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
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OCTAGON WINE DECANTERS

Imperial's Octagon pattern can be found in many shapes and colors but when it comes to the wine decanters and wine glasses, marigold is unquestionably the most prevalent color found. And probably could be considered as the easiest Imperial wine set to be found in the marigold color. But other colors such as purple, although quite rare, do exist. The Carl Burns Imperial Glass book ranks a Helios decanter as even more rare than purple. Although, if we had to choose between the two colors, Imperial's fantastic purple would easily win out over Helios.

Pictured here with the common marigold decanter and wine on the left is an olive green decanter to its right with a blue wine. This olive green seems to be a seldom seen Imperial glass color. We do have another example of this olive green glass in an Imperial Heavy Grape chop plate. Neither the Octagon wine decanter nor the Heavy Grape chop plate are listed in olive green in the conventional carnival glass guidebooks. Where does this decanter color rank in rarity? We really don't know. This olive green decanter came from an Ohio carnival glass collector and fellow HOACGA member. And now we get to be its designated keeper for a few years, we hope.



Octagon Wine Decanters continued...

The HOACGA educational Series III books have an article by John and Lucile Britt on Octagon wines and cordials. Six different colored wine glasses are discussed as to rarity and color. The cordial mentioned has only been found in marigold and aqua and is considered quite rare in either color. The wine glass colors found in the Britt article are marigold, very common, cobalt blue, a very rare color, aqua teal again very rare with only a couple known, a frosty white, reported as the only one ever seen or heard of at that time, and Helios green very scarce and an equally rare purple. The article points out the fact that Helios although a very easy color to find in Imperial Grape pattern, Imperial's #473; it is really a seldom seen wine in the Octagon pattern, Imperial's #505. Carl Burn's book also mentions a clambroth wine, so are there olive green wines out there waiting to be discovered too?

Now the ultimate question is this: were these wine glasses at one time part of a wine decanter set or were the different colors just meant to tantalize the collectors of today? The next big question is how do we represent these subtle colors in a black and white photo? Color photos are available at a nominal cost. Just kidding.

NEW UPDATE BRAZIER'S CANDIES

I am looking at pages A5 and A6 in John Resnik's fine book, THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF CARNIVAL GLASS LETTERED PIECES. John says he has been unable to come up with any information about this company. I have some information.

I have a niece named Ann Ripley who lives in Helena, MT. She knows a lady there named Marie Brazier. I asked her to go see Marie to see if she could give us any information on Brazier's Candies. She came back with a wonderful newspaper article about Brazier's Candies and some post cards and some photographs. We now have a in the Fenton Museum a Brazier's Candies Lettered Plate, loaned to the museum by Marie Brazier.

Here is condensed information from February 12, 2003 edition of the Queen City News in Helena, MT. This is Volume 1, No. 38. The article is written by Kay Hardin-Hansen. Brazier's Candies was located in the Atlas Block at 9 North Main Street. Since that time, the name of the street has been changed to Last Chance Gulch. In 1905, Brazier's Candies was located with their retail outlet in Helena, MT.

Proprietors included John J. Brazier, President of the firm, and his brothers, Frank W. Brazier, Vice President and Albert R. Brazier, Secretary/Treasurer. They also ran a wholesale outlet for their goods at 115 W Lawrence. Before locating in Helena, around the turn of the century, the brothers had crossed the plains pushing a Mormon cart to Salt Lake City according to Marie Brazier. Her late husband, Jeffrey, an attorney, was related to the candy company owners, although his father, Charles, was in the mining business. Over the years, Marie and Jeffrey collected a few pieces of candy company memorabilia.

The newspaper article says a sign advertising Brazier's candy indicates that the gold and silver Salome boxes were a popular item in 1910. We believe that's about the time Fenton made the Amethyst Carnival Glass Plate for this company. About 1913, the retail outlet moved north of the Atlas Block to 133 N Main Street. A.R. Brazier, who was still Secretary of the company, decided that Great Falls would be a better located for the business than Helena. On April 14, 1914, Great Falls Tribune proclaimed, "Brazier's candies will be made here." There is no proof or

indication that the Brazier Company ever occupied the premises of Great Falls. After World War I with a sugar shortage, the business closed and John J. Brazier moved to Lewistown, according to Marie Brazier. A post card is reproduced showing the location on N Main Street.

PS Don Moore wrote an article for the American Collector. In it he describes carnival glass vendors and he illustrates the Brazier's candy plate and attributes it to Northwood. He also attributes the Age Herald Plate in Birmingham to Millersburg. We now know that both of these plates were made by Fenton. We live and learn.


BRAZIER CANDIES

over the years, we were delighted with a phone call from him on Oct. 6, 1997, telling us that he had just returned home from business interests in Helena, Montana, where he was able to discover from examining some historical records, that Brazier's Candies had been located there!

Maker was Fenton, has the Wide panel exterior pattern, and is available in ruffled and IC shape bowls, which can be termed scarce. The handgrip plates are also scarce, with the flat plates considered VERY SCARCE.

Bart and the late Sue Dooley collected some extremely desirable items over a period of many years together, attending numerous auctions, etc. We were able to purchase this plate from Bart in January of 2001 and thanked him heartily for allowing us the pleasure. This is one of the patterns which virtually NEVER appears at public sale!

This is a great place to state that were it not for the personal associations developed during nearly thirty years of collecting Carnival Glass, the Glass itself would have little value!

DIAMOND AND DAISY CUT

Now here is a tumbler where the regular size one was featured by John Britt in HOACGA years ago, but now it has a previously unknown companion in a larger size. As far as I know, only two of the larger have surfaced. We also now know for certain that it is a US Glass product as it was found in their catalog.

The regular sized one is 4" High, 2 7/8" Rim and a 2 3/16" Base. It has a 16 point star on the base. It is not ground. The larger size is 5" High, 3 1/4" Rim and 2 1/4" Base, also unground. Both tumblers were made around the middle to late 1920's.

Both of these tumblers have a nice marigold color. This tumbler has been found in green and pink in the larger sizes, but not iridized. These tumblers were made with a two piece mold, but it almost has the look of a piece of cut glass. Happy Hunting.

Summer is a time of travel, outdoor activities, and attending State Fairs with their 4-H animal exhibits, craft shows, carnival midway, greasy food specialties, and rows and rows of souvenir booths. This is the probable venue for the purchase of our pictured souvenir. The bottom of the Imperial purple "Heavy Grape" chop plate is etched with, "Mrs. Daisy Reynolds, 1913." Did someone buy a special gift for Granny? Or win a present for Aunt Daisy? Or, perhaps, a new husband purchased this loving memento for his bride?


About 8 years ago, we had the opportunity to buy a trunk load of miscellaneous collectibles. As antique dealers, my husband calls all merchandise 'junk.' In this case, it mostly was just junk. There were a few pieces of pottery, a Disney item or two, a lot of odd junk, and three pieces of carnival glass (which is what I was hoping for): one piece was Indiana Glass; one piece was a green plate, 2nd in the 1970's Imperial series "The Twelve Days of Christmas" (I ended up filling in the whole set); and one piece was a purple Heavy Grape chop plate with a thumbnail sized chip/slice at 2:00 o'clock on the edge and the personalized etching across the bottom. We didn't pay much for the whole trunk full, but I felt we got our money's worth in fascination for the chop plate alone.

In "Harry Northwood, The Wheeling Years, 1901-1925," by Heacock, Measell and Wiggins, page 60 states, "Carnival is, of course, a collector's term, derived from stories about this glassware, like others, being given away as prizes at fairs or carnivals. The association is an extraordinarily pleasant one, as most people have found, if not fanciful, memories of such childhood occasions. To a glassmaker, however, Carnival glass is a kind of iridescent glass." I have read that carnival glass was not only a prize to be won, but was sometimes personalized. Some of us have family stories to pass down, and some of us must fabricate our stories. With this chop plate in my possession, the personalization inscribed thereon conjures up many scenarios. We'll never know the real story behind it, but the visual imaginations stir a deep feeling of nostalgia. And, thus, we become entwined with the past.

According to Butler Brothers Catalogs, many glass items could be purchased wholesale for 69 cents (or 89 cents) **per dozen**, probably a lucrative venture for the midway entrepreneur. But, like so many

'cheap' souvenirs from fairs and carnivals, they may not have been valued to endure the test of time. Do you have 'personalized' carnival glass? What pattern? Is it small, or large like this chop plate? Is it dated? Mine has no city or state... does yours? Should the personalized pieces be included in the "lettered" carnival glass category? Surely, it should not be considered as "advertising" carnival glass?!?! What do you think?

Our friend, Candy Brockmeyer, has found an interesting piece of carnival glass. In the email photos that she sent, the bowl appears to be the shape of a sweet pea vase, or as she also called it, a potato chip bowl. It is when you see it in person that it becomes a really impressive piece of glass.



Her piece has a base measurement of 5 3/8", is 5 1/4"

tall, and has a top diameter of 10 1/2". It is basically the same shape and size as the Fenton Diamond and Rib jardiniere that we have had the opportunity to see.

Candy also emailed me the Shetlar Stretch Glass internet site, and they have a great article on the Imperial Bowls with Optic Panels. As we all are aware, Imperial made a number of paneled pieces. On some you feel the raise of the panels on the exterior, and others have the raised panels on the inside. This bowl has the raised panels on the inside, so that is where we get the Optic Panels name. This means that the pattern was made as the plunger pushed into the molten glass that was already in the mold.

In one of the illustrations, the Shetlars show a 12" bowl, number 695, with the same base size, but the top diameter varies by 1 1/2". I imagine that there perhaps was shaping done when this bowl was taken from the mold.

Candy's marigold bowl is not in what we think of as a stretch glass color, but it does have a stretchy appearance around the top edge.

As Candy can attest, if you keep hunting for carnival glass, you will be able to find some interesting pieces that are still available.

If any of you have a piece that is like hers, please let Eleanor Mochel or me know, so we can include it in a future issue.

Since our stay at ICGA's Convention in St. Louis, MO, was cut short, we didn't anticipate having an article for the HOACGA Bulletin this month. However, thanks to some very good friends, Don & Lynda Grizzle, we were alerted to the David Rose Estate Auction held by Alexander Auctions in Dyersburg, TN, on July 23rd & 24th. Due to Don's heavy workload, they couldn't make the sale -- so we thank them for passing this info on to us.

The sale included approx. 150 pcs. of Carnival Glass plus Cranberry and Opalescent glass, Fenton Art glass, Spode china, furniture, boats, house and lost more. Something for everyone!

Lloyd Ward, John & Linda Marshall, Les & Pattie Harris and Mike Cain (we think we have his name correct) were there and kept the bidding lively.

The auction was held on the front and side lawns of the home for sale with canopies/tents and fans to help with the typical southern heat and humidity. Still, Bud & I were reminded of how spoiled we have become to Carnival Glass auctions held in an air-conditioned room wiith softer charis, plenty of ice water and an accurate printed list of items for sale (incl any damage) and know that Item #1 will sell first and #2 will follow.

This auction followed no order even though the items had an assigned number and no guarantee which day it would be sold. Plus, as with many estate auctions, there was a 10% buyers premium. Rarely any damage was called and some of the glass remained in sealed cabinets until sold. Pattie and I agreed that Carnival Glass people need to hold the piece, feel the edges, hold it to the light and turn it this-way-and-that to see the iridescence before we feel comfortable in bidding on the item.

Looking at the on-line photos, we thought there might be an aqua opal Peacocks bowl. When we found the bowl in a sealed cabinet, and with very poor lighting, we still couldn't determine the base color (but it definitely wasn't aqua). Early Saturday morning, they finally brought the bowl outside and we couldn't believe our eyes when it turned out to be powder blue opal. Of, course, we weren't the only ones who were surprised and amazed. The bidding was fast and furious and no one was giving up well into the thousands. Non-carnival people looked at



Some of the featured pieces were the amethyst Mitered Ovals vase for \$10,000 (to a mail bidder), the blue Nuart Homestead chop plate for \$8,000 and the green one for \$4,500, the white Cosmos/Cane ladies whimsey spittoon for \$6,500 and the marigold one for \$6,250, the aqua opal Embroidered Mums ruffled bowl for \$4,500, the emerald green Beaded Bullseye 10 1/2" vase for \$2,100, the aqua opal Diamond Points 10-inch vase for \$1,250, the purple Luster Rose 7 piece water set for \$2,400, the green Hearts/Flowers ruffled compote for \$1,400, the purple Shell/Sand 9-inch plate for \$1,400, the aqua opal Rose Show ruffled bowl for \$1,200, the purple Thumbprint/Ovals vase for \$1,100, the blue opal Holly ruffled bowl for \$1,600, the purple Octagon small size water pitcher for \$1,700, the purple Homestead chop plate for \$2,700 and the amber one for \$2,100, the green Ohio Star vase for \$2,500, the green Imperial Grape whimsey spittoon for \$1,200 and the marigold one for \$1,100, the purple Hattie chop plate for \$2,000, the white Embroidered Mums bon bon for \$1,050, the blue Poppy Show 9inch plate for \$2,400, the purple Butterfly/Tulip footed bowl for \$2,200, the purple Open Rose 9-inch plate for \$1,500, the white Cosmos/Cane compote for \$1,000, the peach opal Strawberry ruffled bowl for \$2,200, the purple Tree Trunk elephant's foot 15" funeral vase for \$1,600, the green Hearts/Flowers 9-inch plate for \$1,700, the aqua opal Good Luck ruffled bowl for \$1,200 and the sapphire one for \$1,350.

LOOKING BACK

CARNIVAL GLASS NEWS AND VIEWS November 1973 Education at Conventions By O. Joe Olson

A national carnival convention is a good place to get educated in a hurry, but sometimes it is expensive.

Two rare tumblers, sold at the conventions in June and July, are good illustrations. One was offered by a woman collector who reads the <u>Carnival Glass News & Views</u>. She fared well. She knew what she had. The second was sold by a man who hadn't kept up. He "played it by ear." The tumbler sold in a twinkling and resold immediately. Today he is sadder but wiser.

Mrs. Audnee Pollock, Pittsburgh, wrote that she had read in the CGN&V that pieces in the Harvest Flower pattern were rare. "I took my amethyst tumbler to Staunton and it brought \$500 at the auction, so it

really paid me to read your carnival

news."

The dark tumbler in Harvest Flower, a Northwood pattern known in custard glass as Sheaf of Wheat, drew spirited bidding between Henry Taylor, Beloit, and Maj. Jack Adams, now of Ft. Eustis, VA., the former being successful. At Des Moines, a week later, Charles Mochel, Kansas City, KS, secured the tumbler from Taylor in exchange for a Perfection tumbler and some cash.

Forrest Horr, Marion, IN, sold an amethyst Gay 90's tumbler in good color, but with a tiny nick on the rim, for \$90 to Richard Clough, Carrollton, IL. The sale took place at the Des

Moines convention. A few minutes later, Mochel also bought this tumbler paying Clough \$250.

Mr. Horr, who witnessed the second sale, promptly wrote for back issues of the CGN&V and subscribed for 1974. He said he regretted having allowed his subscription to lapse in 1972.

The Marion, IN man also sold for \$100 a marigold 7-pc water set in the Mayflower pattern (Presznick). This is a scarce water set made by the Jenkins Glass Co., Kokomo, IN.

The dark Harvest Flower tumbler was the first reported. No dark water pitcher is yet known publicly although at least five pitchers in marigold are known and the marigold tumblers are not too scarce.

Marigold pitchers are in collections of J.C. Corrothers, Maumee, O.; Don Wilgers, Lake City, SD; Ray Wishard, Chambersburg, PA; and one in OK.

The Corrothers have two, the one in best color damaged, plus 12 marigold tumblers. The damaged pitcher was found by E. Ward Russell who sold it to William Crowl and Crowl passed it on to Corrothers.

The iridescence on most of the marigold Harvest Flower pieces is not outstanding. Hartung lists "tumblers only" in the price guide, marigold at \$22 and dark, \$35.

The tumbler in old custard glass is rare while the water pitcher in old custard is unreported. The late Cy Wright of New Martinsville, WV, secured an old Northwood mold and in the spring of 1969, he had hundreds of custard tumblers pressed in this pattern. The work was done at the Fenton Art Glass Co., Williamstown, WV. Fentons asked Wright to alter the "N" in a circle trademark by adding a line to the "N" making a "wobbly" "W."

There is nothing like a Carnival Glass convention to make new friendships, learn about the glass we collect, and even find a piece you have been searching for - Charles.

HOACGA BOARD MEETING JULY 8, 2004 - LAWRENCE, KS

The HOACGA Board held their monthly meeting in Lawrence on July 8, 2004 starting at 12:30 pm. All Board members were present.

Treasurer Ball reported a balance of \$16,344.74 after all bills were paid.

Secretary McMorris reported on the response to the survey regarding member interest in electronically receiving the monthly bulletin. Foreign members who opted to receive the newsletter by email would have their dues reduced to \$35. Ann reported nine responses - 3 from England, 2 from Canada and 4 from the US. To make the project feasible at least 100 members would need to sign up. The request for response on whether the members would prefer to receive the bulletin by email will be continued in the August bulletin. It had been the goal to send the bulletin by email in September, but that schedule cannot be kept now since responses will be awaited in August.

Members in central Kansas had inquired about moving the monthly meeting for one or two meetings a year to Topeka so travel time would be more feasible for them to attend. After checking membership in that area, it was found that only six members would be in the Topeka area and the Kansas City Metro Area has 18 members. The monthly meeting has traditionally been held in Kansas City and after consideration, the Board determined it would not be desirable to move the location. Both Fenton and Northwood made a "Guest Set" in the mid 1920's. Fenton's "First Twenty-Five Years" shows a set made in marigold with a royal blue handle. These sets obviously had a functional use. The pitcher for holding the water and a glass for drinking, this was probably one of the few functional pieces of carnival glass. These sets were made in several colors, but a very few are available today because of their use - they had a difficult time surviving.

As anyone that has experienced the administration of a Carnival Glass club, you know that you are constantly trying to find means of providing financial support.
