

AMBER SCROLL EMBOSSED SAUCE

This is a rare AMBER 5.5" Scroll Embossed Carnival Bowl Made by Imperial

Not only is the iridescence incredible but this is the only amber Scroll Embossed piece we have seen (in any shape)!! Rare + pretty = a great combination. The bowl has the File pattern on the reverse side."



recent eBay pronouncement for an unlisted small amber Imperial sauce had some somewhat cautious bidding for such a rarity but did manage to sell for \$00.00 when the bidding stopped. We can attest to the seller's description of the iridescence on the sauce but have disagree with

assertion that no other amber Scroll Embossed shapes exist as there are small amber compotes known. Also there was an amber bowl, with no description of shape or size, listed in the Mordini auction guide sold at a Mickey Reichel auction in June of 2004. Dave Doty's web site shows a small amber sauce selling for \$100 in 2004. Possibly this is the same sauce. Some weeks ago we too had the good fortune of finding this same sauce at an antique show (flea market) in Belleville, Illinois. The ebay sale was listed as coming out of NE Indiana.

These small sauce dishes are usually found in marigold, a pretty purple and a rare smoke. Glass sellers had touted the purple sauce dishes as being rare for many years and some still do. We have never seen a smoke sauce and have to say that we have seen more purple examples than marigold. This amber sauce is not listed in Carl Burns Imperial book or mentioned in any of the Edwards/Carwile books.

Pictured here with a small purple eight ruffle sauce the amber sauce appears to be somewhat larger because the ruffle is not as pronounced. Another thing that really adds to its beauty is that the file exterior shows through the semi-translucent amber glass.

So just when you begin to think that there is nothing left out there to discover in carnival glass, something like this pops up to brighten your day. Will some lucky carnival glass seeker find one in amberina or vaseline glass someday? Both are rare colors for Scroll Embossed.

LAUREL LEAVES A CROSSOVER PATTERN



Laurel Leaves is a simple carnival glass pattern, or a more complex stretch glass pattern. It consists of a ring or garland of leaves embossed or raised from the surface around the edge of either a round or octagonal shaped plate. Either of these shapes is available in two sizes - about 7 1/2" or 8 3/8". The size of the base is dependent on the size of the plate.

Marion Hartung was the first to show and name this Laurel Leaves pattern. She attributed the pattern to Imperial Glass, "because of the crackle surface". As we know, more information has become available to today's authors and internet web site authors.

Fenton has become known as the manufacturer of this pattern, as found in Margaret and Kenn Whitmyer's <u>Fenton Art Glass Book, 1907 - 1939</u>, and on the Shetlar's Stretch Glass web site. #757 is the number that the Fenton Art Glass Company used for the 7 1/2" plate. Perhaps their #758 is the 8 1/2" or 8 3/8" plate. I didn't find the round shape listed in the Whitmyer book, but the Shetlar's site showed both octagonal and round shapes.

Edwards and Carwile list plates in their price guide in marigold, amethyst and smoke, and say in their article that green is available. Looking through the Whitmyer listing of patterns available under the different Fenton Stretch Glass colors, they had Laurel Leaves #757 listed in Celeste Blue, Florentine Green (what we consider ice green), Persian Pearl (white), Wisteria (a pinkish darker lavender), and topaz (vaseline). They didn't indicate that #757 in topaz was Laurel Leaves like they did with the other colors listed. I found it interesting that under Tangerine (orange iridescent), a 13" octagonal Laurel Leaves plate was listed, so perhaps there are other colors in this size, as well.



There was no production number given for this 13" size. Also there are #757 & 758 listed in non-iridescent colors, so perhaps other colors will surface with an iridescent finish.

Pictured is our topaz, or vaseline, 7 1/2" Laurel Leaves octagonal plate with very pronounced pastel stretch finish.

It's always fun to find different pieces of carnival glass in a great variety of colors, even if it crosses over into the Stretch Glass category. If you have this pattern in a color or size that isn't listed, please let either Eleanor Mochel or me know.

Woody Bombs at St Louis

John Woody bombed at the ninth major carnival glass auction of 1973, November 10 at St Louis. The outcome had been predicted by a few collectors who did not attend while a few critics who looked on described it as a stink bomb event.

But it was interesting and exciting like most of the Woody carnival productions.

This was a consignment auction with fine carnival put up by six persons plus some spicy pieces by Woody. The crowd was smaller than usual - only 51 bidding members - which some attributed to the frequency of carnival auctions during the year.

To whet appetites, Woody opened with two pieces not on the auction bill. First came a rare marigold Diamond Lace tumbler, which sold for \$400 to John Britt of Manhattan, KS. (This tumbler, owned by George Loescher, Beloit, went in the auction after Woody guaranteed Loescher it would bring \$600 or more and he (Woody) would pay the difference if it failed to reach \$600).

Woody's second surprise was an unusual green Corn vase larger than the usual vase, featuring prominent husks out from the vase. This stirred the crowd and in spirited bidding sold for \$1400 to Loescher. (It was reported Woody secured the vase for about \$1,200 from William Crowl, ambulatory dealer from VA, who found it for a reported \$120 at a flea market in the East).

When the regular carnival went up prices went into a tailspin and the majority of pieces went at prices below earlier 1973 auctions.

Tumblers - Fashion, purple, electric color, \$200; Wisteria, white, \$200; God and Home, blue, \$160; Greek Key, green, \$85.

Water sets (broken up) - Fluffy Peacock, blue, pitcher \$300, tumblers each \$42.50; Stork and Rushes, blue, pitcher \$460, tumblers each \$22.50; Singing Birds, purple, pitcher \$390, tumblers each \$35; Maple Leaf, purple, pitcher \$190, tumblers each \$20; Peacock at Fountain, purple, pitcher \$295, tumblers each \$25.

Other items - G/C cov. compote, purple, \$230; Ivy Townpump, amethyst, \$430; Trout & Fly Bowl, amethyst, \$135; Three Fruits aqua-opal plate, \$215.

There were so many relatives and friends of consignees present that hardly anyone knew who was getting what. After a G/C purple centerpiece bowl, with a tiny flake, brought \$290, and the aqua-opal Dandelion mug, \$115, Woody refused to auction any more pieces from one table at the side of the main display. After the auction, Woody dictated the following statement which was printed in the November issue of the Heart of America club bulletin:

"The consignment auction (had carnival) from Art Hughes, Bill Dawson, Orville Fadler, Dr Ron Burt, George Loescher, Woody and an Illinois dealer. It is believed everyone played fair with the public except the Illinois dealer. When he bid on his own merchandise and got it more than once, the auctioneer refused to sell any more of his things."

Woody also told Dorothy Taylor, HOACGA Secretary, that he would only schedule four carnival auctions in 1974 and they would be held at least 60 days apart.

Remarks by Charles Mochel:

It was a great idea for the auctioneer to add one or two super rarities to an otherwise common auction. Raising the mood of the bidding with the higher prices for the rarities no doubt helped all the auction prices.

GANADOR

Ganador in Spanish translates as winner and this little tumbler certainly is that. It comes out of Argentina as part of the galaxy of carnival glass produced by the Cristalerias Papini glass company during their early years of making carnival. It is lited in their catalog under Vasos forma Barrila or what we would call barrel shaped glasses. There are several other carnival tumblers similarly shaped which eventually will have their own write-ups.


It has only been found in a rich marigold, but we cannot exclude the possibility of other colors. Only a couple have surfaced thus far so for now we have to classify it as rare. Its main feature is a band with stars and crescent moons beginning a half inch below the rim. Under this there is a band of plain glass roughly 1-1/8" in width which rests on top of 14 panels extending around the glass and down to the base. In the middle of the base is a small five point star.



The Ganador is somewhat smaller than your average tumbler being 3-1/4" in height. It was probably intended to be a juice glass as it is not shown in the tumble-up section of their catalog. The rim has a diameter of 2-1/2" and the base 2". All in all, a compact very pretty tumbler that would be a nice addition to any collection.



GUEST SET SOUVENIR

In 2004, HOACGA made about 145 of the Cobalt Blue Guest Set as a Souvenir. Any Carnival Glass Guest Sets, regardless of the maker, Fenton or Northwood, are rather scarce and always sell for anywhere from \$300.00 to \$750.00. It was our belief that a Guest Set would make a good souvenir, but they did not sell as we expected. Maybe it was because of the price of \$110.00, but having a souvenir made is not inexpensive. We think it is a unique souvenir, and a type that has not been made before.

In 2005, since this was the 100th Birthday of The Fenton Art Glass Co. we decided to take 48 of the Guest Sets and have them decorated as a Souvenir that would commemorate their 100th Anniversary. This Guest Set contains the official Fenton 100th Anniversary logo and the HOACGA logo (Good Luck and the Horseshoe w/whip), along with a beautiful rose and vine decoration. This is a very limited souvenir, only 48, and it also has the Official Fenton Anniversary Logo, which will only appear on glass made in 2005. This is probably the most limited and unique souvenir that any club has ever made. Some of these pieces are still available.

HOACGA PATTERN NOTEBOOK

In 1979 HOACGA printed the first of the Notebook sections. This section was on Punch Sets. About 750 copies were printed and they were given, no charge, to the membership. As the supply of this section ran out it was reprinted again in 1995, it contained 36 colored pictures with information about each of the sets. Since that time 12 different sections containing an additional 1300 colored pictures of various pieces of Carnival glass have been added. The last section contains photographs and information about 66 different Bonbons and Nappies.

Many books have been, and are still being published for the purpose of identifying and pricing Carnival Glass. The HOACGA notebook does not contain pricing information, but the different sections contain more information than most of the other books combined, the exception, Dave Doty's "A Field Guide to Carnival Glass".

All of the sections to the notebook are available to purchase by individual sections, if you do not have yours updated to the latest information, then you are missing a lot of information about Carnival Glass. If you do not have any of the information then you should at least order the sections that contain information that fits your collecting interest.

We have been publishing new information each year up to this time, but do the cost of publishing we will not be issuing a different section each year as we have in the past.

The last time I had a drink of alcohol we had 0 (zero) pieces of carnival glass in our collection. Guess it's sort of ironic how certain personalities can trade one addiction for another.....now Paula worries



what the next one might be! The reason I mention this at all is that when I was drinking, Scotch was my favorite choice but it was a choice that took a good while to develop. In carnival, vases seem to be the same sort of situation, I didn't really care for them at first and then at some point they became the FAVORITE.

Vases have a number of qualities that can make them the focus of your collection. The numbers of patterns with their different colors and sizes could make for a huge collection. They display so well in so many tight spots in the cabinets and shelves and they show off the carnival iridescence as well as any shape. The star of our vase collection is obviously the Blue People's Vase. After years of pleading on Paula's part, the Whitleys agreed to let us have it in 2,000. It cost a lot but we've never regretted the purchase. It is and should be the goal of any person trying to build a Landmark Collection. Tom Mordini told us that his opinion placed the People's Vases "at the top of the mountain" in this hobby. We have some other Millersburg vases that carry great pride. The Purple Mitered Ovals is so beautiful and delicate. The five examples of Ohio Star make a stunning display. The green one is a perfect emerald beauty, there is also a marigold, a purple, a crystal and an iridized crystal. We have Radium examples of Swirled Hobnail in green, marigold and purple.








Moving on to Northwood we'll start with the Tree Trunks. In the *Standards* there are aqua opal, sapphire, and blue. ice green and green. *Mid-Size* colors are: green, blue, purple, ice blue, white and the super rare lime ice green.

















Next we have the *Mid-Size/Plunger* based marigold, purple and emerald green. *Funeral Vases* are in white, electric blue, electric purple Elephant's Foot and nutmeg custard(but not iridized) *Midsized Thin Rib* in stunning sapphire and the RARE white..

Fenton Vases are represented with three magnificent Rustic Funeral Vases in blue, amethyst and emerald green. The emerald green vase is over 23 inches tall and just might be the prettiest piece of green Fenton out there. However, we'll have to let the bidders be the judge on that! Imperial vases featured will be Funeral Vases in the Ripple pattern in marigold, vaseline and electric purple. There are also two great Beaded Bulls Eye vases in electric purple and radium marigold.

We love our vases and really don't know how I persuaded myself to nart with them.....at least the

Scotch can't be blamed.
