



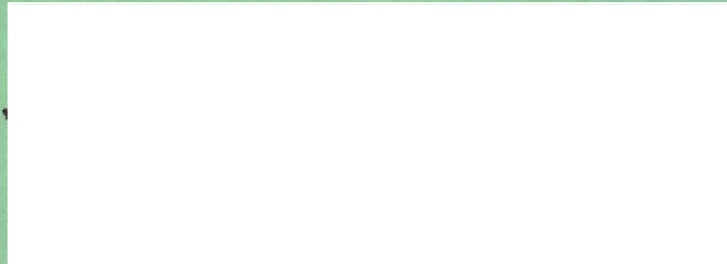

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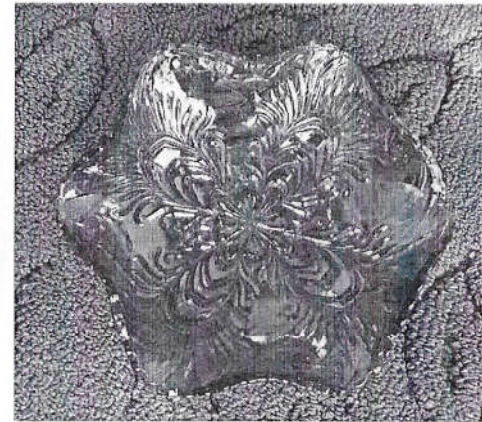
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HEADDRESS/ CURVED STAR

This Headdress bowl caught our eye recently on a search for something new at the local antique mall. No, we didn't buy it at the first fleeting look but strolled more than a few antique malls for a couple of weeks covering about a hundred miles before we came to a decision that that marigold

Headdress bowl was the most interesting carnival sighting we had seen. Oh yes, we did see other glass that we either already had at half the price we paid or glass that you wouldn't even consider buying because of the outrageous price tags. Does everybody have that feeling or is it just Lorraine and I? We often have to wonder why there is so little collectable glass to buy in this St. Louis metropolitan area with some 4 million plus people living about. Oh well, sometimes the hunt is more fun than the find anyway so we keep looking.

Well now, let's go back to the Headdress bowl. First we have to say that it is the only one we have seen other than pictures in a book. Is it pretty? Well yes, the iridescence is bright radium so it passes the pretty test easily. However, we find the pattern is a little strange. A center point flower blossom is surrounded with emanating palm fronds or feathers. The size is 10" with six serrated ruffles and it carries the Curved Star exterior. Both the interior and exterior patterns can be seen so it creates a very busy effect. This also reflects the light very well making a pleasing display. Curved Star bowls and rose bowl shapes have a factory ground base and thus you will usually find some small glass chips in the area of the factory ground base. This seems quite normal for this pattern and shouldn't be considered as damage. You would think that would be a clue to pinpointing the maker. It looks like it is separated from the mould in some irregular fashion and then cleaned up by grinding.

Curved Star has been attributed to several makers. Germany's Brockwitz, and Sweden's Ida Glass Works. The Finnish company Karhula and our own U.S. Glass conglomerate. Past Thistlewood articles suggest that Brockwitz made the Curved Star pattern with the file filler on the claws. This bowl has this feature. But Headdress on the other hand seems to be a U.S. Glass pattern. But this is not yet written in stone, so we are really not sure who made this combination of Headdress and Curved Star but the brilliant marigold iridescence combined with the ground base should tell us something.

So our search for something exotic continues, but in the meantime this bowl most certainly fits the description of exotic. First, it is a kind of unusual pattern, second, it could possible have come from overseas, and third, could be classified as "**just a little mysterious.**"

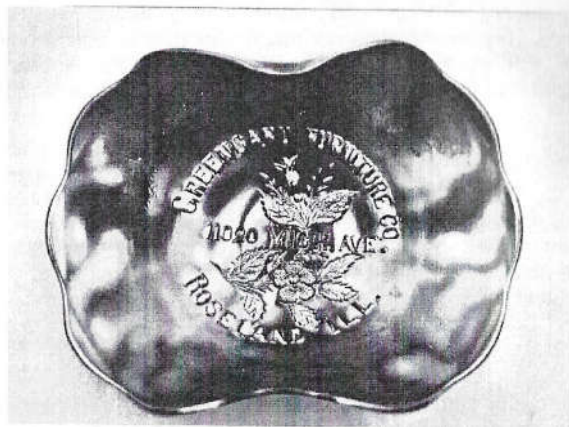
GREENGARD FURNITURE

*This article begins a series surrounding amethyst 6" **ADVERTISING plates**, of which there are 23 different pattern examples available in flat, handgrip, or DHG styles. Should there be a ruffled bowl in the pattern, we shall note that in the individual articles. John Resnik performed a service to all of us, when in 1989, he delved into a background history of each pattern, offering collectors the first documentation surrounding these specialty items. From that point forward new vistas of interest opened up and desirability rose, along with prices!*

During the time we were compiling and publishing the San Diego Club Newsletters, we asked Jack Adams for his personal account of the extremely rare and elusive Greengard Furniture plate. In June of 1998, Jack furnished an exquisite photo and detailed account of his DHG plate, saying that it is also pictured on page 133 of "Millersburg Glass as I know It" by Marie McGee. A color photo is found inside the cover of "The Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass Lettered Pieces" as well.

We will be referring to data from Jack's article, along with some from John Resnik's Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass Lettered Pieces, as well as personal data accumulated as we have moved through the years of gathering our collection of these treasured pieces...MANY of which require YEARS of patience and persistence to attain! We sincerely hope that members will enjoy the stories of acquisition!

appears in a circular design on the pieces, along with two different flower designs. Magnificent iridescence appears on front and back, having Millersburg's Wide Panel as an exterior pattern.

The main identification key is the base star, also found on the famous two-eyed Elk, Benesch bowls, and Peacock & Urn sauces. The scalloped edge of these pieces is identical to that found on Campbell & Beesley Co. handgrip plates by Millersburg.

The Resnik research states that sometime between 1885-1889, Max Greengard opened a retail furniture store at the above address, Roseland being a suburb of Chicago. In 1928, the company moved to 3400 S Halsted Street, changing their name to: M. Greengard and Sons. The company remained in business until 1974.

According to Jack Adams, the only known bowl was purchased from the Munson Auction on 11/5/83 for \$400, remaining in the late Don Moore collection until sold privately during the early 90's. Jack & Mary Adams purchased their DHG on 3/21/87 for \$625. Another handgrip plate is listed as selling on 11/15/88 for \$700. The most recent auction price for a DHG occurred in 2001 for the HOACGA Auction, when the plate pictured on previous page brought \$5,500...a pronounced reflection of heightened interest in the Advertising items since recorded research places more emphases on their value. No flat plates have been reported. However, one single handgrip plate has gone on record since 1989. (#1 in series of 23)

Tyneside Peacocks

A Look at Sowerby's Carnival

The Ninth in a Series on Non USA Carnival

In our previous two articles, we looked at manufacturers who marked some of their Carnival with the full company name. Riihimaki, Iittala, Karhula and Cristalerias Rigolleau all made items featuring the maker's name. But there are also marks on Carnival that are as good as the full name. The famous Northwood "N" mark is the best example, of course. It may only be one letter, but we all know what it stands for. Another example is the peacock trademark that was used by the Sowerby company of Tyneside, England.

The north-east region of England where the Sowerby factory was located is known as Tyneside: an interesting region, it is often fondly referred to as "Geordieland". There is evidence to show that the Sowerby glassworks was operating there as early as 1807. A director of the family business at that time was John George Sowerby, a talented artist as well as a businessman. He designed many of the cast iron moulds that were used in the glassworks.

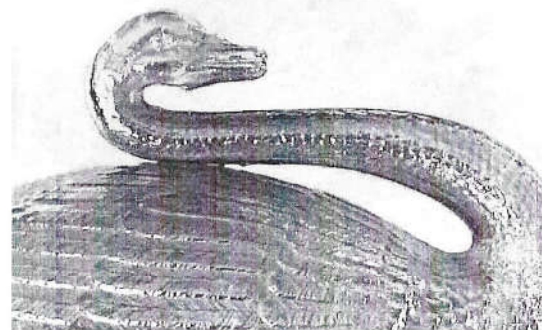
The trademark of the Sowerby glassworks was a Peacock's Head. It was adopted in 1876 (when trademarks were first registered) and can be found on many of their older pieces of glass. It was chosen for the company's trademark because it was the Sowerby family crest. It was a fortuitous choice, as the peacock was also a popular design motif of the era. Examples of the peacock head mark are not seen too often on Sowerby's Carnival Glass and are prized by collectors when found. This peacock head trademark has sometimes been misunderstood and misidentified in the past. It has even been described as a sea lion or a dolphin balancing a ball on its head. Others have mistakenly stated that the Sowerby mark is a letter S. (That is most certainly not the case - for the letter S is one of the trademarks used by the contemporary glass company, Smith). Sometimes, of course, the pressing is not clear, and only a faint squiggle can be seen - but once you know what to look for, you can spot it. Some of Sowerby's Carnival was marked with a paper label bearing the peacock head trademark - though examples of such ephemera are few and far between.

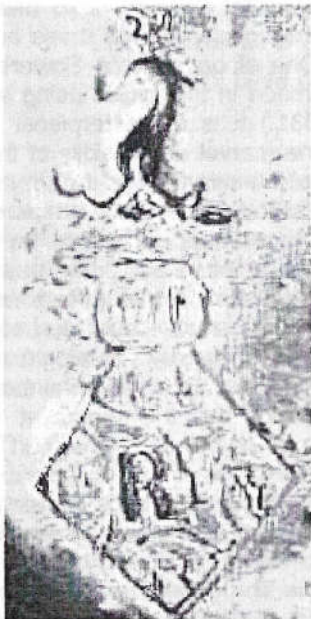
As well as using the peacock head trademark, Sowerby also used Registered Design numbers on some of their glass, though these are rarely seen on their Carnival examples. One of our favorite Sowerby items is the "Covered Swan" which was made in the 1920s using an early 1880s mould (Sowerby pattern #2031.) It is a masterpiece! A breathtakingly beautiful item that makes one marvel at the skills of the mouldmakers and glassmakers. The neck of the swan gracefully curves right back until it almost touches the swan's body. The whole shape of the piece is elegant and satisfying. The item was designed to be a butter dish, the swan being the lid that nestled into a scalloped base. On the inside of some of the lids, faint registration details (the letters RD and barely discernible numbers) as well as a peacock head trademark, can sometimes be very faintly seen. Sowerby's catalog from 1927 lists the item as being made in Sunglow (marigold) and Rainbow lustre (amethyst). Neither are easy to find, but the amethyst is exceptionally scarce.

There is also another "Covered Swan" from Sowerby that is similar in overall concept to the one detailed above, though the actual execution of the design has many differences. It is a newer version, though it is not possible to be certain when it was made. The only color reported is blue, and the space between neck and body is filled in with glass. The edge to the base is smooth, not scalloped and the lid fits on the outside of the base, not the inside as in the older version. We've not seen any of these blue Swans with a trademark.

So, if you're lucky enough to have an example of the older "Covered Swan" - check it out and see if you can spot the faint letters RD and maybe the vestiges of a peacock head.



Look at the amazing curve of the neck on the Swan. Truly a testament to the mouldmaker's skills.



Though faint, it is possible to see the peacock's head above the diamond shaped registration mark (this old mark preceded the use of the letters RD followed by a series of numbers). This was photographed on an old piece of Sowerby's opaque glass dating from the 1880s. No Carnival is known bearing a diamond registration mark - but the peacock head mark above it in the photo, is identical to those sometimes found on Sowerby's Carnival.

Price Guide 'Sinks the Boat'

If Sherman Hand's 1974 carnival price guide had been written for the Kurds of Kurdistan, the Lapps of Lapland, and the kangaroo hunters in the Australian desert, it would have made better sense. There's probably not a bushel of carnival glass in all three areas.

But Sherm's price compilation was for carnival collectors in the US - which made it totally bewildering.

Imagine buying an amethyst Circle Scroll water set at Sherman Hand's price of \$270 (that's right, pitcher at \$120 and tumblers at \$25 each) when the going market probably would be around \$7,500 for the set.

After reading Sherman Hand's latest effort, one collector wrote: "I knew Sherm had been spending a lot of time pickin' his guitar and I figured he would move to Nashville for the country music sound. But when he went to Seattle after his price guide came out I figured it was to get as far away as possible from carnival collectors' cries."

Historic Private Sale By O. Joe Olson November, 1973

In what will go down as a long historic night in carnival, a load of top carnival rarities changed owners Saturday, July 28. The private sale session started about 4:00 pm and negotiations wound up 12 hours later.

This took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Mogg at Hamilton, MO, a town of 1,800 population, 50 miles North of Kansas City. The principals were Jim Mogg and Henry Taylor of Beloit, WI, enroute East on a carnival selling trip.

Among the rarities added to the Mogg collection:

Water Pitchers:

Gay Nineties, amethyst, with tumbler
Morning Glory, amethyst
Lily of the Valley, blue, with tumbler
Flute, purple, with tumbler
Inverted Thistle, marigold
Fentonia, marigold

Other Rarities:

Flute punchbowl and cups, purple
Peacock at Fountain punchbowl and cups, ice blue
Farmyard bowl, amethyst

Two Grape-Cable candle lamps, amethyst
Perfection tumbler, amethyst

Added to other rare water sets acquired earlier, the purchase gave the Moggs a lineup of top rarities in water pitchers unmatched in the nation.

Top Items:

Gay Nineties, Morning Glory, Frolicking Bears, Lily of the Valley, Hobnail, Inverted Strawberry, Inverted Thistle and a dozen more rare water sets.

Mogg did not wish to supply either a general figure on the total amount involved or a specific figure on some of the rarities. But from previously published auction figures and private sale transactions known on the three top pitchers, plus Taylor's profit, the total transaction must have ranged from \$27,500 to \$32,000

Ordering information on educational and other items offered by the club will be included. Eleanor reported after spending many hours on the list of those whose addresses would not accept barcoding and had to be sent individually. There are still around 30 addresses that still require special mailing. She has had no feedback from members regarding the change in sending the newsletter by bulk mail. The change in printers has resulted in a savings of over \$500 per month in publishing the newsletter.

Treasurer Cliff Ball reported that all bills are paid and the club has \$17,148.04 in the account.

Several orders for Video Tapes have been received in the past few months.

President Grissom reported the storage facility has been cancelled and the club materials have been moved to the homes of the officers. This will be a saving of \$444 per year to the club. Bob reported on the inventory of Hartung books. We have about 25 complete sets of ten books plus a varying number of each of the ten books. No further printing of these books is planned at this time.

The 2003 Convention planning continued. It was decided to again hold the raffle of \$1,000 cash. Fenton Glass Company has been contacted in regard to a 2003 souvenir, room display souvenir and whimseys. Frank Fenton and Bob will be working on reaching some conclusions in these matters. Bob is working on the second section of Candlesticks for the notebook. The Britt Award nominees and the auction were under consideration and announcements on these will be forthcoming. Seminar and banquet speakers were considered and Bob will be working on this part of the program and report his results at a future meeting of the board. The display will be on iridescence and Charles and Eleanor Mochel will be coordinating this with John Muehlbauer.

The annual business meeting with election of officers was on Thursday afternoon and was well attended. The officers are:

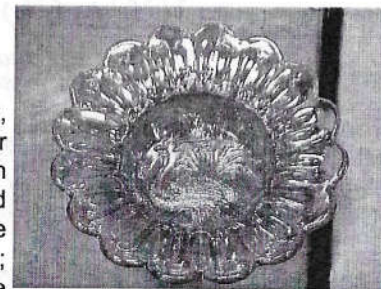
