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Twisted Optic?

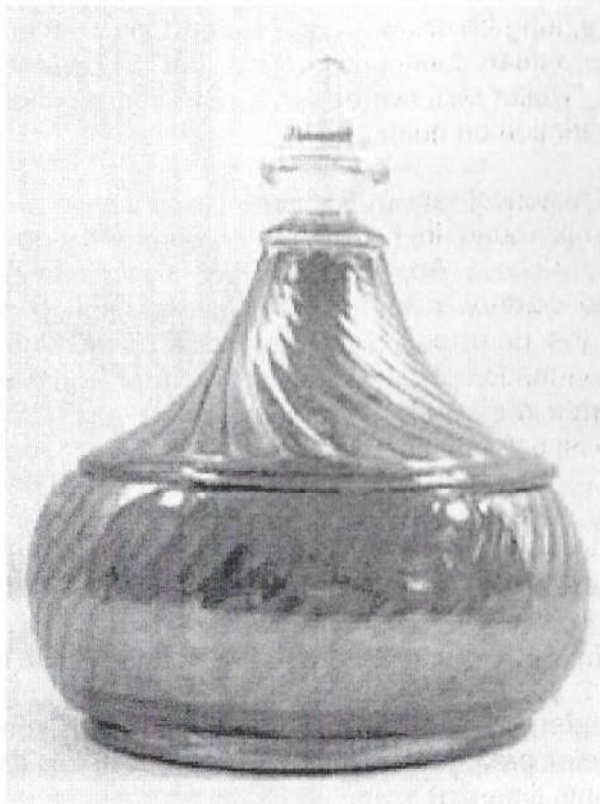
This covered jar presents to some extent a challenge as to just which company made it and what should we call it. After some considerable searching we did find it pictured in Bill Edwards' 6th edition of The Standard Encyclopedia Of Carnival Glass under Twisted Optic. But he states that it has also been known as Swirled Rib and Swirl. Although Swirl patterns had also been made by Northwood and possibly Dugan, Bill states that Twisted Optic pattern was an Imperial Glass Company around 1927. How's that for pinning it down. This covered jar is not even mentioned or shown in other references.

We have a very pretty marigold example and have always found pleasure in owning it. But we were surprised to see this smoke iridescence jar that was recently sold on eBay. Unfortunately we were not the high bidder, although we tried. The trick on eBay auctions is ending up the high bidder when the clock runs out. Not the same as having the auctioneer looking you in the eye and telling you that you might as well bid again, as you are already paying too much. You don't get that personal treatment on eBay.

This covered jar measures about four and three fourths inches in diameter and stands six inches to the top of the pagoda shaped finial. The base measures four inches across. The swirl pattern is internal and twists in one direction on the jar base and the opposite direction on the cover. An arrangement that is very pleasing to the eye. The iridescence like the swirled ribs is internal. This results in a clear glass finial and this can be better appreciated on the smoke jar than the marigold version.

Regrettably you may find it hard to appreciate the rich smoke color of this jar as this black and white article does little to bring out the colors, hint hint. But to the person, who won the bid on this jar, enjoy it as we have enjoyed just seeing it.



SEASONS GREETINGS EAT PARADISE SODAS

The case cannot be made that this was given away as some Christmas Holiday premium when one realizes that Paradise Sodas are actually CRACKERS!

The Paradise Roller Mills came into existence during the mid 1800's, long before Modesto, CA was even a city. The company's primary function was the grinding of whole grain into flour, "Roller Mill" describes the specific process used, and is a variation on grist mill.

Very little historical fact was available about this company, John Resnik found in his search for the 1989 Book on Advertising pieces. Apparently, they expanded around the turn of the century, making cracker products. The exact cause of the demise of this company is not known, but there is no mention of its existence after 1919. A major fire was reported during the summer of 1919, and though no specific losses were named, this could be the causal factor.

Very likely, this particular plate (no other known shapes) is the most available of all the 6" Advertising pieces. There are eight examples listed under auction sales for 2001 and the prices range from \$300 to \$685, indicating a very reasonable place to begin collecting these specialty items. As stated previously, patience and perseverance are requirements in collecting these Advertising examples. Once a color preference has been established within your mind, many times a piece will present itself, but not be within that color realm of acceptance to match the others you have accumulated. Then, you must wait for another opportunity.

For about three years during the mid 80's, Dee Sponsler, Erma Shaputis and I (Diane) shared space for antique shows held at the San Diego Fairgrounds in Del Mar and also in Glendale, CA. Three Carnival collectors in the same booth made for some tight moments on occasion, but one lucky moment came my way the day a dealer from the Los Angeles area set up in our aisle. He offered a good price for this piece, so that day in September, 1988 was when we became the owners of this nice little "cracker plate!"



PEARLY DOTS

Information on this Westmoreland Glass pattern is sparse, possibly due to a general lack of interest, and confusion with Fenton's "Coin Dot." But "Pearly Dots" is more difficult to find. Made in bowls, plates, comports, and rosebowls, a variety of colors may be found: marigold, aqua/teal, green, lime green, amethyst, amethyst opal, peach opal, and blue opal. Except for the comport, the same mold appears to have been used for all shapes, then finished in diverse ways. The tight-crimped edge treatment draws attention from many collectors of carnival glass. In part, interest is due to the lack of frequency in which it occurs, so the search provides a little more challenge. The six ruffled bowls are the most common shape in this pattern, with rosebowls coming up for auction less often than the other shapes.

The bowl shown here flares a bit into a tightly crimped, straight up edging, which is also called a 'candy ribbon edge' (CRE). The pretty lime green can be readily seen, especially at the collar base, although no price listing for this color is given in the available resources. How scarce are they? Or, are they not reported because of the low dollar range? Other inexpensive colors are listed as low as \$20 and up to \$100 for ruffled bowls... and up to \$375 for the blue opal composites. The word 'opal' tends to drive the price and interest up.

Like everything else, a piece is only worth what someone is willing to pay for it. This pretty "Pearly Dots" tight-crimped bowl belongs to my daughter and the lime green base color is intriguing. She took it to a convention to sell, because she is limited on space in her new condo, but there wasn't much interest even though it is quite pretty. The color and the edge treatment should have drawn interest, don't you think?

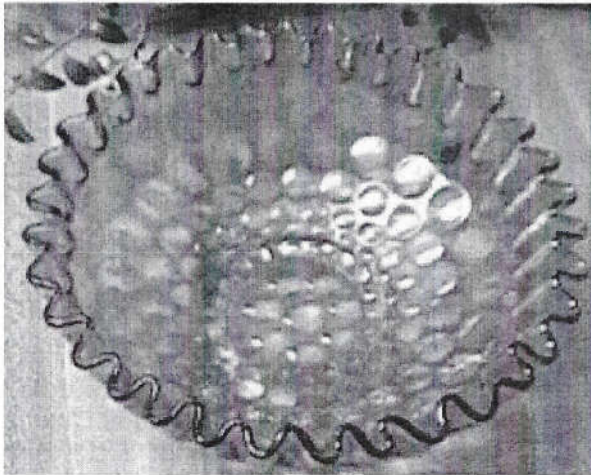
"Pearly Dots" is an under-rated pattern of dots that are more rounded, smooth and shiny, while Fenton's dots are flatter and stippled on "Coin Dot" pieces. The "Pearly Dots" extend out with seven (7) rows of dots from the inner circle to the outer edge,

and is known for its seven (7) smooth dots in the center that give the illusion of a flower with six petals and a center. That configuration is seen on the bowl pictured. However, I have a comport in blue opal that is lacking any design in the center, indicating the possibility of two (2) molds. If you have any "Pearly Dots" pieces, please check for that configuration. Perhaps, the mold with the plain center is used only for the comport shape?

Companies of the classic carnival glass era usually iridised both sides of the glass, but Westmoreland and Dugan seemed to have had at least one production plan in common. Much of their carnival glass is plain on one side, sometimes inside and sometimes outside. And it was often only iridised on one side... usually inside, regardless of where the pattern was. That leaves the clarity of the base glass on the other side to reflect internal qualities of the iridescence with an illusion of a radium finish. Both companies also liked opal effects, with Westmoreland producing a fair amount of iridescent ware on milk glass, both white and blue.

Westmoreland did things a little bit differently from the 'Big 5,' and that brings diversity to a collection. They attempted to offer a unique product for the eye of the consumer. I am thankful that they did. How about you?



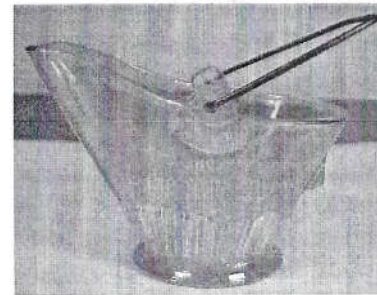
Hand-lettered and Stenciled Carnival Glass Souvenirs

Besides the highly collectible souvenirs and advertising pieces in which the lettering is molded into the glass, large amounts of carnival glass was made with the names of U.S. and Canadian cities, towns, villages, "spots-in-the-road," attractions, and events hand-lettered and stenciled on them. These souvenirs were produced by major manufacturers (for example, Cambridge, Dugan/Diamond, Fenton, Millersburg,, U.S. Glass, and Westmoreland) and probably also by other companies. They come in many patterns, shapes, and colors.

I collect the hand-lettered and stenciled souvenirs with Iowa connections. So do my sister and her husband as do other Iowans. We also have seen (and sometimes bought) examples from other states and provinces. We don't have a very good sense, though, of what's out there for states other than Iowa or the Canadian provinces, and even our knowledge of the Iowa souvenirs is undoubtedly incomplete. We would like to catalog the souvenirs from all states and provinces, and ask that you let us know what you have and, if possible, provide good photos.

THE SMALL CITY of Fairbury, NE, was put on the map in an indelible manner for carnival collectors when the DeLayne Eigenberg family there offered their 700 piece collection at private sale by mail in late January.

The sale was a model of organization.

Mr. and Mrs. Eigenberg mailed a 4-page listing of 370 carnival items and sets (about 700 pieces) on Saturday, January 22 to some 800 collectors and dealers.

The phone calls started January 26.

In three days, 48 items or sets (about 100 pieces) sold for a total of nearly \$12,000.

As expected, very rare and scarce pieces priced below the market were the first to go.

A Christmas compote in purple sold for \$2,000 to the James Moggs, Hamilton, MO, and the Garden Path (variant) 11-1/2" purple plate for \$1,000 to Don Moore, San Francisco.

Many of the early purchasers said they got what they considered "bargains." Both water sets and plates were in this category. The S-Repeat punchbowl set with 8 cups in purple sold at \$800.

The highest priced pieces that did not sell immediately were a Seacoast pin tray, amethyst, \$350; Country Kitchen 4-pc table setting, purple, \$600; the Grape Arbor water set, amethyst, \$1,000; and a Farmyard bowl, purple, \$2,000.

The Eigenbergs offered a 5% discount on any item if the buyer would pick it up at Fairbury, a city of 6,000 population, in the southeast part of Nebraska, about 12 miles North of the Kansas line.

DeLayne said they sought to reduce their collection by about one-half due to lack of display space. They have been collecting only about six years.

"We plan to remain active in carnival when we have reduced our collection." DeLayne said.

"We couldn't decide what pieces and sets to sell. We love it all. So we offered just about everything, except the children's collections. When about one-half is sold, we'll say 'enough'."

Eigenberg owns the Eigenberg Produce Co., which buys poultry and eggs in a 12-State area. Much of their carnival came from leads supplied by drivers, but most of the rare carnival was purchased by mail after telephone calls coast-to-coast.

The Eigenberg's son, Kenneth, 17, has a complete set of Northwood Grape/Cable pieces and their daughter, Karla, also has a choice collection. These were not included in the sale.

Other matters discussed - treasurer's report, progress on the pattern notebook section on Candlesticks, whimsies for selling at the banquet, roster, bulletin, speakers for convention, set up for the big display where volunteers are still needed. We had a very productive meeting and feel things are going on track for the convention.

There will be no board meeting in April as we will be attending the convention and have the annual business meeting.

These two sections are another very informative addition to the HOACGA Pattern Notebook.
