Alfred F. Steiner Ashtray

Advertisement glass give away is still circulating. This ashtray was found recently in a local St. Louis antique mall.

**Alfred F. Steiner, 1608 S. Broadway and 6119 Easton Ave

Our local antique shopping trips seem to yield less and less carnival glass treasures these days but every now and then you get desperate enough to buy something....anything. So when we spotted this marigold ashtray we knew we were not going home that day empty handed...again.

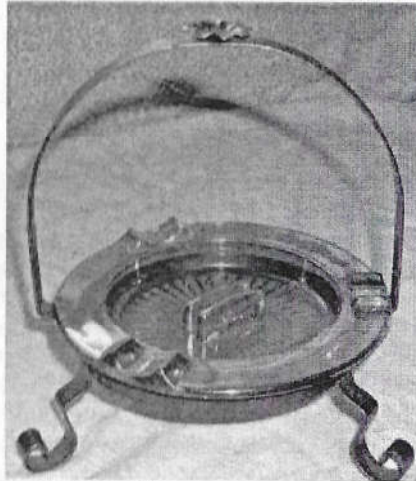
After questioning some longtime St. Louis residents, at a Missouri Numismatic Society meeting, we found that they did have recollections of this store. Coin collectors are a wealth of information when it comes to city history or for that matter, world history. This company was a well-known and respected men's apparel store in the St. Louis area. One collector friend who has his irons in many fires even had some old St. Louis city directories at his house. And the next day provided some details of the company's existence. The 1922 city directory had the Alfred Steiner store's address listed from 1608 to 1612 S. Broadway. By 1930 they were listed at two locations, South Broadway and Easton Ave., the addresses shown on the ashtray. Expanding to four stores in 1952 and in 1959 shrinking to three stores. They don't seem to exist today.

Yes, we know that a trip to the county library and a few hours of research would provide all the answers, but we were primarily interested in establishing that this marigold ashtray was indeed a piece of St. Louis history. David Doty's book "A Field Guide to Carnival Glass" shows a similar advertising ashtray with the lettering "Roth Bros. Meat Market". These ashtrays have a 5 3/4" diameter. We have seen two other similar ashtrays on eBay without advertising. One had a checkerboard pattern where the advertising would be and the other one with no pattern other than the sun burst design in the bottom. That ashtray was in a metal stand and we picture it here as well as the Steiner ashtray.

This stand is similar to the stand that Imperial's Star Spray is often found in. Many years ago we bought a similar metal stand holding two small Imperial Open Rose sauce dishes. We don't know the name of the company that sold these glass/metal stand combos, but they did seem to be buying Imperial glass.

So could these ashtrays be Imperial products? Surely there must be other advertising ashtrays out there? If you have one, we would appreciate hearing from you.



BALLARD MERCED, CA

There is no clue as to what sort of business the name Ballard represents. John Resnik states that months of research were required to discover a telephone listing for one Simeon M. Ballard Insurance and Real Estate, located in Fresno, CA. Seemed there were branch offices established in several small towns around Fresno; Merced being one of them. Further research revealed that the Merced branch manager decided to promote his own kingdom of interest, ordering this item with no mention of his decision to the parent organization.

Back pattern on this design is Basketweave. Maker is Northwood.

A Ballard plate sold in April, 2001, that being the only example listed for auction.

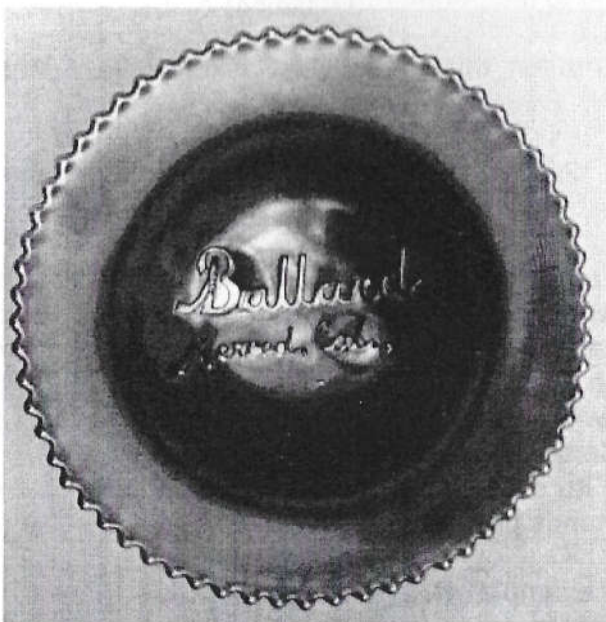
Although Mr. Resnik states in his 1989 publication that ruffled bowls are "available," with no H/G style verified, the overall availability of the pattern can be termed "scarce as hens' teeth." At the time of John's writing, only 4 flat plates were known. Whether that status has changed, is not known. Certainly, IF there are additional pieces, they have remained in collections over a long period of time, or changed hands privately.

Our plate example was purchased in 1987 from a couple who no longer are active in Carnival Glass: Chuck and Peggy Bullard of Northern, CA, while we were all attending a convention in St. Louis.

It is worth noting that this design, along with the Broeker's Flour design, are the only two known advertising patterns having no other than the script displayed on the front surface of the pieces. (We shall write about the Broeker's Flour examples in next month's Bulletin.)

A very lovely example of the flat plate sold over E-Bay on March 16 for \$2,000.00.



INVERTED FEATHER

I do like ice cream. And I like the glass shape shown here. They seem to go together, don't they? Isn't that why we collect things? I began collecting carnival glass for the beauty, but emotion often reigns now when a piece of glass stirs up memories.

The "Inverted Feather" pattern was made by the Cambridge Glass Co. To get my facts straight, I looked into the book, "Colors in Cambridge Glass" by National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. A collective effort that covers its category well, it has only one page of carnival glass, but I found it quite interesting. Let me quote... "*Cambridge first used this treatment in 1909 (preceded only by Fenton). It was again used extensively in the 1916-17 period and possibly in the late 1920s for a third time.*" The authors refer to 'Strawberry' and 'Feather' without 'Inverted' in the pattern name. How did we (carnival collectors) acquire the 'inverted' aspect?

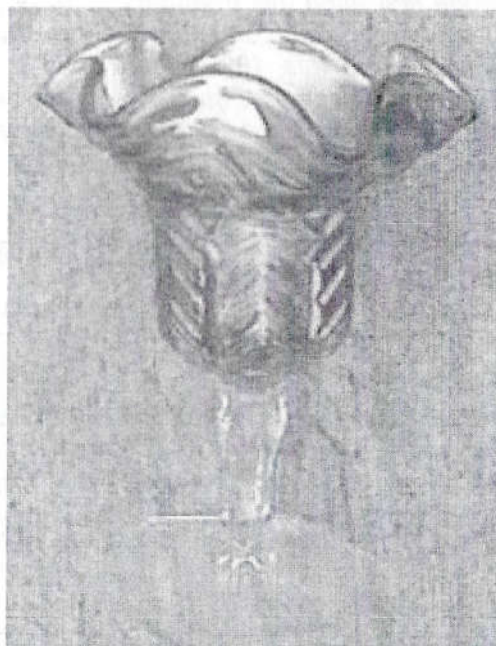
According to this book on Cambridge, most of the major lines of "Near Cut" patterns (designed to emulate cut crystal) were used for carnival glass production. In fact, NEAR CUT™ can often be found molded into the bottom of the glass item. Four (4) colors are listed with carnival treatment: Marigold, Green, Royal Blue, and Purple. It states, "We have been unable to obtain any Blue pieces for this presentation, but several are known to exist." I have never seen any Cambridge Blue Carnival Glass. But, wouldn't it be lovely?

Pictured is a small piece of marigold "Inverted Feather" with flair. But, what is the shape? The first name that comes to mind is 'comport' (or compote, if you prefer). The Cambridge Collectors call it an 'ice cream sundae.' In Edwards' Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass, it is called a 'sherbet' in the description, but is listed as a 'parfait' in the price guide. In Dave Doty's Field Guide to Carnival Glass, it is called a 'parfait or compote.' The shape

shown (whatever you choose to call it) and the cracker jar are the most common shapes in "Inverted Feather" by Cambridge. Other shapes in this pattern are considered rare. Other Cambridge patterns are quite rare, indeed.

Now, back to my ice cream. A caramel sundae with whipped cream and a cherry on top would make a lovely presentation in this pretty dish... a perfect dessert for an elegant luncheon on a warm summer afternoon. And if you can picture girls in organdy dresses enjoying the relaxation of a gazebo on the lawn, so much the better. I prefer 'Parfait' for this occasion.

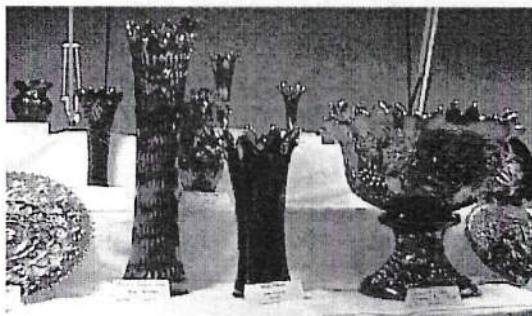

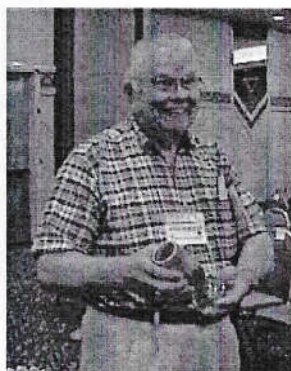
I believe HOACGA convention is so successful because it is always located in the same location and people know what to plan on. In my opinion Embassy Suites can't be beat for luxury and service. Great

HERE WE GO AGAIN!

With this issue we start another publication year serving the most elite and best informed carnival glass collectors in the nation. You are connoisseur, specialists, carnival aficionados! Best of all, I count you my friends.

Our 7th publication year was a dilly. With a lot of notes and a pile of unpublished stories, we locked ourselves away in January and turned out seven (7) issues including the 12-page special devoted to the famous Plummer Letters as collected and shared by Gertrude Conboy of Lawrence, KS.

We predated these seven 1971 issues by months, but mailed them out in a packet to the delight of scores who have written us.

We followed that up—from January 18 to May 30—with a series of ten (10) special carnival glass news "flyers" each mailed first class to this mailing list!

We wrote over 35,000 words and it took a lot of time, paper, envelopes, not to mention postage. The work was a "labor of love" but we ran "in the red" on paper, envelopes, postage, etc. The sale of new carnival did not begin to cover expenses.

But this is a new publication year. The old one is a memory.

Publication expenses this year will depend on your free-will gifts. If you are interested enough in carnival glass and want to keep abreast of developments—drop a couple dollars in an envelope and send it in toward expenses. It will be appreciated.

Even more important than a gift, write a few words and give me the news from your corner of Carnival Kingdom. Send along rumors that you want checked out. Best wishes for 1971-72. O.J.O.

CARNIVAL AUCTIONS MAKE NEWS

Carnival glass history was made in June, 1971 at two major carnival auctions attended by about 400 collectors who bought nearly 500 pieces of carnival and paid an estimated \$32,000.

The Kansas City sale of nearly 250 pieces grossed an estimated \$18,500. This came from the Dr. Al Whittman collection, Wichita, KS and 50 pieces of G/C marigold from Veva Amey, Ponca City, OK.

The three top items in price: Butterfly & Tulip, amethyst, flat-ftd. Bowl, \$700; Homestead NuArt purple unsigned, \$600; Singing Bird water set, purple, \$480.

Water sets, plates, rosebowls and mugs sold easily. When the quality was there, the prices were above average.

Richard Clair, Rushville, IN, who sold his 500-pc collection in May, bought three items: Millersburg Courthouse, chip in base, \$140; Raspberry milk pitcher, purple, \$110; G/C tankard pitcher, marigold, bruise and crack in base; \$375. He was a strong buyer at Dayton.

The Dayton auction, June 20, offered duplicates and culls from the accumulation formed by Raymond Wishard, Chambersburg, PA. About 250 pieces brought an estimated gross of \$13,500.

So many poor color and damaged pieces and sets were offered that some collectors might have thought they were at a Lodi auction except for the absence of minimum starting bids. At the Dayton auction, as in Kansas City, collectors started the bid where they wished.

Three top items in price at Dayton: Singing Bird water set, purple, \$340; B/C purple punchbowl and six cups, \$335; Proemta; water set, purple, \$330.

Perhaps the biggest bargain at Dayton was an amethyst Butterfly and Plume water pitcher with 2" crack in base and one rim chip with three tumblers, two perfect and one chipped, the 4-pcs at \$55.

Heaviest buyers at Dayton were Mr. & Mrs. John Roller, Jr., of the White Horse Antique store, Narrows, VA.

HARTUNG 1971-72 PRICE GUIDE

The new 1971-72 price guide on carnival glass by Marion T. Hartung, of Emporia, KS is a carefully done work giving average prices on all carnival items previously covered in her pattern books. It is in the conservative tradition of her previous biennial market reviews.

Only major omission was failure for a second time to include the Millersburg People's Vase (like leaving the all-American quarter-back on the bench), but this probably was occasioned by the tremendous workload the author has been carrying.

In summary: Common to good carnival up from 10 to 20 percent over two years ago. In the very scarce to rare category, much larger price increases are noted for many items but these listings trail behind prices being asked and paid for the major rarities.

Sample rarities from the 1971-72 Price Guide:

Age Herald Bowl, amethyst, up \$685 (over 1969-70) to \$850
Brooklyn Bridge Bowl, marigold, up \$145 to \$250
Butterfly & Tulip flat-ftd. Bowl, dark, up \$150 to \$250
Cleveland Memorial tray, amethyst, up \$250 to \$1000
Christmas Compote, purple, up \$150 to \$750
Elks' paperweight, purple, up \$575 to \$950
Farmyard Bowl, purple, up \$950 to \$1600

In Grape/Cable, Northwood, no difference in price was noted in the 1969-70 Hartung Price Guide between the 10-1/2" and the master 16" punchbowls with base. Now Mrs. Hartung lists them separately...

The master 16" punchbowl, purple, up \$580 to \$750, and the same punchbowl in ice blue or white, up \$1150 to \$1500
Hobstar & Feather Giant Rosebowl, purple, up \$150 to \$350
Peter Rabbit bowl, blue, up \$300 to \$500
Pipe Humidor, Millersburg, green, up \$400 to \$850

You may not have many candlesticks in your collection, but what is your knowledge of the ones you have? Do you know the difference between a Northwood "Colonial," a Fenton "Florentine," or a Vineland "Colonial?" You will probably be able to identify some of the candlesticks in your collection.

The HOACGA Notebook section for 2002 contains photographs of 72 different candlestick patterns and the section for 2003 contains an additional 53 patterns, including the Fostoria Brocaded pieces. Most collectors have some candlesticks in their collection, but this is an area of Carnival glass collecting where information is not readily found. This is an attempt to compile them in one place, present as much information as possible, and to show them with a color photograph. These two sections are another very informative addition to the HOACGA Pattern Notebook.

Much time has been spent, not only by me, but several other collectors, trying to identify the various pieces. Information such as this is only possible with the help of many members who have supplied photographs and a listing of their candlesticks.

If you have not ordered these two sections, you are missing a good source for information about carnival glass candlesticks.
