OCTAGON WINE DECANTERS

Imperial's Octagon pattern can be found in many shapes and colors but when it comes to the wine decanters and wine glasses, marigold is unquestionably the most prevalent color found. It could be considered as the easiest Imperial wine set to be found. Other colors in Octagon wine sets are definitely a challenge to find.

We picture here the common marigold decanter and wine on the left. The purple top-less decanter in the center is our newest find and we regarded it as a must buy even without the top. It is pictured with a purple wine that can be found now and then. To its right is an olive green decanter with an olive green wine. The Imperial glass color olive green seems to be not an often seen Imperial glass color. We do have another example of this olive green glass in an Imperial Heavy Grape chop plate. Neither the Octagon wine decanter nor the Heavy Grape chop plate are listed in olive green in the conventional carnival glass guidebooks.

This olive green decanter was bought from an Ohio carnival glass collector. And the purple decanter was purchased on eBay from a glass dealer in Argentina. Where does this olive green decanter color



rank in rarity? We really don't know. But we note that the Carl Burn's Imperial book does list a Helios green decanter and wine glasses and declares it even scarcer than the purple set. A purple wine glass sold recently on eBay for a whopping \$175.27 plus the related cost of shipping. We do have one cobalt blue wine glass and wine glasses are also reported in Helios green, aqua and a super rare white.

Another tough item to find is the elusive marigold Octagon cordial. Be aware that many of the four-inch tall marigold wine glasses are offered on eBay as the smaller three and one half inch tall cordial.



HEAVY VINE - aka Balmoral

If you like simple, but elegant, patterns that can be found in a variety of shapes, then adding pieces in the Heavy Vine pattern to your collection will be fun. This pattern was made in Czechoslovakia, most probably by the Rindskopf Company, according to Glen and Stephen Thistlewood in their books. Their reasoning came from an advertisement in the British Pottery Gazette that showed the Balmoral pattern, which someone has since named Heavy Vine, because of the incised vine in a panel around the pieces. The National Glass Company who was the advertiser of the Balmoral items made reference to them being made in Czechoslovakia. Most likely, the advertisement was for crystal glass in the pattern.

The Thistlewoods report that there were seventy different shapes made in crystal. Perhaps as time goes on, many more shapes will be reported in carnival glass. At this time, the only reported color in carnival glass is marigold.



The most known shapes in carnival glass are the dresser set pieces, which include a tumble up set, covered powder jars in different sizes, an oblong pin tray, a ring tree, and pictured in Edwards'/Carwile's Encyclopedia, are two sizes of stopped colognes, and an atomizer. Thistlewoods show a butter dish and water pitcher. Doty prices a covered 3 1/2" bowl, mini rose bowl, shot glass, and two sizes of tumblers, as well as the dresser pieces.

He also shows a photo that he received from Patricia Walther of Buenos Aires, that shows a jug, fours sizes of stemware, and a wine decanter. Knowing Carl and Eunice Booker had several pieces of Heavy Vine, I contacted them, and they reported that they have four different sizes of stemware - 6 3/4", 6 3/8", 4 1/2", and 3 3/4". They also have a lamp, which they believe might have been converted from one of the cologne bottles.

Carl and Eunice believe that there might be a size of stemware between the 6 3/8" and 4 1/2". They weren't sure what size a claret would be, so I decided to check other glass stem sizes and their identification as to what they were called. I discovered that it was the amount of liquid the glass held that really determined the name. The cordials are the smallest only holding 3/4 oz. to 1 oz. Wine glasses varied from holding 2 1/2 oz. to 5 oz. The clarets ranged from 4 oz. to 5 oz., while water goblets held 9 oz. to 10 oz. It appears to me, since a claret is a type of wine, perhaps it depended on how much you wanted to drink as to what size the glass was that you used!!!

Pictured with this article is our stemmed that is about 6 3/8" tall that holds only three ounces. Now, since this is one of the taller sizes, what shape do you say we call this? Of course we, who collect carnival glass, know what size is generally referred as a wine glass in our hobby.

Since there is a butter dish known in carnival glass, are there other pieces of a table set known? Do you have another shape or color in the Heavy Vine pattern? If so, please let either Eleanor Mochel or me know, and we'll include it in a future bulletin.

I want to thank Carl and Eunice Booker for their input on this pattern for inclusion in this article.

DUGAN'S ROUNDUP

This beautiful, purple, Roundup bowl was shown at the September 18, 2004, meeting of the Hoosier Carnival Glass Association. It is almost flat, but the edges turn up just a bit. Our strictest definition would be a very low bowl in the ice cream shape. The iridescence on this bowl is outstanding. It has a very happy home with a lot of its brothers and sisters in different shapes and colors.

The Roundup pattern was made by the Dugan Glass Company. Mrs. Hartung gave it this name in Book III, page 91, of her Carnival Glass Book series. Mrs. Presznick gave this pattern the name "Egyptian Band." Mrs. Hartung makes the following statement: "...while we think of Carnival patterns in terms of fruits and flowers or imitations of cut glass, here is one refreshing in its unique flavor." Both Hartung and Doty refer to the lines or figures on the inner ring of these pieces and state that they look like western brands used on cattle, thus the name.

The Roundup pieces may be found in nine-inch bowls and nine-inch plates. The bowls may be ruffled, ice cream, or three-in-one shape.


The Roundup pieces come in a variety of colors as follows:

Amber; Amethyst/Purple; Blue; Lavender; Marigold; Peach opal; White

Some pieces may be found in a deep purple referred to as Oxblood. Peach Opal seems to be the most available color with Marigold quite hard to find.


We will discuss green carnival glass.

WHEELING COMMANDERY #1

Every now and then a collector upon reviewing a carnival item will show their appreciation by remarking that it is a museum piece. That happens to be the case with this very rare little Masonic souvenir juice tumbler. I happened upon the museum website after acquiring the tumbler. If you would like to view it in full color after reading this article, you can see it at:

All collectors have probably seen one of the elaborately enameled clear iridized Shriner's champagne glasses. This tumbler is also clear iridized, but more intensely iridized which results in a rainbow of colors. The Shriner's champagne has been attributed to the US Glass Company and it seems that most likely that US Glass also made this one. Given that Wheeling is located in the midst of an area with many glass factories, the attribution to the US Glass with its prior experience making such pieces it seems to be the best of many choices.

The tumbler is nicely engraved on just one side of it. Below Wheeling Commandery #1 is an engraved crown with a leaning cross inside of the crown. Below that in Gothic script are the words Knights Templar. And below that in three lines of Roman type print are the words Sistersville, W VA, May 18th and 19th, 1910. It appears that all these types of Masonic clear iridized glasses were made in the very early years of carnival glass.

As you can see from its measurements it also might have served as slightly large shot glass as well as a juice glass, but have you ever come across a person who actually served anything in a souvenir glass - strictly a cabinet item.

It's height is 3-1/2" x 2-1/16" rim and a 1-1/2" clear base. Around the inside of the tumbler there are 16 faint panels. This one must be considered very rare.

\$100,000.00 AUCTION - 2006

The 2006 HOACGA Convention will be one that will be talked about and remembered for several years. When members starting arriving on Tuesday and all through the convention there was a feeling of excitement and expectation. Pete and Paula Bingham's outstanding collection was to be auctioned. Besides the BLUE PEOPLE'S vase the collection contained many other very fine pieces. There are many TOP RARITIES, but the one that has gotten the most attention has been the PEOPLE'S vases.

NOTE: Much of the notoriety the PEOPLE'S vases have attained is due in a large part to Floyd & Cecil Whitley. They have had a part in the history of these vases and have been willing to display (three of the four known colors) and have people view them in their home.

About 10 years ago, Auctioneer John Woody, predicted that by the year 2000 a piece of Carnival Glass would sell at auction for \$100,000.00 or more. His timing was off but the amount was not. At the 2006 HOACGA Convention the BLUE PEOPLES VASE was auctioned and the winning bid was \$100,000.00. This was the first item to be auctioned, when the bidding started the opening bid was \$55,000.00 and moved to \$85,000.00 very quickly and it took a few more minutes to get to the final bid.

The winners were STACY & DESIREE WILLS the new owners, PETE & PAULA BINGHAM the sellers, JIM WRODA Auctioneer for auctioning the first piece of carnival glass for \$100,000.00!

Floyd & Cecil Whitley and Marie McGee were at the auction, so several photo's were taken of this historic event. The Whitleys the previous owners, Pete and Paula Bingham, Stacy & Desiree Wills, Jim Wroda, auctioneer, and Marie McGee (Mrs Millersburg).

Many choice pieces of Carnival Glass traded hands at this auction, many of these have found a new home and it will be many years before they appear again.




