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TINY TWIGS VASES

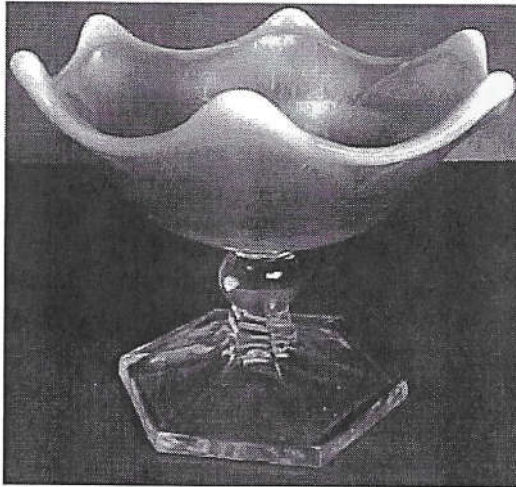
This petite vase was an early Dugan carnival glass product that was previously made in opalescent glass. Both the opalescent and the carnival versions were made during the 1904 to 1913 Dugan period. These vases are somewhat rare in carnival glass but are reasonably available in opalescent glass colors in two sizes. The smaller sizes are shown here in flint opal, blue opal and vaseline opal with a couple of purple carnival glass vases. And like their opalescent cousins the carnival glass tops vary in shape. The taller stretched Twigs Bud Vases came along a few years later and are easily found in marigold and an occasional amethyst vase can be found. These vases were made in the Diamond Glass Company years, 1913 to 1931 rather than by the earlier Dugan Glass period.

Available color wise, the Tiny Twigs is just the opposite from the stretched Twigs Bud vase as it is more often than not found in a very dark amethyst and rarely found in marigold. The two common carnival glass production shapes shown are called Crimped Jack in the Pulpit and Tri-Ruffled. Certainly other shapes may exist. Which of these two shapes shown here is more valuable is kind of questionable, we think, as neither shape is found very often. It may just be a matter of shape preference rather than rarity that determine the value that collectors are willing to pay.

Standing all of three and one half to five inches tall and with the somewhat delicate twig branches these vases were in all probability very susceptible to damage. The carnival glass Tiny Twigs vases are made with thicker glass and so are much heavier than the opalescent versions. This may indicate that they were having some problems during manufacture and even using the heavier glass, production was very limited. This would explain their rarity today.

ORANGE PEEL

Orange Peel, originally named #69 Orange Set, was a product of the Westmoreland Glass Company, with the iridized pieces dating to 1909. This pattern is known in a limited number of pieces in both iridized and non-iridized. Known shapes are the punch bowl and base, punch cups, custard cups, and a stemmed sherbet.

According to Edwards and Carwile, all pieces are found in marigold. The stemmed sherbet can also be found in amethyst and teal, and had priced one in russet green. Punch bowls and cups are listed in amethyst and teal. Dave Doty and Tom and Sharon Mordini have punch sets selling in amethyst, marigold, and teal. Doty has an amber punch cup selling as well. He reports sherbets selling in marigold and peach opal.

Chas. West Wilson, in Westmoreland Glass, believes the punch sets were made only in carnival glass, while the other shapes were made with fired on orange coloring, as well. He reports that a Butler Brother's catalog described the Orange Peel pattern as "realistic as nature", which it is, of course. The Butler Brother's ad that he pictures shows the punch bowl and base pictured with what we call the custard cups, the ones with the flames at the top. He said these were known as sherbets or bowls with handles. What we call the sherbets, he refers to as bowls with high colonial crystal foot.

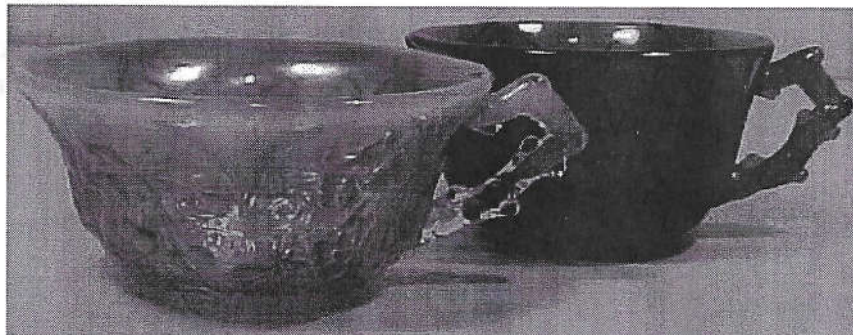
Both styles of cups have the rustic twig handle, which is similar, if not the same, to the handles on Fruit Salad punch cups, also a product of Westmoreland Glass.

I found it interesting that both styles of Orange Peel cups could be made with the same mold, just by changing the plunger. This allowed the punch cup to have the height of the rim raised to make the smooth top edge, which, of course, made it much easier to drink from it.

Have you seen the cup with the flames in carnival glass? Chas. West Wilson believed that this cup was sold only with the orange decoration, but then, it was pictured with the punch bowl which was listed as iridescent in the Butler Brother's ad. Also, another of his thoughts is that if the base of the cups are not ground and polished, they were a later version.

Pictured with this article is a peach opal sherbet, that to me, appears to be flattened more than the normal sherbet. I don't have a normal sherbet to compare. This stands about 3 1/2" to the top of the flames, and has an opening diameter of about 4 3/8" at the widest. Perhaps we could call this a sherbet compote. Also pictured is an amethyst punch cup and a peach opal Fruit Salad punch cup to compare the handles.

SHASTA DAISY SHASTA DAISY WITH PRISM BAND

Although Northwood made a pre-carnival pattern called Shasta Daisy this enameled pattern is not a Northwood product, but came out of the Fenton factory. First brought to the attention of collectors in Cecil Whitley's book "World of Enameled Carnival Tumblers" it has become one of the more eagerly sought after enameled water sets for the beauty and simplicity of the flower design. It is not a busy pattern and the fact that it was made only in the pastel colors of ice green and white makes it very desirable. Marigold has been rumored, but has yet to surface.

The enameling was applied by the ladies in the decorating room of the Fenton factory. I suppose that one at time or another, collectors have been told the story that the enameling was done by the worker's wives who were brought the blanks by their husbands to paint them at home. Romantic as this sounds these items did not leave the factory until they were a finished product.

The primary colors of the enameled daisies are green and white. The smaller tumbler is perfectly smooth inside and out, but the one with the prism band has ten ribs on the inside which extend through the base of the glass. The prism band itself is just a series of closely packed straight lines approximately $\frac{5}{8}$ of an inch thick. The measurements of the former is $3 \frac{5}{8}$ " high, $2 \frac{3}{4}$ " rim and a $2 \frac{3}{8}$ " plain base. The prism band tumbler is taller at 4" high, 3" rim and a $2 \frac{1}{8}$ " base.

These tumblers are not considered rare, but they definitely are in the "tough to find" category, especially the one with the prism band. Apparently they did not make as many banded ones as the plain ones. Happy Hunting!

2006 HOACGA CONVENTION

Plans for the 2006 HOACGA Convention are now underway, I am sure you will want to be in attendance at this convention. It will be April 26-30, 2006 at the same place as it has been for the past 10 years, the Embassy Suites Airport Hotel in Kansas City, MO, telephone 816-891-7788, the room rate is \$104.00 per day. The Hotel is located near the Kansas City International Airport (free shuttle service provided by the Hotel). All of the rooms are two room suites. A cooked-to-order breakfast and/or a breakfast buffet and the Managers reception each evening are included with the room rate.

RESERVATIONS - If you are considering attending the convention, **please make your reservations early**. The reservation can always be cancelled if you cannot attend. After April 1, 2006, the room charge will be the regular rate and a room may not be available. If you call for a reservation and are told there are no rooms available, or if you have a problem making your reservation, please call Bob Grissom (816-356-5320 home, or 816-896-1931 cell). Bob will make every attempt to accommodate everyone who wants to attend.

ROOM ASSIGNMENTS - Bob Grissom pre-assigns all the rooms. This facilitates our effort to put members on the lower floors and in a group. The 3rd floor is a smoking floor. Occasionally, it is necessary to place non-smokers on the 3rd floor in order to keep the group together. Bob does know some members cannot tolerate a smoking room, so if you are assigned a 3rd floor room and cannot accept it, contact Bob Grissom at the hotel and he will work to make a change for you.

PETS - Small pets are allowed. When you check in, please tell the clerk that you will have an animal in the room.

PRE-REGISTRATION - It is helpful to have those attending the convention to be pre-registered. This gives the secretary an opportunity before the convention to prepare your packet with the program, badges, and other information and you can avoid a wait at the registration table. A special extra is that those members who pre-register will have their names entered into a drawing for a special piece of glass to be awarded at the banquet. You must be present to win.

HOSPITALITY ROOM & DIRTY BINGO - For those arriving on Wednesday, we are planning to have a Hospitality Room with food and drink. The time and location will be announced on the Schedule of Events. After the Hospitality Room closes, we will play "Dirty Bingo" in a location to be announced.

ROOM DISPLAYS - We encourage you to bring glass and set up a room display. Displays should be set up in front of your room window so they can be viewed and judged from the hallway. Displays are always an enjoyable, educational and conversational part of the convention. This is also a fine opportunity to view other displays and view something you have not seen before as well as get a look at some outstanding pieces of glass. Many unique ways of displaying glass have been used.

Every carnival collector know the Bookers and how much they have contributed to the Carnival Glass collecting hobby. They have given educational seminars, been the editors of the ICGA Pump for many years and they have served on the Board of Directors of both the ICGA and ACGA and also their local club. They will be honored at the Luncheon on Friday. Maybe we can get Floyd Whitley and Carl Schroeder to give some background information about them.

FRIDAY LUNCHEON/ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING - Following the luncheon and award, the annual business meeting will be held. We encourage those in attendance at the luncheon to remain for the business meeting as this is an opportune time to put forth your ideas and suggestions for the coming year to aid the officers in their decisions.

EDUCATIONAL TALKS - We will have an educational talk by David Shetlar Co-author of the "American Iridescent Stretch Glass" book. We are very pleased to have him as one of our speakers. This is another aspect of our Carnival Glass collecting.

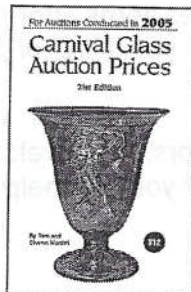

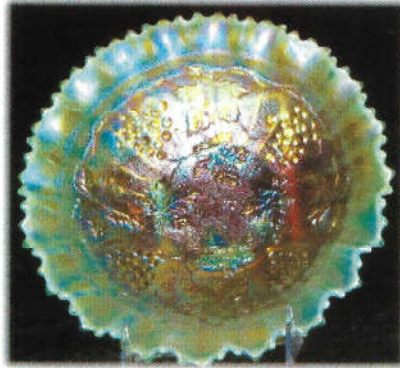

A Pleasure To Behold and A Privilege To Own

One of the nicest things about having fellow collectors in to see your glass is when someone you really respect says "WOW"; or "This is cool can I pick it up?"

Some times they comment on a different way things may be displayed or appreciate a rarity that your neighbors couldn't care less about.

Three years ago the "Two Maries" (McGee and Capps) visited our home during the Texas Convention, Marie McGee was giving the banquet talk on Millersburg and along with a few pieces from the Whitley collection she was using our glass for the display. It made us feel really good when Marie



Capps said "Wow, I thought I had a lot of Aqua Opal, when did you get all this?" The next year we visited her home and found out she was just being kind.....she really does have a lot of it!

Jim Lee told us early on that a collector develops a 'threshold of pain' in regards to buying this stuff. He said "You start out willing to spend \$50 on a piece and before you know it it's \$100, then \$200, then \$500 and when you get past \$1,000 then you're in real trouble!" We crossed that four figure threshold at our first TCGA Convention auction with an A/O Rose Show bowl. That bowl and a bunch of our future "trouble" appear in this auction.

There will be about 25 Aqua Opal pieces in the sale with many rarities and also great color.

Starting with Fenton, we have **two Vintage Bowls** in rare shapes; a round 7" and a tight crimped edge 8 1/2". The rest of the examples are all Northwood:

Rose Show Bowl, it's that 1st one we bought....we didn't really understand color then but Paula's good taste and a little luck got us a great one! **Grape & Cable Stippled PCE Bowl**, a **Grape and Cable Hat Pin Holder**. It's the first one that I remember selling publicly while we've been collecting. Since there are only 5 or 6 of these known, hopefully, bidders won't find the small heat check in one of the feet to be to objectionable. There's a real nice **Peacock at the Urn Sauce**, **2 Stippled Three Fruits Bowls**, (Collar Base) Standard and Variant, **2 Stippled Three Fruits Plates**, Standard and Variant.



I had never wanted a **Three Fruits Medallion** footed bowl because the color from the feet show through the pattern and looked funny to me..... but we finally found one that has so much iridescence that the base color on the feet don't show through at all. There is an incredible **Embroidered Mums Bowl** that we bought from Fred Stone.

It's the prettiest I've ever seen. We have 2 **Good Luck Bowls**, one is Ruffled and the other is Pie Crust Edge and they are a "matched set". The Pie Crest Edge has a small chip between the points that is more than trumped by the rarity and beauty of this pastel treasure. There are 2 **Peacocks Ruffled Bowls**, 1 with yellow iridescence, and 1 with pastel, both have great birds. The **Stippled Peacocks Pie Crust Edge** bowl (1 of 2 known) has a small nick between points that you'll never notice because of this bowl's stunning beauty. A number of collectors have commented that this is the best *A/O* Peacocks bowl they've seen.



Many people have asked "Are you selling the **Stippled Strawberry Bowl**?" The answer is "yes", and we'll probably regret it. It is one of 2 or 3 known, and is very pretty. This was the last piece of glass that George Loescher finally agreed to sell us before he died. We had hounded them for a long time and couldn't believe it when he finally said 'yes'. This is the best of many wonderful pieces we have bought from George and Mavis.



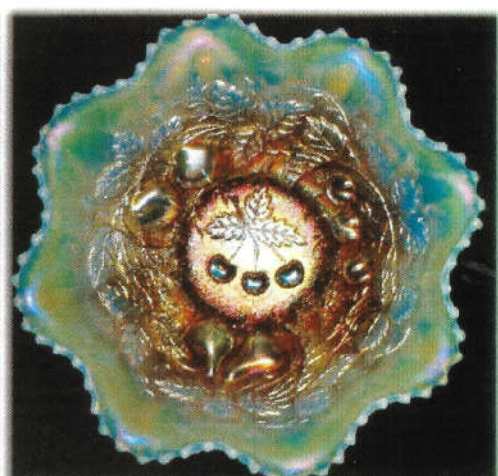
As we finish out our list of 25 with some smaller items I hope collectors aren't disappointed with the lack of Rose Bowls. Our Leaf and Beads has grown a small crack during its stay in Waco so I guess we'll keep it. Other *A/O* items include **Dandelion** and **Singing Birds Mugs**, **Double Loop Chalice**, cute and rare, **Fruits and Flowers Bon-Bon**, **Bushel Basket** and a

Hearts and Flowers Compote.
