Made by Westmoreland? continued...

Green as well as white was missing in many Westmoreland patterns. Westmoreland had many glass colors that were easily recognizable as Westmoreland Glass. Such as yellow, aqua teal, amber, blue opal, lavender, peach opal, moonstone, amethyst and marigold over milk glass. By comparing it to the Westmoreland patterns that we have, such as Corinth vases, Leaf Swirl compotes, File & Fan and #270 compotes, Fruit salad punch bowl, Little Bo Peep mug, the Scales plate and the Louisa rose bowl; we would have to say that the Louisa rose bowl is the only pattern that is even bordering on the possible family similarity.

This Daisy Squares rose bowl, although it was made with the basic glass color green, the top has a really attractive marigold iridescence. The bowl also has iridescence and a Honeycomb pattern on the inside. The iridescence on the outside of the bowl and the use of an interior pattern is another inconsistency when you compare it with our other Westmoreland pieces. Some few years back we had a display at a HOACGA convention called "Bearly Iridescence" with some Westmoreland glass arranged around a teddy bear sitting in a large Westmoreland amethyst Fruit Salad punch bowl. Now don't take this wrong as we do really enjoy our Westmoreland glass and are just pointing out that Westmoreland carnival had its very own concept of how to apply iridescence. And this nice-looking Daisy Squares just doesn't fit the Westmoreland glass color or style in our minds. What do you think?

## TULIP & CANE STEMMED COMPOTE

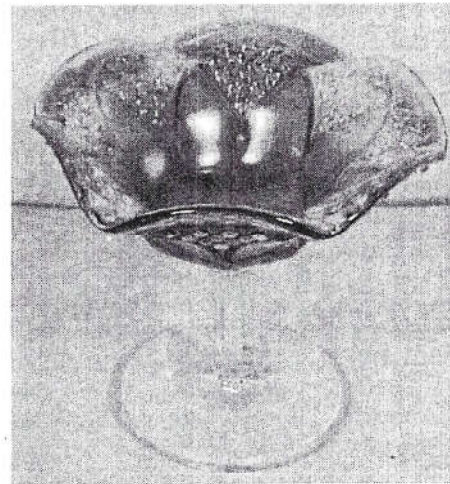

This article features the elegant stemmed compote in the Tulip and Cane pattern owned by Kevin and April Clark of Delaware, Iowa. This pattern was known in the production catalogs as Imperial #9, as Marion Hartung referred to it in her Book 6.

John Britt believed that we later collector called this Tulip and Cane from the appearance of the shape of the the stemmed pieces because they look like a tulip on a stem and have cane panels.

Marion Hartung referred to many pieces being produced in clear glass, including table sets, water sets, egg cups, pickle jars, cruets, two sizes of kerosene lamps, cracker jars, and comports (which she described as open, ruffled wide based bowls). Wouldn't it be nice to find some of these pieces with a carnival finish?

Carl Burns says that some people refer to this as a compote on a domed base, but he refers to this shape as a bowl. He states that the bowl shape is the only piece of Tulip and Cane that he has seen in a color other than marigold. He has seen this bowl in smoke. I recall seeing a small marigold bowl in this domed base in our carnival collecting. John Britt recalled seeing bowls in the carnival treatment, but didn't indicate the size of the bowls. He believed that the stemmed pieces were rather hard to find.



This compote reference by Mrs. Hartung to the domed based bowl is not the compote that is pictured with this article. This is truly on a stem. It measures about 4 3/4" tall, 5 1/4" for a top diameter, and has a base that measures 3 3/8". I believe that this was made from one of the stemmed pieces, but without measurements for those, I can't tell you from which piece that it was most likely made. This has what I would call a six crimped ruffled top.

At the outstanding display of Imperial glass at the HOACGA convention this year, Dr. Roy Hieger, who gave a great presentation on all the glass brought by the membership, stated that this compote is indeed a scarce piece to find.

When Imperial started making reproductions, they produced a goblet in blue, but this should be marked with their famous IG mark, so it shouldn't be difficult to identify.

Perhaps other shapes that were known in the clear glass have also been made in carnival glass. If you have a shape, or color, previously unlisted, it would be great to share it with the membership by writing Eleanor Mochel or me with your piece, so that we may include it in a follow-up article in the bulletin.

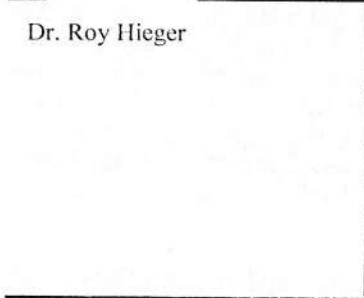

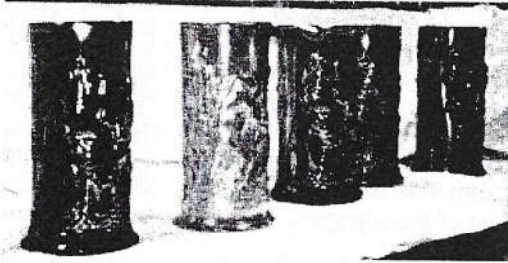

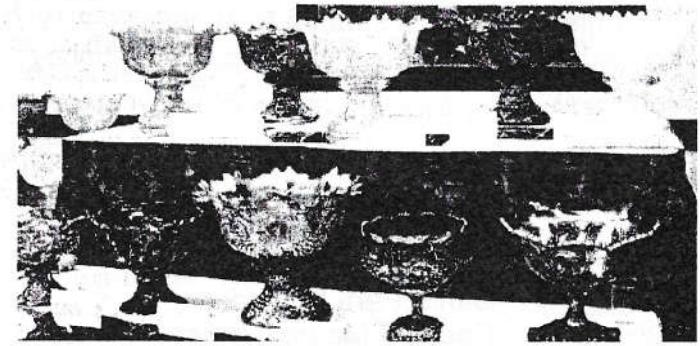

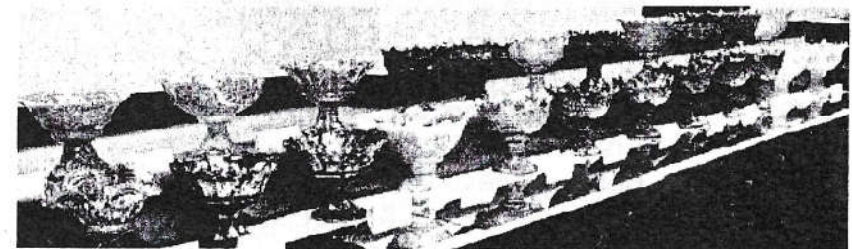

Both Fenton and Northwood made a "Guest Set" in the mid 1920's. Fenton's "First Twenty-Five Years" shows a set made in marigold with a royal blue handle. These sets obviously had a functional use. The pitcher for holding the water and a glass for drinking, this was probably one of the few functional pieces of carnival glass. These sets were made in several colors, but a very few are available today because of their use - they had a difficult time surviving.

As anyone that has experienced the administration of a Carnival Glass club, you know that you are constantly trying to find means of providing financial support. All clubs are experiencing a decrease in membership, which effects their financial position, plus the cost of financing the various activities is continually increasing. **WE ALL KNOW THAT THE FINANCIAL SUPPORT MUST COME FROM THE MEMBERS.** Many of the clubs produce a souvenir each year as one means of providing financial support.
