opal. As with many of the Dugan pieces with a backside patterns it is very difficult to see. This is a very unusual edge. I do not believe any other maker used this edge. My name for it is Flame and Pearl. All of these pieces have the dome foot.
