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MYSTERY LAMPSHADE REVISITED

We need a little help on this one. Pictured with this mysterious lampshade is a recent birthday card I received that somewhat contradicts my problem. The card reads, "With age comes wisdom." But that doesn't seem to be the case here.

So when asked recently by another collector who wants to include this shade in a future book if I ever found any information on this shade, we have to confess that we have not. The shade was found several years ago. After showing the shade or a picture of the shade to several knowledgeable collectors and writing in the HOACGA bulletin an appeal for information, we apparently just abandoned the search until this request for information was received.

After a short computer search we found that our appeal for answers as to who made it and did it have a name was published in the April 2000 bulletin. So please bear with me as I go back to some of the previous write up. The shade is a nicely iridized marigold over moonstone, not signed, kind of heavy compared to other shades. A generous quantity of glass was used in the making. It is four and one half inches tall and has a five-inch flare. The fitter diameter is only two inches and factory ground on the inside. We mention this as many old carnival shades measure closer to two and one forth inches and many shades are not ground but rather crude, almost to the point of the glass being simply broken out of the fitter area.

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Mystery Lampshade Revisited continued...

The pattern detail can best be described as an attractive array of twelve draped tassels. One distinct feature that could be a clue is found on the bottom edge of the shade. The bottom edge of the shade has three dots followed by a dash that is repeated around the shade, with a row of alternating raised dots and dashes immediately above the bottom edge. This shade has an interior that is not iridized. We have other moonstone shades that have the iridescence applied to the interior as well as the exterior. We have Fenton and Northwood moonstone type shades but this shade just does not seem to fit into their style. So who made this one? Does anybody have the answer to this mysterious shade that they would like to share with us, or are you going to keep us in the dark?



DAVIDSON'S SOCIETY CHOCOLATES

Truthfully speaking, we have never SEEN a flat plate in this pattern. Should one exist, it could be termed Extremely Rare! Resnik's book emphasizes the same fact! Handgrips seem to be pretty scarce. No bowls are known. The only two examples listed in auction results for 2001 are card tray shape.

John's educated guess about the placement of this business was somewhere in Northern Missouri-Southern lowa locale. His 1989 efforts to substantiate this were repeatedly thwarted. Perhaps some of you have knowledge of its whereabouts?

There is no date on the piece to offer any clue in that area, but we must assume that since chocolate companies were "springing" up during the early 1900's, Davidson's too, made their endeavors during that time frame...and would it not be NICE to be given a pretty Carnival plate even today, if we were to step into a See's, or a Russell Stover outlet for a \$10-\$12 box of chocolates...Dream ON!

This was a Northwood endeavor, replete with their basketweave exterior. Note the smaller size mums used on the Northwood Advertising pieces?

The most expensive of the card trays sold last year at auction was \$700, but then we don't know whether there were any drawbacks, such as wear, nicks, dings, or cracks.

Then too, since "Iridescence IS the Essence" of our selections, perhaps there was some lack of it. The numbers of bidders with determination has a huge bearing on results, as well.

This was another successful purchase from an ad in the old Antique Trader. In July of 1987, we were both still working full-time and unable to travel from San Diego back to the Mid-West as often as we might have liked, although we did our best to "keep the desert path well-traveled by!"



Northwood's Horehound Grape & Cable


Very early in my 14-year love affair with Carnival Glass, I had the opportunity to visit with John Britt about collecting Carnival Glass. One of the things that he mentioned was that he was continuously amazed and surprised with the new finds in collecting Carnival Glass. He went on to relate that there were still unreported or undiscovered patterns and shapes and colors out there. That conversation with John was brought back to the fore recently when I acquired at a local auction an 'unusual' colored thumbprint Grape and Cable small berry bowl. It was color I had not seen before so it was a piece I simply had to win. I was fortunate as my competing bidder, apparently, did not know any more about the color than I. Afterwards, I learned he was under the impression that it was a strange color of marigold.

After getting it home and doing some research I discovered that I had purchased a piece of Northwood Grape and Cable in the Horehound color. Checking in Carl O. Burns' book on Northwood Carnival, I learned that he considers Horehound a very rare color in the Grape and Cable pattern. A perusal of Mordini Auction Guides certainly confirmed Burns' contention as to rarity of color in this pattern. Mordini reports only 11 items in Horehound in the Grape and Cable pattern selling at auction in the last 14 years! However, a closer analysis of those 11 items also suggests that 4 of those sales could be repeat sales of the same item in subsequent years. Interesting though is the limited range of shapes reported—the punch bowl and base, the PCE bowl, the tumbler, the hatpin holder, and the sweetmeat.

This example apparently is the first Horehound small berry bowl with thumbprint in the Grape and Cable pattern. John Britt was right. There

still are new discoveries to be made!

Horehound Grape & Cable punch cups or a pitcher or a master berry bowl would be real finds! Or some other shapes!



CZECH TOILETRY SET

I recently happened to come across the four toiletry bottles and stoppers pictured. I was most surprised to see that they had marigold iridescence to go with the beautifully enameled figures and floral designs. The figures are painted with exquisite detail and a different person appears on each container over the name of the bottles' contents. The enameled designs are on each of the four sides of the bottles as well as on the stoppers. The figures are in what appears to be 18th Century (or earlier) dress.

When I made the purchase, I believed them to be Czechoslovakian due to the two red rings circumventing the necks of each piece. My research led me to a book Made in Czechoslovakia by Ruth A. Forsythe. I found a picture of a similar set in clear glass, without iridescence, however, they were used to hold different products (I.e. Listerine, Boric Acid). Ms. Forsythe says that the items pictured in the book were all made between 1918 and 1938. I believe these were from the 1930's.

The set I own was used for Toilet Water, Witch Hazel, Peroxide and Bi-Carb. The latter, which held a granule substance, has a wider neck to accommodate a spoon. The other three were used to hold liquids and have a narrower neck. Furthermore, it is interesting to note that the Bi-Carb bottle has a female figure whole the other three are males.



You may not have many candlesticks in your collection, but what is your knowledge of the ones you have? Do you know the difference between a Northwood "Colonial," a Fenton "Florentine," or a Vineland "Colonial?" You will probably be able to identify some of the candlesticks in your collection.

The HOACGA Notebook section for 2002 contains photographs of 72 different candlestick patterns and the section for 2003 contains an additional 53 patterns, including the Fostoria Brocaded pieces. Most collectors have some candlesticks in their collection, but this is an area of Carnival glass collecting where information is not readily found. This is an attempt to compile them in one place, present as much information as possible, and to show them with a color photograph. These two sections are another very informative addition to the HOACGA Pattern Notebook.

Much time has been spent, not only by me, but several other collectors, trying to identify the various pieces. Information such as this is only possible with the help of many members who have supplied photographs and a listing of their candlesticks.

If you have not ordered these two sections, you are missing a good source for information about carnival glass candlesticks.



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COMING FROM THE SOUTH - U.S. HIGHWAY 71:





Carnival Hunter's Companion: a Guide to Pattern Recognition CD-ROM version 2.01

The Next Generation...

This labor of love began in 1993. As a newbie to the obsession of seeking carnival glass, I was extremely frustrated by how long it took to locate a specific pattern in Edwards' book, or any of the other reference guides available. As a librarian, I like to be able to lay hands on information quickly, and it just wasn't happening. So, I spent two summers staring through a large magnifying glass at every picture in the Edwards 5th and 6th editions. I gave each component of a pattern an "identifier," down to the smallest detail. My husband, Fred, is a software developer and created a data base that would cross-reference all the information. We self-published the book in 1995. It was well-reviewed and well-received, but the lack of photographs limited its appeal.

So the next step in <u>CHC's</u> evolution was to transfer the information to CD-ROM format. Glen and Stephen Thistlewood were supportive of <u>CHC</u> from its inception, and they partnered with us to add 378 photographs to the 1,000+ patterns listed.

So, how does it work? There are two basic components to the program – a list of Patterns, and a list of Identifiers. Let's say you have a pattern in front of you that you can't identify. It has several kinds of fruit in the pattern. You would go to the "View Identifiers" section. You might first put a check in the box next to "cherries." You would be shown a list of 25 patterns that contain cherries, some of which have photographs. To narrow the search further, you could put a check in the box next to "peaches." This would narrow the list of choices to five patterns. If you also put a check in the box next to "pears," your list would be narrowed down to four choices. Geometric designs are always a challenge for me to identify, but CHC can help narrow choices for even these most difficult patterns. Even if there is no accompanying photograph, you still have a manageable list of patterns to take to one of the many wonderful reference books that are available.

So we hope this will be one more useful tool that can be used in the search for this wonderful glass!
