INVERTED STRAWBERRY CANDLESTICKS

The Cambridge Glass Company's Inverted Strawberry candlesticks we feel are in a class by themselves. They are a very bold intaglio pattern that feature realistic strawberries intermingled with leaves and blossoms. Green and marigold are the colors usually found, although in the Edwards/Carwile book, the 9th edition of the Standard Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass, they indicate that a rare amethyst example is known.

With a quick look back over the last ten years in the Mordini auction price reports, you will find that most years have only one or two of these candlesticks listed, and of course sometimes as a pair. Something common in the listings is the glass collector's "dirty little word." chips. These candlesticks are made with a substantial amount of glass and would have to be considered as pretty rugged. But, this candlestick sits on a scalloped bottom edge about one fourth of an inch thick that has a square rather than a rounded surface contacting the table. This square and rather sharp bottom design is very receptive to chip damage. And finding these otherwise beautiful candlesticks without any chip damage is unfortunately unusual. This is one of those carnival shapes that you may just have to do without if you have a low tolerance for damage.



But, if you are that much of a perfectionist, maybe you should be collecting cast iron banks or door stops instead of fragile, one-hundred year old glass that was made to be used and not just looked at.

Our green pair shown here have the unusual Cambridge appealing iridescence that just jumps out at you and demands attention. On a visit to one of the Cambridge museums in Cambridge, OH, you will find that the Cambridge Glass Company made lots of beautiful glass. Unfortunately, they didn't make that many patterns in carnival glass, but the carnival glass they did make are all easily recognizable and treasured by many collectors.

COCA-COLA IN CARNIVAL GLASS

We just bought this Coca-Cola tumbler from a dealer on Ebay. Its arrival prompted some research.

We know that this tumbler was made by Libbey, because it is marked on the bottom with their stylized "L" trademark. Libbey Glass has a long association with glass making. Under different company names, it has produced glassware from 1818 and is still in production, as far as I know. Libbey was probably best known for their production of fine cut glass, but, of course, had to be diversified to have remained in business for nearly 200 years.

When looking for information, I went to the Carnival Tumbler website, which is maintained by Ed Perva and Yolanda Lewis, and found that Ed had two Coke tumblers. His measured 4-3/4" tall, had a base diameter of 1-7/8", and a top diameter of 2-3/4". Our tumbler has different dimensions. It is 4" tall, has a 1-13/16" base diameter, and a top diameter of 2-1/2". Don thought that ours might have been the 3 cent size Coke, and Ed's would have cost much more - 5 cents. We would agree with Ed that this is not from the classic carnival production period.

Our tumbler has "Drink" in small white block letters, with the traditional Coca-Cola script lettering also in white. The iridescence is a strong, blotchy marigold.

With the arrival of our tumbler, our memories recalled the existence of a carnival glass Coke ashtray. Don and I were both convinced that we had seen an ashtray pictured in carnival glass literature. Then we recalled that my brother, Larry Keig, had purchased a Coke ashtray many years ago. After we contacted him, he located the ashtray, and reported that it is 6" in diameter, has receptacles for three cigarettes, and a raised rectangular protrusion in the middle, presumably for a small match box. On the outer edge, molded into the top, is "Drink," and at the bottom (twice) is Coca-Cola. The writing appears between the cigarette holders. The lettering is stippled. Pressed into the base is a 44-point rayed star.


He researched and found that tumblers had sold for \$80 and \$85 in 1980 and 1986 respectively, and an ashtray had sold for \$65.

The manufacturer of the ashtray is unknown at this time. We did find two different non-iridized ashtrays pictured in *Treasures of Very Rare*

Depression Glass by Gene Florence. These were made by the Akro Agate Company. Neither of the two pictured ashtrays fit the description of Larry's, so attribution of his will remain unknown.

After searching our carnival books, we still haven't located the ashtray that we all thought that we had remembered. If you have information on these items, or any other carnival glass Coca-Cola items, please write either Eleanor Mochel or me and we will include this information in a future bulletin.



STIPPLED RAYS REVISITED


As a follow-up to my article in the January HOACGA bulletin on our Square Stippled Rays Bowl, I have had correspondence from Joe Williams and Will & Judy Schutz on their unusual pieces in Stippled Rays.



Joe has a pair of green open compotes, or open sugars as Joe would like to believe. Looking through the Butler Brother's catalog reprints, I discovered a compote that has the same stem design, but a different edge design. I emailed the Fenton Art

Glass Factory, and James Measell emailed back confirming that Joe's pieces are most likely Fenton. He suggested that the top edge could be different depending on which top edge ring was used with the mold when the pieces were made. These pieces have the stippled rays both on the interior and exterior - like the creamer and sugar that Edwards and Carwile had attributed to Imperial, but that I felt were Fenton. Still no proof has surfaced to affirm either their attribution or mine on the creamer and sugar.

Will & Judy Schutz sent a photo of their green triangular shaped large bowl - most likely a mate to our square bowl. As I was looking for Joe's compotes, I discovered an advertisement in the Butler Brothers reprints that shows our square bowl along with a six ruffle and tight candy ribbon edge bowl. The short write-up says that they ranged in size from 8-3/4" to 10" with "six fancy footed shapes, crimped and scalloped edges, each shape assorted in golden, emerald green and wine ruby



colors, alternating iced and rainbow hued iridescent panel design, 1/3 doz. Each shape". Per dozen price was \$1.95!

So, now we know these were production items rather than whimseys. Still, these are great items to find in a rather simple pattern. If you have a large creamer in green, Joe would love to hear from you.

Had there not already been a pattern named *Stork and Rushes*, the name would have had to have been used for this one. As there was, this one was named after one of our more noted southern swamps – Okefenoke. It is one of a number of similar beer glasses with enameled designs. The Swallow pattern in the same genre was previously written up by John Britt. It is marigold in color.

Werner Sahn, owner of Rastal Glass in Hohr-Grenzhausen, Germany, was consulted about these types of tumblers. He has the largest private glass tumbler and stein museum in Germany located inside his factory. He states that these types of tumblers were first made after the turn of the last century in the Sudeten area of Bohemia in Czechoslovakia and were made for several decades.

These tumblers came in sets with six tumblers and a tall pitcher that usually had some German writing on it. All had pewter lids that were raised by pressing on a thumb tab. These iridized sets and tumblers are now considered very scarce to rare. The enameled stork and

rushes is in the middle of the tumbler between two rows of rounded bands. There are 14 panels inside the tumbler. Measurements are: 6-3/8" high, 2-3/4" rim, 2" base. A very nice tumbler for anyone's collection.



RESERVATIONS - Made by calling the Hotel directly at 816-891-7788 between the hours of 7 am and 7 pm on weekdays. Ask for reservations and mention the HOACGA convention. Fax: 816-891-0630.

PETS - Small pets are allowed. When you check-in, please tell the clerk that you will have an animal in the room.

ROOM RATES - All suites are \$102.00 + tax, per day for single or double occupancy. For three or four occupancy, the rate is \$112.00 + tax per day. The room rate includes a free cooked-to-order breakfast and a manager's reception each evening from 6 pm to 8 pm.

The Hotel has assessed a charge to the club for use of the meeting rooms, predicated on the total number of rooms occupied during the convention. So, even if you are only staying Friday night for the Saturday auction, please make your reservations at the Embassy Suites.





UPDATE ON RUTH HERRINGTON

Hello, everyone.

I will try to give you an update on what is happening with my medical appts., etc.

On Saturday, January 8, 2005, I found myself in so much pain (and without relief) that I remained in a constant state of tears. Cecil took me to Kaiser's Urgent Care. They do not have facilities to "do" anything except a one-time injection to relieve the pain temporarily. So they referred me to the Emergency Room. We arrived at Kaiser Hospital at Zion about 3:00 p.m.

The ER was virtually empty and they took me directly in. Amazing! Internal Medicine reviewed my tests and records and decided that they still could find no cause for my condition and insisted that a bulging lower vertebrae was the cause. They called Orthopedics even though I explained that I had already gone that route (as well as Neurosurgery) and the back was eliminated as a cause. Even so, another Orthopedics person came down and confirmed that my problem is not spine/back/bone. He conferred with Internal Medicine and set them straight. It was decided to admit me into the hospital in an attempt to get some control over the pain.

Sunday morning, Dr. Thomas (my Primary Care Dr. who is working the hospital only right now) came in. He immediately got involved and decided to get a barrium enema x-ray done for my diverticulosis to make sure nothing was missed or hiding from the CT Scan. So I fasted for 72 hours and lost another 12 lbs. or so. During that time, I saw all 3 Drs. from the Pain Management clinic, who are perplexed. The barrium x-ray showed nothing unexpected. One Pain Dr. came in that afternoon and gave me 2 injections designed to be "nerve blocks" but they did not accomplish the desired result. The pain increased greatly in my right leg for 2 days after those injections and my right leg remains somewhat weakened. Not happy!!!

Meanwhile, Dr. Thomas adjusted my pain meds. My 2 daughters and Cecil finally made their point that the Morphine I was taking was changing my personality. I was agitated, irritable and short tempered. Dr. Th. changed me to Dilaudid (another narcotic) that was having much better results, but had to be taken every few hours. He then put me on a patch for continued coverage along with an oral medication. This combination is now working well enough for me to be functional and I feel much better. With a handle on controlling the pain, it was decided to send me home Saturday afternoon (after 7 days in Hospital). I went to church on Sunday morning and was happy to be there.

Dr. Phillip (Pain Dr.) suggested that I see Neurology... who can test specific nerves for the source... then they can do a nerve block on the proper nerve. Good idea! I will be contacting Neurology this week to set up the tests. Oh, by the way.

It is comforting to know that all of the Pain Drs. are anesthesiologists and are experts in this type of thing. I have a new understanding for their specialty.

So, I am home and am functioning on some level. We realize that we will not be doing any traveling this year since we are suspicious that the narrow foot area in our van may have contributed to the "pinched" problem. We will <u>not</u> be attending any conventions this year. Our priority is to get this thing under control. Meanwhile, I have had a thorough going over in many areas that had been ignored for many years. Now, it is discipline over my life style and activities that is the focus.

Once again, I thank you for all your wonderful concern and care. The problem is not resolved, but I am feeling somewhat better and can function. I even cooked dinner tonight! Thank you for all your e-mails and phone calls. I will keep in touch from time to time. At least, I am catching up on my e-mails. I have a certain amount of computer work to do in the next few weeks for taxes, but I will take it slow and easy. I love hearing from you all. Keep in touch. 
